New voter registration cards on hold until redistricting lawsuit is settled

Citizens of Lynn County, and throughout the rest of Texas, may have noticed that they have not yet received their new voter registration cards for 2012 elections, but there is a good reason for that. The delay has nothing to do with the efficiency of voter registrar offices, but with the judicial system. The redistricting lawsuit that has affected the delay of setting a date for the Texas Primary elections is also causing a delay in getting the new cards printed as

the new cards printed, as senate district numbers are printed on the cards.

"Until they can decide the senate redistricting, we can't print the new voter registration cards," said

Sherry Pearce with the Lynn County Voter Registrar's office at the county courthouse.

"We have had 2-3 calls a day from county citizens asking when they will receive their new voter registration cards, and unfortunately I don't have an answer to that except to say that as soon as we get the information about redistricting then we will work as fast as we can to get the new cards in the mail," she added.

"If they do indeed change the senatorial districts, then we will have to beNew voter registration cards are issued every two years, and the latest card (a light blue color) expired Dec. 31, 2011.

Pearce also noted that if the delay continues, it is possible that new voter registration cards may not be printed in time for the May 12 city, school and hospital district elections. However, if that happens, she said that voters may use their expired 2011 voter registration card as long as they bring a driver's license for identity verification.

"If they have to, officials at polling locations may accept an expired 2011 voter registration card and check it against the current voter registration list, but they may also require a photo

ID, such as a driver's license, as well," said Pearce. "It's a mess, and I hate it, but the cost of printing these voter registration cards comes from local funds and we only want to print these cards one time, with the correct information on them."

She estimated the cost of providing voter registration cards in Lynn County at approximately \$650 for a first printing, but that the cost would go up with additional printings, as well as confusing voters who might receive cards with conflicting information

Zach attack leads Leopard win over Eagles for Bi-District title

Zach, Zach, Zach and Zach led the New Home Eagles to a bi-district title Tuesday night over another Lynn County team, the O'Donnell Eagles. Four of the 10-member New Home squad are named Zach, and together they scored 53 points in the Leopards' 63-41 win. Zach Paul was high point with 23, and Zach West added another 20, while Zach Jackson and Zach English each tossed in 5 points for the night.

The Leopards took a 7-point lead right from the opening buzzer and kept the momentum to claim the Bi-District title and advance to the next round in Class 1A Division 2 boys' basketball. The Leopards will face the Turkey Valley Patriots in Area action Friday night, at 6:30 p.m. in Lubbock Christian University's Rip Griffin Center.

Turkey Valley ended New Home's Lady Leopards playoff hopes last Friday, with a 47-36 win at the Area girls' basketball playoff match in Abernathy (see separate story, page 3). Both boys and girls teams in Valley were District


6 leaders and drew byes in bi-district rounds. Coach Mike Bonham's Leopard team was runnerup in District 7, and O'Donnell was third in District 8.

In Tuesday night's bidistrict round, Zach Paul opened with a 3-pointer for New Home and the Leopards had a 7-point lead before O'Donnell scored a basket. The lead increased to 10 points at 12-2 before the Eagles rallied with baskets by Dylan Gruben, Ladareon Hunter and Jeremy Lira, and trailed by only 6 points at the end of the first period, 17-11. Gruben was high point for the Eagles with 19 points.

Both teams were evenly matched in the second quarter, with both New Home and O'Donnell adding 12 points, going into the half with the Leopards leading 29-23. The Eagles pulled within one point of closing the gap midway through the third period when Jeremy Lira tossed in the Eagles' only 3-pointer for the night, trailing 33-32. A fast break by New Home's Zach Paul and handoff to Joshua Paul put another 2 points on the board for the Leopards, who followed that action with a flurry of 2-pointers to give them a 46-37 lead going into the final period.

The final period belonged to the Leopards, racking up 17 points while holding the Eagles to only 4 points, and the Eagles struggled to get back in the game. A couple of O'Donnell players earned technical fouls with rough play and giving Zach Paul the opportunity for four free throws within a 40-second time span, which he took advantage of to add four of six free throw points in the period.

Joshua Paul had 8 points for the night, and Mariano Torres added 2 to round out the Leopards scoring in the bi-district win.

THIS IS A Leap Year, and next Wednesday is Feb. 29, a Leap Day which occurs only once every four years. Hundreds of years ago, the leap year day had no recognition in English law. The day was "leapt over" and ignored, hence the term "leap year." There was a time when you could commit almost any crime, including murder, on Feb. 29, and not be prosecuted because there was no such day under the law.




Warning Signs of Heart **Attacks and Strokes**

 Chest discomfort. Discomfort from the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes,



"Butterfly Blessings of Laela Marie Duran": **Community project to build new** home for Duran family underway

Plans are underway for a project that the community of Tahoka and neighboring communities are invited to become involved with, to build a new home for the Duran family, who lost their their 8-year-old daughter, Laela Marie Duran, in a tragedy last November. Laela's parents, Luis Duran Sr. and Sylvia Hernandez, and a younger brother and older sister, also lost

The group is preparing a timeline on how the project will flow. The first step is looking at all of the different types of volunteers who will be needed to help make this housing project successful. their home and all their belongings in a house fire in Tahoka that claimed the life of little Laela. The family had no insurance on their home or contents.

The home project is being initiated by several community leaders, who met on Sunday, February 19, with a group of interested community and family members, in the Richard Lopez family home. This group, with the help of the Duran family, named this project the "Butterfly Blessings of Laela Marie Duran". Laela loved to draw butterflies, and as it turns out, there is a butterfly with the scientific name, "Athyma Selenophora Laela."

The group discussed the house floor plans the Durans have chosen from a group of floor plans being provided by Betenbough Homes of Lubbock. Tino Deleon, who has graciously given the Durans a lot where their new home will be built, has taken the first major step. The new home will be located at 1318 Ave. K. A sign is being made that will feature the name of this effort: "Butterfly Blessings of Laela Marie Duran." This sign with the featured graphic will be placed on the home site for the Duran's

Duran Family Benefit Fund. There has been another account set up at First Bank and Trust of Tahoka, Wilson, and Lubbock, under the Tahoka Church of Christ for "Butterfly Blessings for Laela Marie Duran."

John Wilson and John Baker have started the planning of the necessary dirt work and surveying for the foundation and concrete slab on which the home will be built. Local church ministers Steve Bonner and Vernon Baker can be contacted about donations and food for the days the volunteers will be working. The plan is to do all of the cement work on one weekend. The next stage will be putting the house together with the electrical work, plumbing, sheet rocking, etc. to follow.

Many churches in the Tahoka community have expressed a desire to help with this project, and citizens in this and other communities are welcome to join the effort. Valley girls end playoff run for New Home's Lady Leopards

The Lady Patriots of Turkey Valley High School ended New Home's Lady Leopards playoff run Friday night, with a 47-36 win in the Class 1A Div. 2 Area round at the Abernathy High School gymnasium. Valley opened their scoring run two minutes into the first quarter with three free throws, and then added three three-point baskets for a 12-7 lead going into the second period. The outside shooting was a portent of things to come, with the Lady Patriots adding several three-pointers to their tally throughout the game.


