THS Band Wins Top Sweepstakes Honor

Last Wednesday, April 16, at Region 16 UIL Concert and Sightreading Contest at Sundown, the Tahoka High School Band proved that it did not need another 49 years to get a "large sweepstakes" as it earned 1's in Concert and 1's in Sightreading. Coupled with the "1" they earned in marching last October, they qualified for only the third large sweepstakes in Tahoka's history, the other two being in 1952 and 2001.

Band Director Carroll Rhodes stated, "It is very hard to get 1's in all three competitions, much like winning the Triple Crown in horse racing. To get a sweepstakes this year is extra sweet considering all the difficulties the band has encountered and overcome, like marching 12 new people, mostly 8th graders, to fill the holes vacated by failing grades, losing eight band members to grades two weeks before concert contest, and the hardest sightreading contest the band has encountered since I have

been here. To say that Mrs. Smith and I are proud of these outstanding young people would be an understatement."

"Not only do these students participate in band but they are active in track, One Act Play, football, basketball, baseball, power lifting, NHS, Student Council, and their church and community activities. They are to be commended for what all they do," said Rhodes.

The community will have an opportunity to hear this outstanding group of musicians on Tuesday evening, May 20, in the high school auditorium where the 3-D Band will not only perform their contest tunes but also some popular, light-hearted numbers, as well as premiere a piece written especially for the Tahoka 3-D Band, entitled "Tahoka Galop."

"I hope everyone will mark their calendars now for this free concert. These young people deserve to play to a full house and we guarantee it will be entertaining," said Rhodes.

Early Voting Continues

Early voting for the May 3 city and school elections and the Special Election to elect a U.S. Representative for District 19 began April 16 and continues through April 29.

In Lynn County, only Tahoka and O'Donnell are having elections in both city and school races. Elections have been cancelled due to unopposed candidates in New Home and Wilson city and school elections. Lynn County Hospital District also canceled their election, with unopposed candidates.

Early voting for Tahoka city and school races is being held at the Lynn County Clerk's Office at the County Courthouse, during regular business hours. In O'Donnell, early voting is held at city hall for the city election, and at the school tax office for the trustee election.

Seventeen candidates are seeking the U.S. Representative seat. Early voting for that election is also being conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's Office. A sample ballot may be seen at The Lynn County News office, or the county clerk's office.

Eleven candidates are running on the Republican ticket in the Congressional race, including David Langston, Donald May, Carl H. Isett, Richard Bartlett, Vickie Sutton, Mike Conaway, John D. Bell, Stace Williams, Bill Christian, Jamie Berryhill,

and Randy Neugebauer; two are running as Democrats, including Kaye Gaddy and Jerri Simmons-Asmussen; Thomas Flourmoy is running on the Constitution ticket; E.L. "Ed" Hicks is an Independent candidate; Richard (Chip) Peterson is running on the Libertarian ticket; and Julia Penelope is the Green party candidate.

Three Traffic Accidents Investigated During Week

Three traffic accidents were investigated during the last week in Lynn County, all by Dept. of Public Safety officers.

On Saturday, 12 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87, a 1999 Chevrolet Cavalier driven by James Edwards, 43, of Amarillo, overturned, causing apparent minor injuries to the driver and a passenger, Sherbert Edwards, 41, of Lamesa. The driver was treated at Lynn County Hospital emergency room and released, and the passenger was released after treatment at Covenant Hospital in Lubbock, where he was taken by Tahoka EMS ambulance.

Two other accidents occurred Sunday, one on U.S. 87 in the construction zone and the other at Wilson. No details were available on either accident.

Officers investigating the death of a man whose body was found on T-Bar Ranch west of Tahoka said this week they still have no positive identification but are "pretty sure" the body is that of Alejandro Franco Gomez, 35, who disappeared Jan. 1 and was reported missing later after he failed to get his final check from a gin at Welch, where he had been working.

Lynn County Sheriff Bob Wilson said an ID badge issued by an employer and a check cashing card naming Gomez were found in a wallet in a pair of pants on the body. Positive ID is pending DNA testing, which reportedly could take up to three months.

Gomez had been working at Tinsley gin in Welch and was last seen with two co-workers as they were returning from Lubbock early New Year's Day.

The co-workers told officers they let Gomez out at a convenience store in O'Donnell after an argument. Gomez' brother-in-law reported him missing after Gomez failed to pick up his final paycheck at the gin.

Officers had searched the area by air and horseback in Lynn and Dawson counties in February without finding Gomez.

Five persons were jailed during the last week, including three for driving while intoxicated, one for driving while license suspended and one for public intoxication.

Total jail population as of Wednesday was 38, including 24 for Lubbock County and one for Garza County.

Dr. Zane Curry Receives Tech Excellence In Teaching Award

Dr. Zane D. Curry of Tahoka received the Texas Tech University President's Excellence in Teaching Award for 2003. Interim President Donald Haragan and Chancellor David Smith presented Curry with an honorarium and a Texas Tech medalion during the Faculty Honors Convocation Tuesday, April 8.

The award is presented to faculty members who have made outstanding contributions to teaching by demonstrating concern for students and academic excellence through the implementation of instructional strategies that empower students.

"Dr. Curry exhibits a style of teaching that not only encourages students to learn, but ignites the imagination as well," said one of his students. Another student said:

"Challenging, motivating, inspiring. These are all words that I would use to describe Dr. Curry. A professor that recognizes the talents in his students even during times when they might not."

As director of the Interior Design Program, Dr. Curry has revised

courses and developed new courses in order to meet the needs of students majoring in interior design and to meet the guidelines of the Foundation for Interior Design Education Accreditation (FIDER). He has been instrumental in restructuring studio courses to include computer-aided design and is noted for innovative teaching approaches, which serve to excite and motivate students to strive to higher levels of performance.

"As a direct result of Dr. Curry's instructional efforts in the interior design program, undergraduate and graduate students have successfully competed in local, regional and national residential and non-residential interior design events," said a Tech spokesman.

Dr. Curry has been teaching at Texas Tech for 16 years and in that time has taught most of the undergraduate courses in the Interior Design curriculum. According to a fellow faculty member, Dr. Curry invests much of his time and energy in maintaining the FIDER accreditation of the program.

Wes-Tex RC&D Announces Matching Grants Available

The Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Area, Inc. has announced the availability of \$8,000 in the 2003 Matching Grant Program. Barry Pittman, President of the Lynn County RC&D Council, says "Our goal is to make these funds available to the communities and organizations in our county area for local projects."

The RC&D program is authorized by USDA and administered by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). The individual RC&D

councils direct the program to the needs of the local communities.

The County RC&D Council must approve the submitted grant application. Grants will require an equal match of local contributions or donations and will be limited to \$500. Applications will be due in the NRCS office, at Tahoka, by May 12, 2003.

Pittman says, "We feel that this is an excellent way to leverage federal dollars and improve our communities."

Congress appropriates funding yearly for the RC&D program. He also says, "Our U.S. Senators and Representatives have been tremendous supporters of the RC&D program. Congress appropriated over \$50 million for the RC&D program in fiscal year 2003. This is the fourth year that the increase in the final appropriations bill exceeded the President's budget request. This is evidence of the strength of the RC&D program with Congress and in local communities."

Grant dollars can be used for a variety of community projects. "So if you have an idea or something you are currently working on, give us a call," said Pittman. 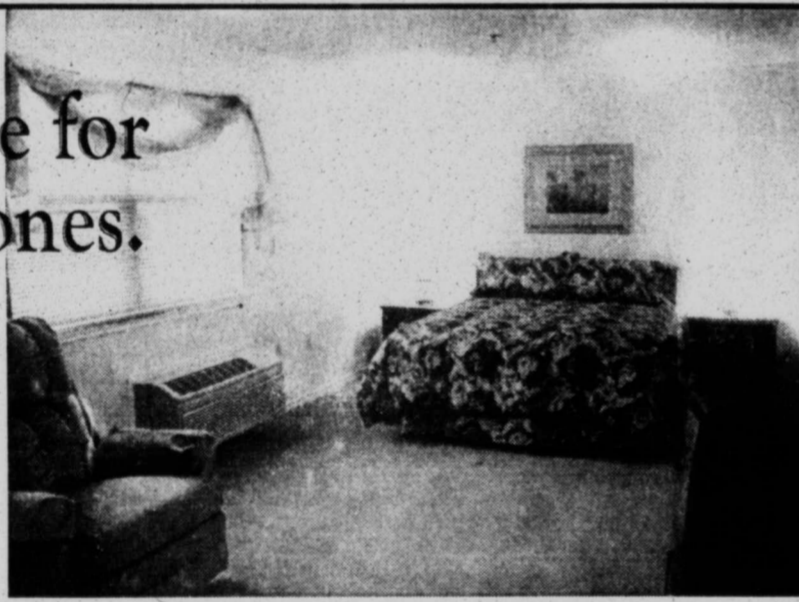
LETTER TO THE EDITOR

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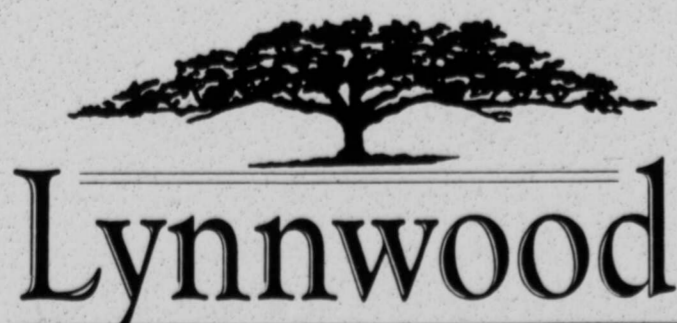
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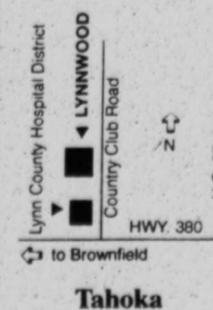

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by excessive rain, hail, flash flooding, flooding, and high winds that occurred from June 4, 2002, are being accepted at the Farm Service Agency (FSA) office located in Tahoka, FSA Farm Loan Manager Curtis Barlow said today. Lynn County is one of 9 counties recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Ann M. Vineman as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the rain, hail, flash flooding, flooding and high winds.

Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 3.75 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for

and FSA emergency loan," Barlow said. Farmers participating in the Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from this program in determining their loss. "Applications for loans under this emergency Applications will be accepted until November 12, 2003, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FSA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster Emergency loans to recognizes farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest. The FSA office in Tahoka is open from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday.

FROM THE NOV. 17, 1916 ISSUE:

Ship Solid Train Load of Cotton

There is an old saying, the truth of which has never been doubted, "that figures will not lie." Others assert with much vehemence that their respective towns are leading cotton markets but few produce figures to substantiate the assertions.

Cotton sold on the streets of Thursday of this week at 16.95. Pretty good isn't it? And that price was not paid for a few, but for many.

Paul Miller, buyer for the Ketter Cotton Account, called on the News Thursday and informed us that he had sold \$60,000 worth of cotton to Denton Bell & Co., of Cleburne, which will be loaded out Friday or Saturday in a solid train load of twenty cars. This is the largest single shipment of cotton that has ever been made from Tahoka, and as far as we have been able to learn the largest from the South Plains.

Up to Thursday afternoon the Fuller Gin Co. had ginned 1062 bales, and the West Texas had turned out 461 a total for Tahoka of 1523. The government report from the Dept. of Commerce shows 1496 up to November 1st 1916 as compared with 1712 to the same period 1915.

Ginners predict cotton to settle on 20 cents and are of the opinion that seed is due to fall off in the next few days. It is now priced at \$50. The crop is estimated at less than 3000 bales.

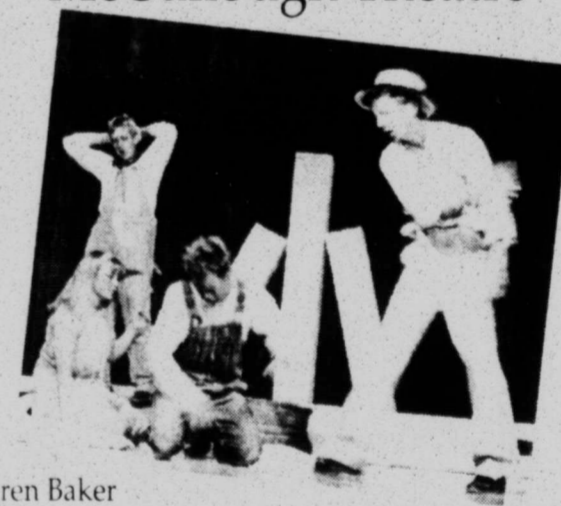
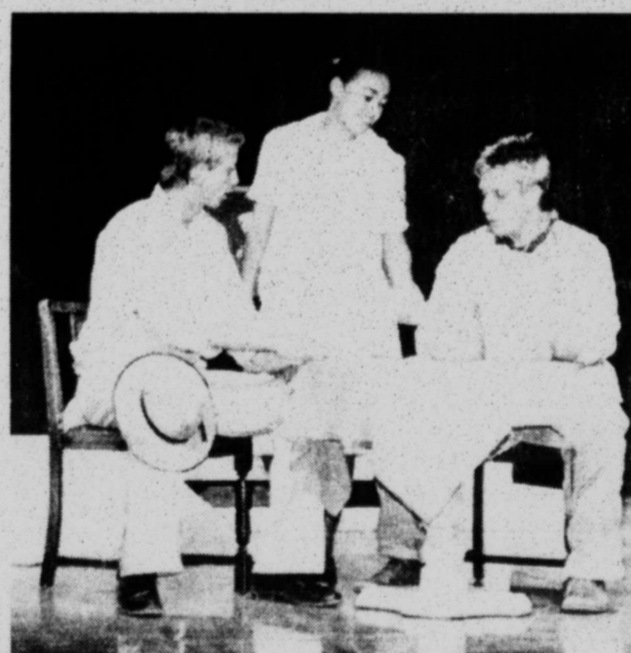

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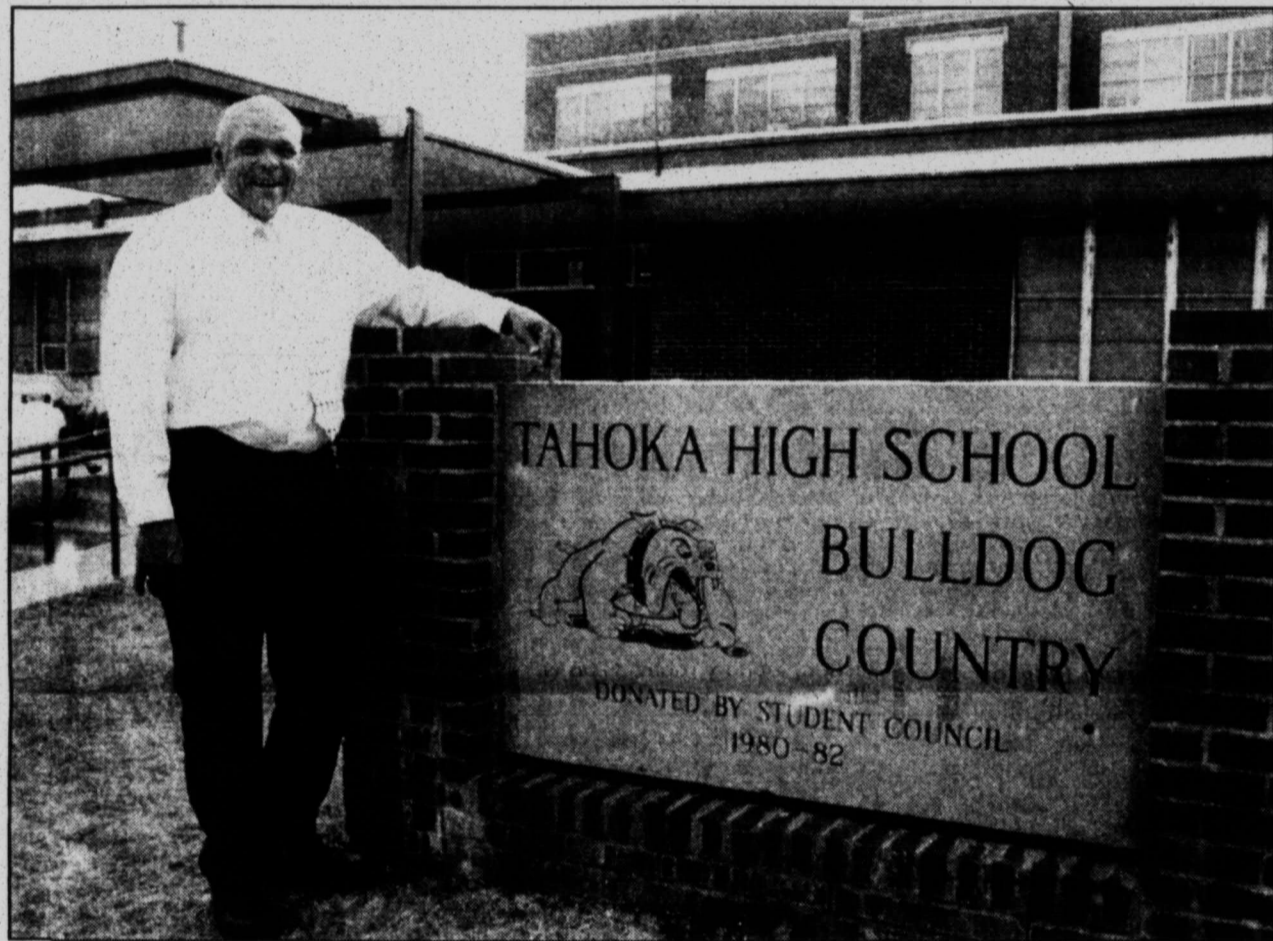

New Technology Comes to USDA

Local USDA offices have additional technology that will help provide better service to farm and ranch producers. From the beginning of the USDA agency, measurement of acres and the location of field boundaries has been a very important activity. With the use of satellites and Global Positioning System (GPS) these measurements are more accurate and can be determined with a great saving of time. The GPS technology is not new but its use by USDA by the field office has just begun. The cost has been a limiting factor in years past. With the decrease in cost of equipment and the increase in accuracy USDA has obtained units for most county offices.

Producers are already making use of precision agriculture methods. As both FSA and NRCS personnel incorporate this technology tool into their activities, producers will begin to realize even better service. Lynn County FSA office is one of the first 30 counties in Texas to begin use of the GPS driven technology to record farm field and tract information. The use of measurement chains and hand plotting on big maps has been the standard for years. The GPS system allows the use of a hand held device that records locations in the field that can be transferred to the computers in the office.

The Lynn County office is in the process of verifying the transfer of information from the historical "big maps" to the GPS data file. This system is being used for all changes of farm boundaries needed to complete reconstitutions when farms are divided or combined due to ownership or operator changes. Other uses will

be included as the data base is totally verified. This system will be used for all field locations for the Conservation Reserve Program with signups beginning later this year.

The Lynn County NRCS is using this system for all field activities in helping producers with installation of conservation practices. These practices include the location of irrigation pipe, terraces, field boundaries, and other conservation use areas.

"The exchange of information between agencies is also part of the use of this technology. This is very helpful on the local county level", stated Jimmy Woodard, County Executive Director of the Lynn County FSA Office. "Our accuracy and savings of time will be a big advantage of the GPS system", added Mario Avila, District Conservationist for the Lynn County Natural Resource Conservation Service Office.

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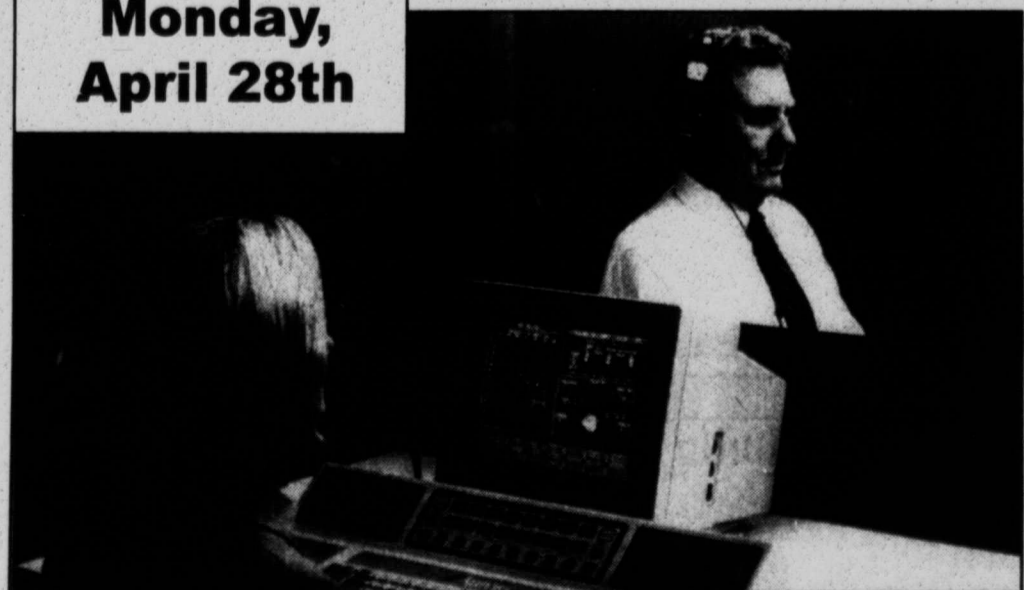
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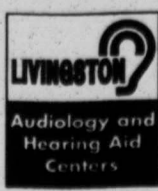
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
