Burglars Get Cash After Hitting Five Businesses

Burglars struck at five businesses in the Tahoka area last Tuesday night, April 7, hitting three places in the city and two north of town on U.S. 87. For their efforts, they got a large amount of cash from the safe of one business, but only a relatively small amount of cash and very little merchandise from

Mesa Irrigation, about 11 miles north of Tahoka, was the hardest hit, as the burglars apparently took some time to break into the safe for the cash after forcing entry through a front door. Sheriff's officers said they also took a Remington 12-gauge shotgun from the Mesa office.

At West Texas Agriplex about a mile and a half north of Tahoka, the burglars broke the glass out of a front door to gain entry to the office, where they took about \$50 in cash from a small money box. Nothing else was missing, although deputies said there was also evidence that the intruders went into a storage barn, where nothing

Officers found the back door of Tahoka Drug damaged in an unsuccessful attempt to get into the building, and a storage building behind the drug store apparently was entered. but nothing appeared to be missing. The storage building door also was

The burglars also got into two buildings on Main St. adjacent to the drug store and pharmacy, Tejeda Café and Creative Awards West Texas. Doors to the restaurant were kicked in. and approximately \$50 cash was taken

The only item believed to have been stolen from Creative Awards was a pocket knife valued at \$25. The back door was damaged as entry was made.

Officers said some businesses at Post were hit by burglars on the same night as the five burglaries here.

Sheriff's officers also were investigating a reported fight between two men in O'Donnell early Tuesday morning. One of the men said he went to Lynn County Hospital emergency room for treatment of bruises he said were the result of being struck by a wooden stool.

Police arrested a 30-year-old Lubbock man April 7 for driving while intoxicated and possession of a small quantity of marijuana.



THE SKYWALK, a big horseshoe-shaped walkway which was constructed on a remote overlook of the southern rim of the Grand Canyon, is open and attracting a lot of tourists. I know, because I watched an entire TV program on the National Geographic channel about 10 days ago, and I was fascinated by how they built it and how it looks now that it's finished.

I wrote a column in November 2005 about this skywalk project, then under construction, and how scary it would be to walk out on the glass-bottomed thing, which goes 70 feet out over the rim, into space. Maybe they should have called it the AIG walkway, since it has absolutely no visible means of support.

I mean, you can walk out on the glass runway and look straight down and see the bottom of the canyon, a mile or so below. I say YOU can, because I'm not going to do it. I know I have had a full life, but I don't want to go out there and look down and have the whole thing pass before my eyes. I admit to being chicken. I'd like to see it, though, from a distance.

On the film, some folks were hanging onto the metal rail, and maybe stepping across to the other side over the glass bottom very quickly. A few brave souls would dance on it. By the way, to keep from scratching the glass, everyone who goes out on the walkway is issued a pair of soft shaggy booties, which I guess they return at the end of the tour and probably re-issue, so that the tourists can get athlete's foot and heart failure all at once.

The TV program told about all the engineering and other problems they faced (it is about 70 miles to the nearest town, Kingman AZ, and water and building materials had to be hauled in).

It cost about a billion dollars to build, if my memory serves correctly, which is unlikely. The Hualapai Indian tribe owns it and gets the revenue, but I'm sure they didn't finance the project. Congress perhaps bailed them out, which sounds more reasonable to me than most of the bailout moves.

The TV program never said if anyone went off the cliff during the project. They probably don't want us to know. It also didn't say, as I recall, how much they charge someone to go out on the walkway.

Seems to me I once heard it was \$25, but at that rate it would take a lot of customers to raise enough wampum to pay for the project. Maybe once they get you out there, they charge another \$100 before they let you back on land. One glance downward, and I'd be ready to pay that or more.

In other business, city attorneys Rebekah Filley and Cal Huffaker presented information on several properties being targeted as dilapidated buildings, and, in another matter, council members instructed Huffaker to send a letter to the owner of property at North 5th and Ave. R inviting him to address the council regarding his intentions with the property.

Vernon Baker and Frances Truehart were present to address the council, both of whom reportedly had positive remarks about the town and who were offering their assistance in areas such as economic development, community development, and community cleanup projects.

"The council was very receptive to their remarks, and appreciated their efforts to bring positive input to the council meeting," City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News.

Mayor Mike Mensch led the meeting, with Webster and council members Rudy Fuentes, Clara Calvillo, Amy Preston, and Jeff Martin present. Councilman Ray Box was absent.



Prom and graduation are exciting events and many celebrate these occasions at parties with friends and family. While we want our students to enjoy this time to the fullest, we also want to be sure they continue to make smart, responsible decisions surrounding these events, including not drinking when underage or getting into a car with anyone who has been drinking.

This is a perfect time for parents to think again if they believe it's ok to host a special event party with alcohol for teens and their friends. According to the National Academy of Sciences, two-thirds of teens report getting alcohol from their parents or other adults These parents may be well-intentioned, but collecting the keys and thinking they're keeping the teens safe is like going to the casino, winning, and thinking you will win every time! When those teens drive home the next morning, they could still be intoxicated and put their lives and the lives of others at risk.

A parent hosting such a party also sends the wrong message to their kids...it's ok to break the law-and this may lead them to do so again under other conditions. As parents, there is nothing more important to us than our children's safety and the good news is when it comes to influencing teens about important decisions such as these,

it's parents who have the power. According to the 2007 Roper Youth Report, the majority of teens-70 percent-say that parents are the No. 1 influence on their decisions about whether or not they drink al-

Parents have to help children navigate through an adult world. Teaching them right from wrong, self control and respect of themselves, others and the law is part of the job. We do a disservice to our efforts if we show them by providing alcohol at a party that it is ok to disregard the law sometimes.

Recognizing the important role parents and other adults play, the responsibility program- Prevent, Don't Provide- serves to remind adults not to provide alcohol to teens and their friends at parties. Parenting is hard work; it is about being an authority in kids' lives and helping them make good choices.

The good news is most parents agree that it is never OK to host a teen drinking party and most teens-72 percent of our teens don't drink. (2006 National Survey on Drug Use and Health, conducted SAMHSA, U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, 2007)

Talk with your teens and help them find a good time without drinking. For more information about Prevent Don't Provide, Family Talk about Drinking, and other programs designed to offer parents information on how they can prevent underage drinking, visit www.



Springtime signals prom time and prom is the most exciting part of the school year for many students. Teens will have a lot on their minds, and driving safely may not be at the top of the list. But the stakes are high because traffic crashes are the leading cause of death for teens. In fact, getting into a car, pickup truck, or SUV is the most dangerous thing that high school students do every day because many of them fail to buckle up. If their vehicle happens to be a pickup truck, they are at particular risk because pickup trucks roll over twice as often as passenger cars. And 71 percent of the fatalities. in pickup trucks were unrestrained, compared to 49 percent in passenger vehicles.

According to the Centers for Disease Control, the risk of motor vehicle crashes is higher among 16- to 19-year-olds than among any other age group. When combined with the fact that teens have the lowest rate of seat belt use compared with other age groups, this is great cause for concern. Among teens fatally injured in car crashes, more than half were not wearing their seat belts. Clearly, the most important thing to be wearing on prom night or any other time you are in the vehicle is your seat belt.

The Lynn County Coalition for Families and the Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Lynn County reminds parents that prom should be a positive experience for a student one that he or she will never forget. There is much talk about gowns, tuxedos, which groups will share a limousine, and of course, who will be the big date; however, the most important part of that talk should come from parents in explaining that prom night safety is crucial in the planning process. Parents need to emphasize safe driving and that alcohol and drugs are not necessary for a fun evening!

Drinking and driving is a serious problem among teens. In 2007, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reported that 26 percent of drivers ages 15 to 20 who died in motor vehicle crashes had a blood alcohol content of 0.08 or higher. And among teen drivers who were killed in motor vehicle crashes after drinking and driving. 75 percent were unrestrained. In a survey conducted by the Centers for Disease Control, nearly 30 percent of the teens reported that in the prea driver who had been drinking alcohol. Another study showed that more than half of teen deaths from motor vehicle crashes occurred between 3 p.m. and midnight; 55 percent occurred on Friday, Saturday, or Sunday.

There is no doubt that prom time can be a dangerous time for teens, but it does not have to be that way. Teens need to know that not drinking and driving and wearing seat belts is the most effective way to protect themselves from injury or death in a vehicle crash.

Be sure your teen wears the right thing to and from the prom - a seat belt!

Parent Prom Tips

. On prom night, demand that alcohol not be allowed.

· Make sure the vehicle your teen will be driving is in good working condition.

. Limit the number of passengers your teen can transport.

. Insist that everyone in the vehicle wear seat belts at all times.

. Don't allow driving after midnight. Make alternative arrangements (chauffeur, car pool with-

other parents, taxi) if necessary. . If renting a limo, parents and passengers should sign a contract allowing the driver to phone parents if alcohol is detected. Insist that only registered passengers be

allowed transportation. · Be sure your teen provides contact phone numbers where he or she can be reached.





The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located approximately 0.25 mile northwest of the intersection of Farm-to-Market Road 1730 and State Highway 211 in Lynn County, Texas. 
