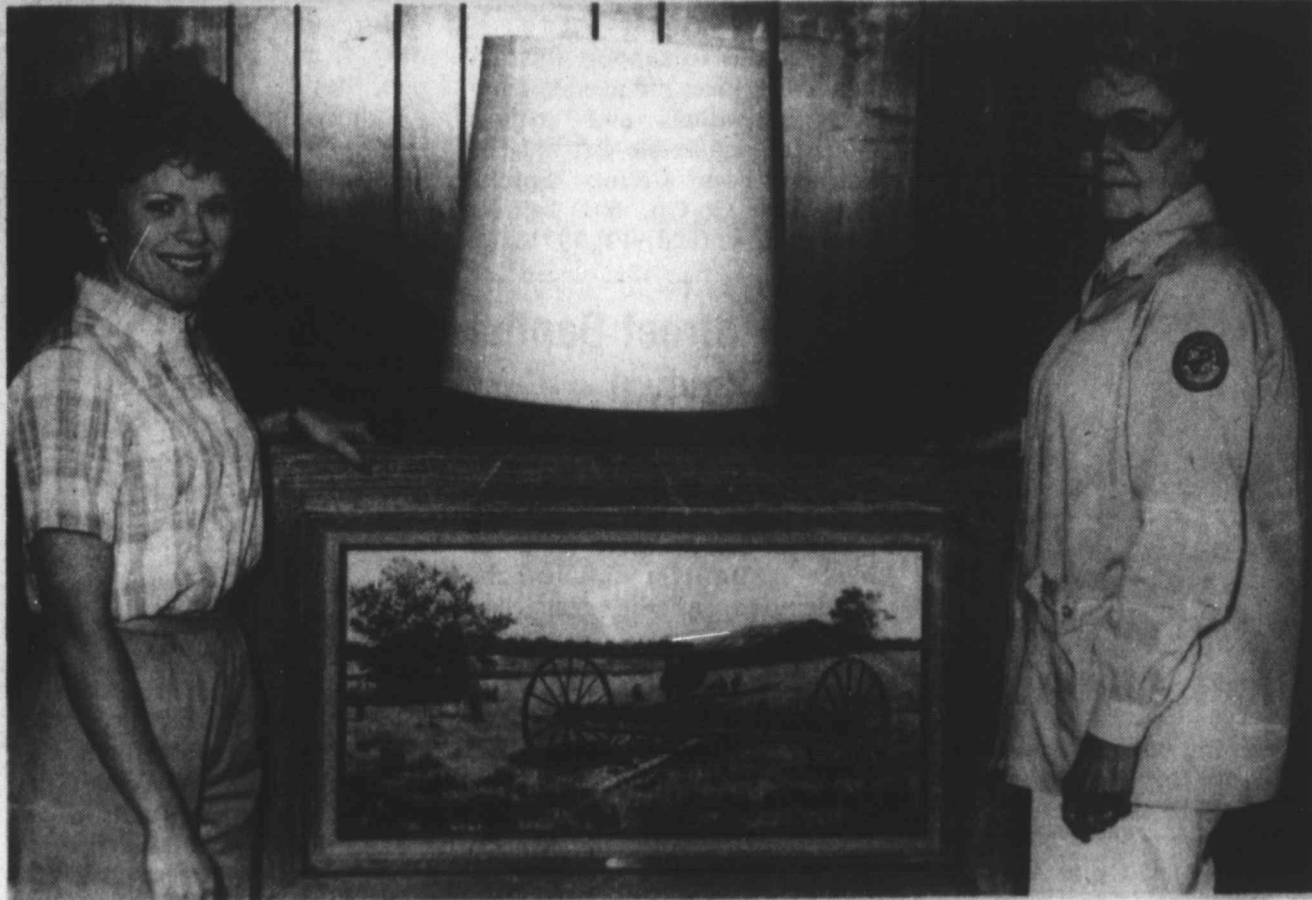

Fun-Food Festival, Auction Begins At 4 P.M. Saturday

"Your county hospital needs YOU!" might well be the motto of each Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary member this week as last minute preparations are being made for the seventh annual Fun and Food Festival and Auction to be held Saturday from 4 to 9 p.m. in the Lynn County Show Barn. Auxiliary members are confident that this year's fest will make the approximate \$9,000 needed to purchase a fetal labor monitor for Lynn County Hospital's maternity ward.

"Dozens of donations for the auction have already been collected," stated auction chairman Ann Roberts. "We're still collecting and all merchants and individuals are welcome to bring their donations to the Lynn County Show Barn on Saturday morning after 10 a.m. where we will be getting everything set up to display."

Lynn County is blessed with numerous artists and craftsmen and the auction will feature the works of these talented people, along with other donated items of every description. "Craft donations often represent countless hours of tedious work," stated Auxiliary President Nadine Dunlap, "and the auction provides an opportunity to make these sizable donations to our county hospital and at the same time have something of great value to show for it."

Each 50 cent admission ticket will entitle one to a chance at the door prizes which will be drawn for periodically throughout the evening.

Food booths at the festival will be serving fish and chips, drinks, nachos, hot dogs, and ice cream. These booths are sponsored by

the Tahoka Lions Club, the 4-H Club, St. Jude Catholic Women's Organization, the Tahoka Chamberettes, and Phebe K. Warner Club.

Mrs. Melba Thomas has arranged for a special attraction for children at this year's festival. There will be a Doll Hospital for children to bring their "hurt" and "sick" dolls and teddy bears. There will also be a clown to greet children, face painting by some of the students in the Tahoka High School freshman class, and a game booth for children.

The festival will be emphasizing and encouraging safe, healthful living with several booths offering a variety of in-

formation. There will be blood pressure checking and the United Blood Services of Lubbock will conduct a blood drive. RX Treadmill of Lubbock, certified fitness specialists, have offered the use of some of their exercise equipment and information materials to show how a combination of diet and regular exercises can be implemented by any person for more healthful and energetic living.

The Hospital Auxiliary extends an invitation to all Lynn County residents to come and take part in the activities of the Fun and Food Festival and thereby support our local hospital and ambulance service.

Pictures Missing 40 Years Are Found Near Here

The O.E. Lightners of Lorenzo this week have their family pictures back—40 years after they were misplaced—and they are grateful, but puzzled about where the envelope full of snapshots has been all those years.

A Midland man, L.C. Netherland, who stopped at the roadside park north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 one day last week found the pictures in an envelope in a bar ditch near the park and turned them in to the Lynn County sheriff's office. From writing on the pictures, the sheriff's office determined that they belonged to the Lightners, who lived many years ago in Tahoka and also at O'Donnell and near Draw.

They located the Lightners in Lorenzo and the owners came over and picked up

the pictures, which were in excellent condition, so they obviously had not been out in the weather long.

"We'd just like more information and we'd like to thank the man who found them and also whoever has been taking care of the pictures for all these years," said Mrs. Lightner.

She said she had determined from the pictures that they apparently have been missing since sometime between 1943 and 1946. "There were no pictures in the family groups of our son, born in 1946," she said.

Drug-Sniffing Dog Impresses Students

Missy, a registered Golden trained to sniff drugs was the star performer in an assembly held at Tahoka High School last Friday, April 24. Missy, brought by Carl F. Rickert, was a calm, well-behaved dog until commanded to sniff for a small amount of drugs hidden in only one of eight small boxes on the auditorium stage.

When Missy sniffed the right box, she then tore into the box to reveal the contents.

Missy is part of an educational and deterrent drug program recently adopted by Tahoka I.S.D. according to Principal Dr. Duane Carter.

Carter said, "The program is to make students more aware of what drugs will do to them; to make students aware of the potential danger of drugs."

"We are not saying we have a bad drug problem, but we can be better," said Carter. "We are using the program to supplement our counselling program!"

The drug program introduced by Rickert is a Narcotic Detection K-12 Program. Rickert is

a former police officer, narcotic agent, and DPS trooper.

"This is not a program to catch you with drugs," Rickert, now a Gainesville private investigator told juniors and seniors, "the goal of the district is to keep drugs out of school."

According to Rickert, the school board told him, they or school employees, "did not want anyone coming in here (to school) and doing anything underhanded to hurt our kids."

The separate assemblies held last Friday for different grades was an introductory assembly, a warning assembly, and the only time anyone will know the dog and handler will be there, said Rickert.

Rickert and his 25 drug dogs and 15 handlers search for drugs and give drug education talks in about 25 Texas school districts, including Lubbock, Gainesville, Olton, Cooper and others. Rickert owns his own Private Investigation and Security Service in Gainesville, and he doesn't handle divorce or child custody cases. Rickert is the father of three girls and two boys. He told

students, "I hope if one of my kids is doing drugs, they get caught."

"It is your choice," said Rickert. "If you bring it to school or use it before you come to school you can expect to get caught."

According to Rickert "most people expect the drug dogs to be Doberman Pinschers ready to rip your throat out."

But Missy, and her handler Mary Calhous, who is Rickert's lead supervisor in the Lubbock area, could have been getting ready for a children's show. Ms. Calhous left the room with Missy, while Rickert hid a small pouch with a small amount of marijuana. Calhous commanded the dog to "find it" when they returned.

During actual searches, he said, the dog sniffs lockers and cars. When the dog "alerts", Rickert backs away from the lockers and sends for the principal. The locker is searched when the principal arrives. Students do not have to be present during locker searches.

However, the owner must be

present if a locked car is searched. Rickert said the dogs can detect drug residue on clothes.

"My job is to ask you, if you do drugs, to keep them out of school and do not do drugs before you come to school," he said.

"It would be an immature person who after seeing the dog work, after hearing what you've just heard, after knowing we're coming into the school to use drugs or bring them to school with them."

Rickert and his dog handlers visit school districts unannounced, and officials say, his method works.

The searches, he said don't violate students' rights.

Senior Deena Lawson said, "I feel there were some students who felt the drug assembly was a joke, and some who did not want them to be there. But, I feel most students do not mind them being here at all, and are ready to have a drug free school. I think it is something we need."

Traffic Tickets Not Paid To Get Additional Fine

Police Chief Ray Woodall and Mayor Jim Solomon this week announced that local traffic fines have been revised to be consistent with those levied by the county and justice of the peace, and part of this revision is to enforce an additional fine to be added to the fines of violators who fail to come and settle their tickets within the required period.

The city officials also pointed up an increasing problem of litter along Main St., especially beer cans and trash thrown out on the ground near some businesses at night.

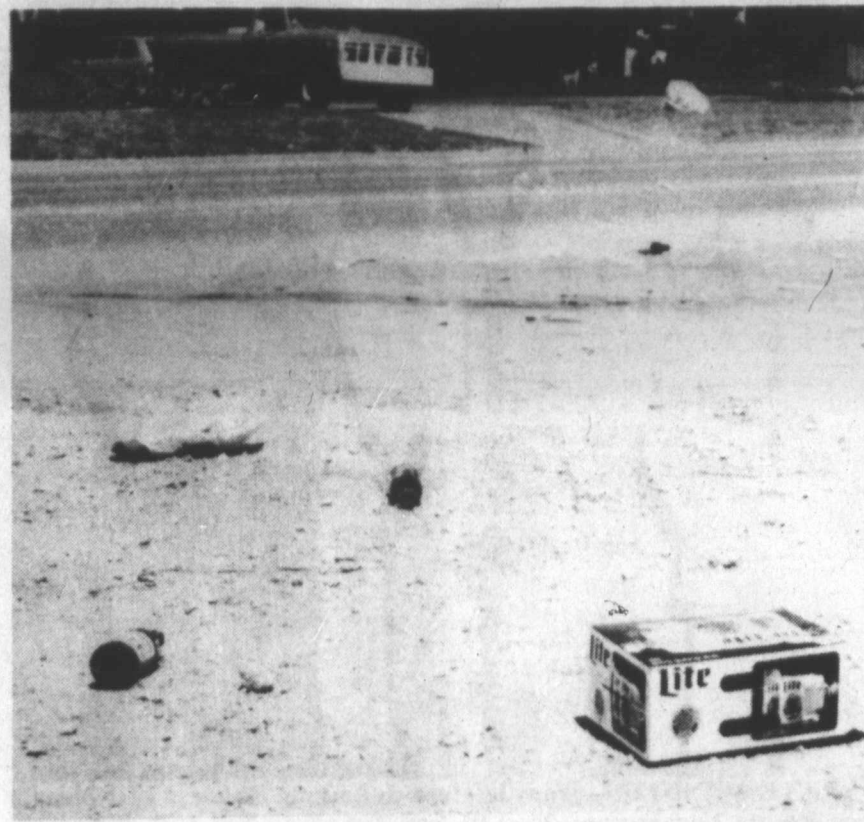
There no longer will be partial

payment of traffic fines, Solomon said, and if a fine is not paid within 10 days, a notice will be mailed with a 5-day extension after which a warrant for arrest will be issued. Those who fail to show up then will be fined \$100 to \$200 in addition to the regular fine for the violation.

Persons with tickets presently delinquent will receive a letter stating the ticket must be paid before May 15 or a warrant will be issued and the additional fine implemented.

communications with our youth and citizens concerning traffic violations. These changes are designed to be fair and consistent to everyone.

"Also, the littering problem on Main Street is beginning to create a lot of concern among the property owners. Tahoka is our home, and pride in the ap-

pearance of our community is something we must develop. The potential of our community is high, relative to many of the other small towns of West Texas.

We are primarily limited in many areas only by our attitude. Therefore, we must start at home; Let's believe in Tahoka!"

Rented Cropland Conservation Provisions Outlined Recently

People who own cropland and lease or rent to others need to take a close look at the conservation provisions of the 1985 Farm Bill.

If your land is highly erodible, or if it falls under the swampbuster or sod buster provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985, you and your tenant could lose most of USDA farm program benefits by Jan. 1, 1990 unless you take action soon.

Contact the Soil Conservation Service where your land is located this year to find out if the following four provisions of the Act affects you:

1. The conservation compliance provision affects you if you or your tenant plants annually tilled crops on highly erodible fields. To remain eligible for program benefits, you and your tenant must develop and be actively applying a locally approved conservation plan for those fields by Jan. 1, 1990. The plan must be fully implemented by Jan. 1, 1995.

2. The sodbuster provisions

applies if annually tilled crops are planted on a highly erodible field that was not used for crop production during the period 1981-85.

If you or your tenant plows out such a field, a conservation plan is needed this year and install-

ation of the plan needs to start during 1987 to remain eligible for USDA program benefits.

3. Swampbuster applies if you or your tenant converts naturally occurring wetlands to cropland after Dec. 23, 1985, the date the Act was signed. With some exceptions, your tenant must discontinue production of annually tilled crops on newly converted wetlands to remain eligible for farm programs.

The loss of USDA benefits applies to all the land you or your tenant farm...not just the affected fields.

4. The conservation reserve program offers producers help in retiring highly erodible cropland. If your land is accepted into CRP, USDA will share up to half the cost of establishing permanent grasses, legumes, trees, windbreaks, or wildlife plantings on your highly erodible cropland.

Under 10 year contracts, USDA will make annual rental payments as long as the terms and conditions of the contract are met. The land will be ineligible for farming during the 10 year contract.

The lease of hunting rights on CRP land is permissible, so some landowners are establishing plants preferred by wildlife. No other harvest will be permitted during the contract.

More than 2.3 million acres of land has been accepted into CRP in Texas during 1986 and 1987 while 19.3 million has been accepted nationally.

The average bid accepted in Texas during the February 1987 sign-up was \$39.70 and the average contract size was 22.8 acres. Nationally, the average bid accepted was \$51.17 and the average size was 124.7 acres.

Farmers Who Hire Aliens Urged To Write USDA

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- Newly proposed labor guidelines will drastically affect West Texas farmers and ranchers who employ aliens. However, producers still have time to voice their feelings about the regulations just as Congressman Charles W. Stenholm did with administration officials.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture last week released the guidelines, which are a result of the new immigration law. The USDA regs allow growers of perishable commodities, such as fruits and vegetables, to hire aliens under a temporary U.S. residency clause. Producers of Christmas trees, herbs, hops, spices and tobacco can also hire alien help. However, livestock and poultry producers, along with cotton farmers, would not be allowed to hire aliens legally because these products were not determined "perishable". Also

excluded were soybeans and hay.

Congressman Stenholm, chairman of the U.S. House Subcommittee on Livestock, Dairy and Poultry, sent a letter to U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese expressing his opposition to the commodity omissions. Stenholm, who is now the dean of the West Texas delegation, said, "I do not understand how the determinations were reached. How can Christmas trees be any more perishable than cotton?" We're talking about the type of work which the H2A program was designed. It is supposed to help producers find a pool of workers in areas where it is very difficult to find help."
