ONCE EVERY three or four years I write something about fishing, one of many things I know almost nothing about. The last time I went fishing was about five years ago, at Lake Brownwood. I didn't catch anything, but then, I really didn't expect to.

I fished in a boat house, or dock house, or whatever they called it, and I also fished once from a boat at Brownwood. Each time I kept my baited hook in the water for a long, long time, the most boring 45 minutes I ever spent, and caught nothing.

My friends who are real fisherpeople tell me that impatience is my problem. They tell me how much they enjoy going out and spending the whole day just fishing and communing with nature, whether they catch anything or not. Of course, they like it better when they do catch something.

Not me. If I haven't caught anything in 30 minutes, I'm ready to go do something else. And I am rather proud to say again that I never have caught a fish large enough to take home. (Except one time I caught a pretty good-sized fish which made rumbling noises like it had serious stomach trouble, and my companion made me throw it back, saying "That's an old drum; nobody eats those.")

And why should everyone be so proud of catching big fish, anyway, when a little one is just as pretty, and two or three small ones would make as much food as one big one? The answer, of course, is because that's where the prestige is; it's a competition to see who can catch the biggest bass, catfish, trout, guppie or whatever. Actually, most fishermen/women don't eat the fish they catch, anyway. Even if I had caught one, my wife wouldn't have cooked it, because she says they stink up the kitchen.

I'm glad somebody likes to fish, because I like to eat fish. Boneless, in a restaurant.

Assault Cases, Thefts, **Wreck Investigated**

Several assault incidents, mostly involving family members, and a traffic accident in the city of Tahoka were investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week. The sketchy wreck report was the first received by The Lynn County News under a new state law which prohibits law officers from giving out names of persons involved in traffic accidents.

(In the last legislative session, a bill was passed which prohibits officers from giving out names and specific addresses in traffic accidents to newspapers or other media. The bill by a Houston legislator supposedly was intended to prevent "ambulancechasing lawyers and chiropractors" from getting information on persons involved in accidents and then contacting them and offering their services.

(In effect, the law blocks newspapers from reporting the news in regard to traffic accidents. The Texas Press Assn. and some of the state's larger newspapers are seeking to get the law overturned.)

The collision investigated this week was on Thriftway parking lot and involved a 1997 Kia driven by a 28-year-old Tahoka man and a 1981 Ford pickup driven by a 52-year-old O'Donnell man. No injuries resulted.

Barbara Whiteside of Wilson told sheriff's officers that someone took about \$250 in cash from her home during the last week. The money had been collected for a Wilson school fund raiser.

A Tahoka woman told police this week that she would file assault charges against a Tahoka man who allegedly made improper advances toward her at a home here on Sept. 28. Both the man and woman are in their 60s. The case is to be heard in municipal court.

Police this week recovered a VHS camera which had been stolen from a vehicle on Lockwood after the vehicle's owners both had been arrested by DPS officers on warrants from outside the county and taken to ail. Investigation is continuing.

A 15-year-old Tahoka youth was

jailed on charges of striking his sister, resisting arrest and assault on a peace officer, plus disorderly conduct and use of abusive language. The arresting officer suffered hand and knee injuries, according to the report. The youth was taken to the Lubbock Detention Center.

Troy Hinds of Tahoka reported a window on his Mercury van had been broken while the van was parked at his residence on N. 3rd Sunday. And Marie Littrell of Tahoka told police someone scratched the door and side of her Pontiac while it was parked on Lockwood Sunday, causing an estimated \$200 damage.

A 37-year-old Tahoka woman told officers she was struck by a 25-yearold Tahoka man on S. 1st St. Saturday. The incident was to be considered in municipal court.

A 47-year-old Tahoka man was to be charged with assault on a family member after his 35-year-old female companion said he kicked her in the stomach at a residence on S. 8th St. Saturday. She was taken to Lynn County Hospital for treatment.

Augustina Salazar of Tahoka reported two tires on her Ford Escort were punctured while it was parked in the 2200-block of N. 5th St. Friday.

In jail during the week were two persons for theft by check, one for possession of marijuana under two ounces, one for traffic warrants (for Slaton) and one for driving while intoxicated, first offense.

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
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Citizens Express Concerns At City Council Meeting

by JUANELL JONES

Tahoka City Council meeting Monday night, expressing their concerns over some juvenile activity re, and wanting to know how law orcement could respond, as well how they, as parents, could ress the issue. Tahoka Police chief Steve Chance spoke at the eeting, saying the police lepartment and the council members ere well aware of the juvenile delinquent activity and that ograms were being implemented to address the problem.

"This [city council] meeting was a very good example of how local government and citizens can work together for a common cause," Chief Chance told The News after the meeting, adding that he felt it was a very positive meeting and a good opportunity for information to be shared.

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Citizens shared information about juvenile activity in the minipark, where parents said children attending functions at the Methodist Church and the Life Enrichment Center were verbally harassed by juveniles, and that an adult leader at the center called police after juveniles "banged on the doors." Tion "What we have here is what is called Delinquent Youth Gangs, which are groups of young people (mostly juveniles - we have knowledge of ages 5-21 involved here) who hang out together. They have a name, a leader or leaders, and they have developed some identifying signs such as similar clothing style, colors, and/or hand signs. They have engaged in delinquent or undesirable behavior (truancy, minor vandalism, status offenses) often enough to attract negative attention from law Enforcement and/or neighborhood residents and/or school officials, but they have not yet committed serious crimes," Chance said. The police chief said that several

changes in police department operations, based on citizen input, have already been implemented and nore changes will be instigated Soon, including: (1) An officer on duty 24-hours

(4) Develop programs that work Several citizens attended the in a preventive manner to deal with the problem.

> Two programs which citizens will soon see include the Red Ribbon Week program, from Oct. 23-31, and a Citizens Academy program. Red Ribbon Week is a drug awareness program where citizens wear red ribbons to show that their community will not accept drug use, said Chance, who says he will be distributing the ribbons throughout the area.

A program which Chance has been preparing for quite some time is the Citizens Academy, a program which he says works well for many cities, and of which he has had experience with.

"The Citizens Academy is an eight-week program (2-1/2 hour classes one night each week) which anybody can attend, which will give an overall orientation on everything Tahoka police officers deal with," Chance explained.

He says the program is free, with all materials provided, and is an organized, structured, informative program which gives a good basic orientation to citizens of what police departments can and cannot do. He organized three Citizens Academy classes while in the Pampa Police Department prior to taking the chief position in Tahoka, and says the program worked well there.

The police chief will instruct some of the class sessions, he says, but there will also be guest instructors. Certificates will be presented to those who complete the course, and they will then be known as Citizens Academy Alumni.

"The Alumni group works directly with the local police department in accomplishing things that need to be done, such as a neighborhood watch and park watch and other crime prevention programs. We want citizen involvement - we are your police department, and we are working for you," Chance said.

Chance said he hopes to have everything in place for the Citizens Academy program by next Friday

Additionally, the chief has been conferring over the past several months with Tahoka school officials over the possibility of having a school resource officer on duty at the school, and has been waiting for approval of a grant application to pay the officer's salary. Chance says he already has a person in mind for the program, who is a non-local officer who has worked with such programs in the past.

"The right person in this position can provide a major input in deterring juvenile delinquent activity, and we are hopeful that this grant will be approved soon. The school superintendent has been very cooperative, the city council has been very supportive, and we are excited about such an opportunity," said the chief.

Within the local department, Chance said, all police officers have now completed additional training on "juvenile street law" in order to help address the problem of juvenile delinquency here.

Also, a program which has been implemented during the last two months is one that lets the parents of juveniles know when their child is involved in law enforcement situations.

"Any time our officers deal with juveniles in any manner other than positive situations, we document that on a department form and send that form to their parents," said Chance. He added that because of citizen input, the department will change that policy somewhat, by not only sending the form to the parents, but also keeping one copy of the form on file at the local police department as well as sending a copy to juvenile probation authorities and school authorities.

"We are working on the problem just give us a chance to implement these programs," Chance said. "Every member of this community should demand the highest standards of professionalism from this police department, and we are striving to provide that," added the chief.

Maurio Avila, Jimmy Woodward and Jackie Smith discussed the future of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).



CRP Sign-up Period **Begins October 14th**

The 16th Conservation Reserve the life of the contract. CRP payments Program (CRP) sign-up period will be from Tuesday, Oct. 14 through Friday, Nov. 14. All contracts that expired prior to 1997, contracts that expire on Sept. 30, 1998, or any land not under contract may be bid if the land meets the eligibility criteria.

The new Conservation Reserve Program is designed to target the most environmentally sensitive land. The primary goals of CRP are erosion reduction, water quality improvement, and wildlife habitat enhancement. All eligible offers will be ranked using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI). The index is used to evaluate all offers based on the potential environmental benefits. The criteria that will be used to determine the EBI ranking include: wildlife benefits, erosion control, water quality, air quality, and cost. Producers who bid their land into the **Conservation Reserve Program will** sign a contract with the United States Department of Agriculture if their bid is accepted.

The wildlife habitat cover benefit factor has been revised since the last sign-up to recognize the improved benefits of certain covers. The air quality factor has also been changed, and to encourage CRP's cost competitiveness an additional sub factor was added to the cost factor.

Participants must establish a cover on the land that is accepted into CRP. They receive cost-share assistance for establishing the cover, as well as, an annual rental payment for taking the land out of production. After the cover has been established, the producer must maintain the cover for

Appointments should be scheduled early in the sign-up to ensure that all documentation can be completed. If producers wait until the last few days of the sign-up to schedule an appointment, it may not be possible to get all the documentation completed before the deadline.
