The Ashbrooks train their children in proper livestock and farming operations, said T.B. Mason, who made the presentation. A secondary benefit of the cattle and hogs is food for the family table. Vicki makes her own sausage, ham and pork chops and the cattle are butchered for beef.

Vicki makes her own jellies from fruit gathered from her trees. She raises a large garden each year for W.R. Steen, chairman of the fresh vegetables and canning. She also does all of her yard work.

The family farms 1923 acres and



she drives a tractor, runs the rod weeder, helps clean set aside land, runs a sandfighter, sprays weeds and runs the module builder in the fall. She also helps her husband in terrace construction.

Reduced Electric Rates Due For SPS Customers

Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) Texas retail customers will receive lower rates beginning in April due to an interim reduction in the "fuel-cost recovery factor" on electric bills. The decrease will lower overall electric rates 9.6

percent or \$43.8 million, for residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers, according to Tahoka SPS manager Doyle Webb.

The reduction, which was requested by SPS in November 1989, was approved this week on an interim basis by a hearing examiner with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The fuel cost collected by the interim factor will be subject to final review by the commission.

The amount of the decrease will vary according to usage and rates applicable to different types of customers. Texas residential customers using 1,000 kilowatt hours a month on SPS's standard rate will see their monthly electric bills decline by \$5.07 from \$69.67 to \$64.60.

This reduction is the result of lower fuel and purchased-power expenses. The cost of fuel to operate SPS power plants, plus the cost of power purchased from other companies, make up about half of SPS's overall costs to serve customers.

"Our industrial electric rates already are among the lowest in the nation, and this reduction will put SPS's Texas service area in an even stronger competitive position to retain and attract industry and jobs." said Bill Helton, SPS president and chief operating officer.



A 30-day in-hospital controlled study of 34 healthy men and women, sixty years and older, were randomly assigned by Prof. S.N. Meydani, DVM, PhD of Boston, to take 400 IU vitamin E twice daily, or a placebo. The result: greater immune responsiveness for the vitamin E supplement group with blood and TB-type skin tests. Evidently healthy seniors eating a normal diet can improve their immunity to infection by taking vitamin E supplements. Dr. Meydani stated that vitamin C and beta-carotene could also benefit the immune system.





A sludge pit is located west of the Imhoff tank. Effluent from the Imhoff tank is discharged into stabilization ponds. All of these facilities are prone to flooding during heavy rainfall periods.



> In February 1987, the City of O'Donnell received one of the last EPA grants available in Texas for. design and construction of wastewater treatment improvements. EPA is providing \$483,478 of the total project cost and the city is spending \$207,107. Since the City will use treated effluent for irrigation, O'Donnell was eligible to receive extra grant funding for using an "alternative" treatment technology.

Bids on the wastewater treatment plant were received in October 1989. Construction of the new plant is expected to be complete by this summer.



If this is not possible, then the child is placed in a placement that will be in his or her best interest. The placement might include a foster home, adoption, or an institutional placement. 
