Two Charged After Owner Of Home Follows Burglars

Two men were charged with burglary of a habitation and held in Lynn County jail in lieu of \$100,000 bond each after a New Home resident followed their vehicle from his home into Lubbock Monday, calling law enforcement officers on his mobile phone.

Arrested by a Lubbock city patrolman and later brought to Lynn County jail were Reynaldo P. Rangel, 31, of Lubbock, and Ricardo Lopez Arizola, 29, of San Angelo. Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards set the bonds.

Brad Smith of New Home arrived home about 5 p.m. Monday to see a 1979 Chevrolet parked in front of his house. He drove around to the back and entered the home to discover that items had been stolen, and then got into his own vehicle to follow the two men driving away in the Chevrolet. In Lubbock County, he used his mobile phone to call officers, and after he followed the suspects all the way into the city of Lubbock, the car was stopped by a Lubbock police officer. Smith identified articles in the car as items stolen from his residence.

Another theft, recovery of a sto-

len motorcycle, and charges filed against a Lynn County man for aggravated sexual assault of a 13-year-old girl were among other incidents investigated by officers in the county during the last week.

Carlos Rocha Jaime, 35, has been charged with assaults on the young girl last year, and now is being held in jail in Runnels County on charges of indecency with a 4-year-old girl.

Three O'Donnell juvenile girls were questioned after a pack of cigarettes was stolen from Allsup's in O'Donnell last week. They also were accused of vandalism in the rest room at Allsup's.

A stolen 1987 Suzuki 750 motorcycle was recovered by DPS and Texas Rangers after the Rangers noticed two young men working on the cycle on FM 211 just west of U.S. 87 in Lynn County Tuesday. The operator of the cycle was placed in juvenile detention facilities at Lubbock pending his return to a New Mexico facility he had left. The cycle was stolen in Albuquerque.

Eddie Askew reported an electric diesel transfer pump stolen from a location 3.5 miles south of Lakeview community Saturday. The pump was

Career Ladder Fund Transfer Rejected

Tahoka School trustees met in a mostly routine regular session last Thursday night, approving a school calendar for next year, hiring an elementary teacher and rejecting a proposal to transfer \$7500 into the Career Ladder program.

The motion to transfer the funds was defeated 5-2.

Resignation of second grade teacher Leslie Gerber effective at the end of the school term was accepted, and Keli Wigington was hired as a teacher for next year.

Bookkeeper Loretta Tekell reported that the 1990 tax roll collection was 91.69 per cent complete on March 31.

Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, reported that the junior class prom would be on May 4, and that Awards Day would be on May 14. All board members were present.

Lynn County Schools Should Get More Under New Plan

Lynn County's four school districts apparently will get more money-per-pupil from the state under the new funding plan passed by the Texas Legislature and given temporary approval by a state district judge Monday.

Judge Scott McKown gave the state approval to send aid to school districts through September, but retained his jurisdiction over the controversial measure, indicating it will be presumed constitutional until it is challenged or until lawmakers fail to live up to its requirements.

The so-called "Robin Hood" bill, taking money from richer districts to give to the poorer, has not been funded, and there were reports this week that the legislature would wait until this summer to pass some kind of tax bill to pay the costs to the state, estimated at an additional \$1.3 billion over the next two years. The state already faces a \$4.7 billion budget deficit.

In addition to increased state taxes, the homeowners and other property owners of the state are facing increased local taxes, especially in the wealthier districts.

A copy of the 94-page bill was given to *The Lynn County News*

Monday. Much of it is incomprehensible, but a chart accompanying the bill indicates that Tahoka school district will need to raise its tax rate by 8 more cents by the year 1995, and that Wilson, O'Donnell and New Home districts will not have to raise their taxes, at least not just to meet the bill's requirements.

The same chart projects that Tahoka will receive \$291 more per student in 1992, and up to \$614 more per student by 1995, provided the bill is still in effect by then. That chart says Tahoka ISD now spends \$4556 per student per year based on average daily attendance of 667. In total revenue, Tahoka ISD should receive \$123,655 more next year than in the present year.

Further confusing the issue so far as the general public is concerned is the fact that these figures are based on what the state calls the "effective tax rate", which is different from the actual tax rate charged to property owners. For example, the effective tax rate for Tahoka ISD is 92 cents per \$100 valuation, while the actual rate charged is 80 cents. School officials explained the difference by saying that the state has a formula for appraising property in a district

which is difference from the actual appraisal totals, meaning that the state says that in order to raise the amount of money Tahoka ISD raises through property taxes, the rate should be 92 cents. However, Tahoka ISD is raising that amount with a rate of 80 cents.

Wilson, with a current ADA of 209, is supposed to receive \$351 more per student next year, increasing to \$561 more per student in 1995. With an "effective rate" of \$1.13, Wilson now spends \$5,391 per pupil, according to the chart. In 1992 Wilson should receive \$73,403 more than it now gets.

For New Home, the current listed ADA is 181, with \$872 more per student in 1992, up to \$2,134 more per student by 1995, current effective tax rate is \$1.45, current spending per pupil \$5,455. New Home school should get \$125,494 more next year than this year.

O'Donnell ISD is projected to get \$689 more per pupil next year, current ADA 421, current effective rate \$1.10 and current spending per pupil \$5,360. The district should get an additional \$256,346 next year.

Dr. Duané Carter, superintendent of Tahoka ISD, said this week he was studying the bill. He did note that the measure requires five more student attendance days than the current 175-day term.

In the measure, "education districts" are set up throughout the state, with two or more counties in each district or region. Lynn is paired with Lubbock, Gaines, Borden, Dawson, Terry and Yoakum counties for taxing purposes. In effect, this means that all the students in all the school districts in those seven counties are supposed to have the same tax base, or be equally funded, which means that the wealthier districts within the taxing region will lose money to the poorer districts. Among the wealthier districts in the region with Lynn County schools are Gail, Seagraves, Seminole, Denver City, and Plains.

The bill stipulates that all schools must levy a tax rate of at least 72 cents per \$100 valuation starting next year. This will be a hardship on property owners in the richer districts who have been accustomed to paying on a rate of 40 cents or less. All districts are to have an effective rate of at least \$1.00 within four years.

City Sells Land To Phone Co-Op

A parcel of land totaling 7.93 acres was sold by the City of Tahoka to Poka-Lambro Telephone Cooperative which submitted the low bid on the property. City officials opened bids at a special meeting of the council Monday night.

The land is just across FM 400 from the city landfill, and Poka-Lambro reportedly plans to erect a tower at the site.

In the only other action by the city council Monday, the salary of the City Health Officer was set at \$50 per month.

Absent from the city meeting was councilman Wayne Tekell.

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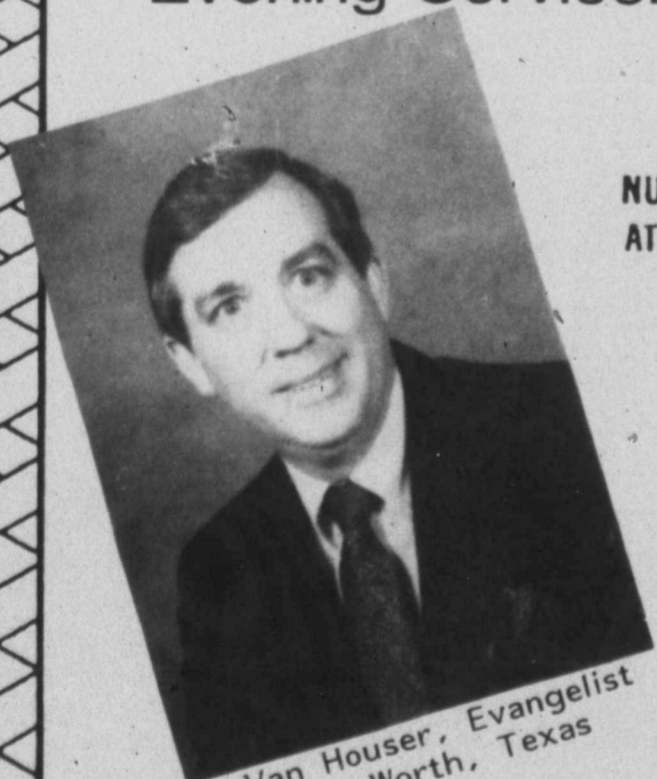

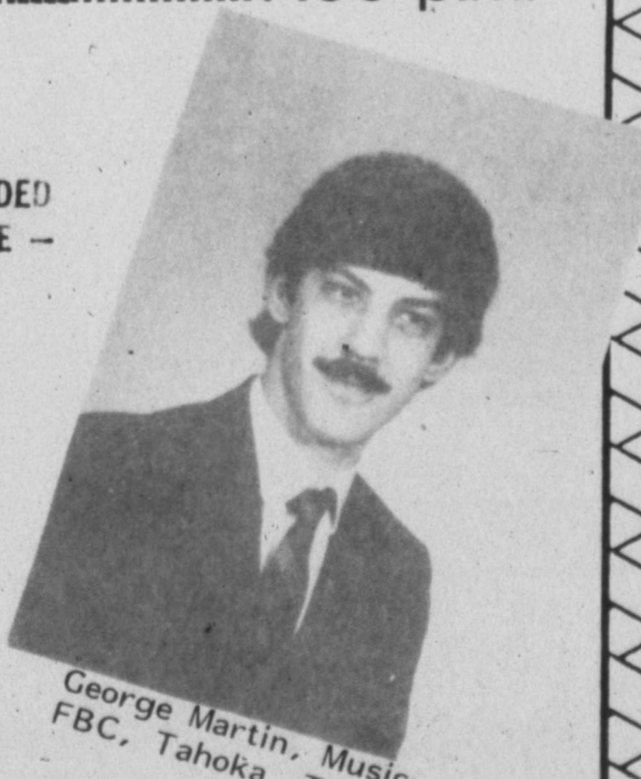

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WHAT IS GLOMERULONEPHRITIS?

The germs apparently get into the kidneys by way of the blood stream. The glomeruli, which are the filtering portion of the kidneys, strain out the germs which can multiply quickly.

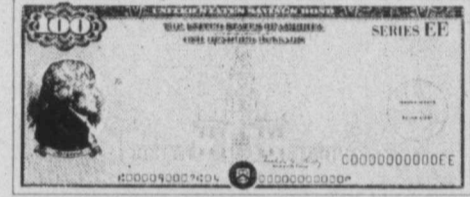
The "Ag in the Classroom" guide is designed for students to learn about the various facts of food and fiber production and agriculture's contributions to the lifestyle of people throughout the world.

In the hustle and bustle of the world's daily activities, countless millions of persons go about the business of making a living, helping others, living quiet lives that seldom make headlines.

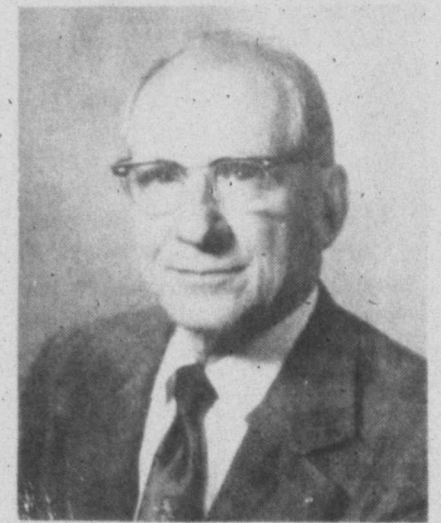
Among those are many who in their quiet ways also rise above the ordinary in the sense that they seek out and accept the "extra" duties of citizenship.

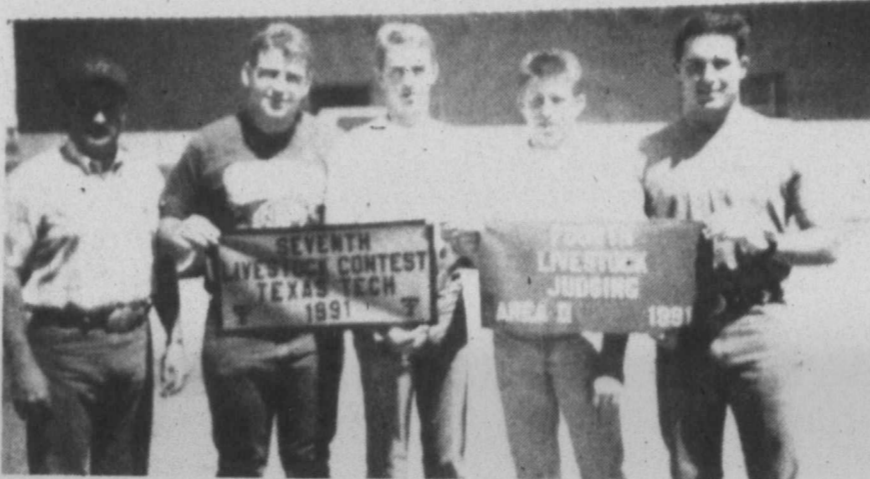
