## Businesses, Homes Are Burglarized

Tahoka police investigated two burglaries early Wednesday morning that had reportedly occurred during the night on Tuesday at the Dixie Dog and at the Texaco station in Tahoka. Entry to the Dixie Dog was gained through a back door that had been pried open. Reported missing was an undetermined amount of cigarettes. Entry to the Texaco station was gained through a glass door which had been broken. \$22 cash was reported missing from the cash register which had been pried open.

Jurline Payne of Tahoka re-

ported to police that someone had kicked in the front door of her residence on March 13 and had stolen a 19" Sony color TV valued at \$489.

Glen Akin Jr. of Rt. 1, Slaton, reported two tanks stolen from stock pens near his farm about 4 miles north of Wilson on FM 400 sometime during the last two weeks. The water tank and fertilizer tank were valued at a total of \$900. Akin also said a barn at the site had been burglarized.

Danny Orr, Rt. 5, Tahoka, reported his home 3 miles east of Tahoka on U.S. 380 was burglarized Saturday, March 28. Stolen were a microwave oven, .25 semiautomatic pistol and a set of golf clubs. The items were valued at a total of \$625.

Fifty-eight persons were in

Lynn County jail during the month of March, not a record high number, but close, according to Sheriff Clifford Laws. In jail during the last week were five persons on traffic violations, and one each for burglary of a building, aggravated assault, driving while intoxicated and violation of probation.

## Oliver North Named Chief

Lt. Col. Oliver North announced this week he would resign from the military because of mounting criticism over his role in diverting funds to Contra rebels and would move to Tahoka, where he will be chief of police.

He will not bring his former secretary to Tahoka with him. "Any shredding of secret documents at Tahoka city hall will have to be done by Hazel and Judy," he said.

North, a veteran of military combat campaigns, promised to be tough on offenders. "Anyone caught speeding or driving without seat belts fastened will be shot," he said, adding that those involved in serious crimes would be dealt with more severely.

He also promised psychiatric treatment for anyone who believes this dumb one-day-late April Fool story.

in 1986 the average Texas household paid \$217 in state sales tax and \$82 in motor vehicle sales tax. Now, if you didn't buy any motor vehicles, you paid no sales tax on one, so that means those of us who did buy one paid more than the average.

Getting away from the state taxes to the income tax situation, this is the last year for some deductions a lot of us have claimed in the past, but a lot of us have been confused in recent months by some reports on what the new tax law will do to us next year.

I was under the false impression that next year you could no longer deduct charitable contributions, not even church giving. And I had figured that this was going to hurt churches and groups like the cancer and heart funds. But this was wrong; my accountant tells me that all donations to such groups will still be deductible if you itemize deductions, and most persons probably do that.

About the only things in the old law that are immediately tossed out are deductions for state sales taxes and income averaging. The extra personal exemption for persons 65 and older is repealed, but these will get a partial extra deduction.

Of course, there are many more things that could be said about taxes, but just thinking about it taxes my brain.

THIS is as good a time as any to talk about taxes, with income tax filing deadlines coming up pretty soon, and since about the only thing you can do about taxes is talk about them (and pay them).

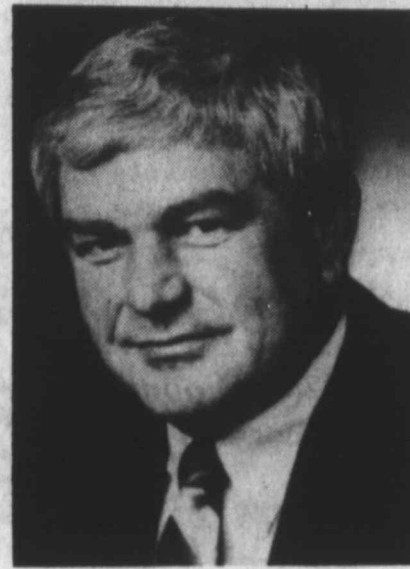

## Dykes Will Speak At Banquet Friday

William Taylor (Spike) Dykes, new head football coach at Texas Tech University, will be featured speaker at the annual Tahoka Chamber of Commerce banquet scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. in the school cafeteria.

Other highlights of the banquet will include announcement of the Man of the Year and Woman of the Year traditionally honored at the annual event. Chamber President Weldon Self will turn over the gavel of office to new President Bernice Phipps.

Entertainment during the meal will be by an unnamed band of business persons who will play mostly "big band" era music. Band members will include Bob Kern of Slaton, Billie Miles of Big Spring, Dalton Wood and Zane Curry of Tahoka.

The meal will be catered and decorations will be by Paris Cafeteria of Tahoka, with serving by 4-H Club members.

Tickets to the banquet are \$8.50 per plate in advance from chamber directors or the chamber office on the west side of the square, or may be purchased at the door for \$9.50.

During his last three seasons as the Red Raiders' defensive coordinator, Dykes made a name for

himself by molding Tech defenses that consistently performed among the best in the Southwest Conference. When David McWilliams left Texas Tech for Texas, Dykes quickly was elevated to the head coaching position last Dec. 6. He is a veteran of 27 years of coaching in both the college and high school ranks.

Dykes' defenses have earned a solid reputation of being stingy and hard hitting since he joined Jerry Moore's staff in December, 1983 as defensive coordinator and linebacker coach. He worked in the same capacity under McWilliams this past season when the Red Raiders compiled a 7-4 record and a berth in the Independence Bowl on Dec. 20.

Born in Lubbock, Dykes was an All-State center at Ballinger High School. He started his college career at Rice, transferred to San Angelo JC and earned All-Conference lineman honors at S.F. Austin. He graduated from there in 1959 with a Bachelor's of Science Studies degree.

He began his coaching career in 1959 at Eastland, and after one year, returned to Ballinger for two seasons as an assistant. He served as an assistant for two years at San Angelo Central starting in 1962, working under Emory Bellard.

Dykes' first head coaching job was in 1964 at Coahoma, and he left after compiling a 24-2 record during a two-year period. He went on to post a 58-28-1 record during his first eight years with coaching stops at Belton (1966), Big Spring (1967-69) and Alice (1970-71).

Spike joined the college ranks with Darrell Royal as freshman coach at Texas in 1971, coached the offensive line from 1972-74, special teams in 1975 and the defensive line in 1976.

Dykes moved to New Mexico with Bill Mondt in 1977, coaching the defensive line before becoming defensive coordinator in 1978. In 1979, he coached the offensive line at Mississippi State for Emory Bellard before returning to West Texas to coach at Midland Lee in 1980.

In his four years at Lee, Dykes was 34-11-1, running his overall record as a head high school coach to 93-39-2.

Dykes arrived at Tech and immediately made a solid impact on the program. Texas Tech was ranked 20th in the nation in total defense, during his first year in 1984. The Raiders led the nation in pass defense that year and finished second in 1985. In 1986, Dykes' defenders were the best ball-hawkers in the league with 41 takeaways.

Dykes, 49, and his wife Sharon have three children: Rick, who is an assistant coach at Rice, Bebe and Sonny.

## Voters Will Make Choices Saturday

Voters in four school districts and four cities in Lynn County will cast ballots in elections Saturday, and there also will be a county-wide election for four places on the Lynn County Hospital Board.

In the hospital board election, five candidates have filed for four spots. Candidates include two incumbents, Leland White of New Home and Bobby Cox of O'Donnell. The other candidates are Ann Wyatt of New Home, Joy Brookshire of Tahoka and Susan Tipton of Tahoka.

In the Tahoka City election, Mayor Jim Solomon is unopposed in seeking re-election, and three persons are seeking two places on the city council. They are Bernice Phipps, Milt Uzzle and Nicky Summitt.

Tahoka school board can-

didates are Thalia Burks, Gwen Patterson and Terry Harvick, with two of these to be elected.

In Wilson, incumbent Mayor Jackie Bishop is running unopposed for a one-year term designed to get the expiration date of that office back on the proper schedule. Five persons are running for three council seats, including incumbents Victor Steinhauer and Charlene Webb and new candidates Roy Isham, Oscar Ortega and Arthur Castillo.

On the Wilson school board, incumbents Servando Benavidez and Keith Wied are running again, and also in the race for those two spots are Jerry Dickson and Bobby Lee.

For the O'Donnell school board a three-person race for two places will involve Jackie Stidham and incumbents David Franklin and Finis Rogers.

Three incumbents are running unopposed for re-election on the O'Donnell city council. They are Tommy Woolam, David Smith and Billy Edwards.

In New Home, there are no contests in either city or school board elections. Four persons have filed for four spots on the city council, and Roy Blevins is running unopposed for mayor. Lee Roy Nettles and Cecil Kieth seek two-year terms and J.A. Evans and Louis Rodriguez are running for one-year terms on the council.

Incumbents Danny Nettles and George Dozier are running unopposed for the school board.

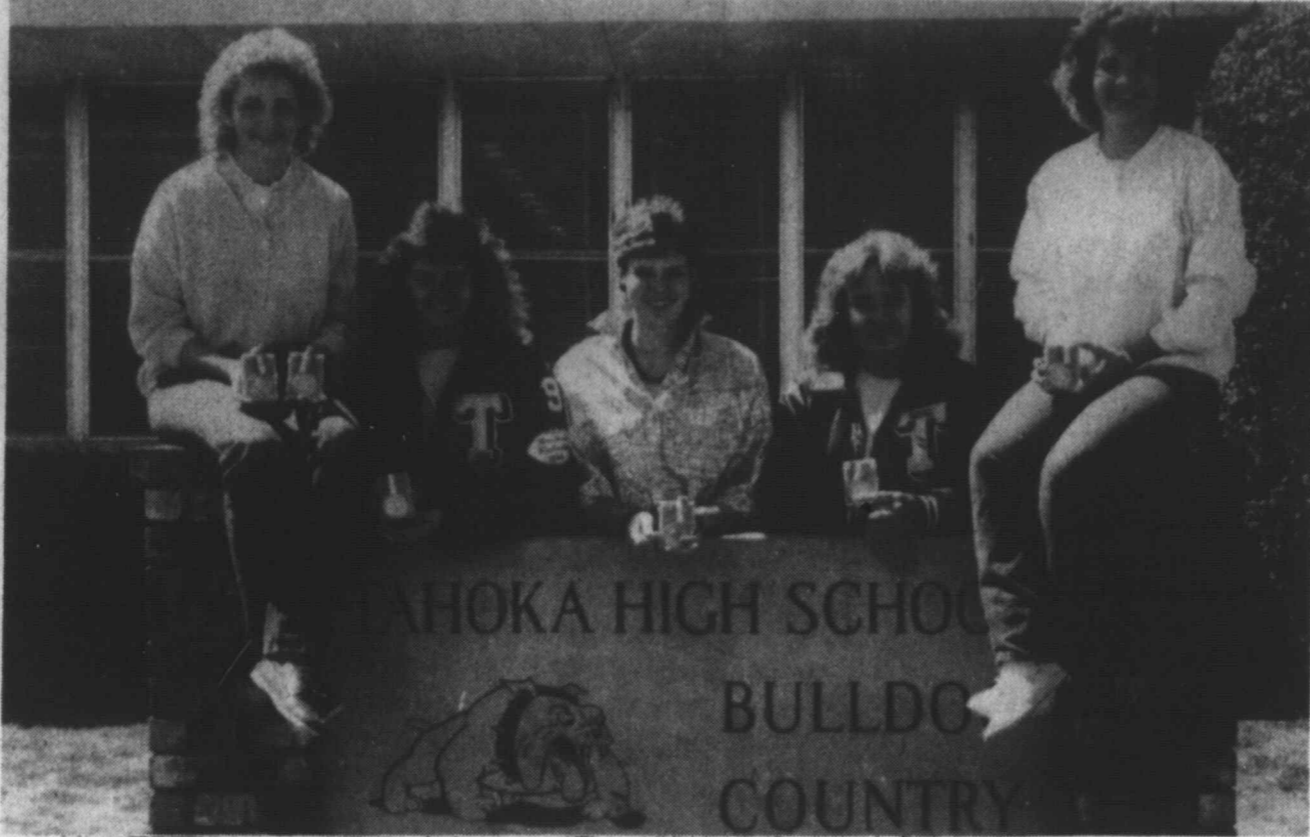

Miss Bessire averaged 26.7 points a game this past season, leading O'Donnell to a 31-1 season.

In her four years at O'Donnell High, Miss Bessire scored 1,999 points and helped lead the team to a four-season record of 104 wins and only 17 losses. She is a three-time All-District player and was a unanimous All-District selection this year. As a junior, she was named to All-State teams by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches and by the Amarillo Globe-News.

In the statistical columns, she averaged 53 percent from the field and 63 percent from the free throw line this past season as a senior. She also averaged 11 rebounds a game and 5.3 steals.

This April marks the 65th year since the Phebe K. Warner Club was organized and federated in 1922. Mrs. Lady Dobbins Stewart, who died Nov. 30, 1986, was a charter member and was to have given the invocation for the club's 65th anniversary celebration on April 14.

At first, the club had many members and the ladies met in the basement of the courthouse. The organization was a "study club" and one of its earliest studies was children's literature, taught by Mrs. Lenore Tunnell, an English teacher in Tahoka High School. Some of the ladies even received college credit for this course through West Texas College. Through the years there have been courses on foreign affairs, mental health, soil and water conservation, social security and taxes, socialized medicine, drugs, religions, jury service, Americanism, gerontology, youth, the Bible, Texas heritage, education and many other subjects.

In its early years, the club observed some holidays, especially Thanksgiving, in a special way. There were Thanksgiving dinners and drama presentations, such as "The Courtship of Miles Standish", in which Mrs. H.P. Caviness was the demure Priscilla and Mrs. Jerry Nash was John Alden.

The Lynn County Free Library has been the main project of the club. In 1931, the club had a book tea at the courthouse and the public was invited. The 50 books given at this time formed the nucleus of the library which now has over 10,500 books on the shelves. At first, the members used the small ante room on the third floor of the courthouse as a place for the books. The ladies took turns at checking out the books and kept records in a small notebook. Since then the library has been housed in five other locations and the name of the library has been changed to the City-County Library.

The club has been active in many civic undertakings and has many projects of its own. It has assisted with T.B. projects, blood drives, collecting taxes, immunization programs, and cancer, heart, polio, and Salvation Army drives. The club's primary projects of recent years involve Girlstown, U.S.A. and two scholarships it awards yearly to a senior boy and girl in Tahoka High School — the Maurice Bray and the Lady Dobbins Stewart Scholarships.

Mrs. Frank Weaver was the first president of the club. From 1974 to 1976, Mrs. Harold Green served as Caprock District President with 68 clubs under her jurisdiction. Mrs. Green also served as the State President of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for the 1984-1987 term.

Throughout the years various members and the club as a whole have won many different honors and awards in the federation on the district and state levels. The most recent of such recognition of the club's work being two first place awards received at the Caprock District Convention for Phebe K's "Stop Elder Abuse" program and project.

The Phebe K. Warner Club was asked to spearhead the plans for Tahoka's participation in the Bicentennial Celebration of 1976. Mrs. Jim Wells served as chairman of the Tahoka Bicentennial Committee. The club donated appropriate books to the school and City-County Library and made a Bicentennial quilt to help finance other local Bicentennial activities.

The Phebe K. Warner Club was organized to fulfill the following purposes: to inspire and develop a greater interest in education and culture, to stimulate intellectual growth of our city, to cooperate in any work which may advance civic improvement,

and to strengthen the ties of friendship among the women of our community.

All of the women of Lynn County are invited to join with the Phebe K. Warner Club in its 65th Anniversary Celebration as it rededicates itself to these founding purposes.

## 4-H News

4-H leaders from Lynn County who are interested in "learning how to teach" youth with swine projects will have an opportunity to gain indepth information on swine production and management at a special workshop at the Texas 4-H Center at Brownwood, April 24-26.

The workshop will be conducted by specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, and staff on A&M's Department of Animal Science.

Sunday morning will be devoted to discussions on managing the breeding gilt and pork carcass evaluation, cuts and nutritive value. The session will close with a discussion on how to use the workshop information in programs for 4-H youth.

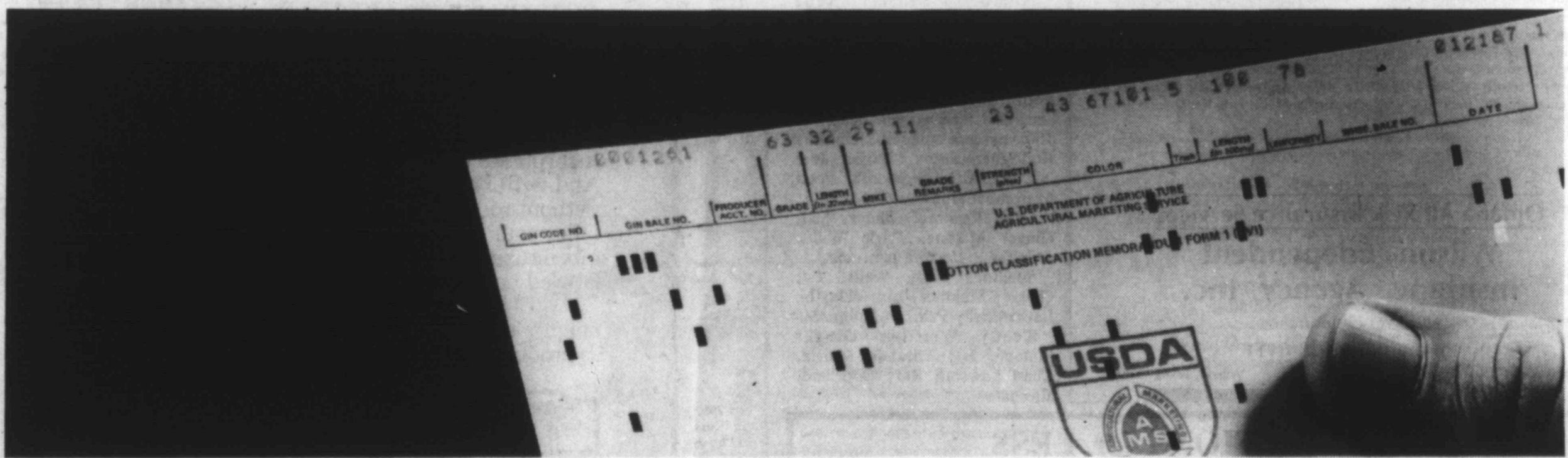

**OUT OF THE WOODS**

SOMETHING interesting has been discovered in our area. Something mysterious. Something exciting. And something a little bit scary.

In a depression of land near our own Tahoka Lake, archeologists have uncovered what appears to be the remains of a life form never seen by mankind, along with remnants of an unidentifiable metal-like substance with a resilience and structure somewhat akin to the components in the outer layer of the metal used on the NASA Space Shuttle.

In an expedition last week to the area, Texas Tech archeological students uncovered what they thought were relics from an earlier age, when Professor C. Head, who headed the expedition, noticed some peculiarities in several pieces of disc-shaped metal. "The pieces were smooth, with no signs of deterioration and no scratch marks of any kind," said Dr. Head, adding, "It struck me as peculiar that these odd-shaped pieces were so resilient."

"There's just no telling what we may find. I think this may be the greatest archeological discovery ever in the history of mankind . . . And I'm not leaving till I'm sure of exactly what we've got here," declared the Professor.

"This calls for national press coverage. I'll be famous," added Dr. Head. Dr. Cone Head, that is. (For those of you who don't know, Cone Head people are aliens on the late show, "Saturday Night Live.")

**Cotton Options Seminar Slated**

A Cotton Options Seminar will be held April 13-14 in Lamesa. A \$25 registration fee is due by April 6.

Farmers are continually faced with pricing decisions that will improve income. That means to take action at the "right" time to protect against major price downturns and to benefit from market rallies. With worldwide market forces driving U.S. crop prices, political and weather-related events at home and abroad can result in significant price moves with little notice.

Many producers are relying on government programs totally for price protection. They are overlooking the benefits that can be derived from the marketplace by developing a year-round pricing plan. For example, December 1986 cotton futures started at

59.25 cents per pound on June 14, 1985 and declined to 30.15 cents on July 21, 1986—a difference of 29.10 cents per pound, or about \$140 per bale. This happened when market prices were thought to be very depressed. By contrast, December 1987 futures rallied from late July to mid-September 1986 by about 15 cents per pound.

Farmers with sharp marketing skills are able to take advantage of price changes. Daily price charts, supply-demand information, market indicators, farm program implications, and computers are helpful tools in making pricing decisions. Plotting each day's price helps to recognize price movements. Knowing the reasons for price changes are essential for effectively timing the price decision.
