

A STORY showed up on my desk, submitted for publication, about a Lubbock barber named Jake Goss, who started cutting hair when he was 10 and has been barbering for 56 years. Since Goss has no Tahoka connections (that I know of), I didn't use the story, but some of it did make interesting reading.

For example, he said he cut the hair of Buddy Holly and once cut the hair of Waylon Jennings. Goss told reporter Brian Mayes that Holly was very particular about his hairstyle, which he changed frequently. And he supposedly cut the hair of Jennings, although from what I have seen of old Waylon, he probably didn't cut it much.

Reading about Goss reminded me of haircuts I used to get when I was a kid (I really was a kid once, although most members of my family don't believe it). Haircuts were a quarter in those days (and school was a 10-mile walk through the snow, uphill both ways). The name of the barber in Newport (which straddles the Clay and Jack County lines) was Everett Cloer, and about the only thing I remember about him was that he had me convinced that if I didn't sit still he would cut my ears off. He'd tell me things like "I just swept up a couple of ears I cut off kids who moved at the wrong time." I was terrified, and I remember I sat as still as I could, although sitting still was not (and still is not) one of the things I do best.

Although lots of kids in those days, and some now, had their hair cut by their mom or dad, I don't remember ever getting mine cut by my parents. Later in life, shortly after getting married and not having enough money for haircuts, I remember letting my wife cut my hair with some clippers we bought. She did a pretty good job, but the clippers were cheap and after about five minutes they would get so hot they branded the back of my neck, making me one the first of the West Texas rednecks.

When our son was in high school and college, haircuts were things only older, out-of-touch people got, so he only had a couple of haircuts a year, both at gunpoint.

I once knew a man at Sudan who got his hair cut every Friday, although he was in his 70s, and to me it looked like a waste of money. I seldom get my own hair cut these days, since I no longer have much hair, and besides I pull a lot of it out trying to keep the reading public happy while still doing my job of reporting what is happening.

Two In County Work On National **Agriculture Survey**

Barbara White and Patsy Barnett of New Home will be working as field enumerators with the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service on a national agriculture survey starting June 1. They will travel over the county counting livestock and collecting data on crops, interviewing farmers and ranchers.

Information gathered on the confidential survey will be used to make state and national estimates of crop acres, livestock inventories and grain stocks, information they said is vitally important to producers in Lynn County.

"These estimates are a working tool farmers and ranches can use in their production, marketing and investment decisions and are the only unbiased information source available," said state statistician Dennis Findley.

The June agricultural survey is the largest of a series of surveys conducted throughout the year by the Texas office. The random sample of producers selected for the survey represent a cross-section of Texas agriculture.

"Our field enumerators will be putting in some long hours during the next two weeks," Findley said, "but their hard work is the only way to provide Texas producers with accurate, reliable agricultural information."




MR. AND MRS. EVERTON NEVILL Nevills Celebrate 50th Anniversary
