Loss To Stratford Leaves Bulldogs 3-2

Tahoka wound up its non-district schedule with a tough 35-26 loss to Stratford in Amarillo last Thursday, leaving Coach Wes Cope's team with a record of 3-2.

The Dogs will rest up on an open date this week before going into district play against five highly-ranked foes in district, starting with Idalou Oct. 11.

Stratford led 13-12 at halftime and pulled ahead in the last half, then held off a Tahoka comeback effort. Tahoka was down by 15 points going into the last quarter.

Quarterback Brandon McCord did suffer two interceptions and fumbles also hurt the Bulldogs. However, McCord did throw for four

more touchdowns—he now has 15 in five games. The most spectacular score was a 91-yard pass to Michael Nance.

McCord, who has rarely been sacked, this week gave high praise to his offensive line. "They have really given me a lot of protection and time to throw," he said. However, one of those premier blockers, 270-pound junior Lance Lankford, suffered a broken foot and may be gone for this season.

Tahoka had 128 yards rushing and 286 passing. The passing yardage brought McCord's total for five games to 1,387. Adrian Moore caught one of the touchdown passes on a play covering 55 yards.

Theft Of Diamond Ring Reported Here

A ladies diamond ring valued at \$5,000 was reported stolen from the bedroom of a home in Tahoka last week. Owner Josie Pebsworth said the ring was in a small white box. An investigation by Tahoka Police Dept. is continuing.

Police also answered calls regarding a child custody case and an incident involving someone throwing water balloons.

In jail during the last week were four new inmates on charges of application to revoke probation on a drunk driving conviction, simple assault, DWI first offense and public intoxication.

Thirty-one persons were in Lynn County jail as of Oct. 2, including several from other counties.

During the month of September, dispatchers at the sheriff's office processed 238 calls, including 77 for the City of Tahoka, 112 for the county, 19 for ambulances, 11 fire alarms and 19 for the City of O'Donnell.

Lynn County DPS Trooper Jay Druesedow has been accepted into the Special Crimes Unit of the Department of Transportation, and will be an investigator with the rank of Sergeant in Corpus Christi.

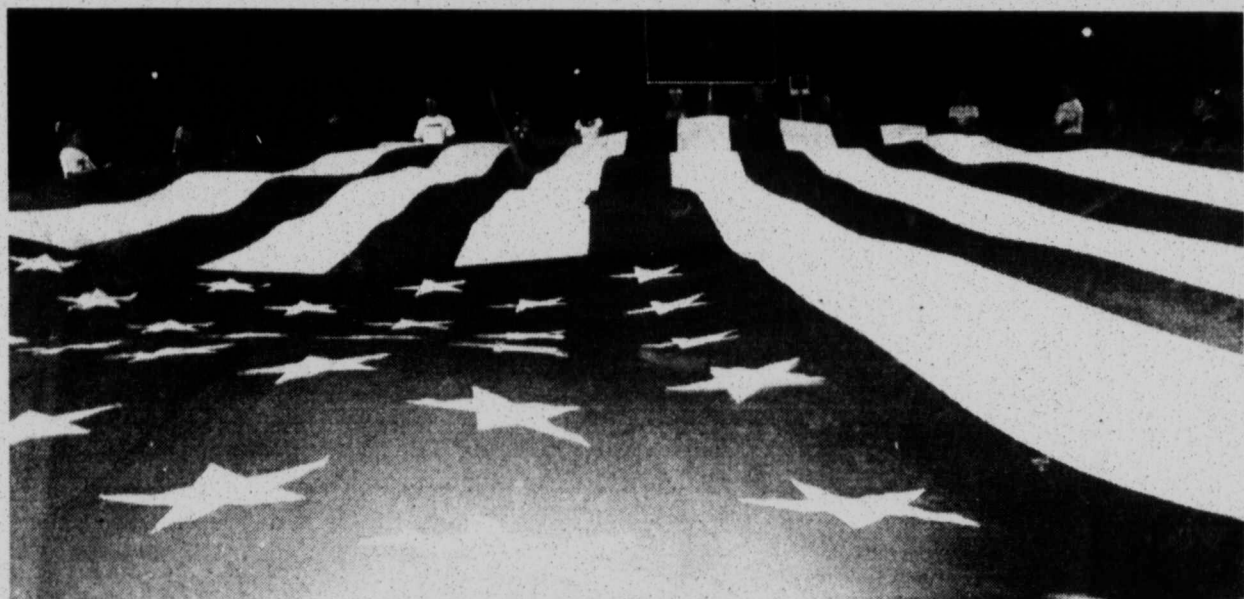

Rylander Releases Tax Allocations

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander recently delivered \$303.1 million in monthly sales tax payments to local governments. September sales tax rebates include local taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller in August.

Tahoka showed the only increase in payments over the same period last year, receiving \$6,033.37 this year versus \$5,206.95 last year for an increase of 15.87 percent. Wilson received \$346.80 this year as opposed to \$455.46 for the same period last year, for a decrease of 23.85 percent. O'Donnell showed a decrease of 20.71 percent, receiving \$502.30 this year versus \$644.53 last year.

Year-to-date Tahoka has received sales tax allocations of \$61,329.68 while O'Donnell has earned \$8,758.09 and Wilson has received \$3,615.90.

The Comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be Friday, Oct. 11.

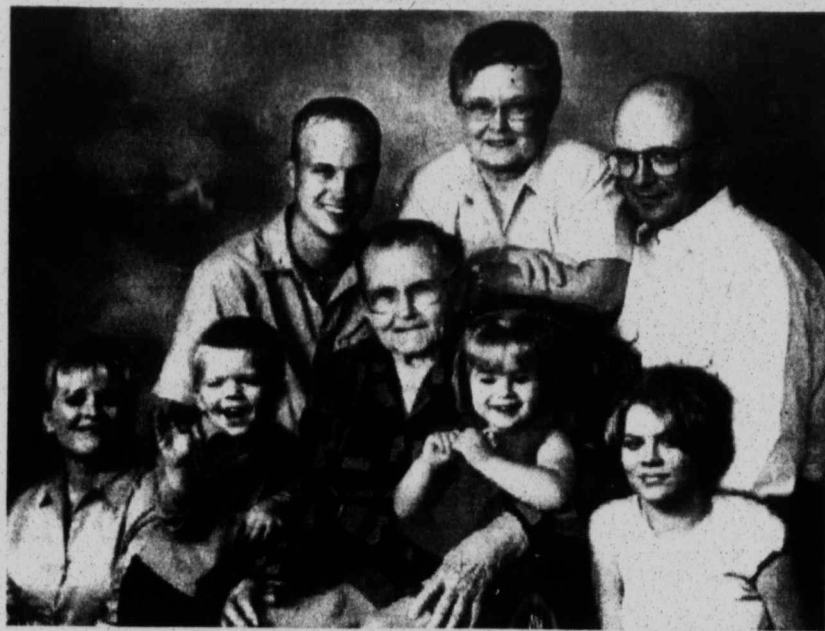

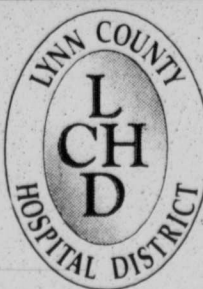

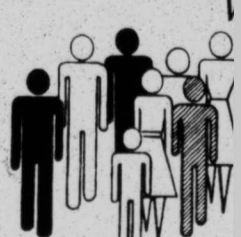

Jimmy Woodard Gets National FSA Award For Community Service

Jimmy Woodard, County Executive Director of the Lynn County Farm Service Agency (FSA), was presented a prestigious award for FSA employees at the National Convention for the Association of County Office Employees from the Farm Service Agency. He was presented the National Award for Community Service, named from among the top five candidates in the United States. The award was presented at the 2002 National Convention held in St. Paul, Minnesota.

Woodard advanced to the national competition after winning at the state and southwest area levels, the latter which included candidates representing the states of Texas, New Mexico, California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma. The winners from the five areas in the United States were then considered for the national award, with Woodard chosen.

Award selection is based upon the candidate's community service in his area, and candidates are from among any county office employees in FSA in the nation. Woodard's community service included many years of service with the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department, 4-H youth, and involvement in church activities.

He has worked in the Lynn County FSA office for 24 years. He began his FSA career as a County Office Trainee in Scurry County, and was hired as the County Executive Director by the Lynn County FSA Committee shortly after beginning his training. Woodard and his wife, Judy, live in Tahoka. They have a son, Jody, who lives in Brownfield with his wife, Kathryn.

"It was very humbling, but a great honor to attend the National Convention and receive this award," said Woodard. "Our association is very active and represents the membership well. The dedication of the membership to provide service to farmers and

ranchers of our nation is very evident as I observed the conventions from the state, area, and national levels. Employees take their job very seriously as they assist farmers and ranchers while administering the farm legislation passed by Congress," he added.

Farm Service Agency is a division of the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture, with over 2500 offices in most counties in all 50 states. NASCOE is the member organization made up of employees working in these county offices. Woodard was presented his award at the 2002 National Convention, held in St. Paul, Minnesota with over 630 delegates and members present from all states. The annual three-day convention ended with a banquet for presentation of awards, scholarships, and recognition of elected officers and national committee chairpersons.

FSA County office employees are at the beginning of a new farm program that will include the 2002 through 2007 crop years. A large amount of information is being sent to owners and operators, prior to the beginning of signup. Signup is set to begin in October with a final date of June, 2003.

"Producers should review all correspondence and attend producer meetings to be better informed about the new Farm Bill," said Woodard, noting that helpful websites can be obtained by contacting the local FSA office. The national website can be found at www.fsa.usda.gov.

SUBJECT: QUARTERLY FLUORIDE NOTIFICATION

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission (TNRCC) has notified the City of Wilson water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) for FLUORIDE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA) has established the MCL for Fluoride at 4mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for FLUORIDE indicates a level of 3.8 MG/L.

This is not an emergency. However, some people who drink water containing FLUORIDE in excess of the MCL over many years could get bone disease, including pain and tenderness of the bones. Fluoride in drinking water at half the MCL or more may cause mottling of children's teeth, usually in children less than nine years old. Mottling, also known as dental fluorosis, may include brown staining and/or pitting of the teeth, and occurs only in the developing teeth before they erupt from the gums.

You do not need to use an alternative water supply. However, if you have health concerns you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you.

The City of Wilson has inquired about getting an Reverse Osmosis plant to deal with this problem and without the help from grants this system has been too costly to put in at this time. The City is also looking for alternative water supply sources.
