WORK OF DEDICATION—Mackey Turner of Tahoka worked many dedicated hours to lovingly crochet this intricate wall hanging of The Lord's Prayer. The white crocheted artwork took 2800 yards of thread, and is mounted on black velvet. After framing, the piece was about four feet wide by six feet deep. Mrs. Turner said she worked diligently on the piece for about a month, starting from the bottom and working back and forth across the piece, counting every stitch. She said as she finished each row of words, she could hardly wait to finish the next row above it, and when she finished the words, she was motivated to hurry to see the picture of Christ at the top of the piece. She said said had no idea the crocheted piece would turn out as large as it did, after it was blocked, mounted and framed. The delicate work is a focal point in her home, quickly drawing the attention of visitors. When asked if she would ever do another one like it, she responded with a quick "not one exactly like this, never!" but she showed the photographer a pattern she was considering doing some day of The Lord's Supper. She said she enjoys the challenge.

THE CENSUS BUREAU, still hiring people to help finish up the population count and expecting to be winding things up for a couple of months yet, nevertheless has sent out information on what they have learned (or expect to learn) about the population.

Among the things they are telling us is that people are getting older, there are more Hispanics and blacks than ever, big city areas are getting bigger and families are getting smaller.

Almost any of us could have told them all those things before the census ever began, if they had just bothered to ask. For example, I have been getting older for as long as I can remember, and so have most of the people I know. (Only high school and college girls are a lot younger than they were when I was a student). The only other exceptions I know are Dorian Grey, Pat Boone and Dick Clark.

The number of persons 65 and over has increased about 23 per cent to approximately 31.4 million since 25.1 million were counted in that age group in the 1980 census. Since 1980 the Hispanic population in the United States has increased 39 per cent to a total of about 20.1 million, and now makes up 8.2 per cent of the total population. Blacks now are about 12.4 per cent of the total, and the black population has grown 13.1 per cent to an estimated 31 million.

The average household in the country now has 2.62 persons, a decline from the 2.76 persons in 1980. Our house has just 2 persons, our .76 of a person having moved out some time ago.

There also are more dogs and cats and mediocre golfers than ever before, but the Census Bureau doesn't know that.

# County Jail's Population Up In Hurry

Sixteen new inmates were booked into Lynn County jail during the last week as officers on the county, city and state level stayed busy hauling in offenders.

Tahoka Police arrested a 32-yearold Odessa man Sunday for driving on the wrong side of U.S. 87 and also for possession of drug paraphernalia. Police also arrested two brothers Saturday for fighting in the street, and both were charged with disorderly conduct and public intoxication and were jailed.

A 30-year-old Tahoka woman told police Sunday she had been assaulted at her residence by a 27-year-old Tahoka man, but she declined to press charges.

Harmonson Fertilizer and Spraying at New Home Monday reported a tire and wheel valued at \$275 stolen off a trailer tire rack.

Four persons were jailed during the week for public intoxication, and three others for driving while intoxicated. 


