THE ALASKAN oil spill has created some interesting situations, with the main one, of course, being the pollution effect and threat to fish, otters, birds and other wildlife, and the economic loss to those who catch fish for a living. However, according to news reports, the cleanup campaign has brought a temporary economic boom to the Alaskan area, as Exxon is paying people \$17 an hour or so to work on the cleanup (and apparently more than that to the oilfield workers from Lubbock and elsewhere who have headed that way to assist.

An Alaskan cannery, for example, had to shut down operations because most of the workers quit to go to work for Exxon during the cleanup. The cannery and other businesses such as grocery stores and restaurants could not afford to pay that much, so they are all winding up shorthanded.

Right after the oil spill, prices of gasoline at the pumps took a big jump, and although the companies (so far as I know) never said it was because of the oil spill, there was a hint that this could be a factor. That, of course, is silly, since nobody would believe that one tanker load of oil lost would make any dent in the total amount of oil used by people all over the world.

In Lubbock, some oil distributor said the jump at the pump was because some refineries have not been operating. Anyway, the general public has a pretty strong suspicion that the oil companies use any excuse they can to raise prices. Incidentally, don't blame your local service station operator; he didn't raise the prices, and he probably doesn't make any more for himself than he did at the lower prices.

Some protesters also demanded an end to oil spills, not bothering to explain how anyone can stop oil spills. I'm not defending Exxon, but do those people think Exxon ran its tanker into a reef and spilled all that oil on purpose?

Vandalism, Barn **Burglary Reported**

Vandals damaged a 1986 Cadillac owned by a Tahoka man, and burglary of a barn northeast of Tahoka was reported during the last week to law enforcement officers.

Bill Grider of Tahoka reported that between 7:30 and 10 p.m. Monday, April 18, while his car was parked near O'Donnell Catholic Church, someone scratched the words "Rick Rock" on the trunk of the vehicle.

A Forney cutting torch and gauges and a Craftsman hand grinder were reported stolen after a barn owned by Brad Hammonds, about 2.5 miles northeast of Tahoka, was burglarized last Wednesday. Value of the stolen items, taken after a hasp was pried off the barn door, was listed at \$425.

County Supports Area EMS Organization

Lynn County commissioners voted Monday to support the South Plains Emergency Medical Service organization, of which the county EMS ambulance service is a part, in the amount of \$1,500 for the current year, although the item was not included in this year's budget.

Lynn is the 11th area county to join the group, according to County Judge J.F. Brandon, who said commissioners would consider putting the organization's support into next year's budget.

New Cable Channels Scheduled

Subscribers to Telemedia cable television in Tahoka should receive their promised five new channels by this weekend as installation of receiving equipment began Tuesday, and new channels also were to be installed by Telemedia in Wilson and O'Donnell within the next few days.

A spol. sman for Telemedia said there has been some misunderstanding by the public about date of installation of the new channels and the installation's relationship to increased prices which went into effect on April 1. "The new channels were never promised on April 1, but 'in April', and some people thought the price increase was tied to the addition of new channels."

It was added that the new channels for Tahoka "should be turned on sometime this weekend."

All of the current cable channels in Tahoka will continue as before, on the same channels they now are available. In addition, Channel 11. which has been vacant, is now QVC, a shopping channel. The other four channels being added will be at the top end, cable channels 23-26. Channel 23 will be the Discovery Channel, an educational channel. Channel 24 will be Nickelodeon, a variety channel. The USA network will be on channel 25, sports, variety and movies. Channel 26 will be TNT, or Turner Network Television, which is mostly older movies from the 30s. 40s and 50s.

O'Donnell will get QVC on channel 7, Nashville network on 20, TNT on 22 and USA on 21. Wilson will get

WGN, Chicago, on Channel 3. Those subscribers in O'Donnell who need new converter boxes for the new O'Donnell channels should pick them up at the "head end" at 1 st and Standifer in O'Donnell on Friday, April 28, starting at 10 a.m., said a company official. Persons who have the newer model cable-ready TV sets will not need converter

Students Enjoy Local History

Some forty-five sixth grade students, along with teachers, parents and other guests, were treated to a trip down "Memory Lane", April 16. The first stop being the Tahoka Pioneer Museum, which proved to be an impressive experience for the youth, that otherwise might be unable to fathom how life "was" in past days.

The well behaved group was then taken by bus to Tahoka Lake ranch for a delicious barbecue hosted by J.T. and Steve Miller, along with parents of students. A.J. Jester again confirmed his reputation as a great

barbecue cook.

A high-light of the day for both young and old was an informative talk by Lubbock's Bob Nash, a historian of note. He graciously consented to come down and stand amidst the present green mesquites, grass and cattle and did so ably describe how that very area appeared when occupied the Comanche Indians.

Because of the fresh spring water, buffaloes, small animals and birds, the Indians lived a self sustained life until the buffalo "hunters" came and destroyed their livihood. Mr. Nash exhibited arrowheads of various sizes used to obtain food for their tribe. Too, quite interestingly, he displayed buffalo bones found recently by Craig Leslie and his boys in a embedded deep ravine.
