THE CENSUS BUREAU, still hiring people to help finish up the population count and expecting to be winding things up for a couple of months yet, nevertheless has sent out information on what they have learned (or expect to learn) about the population.

Among the things they are telling us is that people are getting older, there are more Hispanics and blacks than ever, big city areas are getting bigger and families are getting smaller.

Almost any of us could have told them all those things before the census ever began, if they had just bothered to ask. For example, I have been getting older for as long as I can remember, and so have most of the people I know. (Only high school and college girls are a lot younger than they were when I was a student). The only other exceptions I know are Dorian Grey, Pat Boone and Dick Clark.

The number of persons 65 and over has increased about 23 per cent to approximately 31.4 million since 25.1 million were counted in that age group in the 1980 census. Since 1980 the Hispanic population in the United States has increased 39 per cent to a total of about 20.1 million, and now makes up 8.2 per cent of the total population. Blacks now are about 12.4 per cent of the total, and the black population has grown 13.1 per cent to an estimated 31 million.

The average household in the country now has 2.62 persons, a decline from the 2.76 persons in 1980. Our house has just 2 persons, our .76 of a person having moved out some time ago.

There also are more dogs and cats and mediocre golfers than ever before, but the Census Bureau doesn't know that.

Speakers' subjects ranged from alternative funding for county health plans to how to handle a claim under worker's compensation, time management and media relations.

John Gilmartin, coordinator for the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said this training was the third to be offered by the Institute this year for elected county officials.

Joe M. Rothe, seminar program chairman and an Extension Service specialist with the institute, said each treasurer who attended all sessions was awarded 20 hours of educational credit by Texas A&M's Office of Continuing Education.
