Pay property taxes by Jan.31 or face additional interest fees

Lynn County property owners who have not yet paid their 2011 property taxes have a few weeks left if they plan on getting by with no additional fees, interest or penalties tacked on their original bills.

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly.

Those who wait until February will pay an additional seven percent in penalties and interest. Every month following that, the penalties and interest go up by two percent through June when the penalty fee remains at 15 percent. And, beginning July 1, delinquent penalties will include an additional 20 percent for attorney fees.

Some homeowners may take advantage of an option to pay their tax bills in four installments, if they meet the requirements, according to Marquita Scott, Chief Appraiser, Lynn County Appraisal District.

"Homeowners who are qualified for the age 65 or older, or disabled, homestead exemptions, may pay their current taxes on their home in four installments," said Scott.

"If you choose to use this installment option, at least onefourth of the current taxes must be paid before the Feb. 1 delinquency date. The remaining payments are due before April 1, June 1, Aug. 1, without any penalty or interest. If you miss an installment payment, you will face a 6 percent penalty and also pay interest at 1 percent for each month of delinquency. You must indicate on your first payment that you are paying your home taxes in installments. Installment payments apply to all taxing units on the tax bill," explained Scott.

Property owners who want to pay their taxes in person have until 5 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 31 to pay their taxes (without additional interest) at the Lynn County Appraisal District office, located at 1615 Main Street in Tahoka. If paid by mail, taxes must be postmarked by Jan. 31 to avoid penalties.

Burn ban reinstated for 90 days

Lynn County Commissioners met in special session Tuesday, Jan. 3, reinstating the countywide burn ban for 90 days, effective beginning Jan. 4, 2012.

The burn ban prohibits all outdoor burning in unincorporated areas of the county.

Outdoor burning is also prohibited at all times in the City of Tahoka.

Missouri Ellen "Polly" Smullen







Lacking 5?

As the New Year starts we all begin to work on our resolutions. Statistics show that between 40 -45% of us make resolutions according to proactivechange.com Statistics also say the top 3 resolutions are weight loss, exercise and to stop smoking which all are part of getting healthier. As we begin to work on being healthy there are 5 nutrients most people do not get enough of according to YahooHealth.com.

Vitamin D which we know strengthens our skeleton but also in recent studies it has shown to help decrease the chances of a heart attack or stroke. Vitamin D may reduce inflammation in your arteries. Also the University of Minnesota has found that adequate vitamin D levels release more leptin, a hormone that tells your brain you are full. The UofM study also found that vitamin D triggers weight loss primarily in the belly section. You can get vitamin D from the sun and also foods such as milk, salmon, mackerel, tuna, and eggs Magnesium is involved in more than 300 bodily processes. Without the proper amount of magnesium every cell in your body has to struggle to generate energy. Low magnesium levels may increase your blood levels of C-reactive protein, a key marker of heart disease according to the Journal of the American College of Nutrition. It is recommended that we have 400 milligrams a day. Foods such as halibut, navy beans and spinach are rich in magnesium. It should be noted that most men do not get the recommended daily allowance (RDA) so a supplement should be taken (250 mg daily). **B12** is known as the Brain Booster. Studies show that older people with low levels of B12 have less of the gray matter in their brains. Gray matter is the "computer" or thinking/decision making part of our brain. B12 can be found in lamb and salmon but the best source is a B12 fortified cereal. So have a bowl each morning with milk and we should all be good. If you are taking an acid blocking medication you may need to consult your doctor on a possible supplement. Potassium is the mineral that makes your heart beat. Without it your muscles do not contract and your brain could not comprehend a sentence. Crazy! The RDA is 4700 milligrams. Avocados, bananas; potatoes all contain levels of potassium. Eating the daily recommended amount of fruits and vegetables will usually help you reach the RDA.

Iodine supports your thyroid gland in its production of the hormones T3 and T4, both help control how efficiently you burn calories. Insufficient iodine can cause you to gain weight and feel fatigued. Most people think that if they just use iodized salt they are getting enough iodine but researchers at the University of Texas of Arlington tested 88 table salts and found that half contain less than the RDA of iodine. Milk, eggs and yogurt are great low sodium sources of iodine.





To whom it may concern or care,





PUBLIC SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT: Fair Housing, It's the Law

To promote fair housing practices, the City of Tahoka encourages potential homeowners and renters to be aware of their rights under the National Fair Housing Law.

Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, as amended, prohibits discrimination against any person on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, handicap, familial status or national origin in the sale or rental of units in the housing market.
