Gladewater coach David Husmann, whose team got blanked $20-0$ by Forney two weeks ago in the playoffs, advises a healthy respect for Blanton.

Blanton gives the Forney offense instant credibility because of his speed (4.4 in the 40). And his supporting cast is strong enough to keep opponents from keying on him. nents from keying on him.
The result is that Forney has The result is that Forney has scored more than 30 points in seven games this year. "They're a first-class outfit," Husmann said. "They act right, they play hard, they gang-tackle and they're well-coached.
While the Jackrabbits' average of 294 yards gained per game may not sound awe-inspiring, they allow an average of only 161 .
And when it comes to turnovers, they also take a lot more than they give: They have a total of 37 takeaways (fumbles recovered plus interceptions) compared to 17 giveaways (fumbles lost plus interceptions thrown).

Aside from Blanton in the
rushing department, Forney relies on Bryson Brown (140 carries, 800 yards and nine touchdowns)
Ironically, Forney is only about 20 miles as the crow flies from Ferris, the Mules' oppo from Ferris, the Mules oppo nent from two weeks ago. Ferris competes in District 8-3A while
Forney is in 11-3A. Forney coach Mel Maxfield summed up the situation for both Muleshoe and his team. "Regardless of what classification, any time it's this deep (in the playoffs), there's noth ing left but good teams. It comes down to who plays defense and who stays away from turnovers."

Starting grapes from seed requires period of cold

## By mon

A. Clovis reader had inquired (some time ago) about how to start grapes from seed he gath ered back East.
His idea was to plant them in the spring, and that might be simpler but it won't fit Mother Nature's plan for grape seeds. They actually should be planted before the end of Janu ary. There seems to be little information available about growing grapes from seed, but I knew that the seeds would need either winter cold or else stor age in a freezer for awhile. The best information I have found suggests 12 weeks of cold weather if the seeds are planted outside.
Then they should sprout in the spring when the soil temperature reaches 68 to 70 degrees. The writer specified that these were Concord grape seeds, in
which case the vines and fruit produced are going to show quite a bit of variation. (I'm judging by the "volunteer" vines that Some of the vines will be very beautiful plants indeed, and
