Fun/Food Festival Set Here Saturday

All area residents are invited to the Lynn County Hospital District Fun/Food Festival and Auction, a fund-raising event sponsored annually by the Hospital Auxiliary that will be held this Saturday, April 16, from 4:30-8:30 p.m. at the Lynn County Show Barn on South 9th Street in Tahoka. This year marks the 25th anniversary of the festival, with a grand total to date of more than \$313,500 raised for hospital equipment through the generosity of local citizens over the past 25 years (see Fun/Food Fest Raises Funds inside this edition for a complete list).

Each year, area merchants and individuals donate items for auction at the Fun/Food Festival, which also includes a fish fry meal prepared by members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department who volunteer their time and talent to serve up hot fried fish and all the trimmings for the festival crowd. Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors and staff members will serve the

The doors open at 4:30 p.m. when the Silent Auction begins. Admission is free, but a 50-cent donation will buy you a door prize ticket to be eligible for the many door prizes that will be given away. Raffle tickets of \$1 each may also be purchased for a chance to win a three day/two night stay at Sam's Town Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada. The all-you-can-eat fish fry will be served beginning at approximately 5:45 p.m., at a cost of \$5 per plate. Red beans and cornbread will also be available, and homemade ice cream will be sold by Phebe K. Warner club members. Lynn County 4-H youth will have drinks available at the concession stand. All proceeds benefit the hospital.

The main event of the evening will be the live auction of the donated items, as well as a Silent Auction table where bidders may write their bids on a list beside each item. The live auction will begin at approximately 6:15 p.m. with Bill Miller as auctioneer. Cal Huffaker and Amy Preston will serve as emcees, and several other volunteers will assist as spotters at the auction.

Lots of interesting items have been donated for the auction, including jewelry, crafts, lawn and garden decor, sports memorabilia, handcrafted items, tools, and more. Several trip packages will also be auctioned,

School Authorities Investigate Alleged Threats By Student

A Tahoka High School student who allegedly made threats about other students has been removed from the high school campus and assigned to the school district's alternative campus for the remainder of the school year.

The male student, a junior at THS, allegedly made a comment about having a "hit list" of people to kill at the school, but school officials and law enforcement officials have not found any evidence in the student's locker or at his home of such a list or any weapons, according to Superintendent Jimmy Parker.

"Tahoka ISD has taken seriously the rumors of alleged threats by a student," said

Supt. Parker in a statement to The News. "Currently, we have taken all of the appropriate action that can be taken at this time. The student in question is not currently attending classes in the regular classroom setting and has been assigned to the district's alternative campus."

The superintendent said that law enforcement officials have been consulted and that they are reviewing the situation, "but no formal charges have been filed at this time," he said. "We will continue to monitor the situation and will take further appropriate action if and when it becomes necessary. The safety of our students will continue to be our top priority," added Parker.

Dr. Eaker Agrees To Repay Training Costs To Hospital

Dr. Robert Eaker, whose schooling expenses were partially paid by Lynn County Hospital with the understanding that Dr. Eaker would open practice at the hospital, has agreed to repay the amount spent by the hospital on his training, a total of about

As the hospital board met last Thursday and submitted a final offer to Dr. Eaker, they were advised that the doctor, a native of O'Donnell, would formally reject the offer and would repay the hospital, according to provisions of the program under which he completed his training, administered by the Office of Rural Community Affairs

Hospital Administrator Dan Powers said he had been advised that Dr. Eaker would open medical practice in Sweetwater.

Present were Powers and hospital chief operations officer Jimmy Morris, and board members Billy Tomlinson, Jerry Ford, Joan Knox, John Hawthorne and Dalton Wood. Absent were members Virginia Griffing and Mike Rivas.

Churchyard Incident Lands Two In Jail

A man and a woman were arrested Monday afternoon at the parking lot of First United Methodist Church after the man broke a limb off a small tree and approached a woman church worker while mouthing obscenities. Another woman who lived with the 21-year-old man involved also was arrested after she brandished a knife while arguing with the man.

The man was charged with disorderly conduct, and the 26-year-old woman with the knife was charged with assault/family violence. Both remained in jail as of Wednesday.

Police also investigated another disorderly conduct incident, in which two young women reportedly were fighting last Thursday.

A DPS trooper who could not be contacted by The News investigated two accidents during the weekin the O'Donnell area; both reportedly were minor. And this week, details became available on an accident on U.S. 87 about 7 miles south of Tahoka last week, when there was a collision between an 18-wheeler truck and a 2004 Ford pickup pulling a trailer with two horses.

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

"The Cleaners" Closes Doors, **Ending Many Years Of Service**

Another business on the square in Tahoka has closed its doors, following an unfortunate trend of longheld businesses here whose proprietors are unable to sell their interests when the time comes for retirement or other agendas.

Toy Holland closed up shop at-The Cleaners oir March 16, ending 18 years of dry cleaning service she has offered to the people of Tahoka and Lynn County, and, to her chagrin, closing the doors of a business which had served area citizens for approximately 70 years.

You know. I hate to close it and have another business that historically has served so many people of Lynn County end its time, but it was just something I had to do," said Mrs. Holland, who offered the dry cleaning business for sale for nearly two years without any takers. Now she is selling the equipment piece by piece, and offering the building up

It's a business she literally knew nothing about when she took over saying. "I hardly ever even fook clothes to the cleaners, but there I

From the first time that I walked into The Cleaners over 18 years ago. I thought, what have I gotten myself into ". she recalls with a laugh. "Suddenly, here I was listening to an for well over 30 years. old man showing me how to run this factory. It didn't take him long to as owner, not knowing anything start telling me the ins and outs of about the dry cleaning business but the dry cleaning business and my willing to learn. She changed the life-changing encounter had begun." said Mrs. Holland.

Aver, who had operated the cleaners that would be of no earthly value to in Tahoka for well over 30 years. She

recalls the history of Ayer, noting that he had worked for a cleaners in south Texas as a young man, employed by a man by the name of Terry Thompson. After a few years, Thompson decided to move his cleaners to West Texas and by some strange twist of events, ended up in Tahoka on the east side of the downtown square.

"Granvel and Terry Thompson had struck up quite a friendship, and I think Mr. Thompson had become his mentor, teaching Granvel the art of dry cleaning garments. In due time. Granvel had married and had a son, but unfortunate circumstances brought about the death of his wife and first child. He later remarried a young Tahoka woman by the name of Lucille Wright, and they had two sons. John and Terry (who was named after Terry Thompson)," said Mrs. Holland

As Terry Thompson grew older. he sold the cleaners to Granvel. After a while. Granvel bought a building on the south side of the downtown square and moved the operation. He soon developed his own techniques and so was born the name of Averway Cleaners (it was always done Granvel's way!). Granvel, with the help of his two sons, moved the equipment to the prevent location and operated the Ayerway Cleaners

In 1986, Toy Holland stepped inname to The Cleaners,

"I soon found out that Granvel She was speaking of Granvel had a way of taking a piece of scrap anyone else and make something out

of it, and this business was a perfect example," says Mrs. Holland. "But that was really of no surprise for a man just starting out in a time of depression. They had to make what they had work. There was not money to buy new. I used to kid him about his slogan, 'It's not new, it's been Ayerwayed,' and I said, 'It's not broke it's just been Ayerwayed!"

The equipment was strange to someone who had never been in the business. "The first day that I walked in, Granvel began by turning on the boiler and I started to hear the pipes knock and crack, and I realized that this place sounded a lot like Willie Wonka's Chocolate Factory! The pipes with steam seemed to moan and groan with an unfamiliar rhythm to my ears. Granvel had become my mentor and I started the life process of learning," she says. "I noticed that all the machinery worked fine - as long as Granvel was around. When he left, it was as though the machinery had a life of its own and would cry out for its former owner! Granvel would come back and things would work fine. I soon learned to work on a lot of the machinery - and turned myself into 'Josephine the Plumber'," she says with a laugh.

Mrs. Holland insists that part of the history of The Cleaners is the people of Tahoka. "They were great - whenever I needed something done that I couldn't seem to budge, I had everyone from farmers to passersby helping me with projects at hand. When the old boiler went out, it seemed every able-bodied man in Tahoka helped roll a 1000-pound boiler in from the alley on skids! So you see, everyone had a hand in the life of The Cleaners," she says.

Time marched on, and so did life at The Cleaners. Mrs. Holland says The Cleaners really did appear to have a life of its own, even though she knew the machines were inanimate objects. "Its machinery seemed to speak to each other by the noises from one machine to another from everything to a timer that sounded like a frog, to stopped-up steam traps. It had now gotten to the point when I would leave, the machinery would act up just like it had done with Granvel, calling me back!" she

Up until the day it closed. The Cleaners operated with equipment and machinery that had lasted throughout the years, including a dry cleaning wheel that was manufactured in 1930, dryers that were reworked to use radiators from old ears, and even a recycled boiler tank from a motor home. "This really was Willy Wonka's Chocolate Factory!' she laughs.

Her smile fades, however, as she speaks of the days of closing down operations.

'A week or so from the time of closing the cleaners. I worked there alone, just I, and what had become known to me as a fine old lady known as The Cleaners. The last day I cleaned clothes and turned off the system for the last time, there was a squeaking noise as I tightened down the valve for the last time, just as though I had choked someone. This place seemed to have a life! I have since kept the blinds closed as I have slowly dismantled her machines, try-

ing to keep a certain amount of dignity in her death. She will have her machinery scattered and sold to the highest bidders, just like one would do in the death of a family member. said Mrs. Holland.

The Cleaners officially closed on March 16, 2005, ending an approximately 70-year operation. While Mrs. Holland regrets that the business is closed, she says she knows that the timing is right. "Having said all, I must say that everything has its time, and her time has been ful-

Sgt. Richard Hinkle Sends Greetings From Iraq

Hi from Iraq, this is Richard Hinkle. The picture is of me and Tahoka resident Gary Strickland. Everything here in Iraq is going ok so far, not much has happened at my location. I'm in southern Iraq right now at one of the prisons, Camp Bucca, you may have heard of it on

The wind blows here almost everyday. Yesterday we had a real bad dust storm, we had one tent almost blow down and dust was all over everything. Had to clean all the sand off my bed before I could even get in it. Some days are clear as can

I am the company clerk so I have some morning reports to do and the rest of the day I just take care of any personnel issue that may come up. I monitor the radio and computers we have set up. I also

handle the mail for my guys at my location, so at 430pm I go and pick up the mail from the PO and come back and sort it out, just like I do there. (Editor's Note: Hinkle was a clerk at the Tahoka Post Office before he was called to reserve duty



New Restroom/Concession Stand Facilities To Be Designed For TISD

Trustees at Tahoka Independent next school year," he said. School District last week selected Taylor Millwright Services, a' design-build firm, to design new restroom/concession stand facilities at the school's football stadium. The firm will submit a design and advertise for bids for building the new facilities, and then bring a cost estimate to TISD officials.

Trustees approved the design/ build method of construction at a special meeting on April 7, and then selected the firm to design the building on the north end of the track/football field on North 4th Street. Superintendent Jimmy Parker said the cost may range anywhere from \$80,000-\$100,000 or more

"When we get the bid process done, it should take 60-75 days of actual construction to build the new restroom/concession stand," said Parker. "We expect to have the new building completed during the summer, in time for the beginning of the

School officials had at one time considered remodeling the old ag building on the northeast side of the football field for restroom/concession facilities, but decided that a new facility would be better suited for the design, and would be centered at the north end to be easily accessible to both visitors and home fans, as well as having concrete sidewalks already in place to allow for handicap acces-

Another project, the renovation of the school tennis courts on North 2nd Street, has recently been completed at a cost of approximately \$31,000. The two tennis courts were completely redone, with a new concrete base poured before new resurfacing was laid. The tennis courts have not been resurfaced from the base up since the late 1970s, according to school officials, although some repair surfacing has been done in the intervening years.





City Approves Bid For New Fire Truck

Tahoka City Council members Friday approved a bid for a new fire truck for the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. In a called meeting, the council members voted to buy the truck from the Ferrara Co. of Holden, LA on a bid of \$150,500.

A slightly lower bid of \$149,210 was received from Dayco of Lubbock, but the council opted for the Ferrara bid on the recommendation of Fire Chief Jimmy Woodard, who said a committee had investigated both companies from a standpoint of quality and warranty.

City Administrator Jerry Webster said that a grant from the department of Texas Parks and Wildlife would pay \$108,000 of the cost, and that the \$3 monthly donations paid by citizens on their water bills would pay the balance. He said the local fund should be built up enough to pay the difference by the time the new fire truck is delivered in about

He also noted that the truck will carry a 1,500-gallon water tank and pump assembly, and is designed primarily to fight grass and brush fires.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED INCREASE IN ENVIRONS GAS RATES

On February 25, 2005, Atmos Energy Corporation ("Atmos" or the "Company") filed a Statement of Intent with the Railroad Commission of Texas (the "Commission") to increase its gas rates in the unincorporated area ("Environs") surrounding the Cities of West Texas Service Area (the "Cities"). This proposed increase in gas rates willing to apply to customers residing inside the city limits of the West Texas Service Area.

In its filing, the Company proposes to change its Environs base rates and service charge tariffs to the same level as those current rates previously approved by the Cities for customers inside the city limits. The service charge rates have been in effect inside the city limits since April 10, 2003 and the base rates have been in effect inside the city limits since May 1, 2004. The Company proposes to change the Environs rates effective April 1, 2005. The Commission may suspend the proposed effective date for up to 150 days.

The proposed changes will affect all classes of Environs tariff customers, including Residential, Commercial, Industrial, State Institution, and Public Authority customers. The Company's Air Conditioning Customers, who currently take service under a separate tariff, will instead be served under the Residential tariff. There are approximately 17,306 Atmos Environs tariff customers (15,071 Residential, 1,916 Commercial, 182 Small Industrial, 16 State Institution, and 121 Public Authority). The proposed changes in Environs base rates are expected to increase the Company's annual revenues by approximately \$440,274. The Company also proposes to implement and apply a new Weather Normalization Adjustment clause to the bills of customers in weather-sensitive classes (Residential, Commercial, State Institution, and Public Authority).

The typical monthly residential customer bill (assuming consumption of 6 Mcf) and the typical monthly commercial customer bill (assuming consumption of 30 Mcf) will be affected as follows by these changes:

The various changes in base rates and nonrecurring charges proposed by Atmos would increase the Company's total revenues in the Environs by approximately \$470,651 on an annual basis, or 9.7%. The proposed change in revenues is a "major change" under state law. The new Environs rates will not exceed 115% of the average of all rates for similar services in all municipalities served by Atmos Energy within the same county.

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


