County Accepts Bid On New Teletype System

Lynn County commissioners in a called meeting last Thursday accepted a bid from IBM for a new teletype system to be installed in the sheriff's office. The equipment will be purchased for \$11,068 and is to be installed by May 31.

Judge J.F. Brandon explained that the current teletype system is outdated and, in fact, the company making the equipment will be out of business after June 1, with no service agreement possible. Also, he said, the current equipment would not work anyway with a statewide system which is scheduled to be changed at the end of this year.

In a regular meeting of the commissioners Monday, the group approved \$100 expenses for hosting a meeting of county and district clerks on April 22, paid annual dues of \$50 to the Texas Good Roads Assn., and approved publication of a condensed audit report on county finances.

District Judge George Hansard appeared before the commissioners to discuss the possibility of having the juvenile officer for the county operate from the same office as the adult probation officer, in the courthouse.

Payment of attorney fees of \$604 for a firm which has been working on consolidation of justice of the peace districts in the county was approved.

All commissioners and Judge Brandon were present Monday.


