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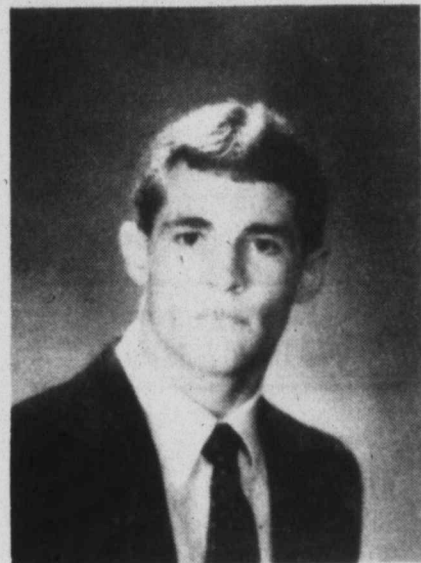
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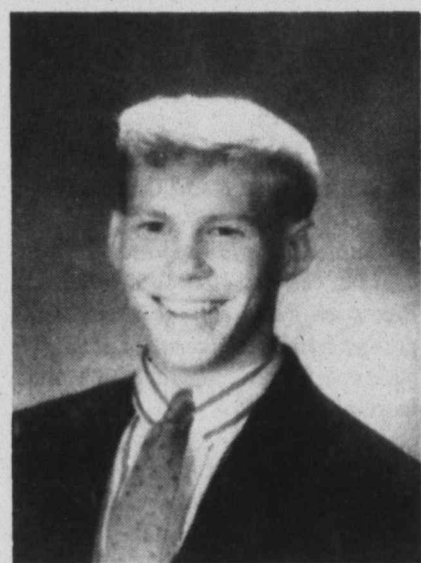

YES, I AM old-fashioned in some of my thinking, and yes, I am prejudiced against persons who dress in weird ways or otherwise cause their appearance to be strange just to make a statement of rebellion against the norm.

The other night, I started to watch a movie which sounded like it might be pretty good, and besides, the TV Guide rated it three stars. Usually, but not always, their ratings are a pretty good barometer of whether I will like a movie or not. Anyway, I don't remember the name of the movie, but it starred an actor named James Woods. Three minutes into the movie, I got a look at him, and he was wearing a pony tail. "This is not the kind of hero I can identify with," I thought, as I turned it off to watch something else.

Just a few days before I had flipped past a new series called "Sweating Bullets" or something like that, and I turned it off for the same reason. This otherwise rugged looking guy who is the main character wears his locks in a pony tail. He looked like a cross between Rambo and Gidget.

Even when my own kids were in high school in the early 70s, they kept telling me that it's what is inside a person that counts, not how they look. But I felt then, and still do, that a person has a choice of how he or she looks, so far as grooming and neatness are concerned. So those who choose to look like something which crawled out from under a rock should not mind if the rest of us are repelled by their appearance.

Males who wear their hair in pony tails and stick earrings on their ears may be as masculine and tough and smart as anybody. But they still look awful. And any movie's main attraction is that we can relate to the main character. I just can't imagine myself with a pony tail wooing beautiful women and zapping bad guys and being an all-around super hero.

I can't even imagine having that much hair.

ACCORDING TO a release from the Texas Bankers Assn., 64 per cent of Texas bankers who were surveyed in May "believe there is a credit crunch in Texas." I'm not sure what that means, except that it's probably not as good as a Nestle's Crunch.

Apparently this means that banks are making fewer loans, and are getting fewer loan requests, and "of those who said there is a credit crunch, 93 per cent attribute the problem to over-regulation by bank regulators."

Fifty-two per cent of those surveyed said local economic conditions are about the same as a year ago, and 41 per cent expect better economic conditions in their local areas.

I did my own survey, questioning three local bankers. Of those surveyed, 100 per cent predicted that if I don't start depositing more money in my account than I withdraw, I am going to be in big trouble this year.

Four Lynn County Schools will honor 89 graduating seniors in commencement exercises this week and next. Tahoka will graduate 36 seniors Friday, after O'Donnell High School has commencement for 26 seniors Thursday (tonight).

Wilson High School and New Home High School graduation exercises are scheduled next week, New Home at 8 p.m. Thursday, May 30 in the school gymnasium, with 12 seniors, and Wilson at 8 p.m. Friday, May 31, when 15 seniors graduate in a program at the school auditorium.

O'Donnell has no baccalaureate service; Tahoka baccalaureate was Sunday night at the Tahoka First Baptist Church.

Pictures, information and congratulatory advertising for Tahoka and O'Donnell seniors are included in this edition of *The Lynn County News*. For Wilson and New Home seniors, these will be published next week.

Wilson and New Home baccalaureate services will be at 8 p.m. this Sunday evening, May 26, one at Wilson school, and the other at New Home Baptist Church.

Trey Nance has been announced as valedictorian of the Tahoka graduating class, and Chris Carter is salutatorian. Jeff Emory Nance III is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.E. Nance, and Carter is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ike Carter.

Nance has won many awards in academics, athletics and community service. He was quarterback on the football team, a starter on the basketball team, and runner-up in district boys singles in tennis, advancing to regional play. He was president of the THS FFA chapter, a member of

National Honor Society and Student Council.

Carter was president of Student Council in his senior year and vice president of National Honor Society. He played basketball his junior and senior years, and varsity golf as a junior.

Lea Bessire, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Bessire, is valedictorian of the OHS graduating class, with a grade point average of 3.679. She participated in cross country, track and basketball all four years, and was all-district in basketball her senior year. She qualified for regional in triple jump the last two years.

She also was one of the five members of the Seiko Challenge team which went to New York.

The O'Donnell commencement exercises will begin at 7 p.m. today (Thursday) in the high school auditorium. Rodney Howell, minister of the Catholic Church, will deliver a commencement address, followed by the presentation of the class by High School Principal Glenn Hopkins. Diplomas will be presented by Supt. Dale Read and School Board President Kenneth Eaker.

At commencement exercises in Tahoka school gymnasium Friday night, Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent, will present awards, after which High School Principal Charles Cate will present the class. Then Delbert McCleskey, president of the school board, will present diplomas.

Information For 911 Calls Sought In Tahoka, Wilson

Information on location of homes in Lynn County for use when the 9-1-1 emergency calling system goes into effect in the county in October is being sought in Tahoka and Wilson, with students in those schools this week being given forms to fill out to be returned to County 9-1-1 Coordinator Barry Pittman at Tahoka City Hall.

Pittman explained that the information which will allow the 9-1-1 answering service at the Lynn County Sheriff's Office to locate the source of the calls immediately is needed in Tahoka and Wilson from

any homes served by General Telephone and Electronics (GTE). The information on the location of homes in New Home, O'Donnell and any other county phones served by other phone companies is automatically supplied by the phone companies to the 9-1-1 system, a service not offered by GTE.

The forms should be returned to the sheriff's office within the next month, if possible.

Anyone needing a form to fill out may obtain one from the Wilson City office, Tahoka City Hall, or sheriff's office.

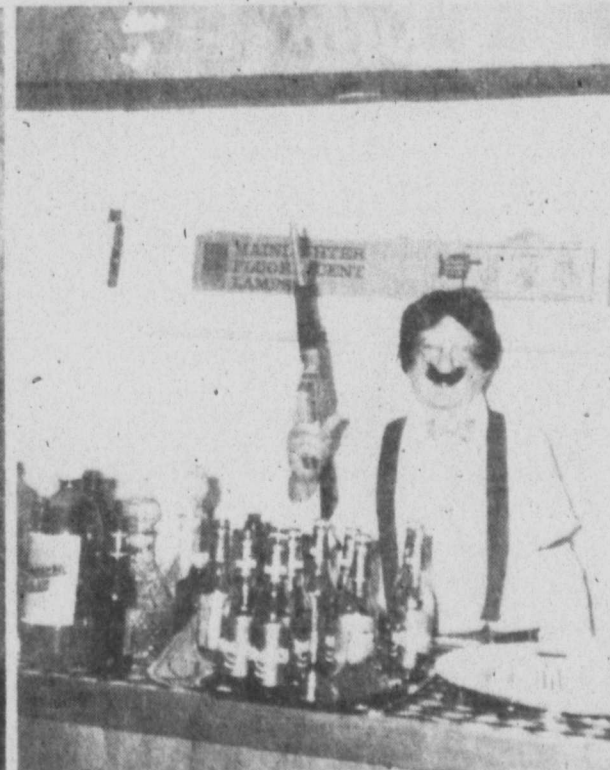
Most To Close Monday For Memorial Day

Seventh Graders Conducting Environmental Experiment

Students in Robert Tidwell's seventh grade class at Tahoka Junior High School are participating in a nationwide environmental school project sponsored by the Keyes Fibre Co. which produces Chinnet molded fiber paper tableware for the consumer and foodservice markets, and other molded fiber paper for the packaging industry.

The school experiment concentrates on composting, a method of solid waste disposal in which organic materials biodegrade into soil-like humus.

In a controlled, simulated composting environment, students have

been monitoring the decomposition of the three types of disposable products: foam, plastic and molded fiber paper plates. At the mid-point of the project, students checked the progress of the experiment and found significant differences in the stages of decomposition of the three materials.

In addition, students have been involved in a number of auxiliary activities throughout the 6-week project, ranging from discussion groups and classroom debates to writing local legislators about environmental issues.

The experiment ended May 16.

900 Call Blocking Option Available

Throughout the state, local telephone companies are offering their customers the option of blocking calls to 900 pay-per-call information services.

Protests from consumers about 900 pay-per-call services have made this issue one of the most pressing matters at both the state and national levels. On the state level, local telephone companies are responding positively to recent rules adopted by the Public Utility Commission, which require local telephone companies to provide free blocking to all 900 and 976 numbers upon request.

"The Texas Telephone Association and its member companies support the 900 pay-per-call service blocking. We believe the call blocking option will alleviate some of the consumers' and the Texas Legislature concerns about abuses connected with 900 service," commented TTA president Tim Raven.

Raven said telephone subscribers throughout the state will receive ballots in their telephone bills notifying them of the 900 and 976 blocking option. To order the call blocking option, customers can return the ballot or contact their local telephone company.

The Jaycees bought 100 barrels to distribute and are hoping that the last 12 barrels will be bought by individuals or businesses who may have missed out on ordering the first time.

According to Dustie Cook, president of the Jaycees, those who received a barrel should take care of their geraniums by watering every three or four days, and pinching the buds off after the bloom has dried out. "If you don't pinch off the dried blooms, the plant just wastes water by sending it to the dead bloom anyway," she said.

The Jaycees worked from about 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Saturday, with the help of others including Lynn County Adult Probation Dept., Lynn County Sheriff's Dept., Barry Pittman and City of Tahoka, Taylor Tractor, and Lynn County Fuel Assn.

"We really appreciate all the businesses who participated in this project," said Jaycee member Cal Huffaker. "We've already heard lots of comments about how nice the flowers look around town," he added.

Huffaker said the Jaycees would keep the additional 12 planters on hand for only one additional week, and will sell them to anyone interested for \$30 for an empty barrel, or \$50 for a barrel with the geraniums in them with all labor provided by the Jaycees in planting and moving them to another location.

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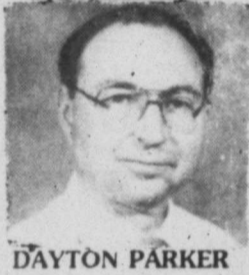

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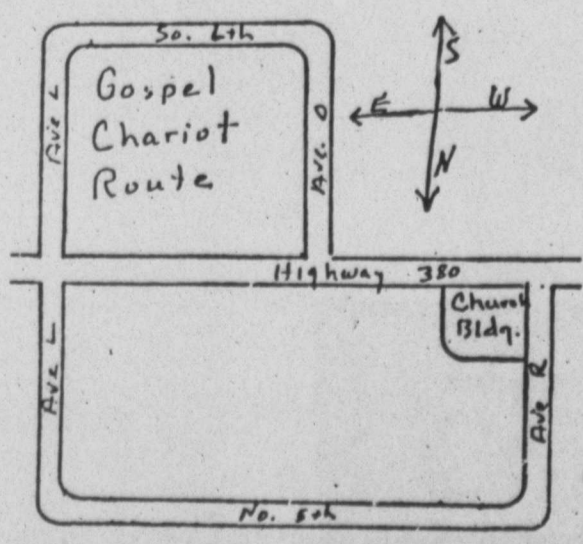
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Lynn County Hospital Has Open House Last Week

\$500,000-Plus To Be Awarded Youth At Texas 4-H Roundup

More than half a million dollars in scholarship will be awarded to outstanding young people at the 1991 Texas 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University, June 4-5.

The biggest 4-H event of the year, Roundup brings together more than 2,500 young people who learn by demonstrating skills and leadership in competitions.

Gayle W. Laine, 4-Y Youth Development Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said that \$592,000 in scholarship sponsored by the Texas 4-H Foundation will be awarded during Roundup.

Texas has the nation's largest 4-H scholarship program, an effort that continues to grow with tremendous support from private donations.

There are over 2100 applicants this year and 91 scholarships to award. Selection is a difficult process

that takes a seven-person committee five days to complete.

The young people are judged on their 4-H experiences, leadership skills, project, community service, personal needs and other qualifications pertaining to high school academic performance and college entrance exam scores.

Scholarships are granted in agriculture, life sciences and unrestricted categories.

Another part of Roundup is the 4-H Food Show, according to Laine. Contestants enter their favorite recipes in one of four categories - nutritious snacks and desserts, fruits and vegetables, breads and cereals, and main dish. Each first-place winner receives a \$750 scholarship from the Morrison Milling Company.

In 40 other contests ranging from entomology to safety and accident prevention, young people will be judged on method demonstration and illustrated talks.
