## Hearing Affecting Voters' Rights

Notice is hereby given by the Wilson Independent School District that on the 18th day of April, 1995 at 7 o'clock p.m., its board of trustees will conduct a public hearing at the Wilson School Cafeteria, 1411 Green Street, Wilson, Texas.
The District has been sued in Federal Court by plaintiffs seeking a declaratory judgment that the existing at-large scheme of electing board of trustees of the district violate the plaintiffs' civil rights. In that suit, the plaintiffs claim that the present election method unlawfully dilutes the voting strength of minority voters, and the plaintiffs seek a permanent injunction against the present election system, and seek the formation of an election scheme to include single-member electoral districts.
The District has agreed to a settlement of said lawsuit by changing to a cumulative voting method for the election of trustees. The settlement agreement, when approved by the court, must be submitted to the United States Department of Justice for pre-clearance. It is important for the voters of the district to study the settlement proposal and to comment thereon. The proposed new plan for election of trustees from precincts within the district must be approved by the Justice Department; otherwise, the settlement agreement is invalid.
The proposed agreement will be discussed at the hearing. All persons are urged to attend the hearing and shall be given an opportunity to comment on whether or not they favor the election of trustees in the manner set forth in the settlement agreement. The settlement agreement may be read, studied, and examined at the office of the superintendent of schools of the district located at 1411 Green Street, Wilson, Texas (School Administration Building). Cumulative voting is proposed for the May 1996 School Board Election.

anything. They work some flowers in anything. They work some flowers in "They work any wildflower, fruit rees, cotton and saltseeders." "Some years we have a big bloom of Tahoka daisies," he said. "They really like those. Whatever's in bloom maize, stuff you wouldn't think have blooms on them.
"A bee will fly about a mile to get a good pollen store," Knox said. They work only during the daylight hours and come in just before sunset." He said the bees have scouts that go out and find the flowers or what-
ever they are going to work that day.
According to Knox, the bees have their own language that they use to talk to each other. It's a body language called dancing that alerts other hees where nectar and pollen are located. The dance also explains direcion and distance.
When a bee is out collecting pollen and nectar, most people would think that they are eating it as well but that is not true.
"A bee does not eat unless another bee feeds it," Knox said. "Bees an not feed themselves."
With the distance and various directions the bees travel, one wonders
"You could move a bee hive everyday if you wanted to," Knox said. The only time you can mess up a bee Grom knowing where its hive is lo-
