A Century of Faith First Baptist Church of Wilson to celebrate 100th Anniversary

ctober 18, 2014 will mark the passage of a century for First Baptist Church of Wilson. More than 200 current and former Lynn County residents will begin gathering in Wilson this coming Saturday afternoon to initiate a weekend of reminiscence and worshiping to honor the 100 years of the First Baptist Church's service to the community. Anyone who has ever attended an activity at FBC or has been befriended by its members is urged to take part, according to event organizers.

Anniversary events will begin in the main auditorium from 4-6 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 18 with a worship service, memorial and reminiscing with guest speakers and visiting dignitaries. Current and former members will share their talents with special music, and a media slide show will be presented. From 6-9 p.m. everyone is invited to gather in the Fellowship Hall to visit with friends and to view a pictorial history of

First Baptist Church. In addition, historical documents will be on display and the 2014 Church Directory will be available for sale.

On Sunday morning, Oct. 19, choir practice is at 9 a.m., Sunday School will be held at 10 a.m., and a celebratory morning worship service will begin at 11 a.m. that will include special music, a puppet ministry presentation, and special message.

Billy Parmer is the current pastor of FBC Wilson, serving since 2004, and he is the longest

serving pastor in the history of the church. He is the 30th pastor to serve during the past 100 years.

"Thank you to all the members of FBC Wilson for allowing me to serve you and serve with you, and thank you to all that have come before to make this ministry possible," said Parmer in the 2014 Church Directory observing the church's 100th anniversary. "Thank you for allowing a fellow 'dirty, rotten, filthy rebellious sinner against God' to join you as we continue to learn about God's grace and preach God's grace. Lynn County Agent Bryan Reynolds, with the Texas Agri-Life Extension Service, is resigning his position here on Friday, ending a 20-year service to Lynn County through the extension service. Lynn County Commissioners reluctantly accepted Reynolds' resignation at their regular session Monday morning at the county courthouse, and County Judge Mike Braddock expressed the county's appreciation for Reynolds' years of service. "I started here 20 years ago on Oct. 17," said Reynolds, addressing commissioners and other county officials present at the meeting. "It has been exciting, and a lot of your kids have grown up with me. I just appreciate all the opportunities that I have had here. It's been great, and I will say that this county's support of the extension service is second to none." he added. "I was not looking to leave this job, but the opportunity came along and after sleepless nights and lots of prayer, I am taking the new job. But I'm not leaving Tahoka, and now I will get to be that volunteer 4-H leader that can deal misery to Wendy

[Scott, the other county agent here]." he added with a laugh.

Reynolds is leaving to accept a position as gin manager at Farmer's Coop Gin in Tahoka. He will begin his duties there Monday

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COUNTY ATTORNEY RACE TO BE DECIDED: Early voting starts here Monday

One local race will be decided in the Nov. 4 General and Special Election, with early voting starting Monday, Oct. 20 and continuing through Oct. 31. The ballot will include a place for voters to write in a name for their choice of Lynn County Attorney, as two candidates are running locally as write-in candidates. County Attorney James Craig and challenger Rebekah Filley are both seeking the seat.

Several other uncontested county offices are also on the ballot, as well as District Judge Carter T. Schildknecht for the 106th Judicial District (unopposed), and other statewide races, including Governor and Lt. Governor, and the Commissioner of Agriculture. The seats for U.S. Senator and Dist. 19 U.S. Representative are both contested races as well.

Also on the ballot is one propos-(See EARLY VOTING, page 3)

In other business at Monday morning's session, commissioners considered proposals from two firms for independent auditors for the county, but took no action, and also discussed (without action) possible changes to the county handbook regarding per diem rates. Commissioners approved the purchase of motor graders for Pct. 2 and Pct. 4, after discussing trade-in costs and finance issues with Lance Wells, representing Warren Caterpillar. Purchase cost is \$67,692 (with trade-in) for a motor grader for Pct. 2, and \$71,506 (with trade-in) for Pct. 4.

Monthly bills were approved, and commissioners approved a contract between the Sheriff's Dept. regarding uniforms and firearms.

Judge Braddock led the meeting. with commissioners Keith Wied, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Danny Martin present, and other county officials.

Hale Center Owls crush Tahoka in district opener

The first district game for Tahoka at Hale Center last Friday was not good for Tahoka, as the Owls flew by the Bulldogs 48-6, showing a strong defense and a passing attack that netted four touchdowns.

This week, Tahoka will continue district play, hosting Floydada, which last week beat Olton 24-19 to go 3-3 for the season and 1-0 in district 2-AA. Tahoka now is 2-4 and 0-1 in district.

First score of last Friday's game came midway of the first quarter when Hale Center QB D.J. Dunn passed 13 yards to Dalton Needham, a combination that worked for two more touchdowns before halftime.

Also in the first half, Anthony Borjas scored for the Owls after intercepting a Tahoka pass. The halftime score was 35-0.

Hale Center added its final two scores in the third quarter, and Tahoka finally got on the scoreboard with just 1:32 left in the game, when QB Roman Parmer went in from 2 yards out.


Tahoka had just 92 yards rushing, led by Dillon Trevino, who gained 76 yards in 18 carries, an average of 4.2 per carry. Parmer gained 22 in 10 efforts and Grant Tekell gained 17 in 5

carries Hadley Reynolds completed 1 of 2 passes for 23 yards, and Parmer connected on 3 of 13 for 23

Dunn of Hale Center completed 10 of 18 passes for 131 yards and two touchdowns, but had two passes intercepted. Intercepting passes for Tahoka were Domenique Herrera and



tion for voters to consider, which is a state constitutional amendment that would authorize annual disbursements from the Economic Stabilization Fund, commonly known as the Rainy Day Fund, to the state highway fund. The amendment would authorize the comptroller to redirect half of the oil and natural gas production tax revenue from the Rainy Day Fund to the state highway fund. The Rainy Day Fund revenue to be transferred into the state highway fund may only be used for constructing, maintaining and acquiring rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads.

Early voting will be conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's Office at the county courthouse in Tahoka during regular business hours, M-F 8:30-12 noon, and 1-5 p.m. Voters must bring their voter registration card and photo ID to cast a ballot.

we will place our future," he added

In 1913, Miss Emma Nicholson, the first teacher at a one room school building in the fledgling, thinly-settled community of Wilson, saw the religious needs of her pupils and undertook the task of organizing a Sunday School, and a revival was held soon afterwards. The First Baptist Church of Wilson was organized on Oct. 18, 1914 with 16 members, following this revival. The first pastor, called on Nov. 15, 1914, was J.E. Nicholson, brother of Miss Nicholson.

The church's first house of worship was built on the southwest corner of 13th and Dickson, and FBC of Wilson used this building from February 1916 to February 1926. The church grew from 16 members to around 200 in less than ten years, and FBC entered into a building program and moved into a new brick basement, with the first service held Feb. 21, 1926, and the church continued to grow.

The church sponsored their first Vacation Bible School in

early 1950s.

In February 1953, Mrs. L Lumsden and son, William G. Lumsden, offered a gift to the church in the form of a Memorial Bell Tower, and during this construction a new cry room was added and a pastor's study was built. On Dec. 13, 1953, the Lonnie Lumsden Memorial Tower and Chimes was dedicated. The first church bulletin printed in color was in 1965. Fans were installed in the sanctuary in 1985, and a Community Easter Sunrise Service was held in the high school auditorium. A new chime system was installed in 1991, when Bro. Ira Shelton was pastor.

Bro. Kenneth Platte was called to serve in August of 1993, and he and Billy Parmer went on a mission trip to Mexico. He resigned in 1998, and Tom Griffin served from July 4, 1999 until June 2002. Bro. Billy Parmer was called in September of 2004 and continues to serve.

"Our mission goes on at FBC, as we reach out to our community and beyond. On Wednesday evenings we have a large group of children and youth, as well as a growing groupp of adults. We have food, fellowship, prayer requests, praises and Bible study,
