#### Chamber to sponsor annual Easter Egg hunt next Saturday

All Lynn County children, as well as any children visiting the area, are invited to the Easter EGGstravaganza next Saturday, March 26, on the grounds of the Lynn County Courthouse at the downtown square in Tahoka. This year, in hopes of warmer weather, the event will be held in the afternoon, from 1:00-2:00 p.m. Children should bring their own Easter baskets and join in the fun and games that will be provided, free of charge, by the Tahoka-Area Chamber of Commerce.

Train rides around the square, a Cupcake Walk, games and egg relay races will be a part of the fun, and children are invited to have fun with hula hoops and participate in the sidewalk chalk art, drawing on the sidewalks around the courthouse with chalk.

Easter Egg hunts will be divided into three age groups, with toddler-3 years old having the first hunt at 1:15 p.m., 4-6 years old at 1:30 p.m., and 7-9 years old starting at 1:45 p.m. Separate hunting areas will

be roped off for each division, and specially marked items will be in the hunt for children to claim for extra prizes and a Grand Prize in each age group. The Easter Bunny will be here, and parents may bring their own cameras for photo opportunities with the Easter Bunny and an Easter cut-out background in which children may place their faces in the cutouts for a fun photo.

"The Chamber would like to thank Tahoka High School FCCLA teacher Whitney Wilson and her students who are filling nearly 3,000 Easter eggs for this event, and a special thanks to Leighton and Joan Knox, Starr and Todd Holland, for bringing the WTS&O Blue Weed Special train to the square for rides. Additionally, thanks to Lynn County Commissioners and County Judge Mike Braddock for allowing the use of the courthouse grounds for this annual event," said Juanell Jones, co-chairman of the event, along with Amy Preston.

## City receives official TWDB confirmation of funds ready for waterline project

The check is in the mail ... or actually, the funds are on their way to city coffers for the city's waterline replacement project, and that means the actual construction phase is just around the corner – finally – for new water lines throughout the entire community. It's been several years in the making, but city officials are pleased that, at long last, the funding for replacing the original antiquated system that has been a maintenance nightmare for years will finally be available.

City Mayor John Baker received a letter on March 4 from the Texas Water Development Board confirming that funding is in the final process, with closing documents included for the \$4,443,000 grant commitment and a \$1,871,000 loan commitment from the Economically Distressed Areas Program (EDAP) for the City of Tahoka. The loan will be evidenced by TWDB's purchase of \$1,871,000 Combination Tax and Revenue Certificates of Obligation, Proposed Series 2015.

"We anticipate the bonds will be sold by the first of April, and the bid process can begin after the bonds are sold," said Mayor John Baker. "The bid process should take four weeks, and it will probably be June or July before the construction begins."

He told *The News* that during the construction phase the new lines will be laid parallel to the current lines, and that new meters will replace current meters in the same locations they are currently situated.

"We are already starting the pro-

cess of replacing water meters with the new smart meters," said Baker, noting that the meter project is funded from approximately \$600,000 of the \$1.8 million loan.

He warned citizens that when the actual construction begins, "then we will be tearing up and making messes all over the city" as the new waterlines are laid.

Baker said the new system is designed with four loops, fed from two (See WATERLINE PROJECT, page 3)

Volunteers sought for excavation project

ant to dig at an archeological site, right here in Lynn County? Volunteers are being sought to assist the Lubbock Lake Landmark Regional Research Team in the continuing excavation of a hunter-gatherer campsite overlooking Tahoka Lake. The week-long archeological project will be conducted May 9-13.

"Volunteers will help in all aspects of the excavation including digging with trowels, screening matrix, taking notes, mapping, etc.," explained Dr. Stance Hurst, Regional Field Manager for Lubbock Lake Landmark.

"Essentially they will be working

with us in doing the work at the site. We are working on a campsite that was recently uncovered. We expect to find such things as hearthstones, stone tools, and the remains of flaked stone from making and maintaining stone tools. We do not know yet the age of the site or

its main purpose, as this is exploratory at this point," added Dr. Hurst.

Volunteers must apply now through an application form, and if approved will be assigned to a work time that fits their schedules, from 8:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. May 9-13. Volunteers must be 15 years or older and have an interest in archaeology. Anyone interested in helping with this work should contact Clyde May at Tahoka Lake Pasture at 806-327-5434 for a volunteer application form.

Burial was at Tahoka Cemetery under the direction of Calvillo Funeral Home and Chapel. She died on Wednesday March 9, 2016 at her residence.

She was born on April 16, 1935 in Mexico to Jesus Anita Moreno. She married Juan Juarez Gonzalez, November 27, 1950 in Roby. She was a homemaker. She was faithful in the church as she served as a Guadalupana and in the Cursista.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Juan Juarez Gonzales: one son. Antonio Gonzalez; a daughter Anita Gonzalez; five brothers Jose Moreno, Saragosa Moreno, Roberto Moreno, Rogelio Moreno and Jesus Moreno; four sisters, Anita Moreno, Tomasa Corella, Isabel Salas and Irene Delgado; three grandsons David Angelo Salas, Angel Arriaga and Andrew Arriaga.

She is survived by five sons, Ascensio Gonzales of Tahoka, Rafael Gonzalez of Lubbock, Jose Luis Gonzales of Kyle, Ernesto Gonzales of Slaton, Carmelo Gonzales of New Braunfels; four daughters, Mary Helen Valdez of Tahoka, Maria Isabel Rodriguez of Lubbock, Elida Brewer of Kyle, Carolina Torres of Slaton; one brother, Jose Moreno of Mexico: two sisters, Maria Moreno of Kyle, Albessa Moreno of Mexico, 17 grandchildren; and 38 greatgrandchildren.



#### Madeline Cox Hegi

On March 7 at the age of almost 105, Madeline Cox Hegi-a devoted wife, mother, grandmother, great grandmother, teacher and community leaderwent to be with her Heavenly Father and to reunite with many friends and Pete, her beloved husband of 55 years. Throughout her life, she was a dedicated teacher who loved children. of all ages. Known simply as "Madeline" by children and adults alike, she grew up on a farm near Goodrich in eastern Kansas. Madeline rode her horse, Flory, five miles to school each day. After graduating from high school, she attended college at West Texas State Teachers College. She then began a life of teaching that lasted in one form or another until she was 98 years

Her first teaching job was as a home demonstration agent in Dawson County, Texas where she taught rural women how to

become self-sufficient. Madeline then spent 29 years teaching in the Tahoka, Texas school system. In 1964, the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs named her the Teacher of the Year for the State of Texas. After her retirement in 1974 and in recognition of her commitment to young women, the Tahoka home economics chapter was renamed the Madeline Hegi FHA Chapter and the home economics building was named the Madeline Hegi Family and Consumer Science Building. In 1997, her family honored her by establishing the Madeline Hegi Scholarship Fund for graduating Tahoka seniors to provide college opportunities for deserving youth. Thus far, 71 students have benefitted from receiving her four-year scholarships. Although she retired from

the Tahoka school system in 1974, Madeline remained actively teaching youth for 24 more years through Kids for Christ (KC's), where up to 70, fourth through sixth graders would eagerly meet at her home every other Wednesday for cinnamon rolls, punch, Bible studies and important life lessons. Over the years, she helped bring hundreds of kids to Christ at a pivotal point in their lives. For many years, she also was a counselor and camp grandmother (known as Grandmother Bear) at Ceta Canyon Methodist Youth Camp. She was also grandmother extraordinaire and "Hegi Camp leader" for her grandsons, whom she called "her four little boys."

Throughout her life, Madeline was a champion for healthy living. Decades before vitamins, juicing and exercise were in vogue, Madeline was an early adopter and evangelist. She believed the secret to healthy lifetime memory was to have strong blood flow to the brain-so every night until she was 88, she stood on her head to increase that flow. She was truly a living testament of 1 Corinthians





take no pleasure in telling this sordid tale.

In the early '50's, Panhandle communities were overrun by gangs of marauding, pillaging, screaming farm children. The Harmony community, down south by the county line, was no different, maybe worse. Mostly, the gangs were pre-war or postwar babies, the results of some happy returning soldier coming home from Europe or the Pacific. Some, though doubtful, were actually planned for, but they just kept coming...hordes of them. And as they grew up, as the countryside became more populated, they began forming roving gangs of barefooted, snot-nosed friends, throwing anything and everything they could get their hands on. A good throwing arm and two strong legs to get away were the most important weapons in the hood.

On the farm, throwing things was at the center of life and entertainment. A high art form practiced by all. Like David and Goliath of an earlier time, weapons of choice were clods, rocks, sticks, corn stalks, boards, farm tools, tomatoes, eggs, even shoes if necessary. Then run like crazy, also known as "runnin' like the dickens".

Anyway, all this begs the uestion of: Throwing at what? And why?

Well, bulls. Why? Because they were big.

Every farm and homestead had a few head of cattle, some for milk, some for beef, some for pets, some for kids' target practice. And the hoof stock knew it. They weren't the dumbest animals on the farm, although you could've fooled me. They felt like someone had painted a big round target on them, and they came to be very spooky of kids. Even mean. Let's face, bulls hated kids. And since the bulls were the biggest and baddest of the herd, the top kid hater, so became our logical number one target. It was a chicken and egg thing...that's another story, but I shan't digress.

But the bulls had one critical advantage. The pasture. Usually

big, wide Texas pastures. During the day the bulls ranged all across their realm, the pasture, on alert for trespassers. And kids or any other uninformed, dam-fool walking folk needed to know the exact boundaries of that pasture. Precisely. This was accomplished by little kids taking turns racing across the pasture when the bulls weren't there, thereby each establishing a timing record, some of which was near equivalent to Olympic speeds. There were short-sprinter pastures, quarter-miler pastures, milerpastures, all kinds of timing for all kinds of pastures. And you needed to know each. Exactly.

Then the bulls would be timed on how fast they could race across the pasture, usually in pursuit of the dumbest or youngest kid in the gang who was picked to be the guinea pig racer to time the bulls. Like Pamplona in Spain, the 'running of the bulls', except by kids who learned that life often does flash before their eves when fleeing imminent extinction in the form of a half ton of mad beef pounding the earth right behind you. Yep, the fact that we all survived is a testament to how much adrenalin can kick in when there's a great big bull closing in on you and that fence line. Texans can be fast when they need to.

This then, right here on the Plains, gave birth to the hilarious Internet joke roadsign you may have seen that says... "because the bull can do it in 10". This is early farm wisdom at it's most fundamental: Know your time. To us, it was life or death. It really never occurred to us that we were early precomputer thought leaders cre-

If you saw color, you probably need a new toilet flapper, which is an easy repair to make. Check irrigation systems and spigots too.












On Monday night, police responded to a criminal mischief/assault complaint, when a man told officers that two other Easter Egg Don't mi



Chris Green, Texas Agri-Life Extension Agent-Ag for Lynn County, has resigned his position here, according to information from Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock in Monday's meeting of the Lynn County Commissioners. Green submitted a letter of resignation on Feb. 29, effective March 1. He has been at the post for less than a year, starting June 1, 2015.

Commissioners took action Monday to approve an agreement that Lynn County would support the county's portion of funding another ag agent, when the position is filled. Lynn County normally has two agents. Currently, Extension Agent Wendy Scott continues to provide all Agri-Life services for Lynn County.

In other business at Monday's meeting, Lynn County citizen Jamie Holdren presented information regarding County Road EE, telling commissioners that an adjacent landowner had diverted the natural water flow in a manner that affected Holdren's property and also forced water across a county road, and asking commissioners if the county had any authority in the matter. Commissioners told Holdren that they have no authority over conditions on private property, but that Commissioner John Hawthorne, who was absent from the meeting, would look into the matter concerning the county road. Remembering Madeline Hegi



We learned to change diaper, cook basic dishes, and stand up for what we knew as right. She even gave us her gentle version the birds & bees "talk". That sent us into gales of giggles after class, but as a result, most of us were better informed. She was responsible for several girls getting "full rides" to college, and not one of those girls let her down. I taught my daughter as many of the things she taught me that I could remember. I could go on and on and on.

As a "senior citizen" myself, it's hard to believe that the death of a woman who touched my life so very, very long ago can bring me to tears. Her practical and heart-felt legacies/lessons will be passed down through generations; thus they/she will live forever. Thank Heaven she was such an important part of our young lives. 

#### Applications for conservation programs being accepted at local NRCS office

USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) District Conservationist Matthew Dorsett announces applications for funding opportunities with the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) are currently being accepted at the Lynn County NRCS offices, located at 1601 South 2nd Street in Tahoka.

NRCS in Texas has received its initial allocation of EQIP funding for 2016 and will begin ranking and obligating contracts after March 18, 2016. All agriculture producers interested in submitting a contract application for 2016 should do so before this ranking deadline.

EQIP - one of the largest programs in the Farm Bill - is a voluntary conservation program that promotes environmental quality and assists producers to meet local, state and federal regulations.

"EQIP is a valuable tool to help Lynn County's agricultural producers implement conservation practices that provide environmental benefits to help sustain agricultural operations," says Dorsett.

EQIP is a continuous signup programs that allow landowners or operators to apply for financial and technical assistance for the application of specific conservation practices; but the deadline for the first 2016 funding allocation is March 18. Contracts are offered periodically depending on budgetary allocations. Applications made after the deadline will be considered in the next funding cycle. Higher priority will be given to those applications that address national, state and local priorities and provide higher cost efficiency.

EQIP offers technical and financial help to install or implement structural, vegetative, and management practices that can benefit the soil, water, air, plants, livestock, and wildlife. Each county in the state is funded yearly to assist producers financially with these land management practices.

#### Did you know? About the Hula Hoop ...

The hula hoop gained international popularity in the late 1950s, when a plastic version was successfully marketed by California's Wham-O toy company. In 1957, Richard Knerr and Arthur 'Spud" Melin, starting with the idea of Australian bamboo "exercise hoops", manufactured 42-inch hoops with Marlex plastic. With giveaways and national marketing and retailing, a fad was started in July 1958, and 25 million plastic hoops were sold in less than four months, and in two years, sales reached more than 100 million

\* Carlon Products Corporation was one of the first manufacturers of the hula hoop. During the 1950s, when the hula hoop craze swept the country, Carlon was producing more than 50,000 hula hoops per day. The hoop was inducted into the National Toy Hall of Fame at The Strong in Rochester, New York, in 1999.

\* The hula hoop craze swept the world, dying out again in the 1980s, but not in China and Russia, where hula hooping and hoop manipulation were adopted by traditional circuses and rhythmic

\* The longest verified record holder is Aaron Hibbs from Columbus, Ohio who kept a hoop spinning for 74 hours and 54 minutes between October 22-25, 2009.

. The record for most hula hoops twirled at the same time is 160, by Marawa the Amazing.

("Golden Spread") on behalf of tself and its member distribution cooperatives listed below (the "Participating Members") hereby gives this first amended notice of their intent to file with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission ("FERC") requesting approval of a proposed Joint PUR PA Implementation Plan ("Joint Plan") to jointly implement their respective obligations under Section 210 of the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978 (16 U.S.C. § 824a-3)("PURPA") and under Part 292 of the

The Joint Plan provides that (1) Golden Spread and each Participating Member will interconnect with and operate in parallel with any QF that adheres to applicable rules and regulations pertaining to generator interconnection, (2) on behalf of itself and each Participating Member, Golden Spread will purchase capacity and energy from QFs at a rate equal to Golden Spread's avoided costs; (3) each Participating Member will sell supplementary, back-up and maintenance power to a QF, upon request, on either a firm or interruptible basis, in accordance with the applicable law and the Participating Member's applicable rates, rules, and regulations governing retail service, and on the terms that are consistent with the ones offered to the Participating Member's other will be subject to duplicative charges for interconnection or wheeling solely as a result of selling to Golden Spread and buying from a Participating Member.

In the filing with FERC, Golden Spread, on behalf of itself and the Participating Members, plans to apply for waiver of certain obligations under Section 292 303 of FERC's Regulations which, if granted, would result in all purchases from QFs being made by Golden Spread and all sales to QFs interconnected with the Participating Member electric distribution systems being made by the Participating Members. With respect to South Plains Electric Cooperative, Inc., however, Golden Spread will not assume the obligation to purchase power from QFs in the portion of South Plains service territory located in the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, where the power is supplied by Brazos Electric Cooperative, Inc. And with respect to Tri-County Electric Cooperative, Inc., Golden Spread will not assume the obligation to purchase power from QFs in the portion of Tri-County's where power is supplied by Southwestern Public Service Company


