



Kennel yearbooks have arrived


The 2012-2013 Kennel yearbooks have arrived and will be available for pickup Thursday from 8-4 p.m. in the high school journalism room.



NHISD proposes \$1.22 tax rate


New Home Independent School District Board of Trustees will hold a public meeting at 7 p.m. August 19 to discuss the school district's budget that will determine the tax rate that will be adopted. The proposed tax rate under consideration is \$1.22785, which is a 1.5-cent inbrease from the previous year's rate of \$1.21.

The proposed rate includes \$1,17 for Maintenance and Opprations (M&O), compared to last year's M&O rate of \$1.145, and an Interest & Sinking (I&S) rate of \$0.05785, slightly lower than last year's I&S rate of \$0.06500. The rate to maintain the same level of M&O and pay debt service is calculated at \$1.42663. The \$1.22785 rate is the rollback rate, which is the highest rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election.

Taxes due on an average residence valued at \$96,420 in the New Home school district would increase by approximately \$66.75 at the proposed rate of \$1.22785. See more information in NHISD's "Notice of Public Meeting to Discuss Budget and Proposed Tax Rate" in this edition of The News.



Local's granddaughter achieves honor:

Makayla Cook, 18, awarded **Bronze Congressional Medal**

An 18-year-old student in Boerne, Texas with ties to Lynn County has accomplished a significant honor this summer. In ceremonies held July 26, Congressman Lamar Smith presented Makayla Cook, 18, with the Bronze Congressional Medal Award at the Boerne Chamber of Commerce, in Boerne, Texas. She is the daughter of David and Lisa Cook (originally of Wilson), granddaughter of Victor and Onita Steinhauser of Wilson, and JoAnn Cook (originally of the Lubbock/Wilson area).

Cook is an 18-year-old senior in college through the College Plus/Thomas Edison State college program, and is pursuing a BS in Psychology and a BSBA in Marketing. She has been working to achieve this Congressional Award since she was 14 years old, and was excited to finally reach the culmination of her hard work.

"It was just the experience, and challenge, of a lifetime," Cook says of her experience.

"It's nice to be acknowledged for experiences that go beyond normal 'life requirements'."

The Congressional Bronze Medal Award requires students to achieve 100 hours of Voluntary Public Service over seven months; 50 hours of Personal Development over seven months; 50 hours of Physical Fitness over seven months; and the planning of a one day, two day, three day, and one overnight Expedition/Exploration. All of these hours must be accomplished outside of school functions, and must be independently planned and executed. Each accomplishment must be notarized by a non-family member that was either involved in the event, or who witnessed the student's work being completed (ie., coach, supervisor, or trip participant).

Looking back, Cook is most proud of the expedition mission trip she planned when she was 16 years old. "I took a crew of eight men to Haiti in December



of 2010. We were there for 14 days, and it was amazing to see how the Lord worked through the lives of the crew members to accomplish His mission."

Congressman Smith said that Cook is only his "third award this year," and there are currently no other scheduled

award ceremonies on his calendar for 2013.

"It is a rare and honorable thing for a young person to accomplish," Smith said with a smile, "and I want to keep up with where this young lady goes in life."





WISD proposes \$1.17 tax rate

Wilson Independent School District Board of Trustees will hold a public meeting at 7 p.m. August 13 to discuss the school district's budget that will determine the tax rate that will be adopted. The proposed tax rate under consideration is \$1.17, which is a 2-cent increase from the previous year's rate of \$1.15.

The proposed rate of \$1.17 is for Maintenance and Operations (M&O) only, as the district has no debt service to add any additional tax rate for Interest & Sinking. The rate to maintain the same level of M&O and pay debt service is calculated at \$1.295249. The \$1.17 rate is the rollback rate, which is the highest rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election.

Taxes due on an average residence valued at \$42,620 in the Wilson school district would increase by approximately \$15 at the proposed rate of \$1.17. See more information in the "Notice of Public Meeting to Discuss Budget and Proposed Tax Rate" at left.

Beware of unsolicited checks/letters for mineral rights, says local reader

A Lynn County News reader, who prefers to remain anonymous, is urging county residents to beware of unsolicited letters containing checks written to the owner for purchase of mineral and royalty interests. Letters addressed to owners may arrive in the mail, containing legal documents and a check made out to the owner, but caution is urged to mineral owners to be sure the agreement is with a company with whom they have already arrangements/agree-"This letter came in the

mail, from a company I had never heard of, and included a check made to me for the sale of mineral rights. I immediately shredded the check, but there may be some mineral rights owners, perhaps elderly or confused about which company they intended to reach an agreement with regards to their mineral rights, who may inadvertently cash the check. If the owner cashes the check, they are making an agreement to sell their mineral rights. Please be cautious, and do not cash any checks if you are unsure about any agreements," said the infor-

The letter in this informant's packet included a Mineral and Royalty Deed with information pre-filled and awaiting a signature. Instructions for executing the deed were included with the letter, as well as a check made to the owner from the company.

"Just be sure any documents you sign are with a company you are legitimately doing business with, and beware of cashing any checks from a company regarding your mineral rights. If unsure, don't sign documents or cash a check until you can

verify the information. These are actual oil/gas companies and the letters being sent are not illegal - however, the letters can be misleading as the legal documents seem to indicate an agreement has already been reached, and just awaiting your signature," added the informant.

Worker protection standard training set for August 23

A Worker Protection Standard training for agricultural workers will be held on Friday. August 23 at 10:00 a.m. at The Center For Housing & Community Development (1400 Ave. K) in Tahoka.

Any agricultural employee who works directly with any type of pesticide, which includes, herbicides, insecticides, fungicides, etc. must have a Worker Protection Standard Handler card. The Worker Protection Standard is a federal law that has been in effect since


