Donations will be accepted for the Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center. A new edition to this year's tour is KCBD-NewsChannel 11 and Anderson Bros! "Finders Keepers" hidden treasure contest. This contest is designed to showcase each community's history while rewarding the smart and savvy individuals of the town. In each community beginning at noon, a piece of jewelry valued from \$2500 to \$4925 will be hidden in a public place of significance. # Five arrested on felony indictments

Five more persons indicted by a recent 106th District grand jury for alleged felonies have been arrested.

Troy Brandon Fillingim, 34, of Tahoka was indicted for theft over \$20,000 and less than \$100,000. He posted \$50,000 bond on the charges, which involved farm chemicals owned by Helena Chemical Co. of Lubbock.

Kimberly Sue Deatherage, 38, of Lubbock was indicted for possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine.

No new developments were reported in the case of Rudy Chapa Jr., who was found dead in his home in Tahoka on July 7, with death apparently caused by a blow to the head. Police said this week they were waiting on toxicology and other reports, and that they have been talking to persons with possible information in the case.

Lynn County jail held 28 prisoners early this week, with the number of prisoners held for Lubbock County at only six as Lubbock County opened a new jail. Three were held for Gaines County.

Charges on which a dozen persons were jailed last week included four persons for driving while intoxicated, one of which was an application to revoke probation on two or more DWI convictions; the grand jury indictment; warrant on non-payment of alimony; warrant on bond forfeiture in a case of driving while license invalid; warrant on harassment; driving while license invalid plus application to revoke or suspend license; and displaying a suspended license plus open container in vehicle.

Jimmy Woodard has had to hit the ground running just a couple of months after hiring on as the City of Tahoka's first Code Enforcement Officer, chasing down property owners after the recent flooding brought an onslaught of overgrown weeds

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Woodard has taken on as a part-time employee for the city, and he is quick to admit that he is the "rookie" in this job. "I took the job in mid-May

and completed my training for the certification test in June, which I passed, so I have my first about compliance, and

license as a code enforcement officer," Woodard said. "The training included legal issues regarding enforcement of city ordinances and codes, but I'm still learning on the job," he admits with a smile.

> most have been understanding. Nearly everyone I have contacted in reference to the overgrown weeds/grass has been very cooperative," he added.

Grass and weeds and debris ... Oh My!

Woodard said that once someone has been contacted about a code violation regarding overgrown weeds or

grass, the owner then has seven days to comply. After that, the city is authorized to either mow it or pay someone else to mow or shred, and then send the bill to the owner. If the owner does not pay, the city will file a lien against the property, and can issue citations and fines.

"With the recent rains, we've got a

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plus later on in the fall you can have a tremendous fire hazard with dried brush," said Woodard.

Woodard knows about fire hazards and safety issues - he was a member of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department for 26 years, including 7 years as Assistant Chief and 3 years as Chief, and he worked 29 years for the Farm Service Agency, followed by a four-year stint as Emergency Services District Coordinator for the Texas Department of Rural Affairs, where he worked with volunteer fire departments and volunteer ambulance services throughout the state of Texas.

As the city's code enforcement officer, Woodard also checks permits from roofing companies working in Tahoka to ensure citizens are protected by using properly-licensed and bonded roofing companies, and he enforces code violations regarding rubbish, debris and dilapidated buildings. "In my training with other

code enforcement officers, I have learned that 'grime equals crime' concerning dilapidated buildings," he said. "The city has been diligent about working to get rid of dilapidated buildings, and these take time and there are legal issues to consider, but the dilapidated building

> He hopes to also work with the city to provide a place for dumping of tires, oil, and other items that are not allowed in the landfill. "The city council has been very receptive to any suggestions I have made. I hope to be able to offer, periodically, a collection site for items that are not allowed in the city landfill," said Woodard. Currently, there is no local collection site for these types of items.

## Former trustee Kent Kahl appointed to TISD board

Former Tahoka Independent School District trustee Kent Kahl was appointed to fill a vacant seat on the Board of Trustees by a unanimous consensus of the other board members at Tuesday night's board meeting, taking the seat held by Tony Garcia who resigned recently due to a nepotism law that precludes a trustee from serving on the board if a relative is newly employed by the school district. The law says that the relative must be employed by the school district for at least six months before a related trustee may serve on the board.

Kahl will serve as trustee until the next year's election.

Garcia's daughter-in-law, Lindsay Garcia, was hired as a high school English teacher at the meeting. Superintendent Steve Burleson reported three more staff resignations to the board, including high school English teacher Regina Resendez, elementary teacher Hailie Wolfe, and librarian Carol Fancher.

Supt. Burleson told The News that all staff positions for the 2010-2011 school year have been filled, and noted that the librarian position would be filled by a contracted service. A librarian from Idalou will oversee the TISD libraries with the two current assistants continuing to serve the day-to-day needs here.

Board members and Supt. Burleson conducted a walk-

through of the elementary campus to observe improvements completed this summer, including new carpeting throughout the entire elementary campus. and other repairs. New roofs on the cafeteria, kitchen, and middle school building should be completed soon.

Aug. 9 was scheduled for a budget workshop and board meeting, with trustees sched-

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uled to propose a tax rate at the Aug. 9 meeting, and to set the tax rate at a meeting on Aug. 23

Students return to school on Aug. 23.

Six trustees were present for the meeting, including Frank McLelland, Cathy Box, Jim Bingham, Scott Dimak, Abraham Vega and Kent Kahl, with trustee John Hawthorne absent.

#### **Snake Bites**

With the recent rains we have seen an increase of snakes coming into our communities. A rattlesnake bite is a serious event, but by staying calm, following good procedures and using common sense, it doesn't have to be a fatal event. In fact, Rattlesnake bites are generally not fatal.

There have been many snake

Wash the bite with soap and water (if available).

If the victim has to walk out, sit calmly for 20-30 minutes to let the venom localize at the site, proceed calmly to the nearest source of help and try to avoid unnecessary exertion which will stimulate circulation of the poison.

**ACTIONS TO AVOID:** DO NOT cut the bite. The

## **Mosquito prevention needed** after heavy local rains

Mosquitoes often make life miserable for humans, pets and most other animals. "With the recent rain and standing water in many locations, mosquito populations will take off with warm weather," according to Bryan Reynolds, Texas AgriLife Extension Service County Extension Agent for Lynn County. Not only do mosquitoes irritate and annoy people, they also transmit many disease-causing organisms to humans and animals. They can spread diseases such as the West Nile Virus, Encephalitis and Malaria. Mosquitoes are also responsible for transmitting heartworms in dogs.

Mosquitoes have four distinct stages to their life cycle: egg, larva, pupa, and adult. They complete their life cycle in 8 to 10 days. Adults typically live from about a week up to one month.

"There is no fool-proof method to make areas mosquito free but there are things that all of us can do to help control mosquito populations." Reynolds stated.

The best defense against mosquito populations is to remember the 4 D's: drain, dusk/ dawn, dress, Deet.

Helping to control mosquitoes is everyone's job. The first is DRAIN. Reduce any standing water that provides breeding sites for larvae. Anything that collects and holds water will serve as a breeding site for mosquitoes. Drain anything around

**JULY 26-30** Monday: Hamburger steak w/ brown gravy, scalloped potayour property that holds water. Also, mowing tall grass and weeds will reduce the amount of area that adult mosquitoes will use for resting sites.

The second D is DUSK/ DAWN. Mosquitoes are most active at dusk and dawn. By avoiding outdoor activities during these times, you can avoid contact with mosquitoes.

The third D is DRESS with long, loose fitting, light colored clothes when outside. Protecting your skin from mosquitoes will help prevent contact with them.

The final D is DEET, which is the active ingredient in most reliable insect repellents. Be sure and follow the label directions on any insect repellent.

A few other things to help with mosquito populations include using "dunks" or "doughnuts" which contain "Bt" or Bacillus thuringiensis. Bt is nontoxic and is an excellent way to help control mosquitoes in areas that have standing water and cannot be drained.



## Commissioners work on budget

bite remedies offered over the years. Recent studies have concluded that the following protocols are best:

Stay calm, get safely away from the snake, and have someone call 9-1-1. The less the victim moves the bitten site, the less likely the venom will circulate through the body and cause damage.

Have the victim lie down with the affected limb lower than the heart. Keep the limb immobilized. If practical, splint the limb.

Treat for shock and preserve body heat.

Remove any rings, bracelets, boots, or other restricting items from the bitten extremity. (It WILL swell.)

additional tissue damage may actually increase the diffusion of the toxins throughout the body.

DO NOT apply a tourniquet. Such action can result in the loss of the limb.

NEVER try to suck out the venom by mouth. You can try the suction cup in a snakebite kit if it doesn't delay other needed treatment. Suctioning seldom provides any measurable advantages

DO NOT apply cold and/ or ice packs. Recent studies indicate that application of cold or ice makes the injury much worse

DO NOT raise bitten area above your head. This may increase the flow of venom into the bloodstream.



PAPER: Acceptable paper is computer paper, white and pastel paper. NO fluorescent or cardstock paper.

NEWSPAPER: dry and unsoiled newspaper. NO slick inserts. NO magazines.

CARDBOARD & PASTEBOARD BOXES: Dry and unsoiled. Corrugated cardboard boxes and cereal or dinner pasteboard boxes. All boxes should be broken down and flattened. NO dirty boxes such as pizza boxes.

PLASTIC BOTTLES & JUGS: All plastic containers; remove caps, lids, and easily removable labels. Rinse and flatten container if possible.

A. Clear and tinted plastic bottles and jugs such as soft drink, water, and beverage containers with PET #1 imprinted on bottom


