## Five Express Views At Public Forum; Wilson To Continue As County Sherifif

Public controversy over the Lynn County Sheriff's Department continued this week as Lynn County Commissioners Don Morton, Mike Braddock. Don Blair and J.T. Miller: as well as Lynn County Judge H.G Franklin and County Attorney Jay ohear from citizens wishing to express their opinions on the matter. Following the public forum the four commissioners met in closed session before returning to a brief
open session and issuing a statement open session and issuing a statement
that noted that complains against the that noted that complaints against the
department had been considered but department had been considered but
that commissioners were unable to conclusively prove or disprove the complaints.
No official action was considered during open session, and Wilson is expected to continue serving as Sher iff until January 2005, when Jerry D Franklin will take office. Franklin, an 11 -year employee of the department,
five of which he served as Chief dive of which he served as Chie
Deputy, is no longer serving in the Deputy, is no longer serving in the
Lynn County Sheriff's Department. The controversy initially arose when Sheriff Wilson fired Deputy Franklin three days after the Demo cratic Primary Election, in which voters elected Franklin over the in-
cumbent sheriff for the next four-year cumbent sheriff for the next four-yea term. Wilson had already demoted
Franklin from Chief Deputy to Pa trol Deputy when Franklin filed as candidate in the race. Both actions caused controversy in the public eye. and some remarks were also made at the meeting Monday regarding
Wilson's language with employees Wison s language with
and alleged racial slurs.

Approximately 25 residents gath cred in the District Courtroom at 11 a.m. Monday for the public forum. sheet indicating they wished to speak sheet indicating they wished to speak
to the court. These included Lois Sherrill, Leland White, Bertha Brewer, Gary Stennett and Bruce Vaughn. All spoke as concerned citizens of the county, with Stennet praising Wilson's character and the other four raising concerns about the
department, including fear of the department, including fear of the
O'Donnell community not receivin their fair coverage by the Sheriff's Department, the splitting of the com-

munity over the controversy, treat ment of employees and alleged raFranklin was present at the proceed ings. Franklin t understand why Jerry iff. but I am simply speaking to you Iff. but I am simply speaking to you
as a concerned citizen," said Lois Sherrill. "This county is not big enough to be split apart $-I$ appreciate the commissioners court trying to setle this controversy in a fair setlle ment, and then I think we should get
behind you and go on," she added: Len, she added: Leland White addressed concerns
about the sheriff using vulgar lan about the sheriff using vulgar lan guage with his employees and alleg-
edly making racial slurs. "I became edly making racial slurs. "I became
concerned when I read the article in concerned when I read the article in
the Lynn County paper of March 18 , he told commissioners. "I started ask ing people questions. The more' heard, the more concerned I became - not about the election, but the situation the Sheriff has put our County Anglo citizens, and citizens agains citizens as a whole. I had personal izens as a whole. I had person ees, and all of the employees I spoke with said Sheriff Wilson has the mos vulgar mouth they have ever heard,"
White said, going on White said, going on to use several
phrases that he said Wilson used when referring to employees. hen referring to employees.
-After the election, Bob stated to several employees that Joe Calvillo brought in van loads of Mexicans Jerry D. Franklin. I did not know that Mexicans, or anyone else for that Mexicans, or anyone else for that
matter, had to read or write to vote. That is not a requirement to vote in our country," he said.
White went on to add, "The situation has set up disaster regarding race relations, as well as an opportu-
nity for a lawsuit against the County I think each of us should be con cerned about that. We can't afford the cost it may bring upon us as taxpayers or as a society of communities both geographically or racially." Napper told The News that county law is written in such a way that essentially one elected body has no authority over another elected of alcial, other than in budget issues. He also said that Franklin could not hav been appointed Sheriff of Lyn
County if the position opened before January 2005, because of the nepotism rule. Jerry D. Franklin is a half brother to Lynn County Judge H.G Franklin, which makes him ineligibl to any official appointmem by the Commissioners court. The nepotism rule, however, does not prevent rela-
tives from being elected by the vottives from being elect.
ers to serve in office.

The county attorney also said that he was unaware of any lawsuits that were rumored to have been filed against the co
