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

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

A Lubbock man was fatally injured in a rollover crash in Lynn County last Thursday afternoon, and another driver was injured in another rollover in the county on Saturday, according to reports this week. And, in 106th District Court proceedings on Monday, four men pled to sentencing in four separate cases.

Rudy Garcia, 48, of Lubbock was identified as the driver of the vehicle involved in Thursday's rollover on FM 2192, in northeast Lynn County. According to information from Sgt. John Gonzalez with the Texas Department of Public Safety, DPS was called to the scene to investigate at 3:19 p.m. Garcia was headed northbound on FM 2192 and failed to negotiate an s-curve, according to Sgt. Gonzalez, who said it appeared that Garcia started to go right and off the roadway and overcorrected the vehicle a couple of times before it went into a bar-ditch and rolled over into the southbound lanes. Garcia was ejected from the vehicle and was reported to have died on impact. The vehicle was fully engulfed in flames and started a grass fire near the vehicle. No other vehicles

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Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. responded to a one-vehicle rollover on Saturday, Aug. 6, at 3:09 p.m. on a county road about 6 miles east of US 87. The female driver was reportedly trapped in the vehicle that rolled over about 2 miles east of FM 213 on County Road X. Tahoka Fire Dept. and Lynn County EMS were called to the scene, and she was reportedly transported to Covenant Hospital in Lubbock. No information was available on the driver's name or the extent of her injuries.



it is out of the country. So, it's more of a personal loan that I will have to get, and I'm already set up for a payment plan. I was determined to graduate debt-free from Tech, and I did. knowing that when I continued my medical studies that at least I would be starting with zero debt. I know it's going to get expensive, but I just have to know that whatever it takes to get through school will be worth it in the long run," she says.

She is doing everything she can to make ends meet - even a family-sponsored bake sale at the Tahoka Thriftway grocery store this Saturday morning.

"Every little bit helps," she says with a laugh. "Everything is pretty much out of packet at this point. But, in the long run, I think it will be less expensive than schools in the US."

# Cool Dog Facts

It's not so black and white. It's a myth that dogs only see in black and white. In fact, it's believed that dogs see primarily in blue, greenish-yellow, yellow and various shades of gray.

Did you hear that? Sound frequency is measured in Hertz (Hz). The higher the Hertz, the higherpitched the sound. Dogs hear best at 8,000 Hz, while humans hear best at around 2,000 Hz

Express yourself, Dogs' ears are extremely expressive. It's no wonder! There are more than a dozen separate muscles that control a dog's ear movements.

Growing up. While the Chow Chow dogs are well known for their distinctive blue-black tongues, they're actually born with pink tongues. They turn blue-black at 8-10 weeks of age.

Why do they do that? When dogs kick after going to the bathroom, they are using the scent glands on their paws to further mark their territory.

No, it's not just to make themselves look adorable. Dogs curl up in a ball when they sleep due to an age-old instinct to keep themselves warm and protect their abdomen and vital organs from predators.

Breathe easy. In addition to sweating through their paw pads, dogs pant to cool themselves off. A panting dog can take 300-400 breaths (compared to his regular 30-40) with very little effort.

Special Report Sugarcane Aphid is here and EXPLODING

On Friday (July 29), late afternoon, I checked a milo field east of Tahoka. I encountered SCA in populations of about 10 20 on about 20% of the plants. Each little colony had a winged adult (alate) with it. There was very little honeydew, but there were a few leaves with some shinny specks on them.

Yesterday, Monday August 1, I went back to check this field again and the SCA had exploded over the weekend. Where there were 10 - 20 aphids there were now 100's and even thousands on some leaves with 100 percent of the plants infested to some degree. There were areas with heavy honeydew. The larger infestations were in mid-canopy. The field is being treated.

I found a single lady beetle adult - which even if mad can't keep up. In our area, we are not seeing very many beneficial insects or spiders in the scouting program fields (cotton or milo).

The message: watch those SCA populations closely as they will EXPLODE, especially with nothing to keep them in check.

**Current Conditions** 

Seventy percent of our program fields are now in bloom.

Insect activity remains very light to non-existent. We are starting to see some

fields with bacterial blight and fields that are showing the effects of nematodes. These type problems start showing up as the plants become more stressed and its needs (water and nutrients) are lacking.

Sugarcane aphid has now been detected in Lynn County approaching levels where management decisions will need to be made

First Bloom and NAWF

As the plant starts flowering, measurement of the height? node ratio becomes less important, and nodes above whiteflower (NAWF) measurement becomes more important as a plant-monitoring tool.

NAWF at first bloom provides one of the most accurate mid season predictors of yield. The cotton plant needs to be growing rapidly at first bloom. Vigorous cotton plants have more momentum or "horsepower" to take the plant further into the fruiting cycle before cutout. The method to measure this horsepower is NAWF.

NAWF count starts at the node with the upper most first position white flower. A first position white flower is the flower on the first fruiting position closest to the main stem. This node is counted as 0 and nodes are counted to the top of the plant stopping with the node, which has the terminal main stem leaf as large or larger than a quarter.

As the plant develops, flowering will slowly (hopefully). advance toward the plant terminal. The speed of the advance varies, but should be approximately one NAWF per week. As flowering progresses up the plant, terminal growth will also progress, but at a slower rate. The objective of insuring good yields is to keep the plant in a fruiting mode and to slow the advance of the white flower toward the terminal of the plant.

At early bloom, NAWF on most full season picker varieties should range between 8 and 12 and on short season stripper varieties, should equal 7 to 10 nodes. As boll loading progresses, NAWF declines. Rate of decline is important; a rapid decline indicates the plant is experiencing severe stress. If NAWF was high at first bloom, this decline could be due to boll loading and high demand for nutrients and water. When NAWF does not decline after first bloom, or it increases, the boll load is not developing sufficiently to hold the plant back. Boll loss could have been from lack of adequate moisture, cloudy days, lack of enough heat units, or insect damage.

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

N THIS SOCIETY where youth and thinness are worshiped, they finally have come up with a couple of more good reasons why skinny is better than fat: you get better gas mileage and you can remember things better.

Those benefits of being slim and trim were heralded in a couple of stories in the daily newspapers, both on Oct. 26. Of course, we've been told for years that being overweight is bad for your health (although a few anti-diet people have dared to suggest that a little bit overweight won't hurt you), but all that does for most of we is make us feel guilty about enjoying a good meal or a tiny snack, like a gallon of Rocky

The medical profession and the pharmaceutical companies have invented things like cholesterol, triglycerides and body mass indexes to make us feel miserable while the drug makers get rich off our misery. Most of us just pig out every chance we get, anyway.

But now, says the news reports, studies show that fat drivers with fat passengers get, fewer miles per gallon of gasoline than they do if their vehicles are carrying less weight. So being lightweight and making sure that your passengers are lightweight, too, can save you money at the pump. Now they have got my attention, which just shows where most of us put our priorities.

The studies also mentioned that airplanes use more fuel than they used to because the passenger loads on airliners tend to be heavier than they once were, meaning that the average American traveler is expanding his horizons in more ways than one.

A few days earlier, I recall reading something about the dangers that many parents in the U.S. may someday outlive their children because so many overweight mothers are giving birth to obese children, whose fat tendencies will stay with them throughout life.

Another story reported that overweight people cannot remember things as well as their contemporaries who are not overweight. They gave some tests which showed the overweight people could not remember as many numbers from a given sequence as those hateful skinny people. There was something else the fatter folks couldn't remember as well, but I forget just what it was.

All of this just reaffirms that fat is bad for us. Of course, I knew that all the time. I just don't want to hear about it.

## Several attend public hearing on parking ordinance here

About a dozen citizens attended Monday night's public hearing for a proposed city ordinance regulating the parking of all vehicles in yards of residences, with six speaking briefly to members of the Tahoka City Council, Mayor John Baker, City Administrator Jerry Webster, and the city's attorneys. It was the second public hearing on the issue, which would prohibit parking on unimproved surfaces such as

Tony Botkin and Tommy Botkin both spoke briefly about concerns about regulations that would not allow farm equipment to be parked in some areas, and Sylvia Rodriguez asked the council to consider safety issues for children riding bikes in the street, or for other street traffic. if more vehicles are required to park on city streets in residential neighborhoods. Betty Ehlers, Doug Ausberne and Josh Dunlap also spoke briefly at the

meeting, with concerns about what an "improved surface" requires, regulations that only allow visitors to park an RV for one week on property, and safety issues related to more vehicles parked in city streets.

The council may consider approving the ordinance, or another revised version, at a future meeting. If revised, the council will most likely have another public hearing to hear comments on the issue.

Following the public hearing, the council met in regular session to consider city business, nominating councilwoman Amy Preston to serve another term as Mayor Pro-Tem, and approving monthly bills. Consideration for proposing a property tax rate was on the agenda as well, but the council decided to have one more budget work session before making a proposal.

## **County Commissioners continue** budget talks, consider issues with courthouse restoration project

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning at the Lynn County Courthouse, approving the purchase of a computer from Election System and Software for the county's election procedures, approving monthly bills, and resuming a budget work session for county offices. They also approved keeping a \$10 Road and Bridge fee on vehicle registrations, which last year brought in \$48,210 to the county.

Marquita Scott, Chief Appraiser for Lynn County Appraisal District, presented information to commissioners on property values in Lynn County. noting that the biggest decrease was in mineral values, which was down 38.6% from the previous year - from \$35 million in 2015 down to \$21 million in taxable values for 2016. She reported that irrigated land values remained essentially the same, with dryland values decreasing 4.5%, personal property decreasing by 29% (part of that is due to the heavy equipment that was used to build wind energy farms in the county, which is no longer in use and therefore taken off the tax roll). Residential values went up 11%, and land values went up slightly, she said. And, she noted that the county still collects a half-cent sales tax to offset property tax rates. Commissioners continued budget discussions after Mrs.

Scott's presentation. Lynn County officials were notified a couple of weeks ago that \$4,8 million in grant funding had been awarded to Lynn County for a full restoration of its historic courthouse, through the Texas Historical Commis-


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sion's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program (THCPP). As part of the grant application process, Lynn County officials had set aside nearly \$1 million in matching funds for the long-anticipated funding award, but the \$4.8 million grant is only 90% of the amount that the county requested, which means that the county will need some additional funds for the completion of the proj-

In order to get a more accurate figure for current construction costs, Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock visited with representatives from Komatsu Architectural firm, and informed commissioners this week that they expect to have an accurate estimate of costs for the courthouse restoration project to county officials by Aug. 18. Judge Braddock also brought up the issue of possible locations for temporarily moving courthouse offices during the construction/renovation project, as all offices would need to vacate the courthouse building during the project.

"We're checking on some buildings in town for moving our offices into. I have no idea on costs yet, but I do know that the grant does not provide any funds for moving out of the courthouse building, or for temporary housing," Braddock ex-

After county officials get a better idea of what the project costs and estimates of relocating offices, commissioners will discuss how they propose to obtain the additional funds needed for the project, and whether to accept the THCPP grant award of \$4.8 million. County offi-







When the card is renewed, the expiration date on the new card will be six years after the current card's expiration date, whether customers renew early

Additionally, in order to renew online, the card cannot have been expired for more than two years. Requirements for renewing online are available at Texas.gov, the official website of the State of Texas. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-357-3639. The eligibility requirements for phone renewal and online renewal are the same. The fee is the same for online, in-person and telephone renewals.

Licenses must be renewed in person every 12 years, so an updated photo can be taken and eyesight can be tested. If residents need to come into the office to renew, they can do so up to one year before the expiration date, which means they can pick a time that is convenient for their schedule and visit any driver license office in the state.

Customers may obtain a replacement driver license or identification card online if they are able to provide the 20 character code on the front of their current license or card.



After stopping the vehicle, the driver, a 31-year-old Lubbock woman, was arrested for possession of marijuana and for tampering with physical evidence (for trying to conceal the controlled substance under her clothing, which fell out of her clothing as she exited the vehicle); and a passenger, a 30-yearold woman from Tahoka, was arrested for an active warrant out of Lubbock County for burglary of a habitation.

Lynn County Jail held 45 inmates during the past week, including 32 for Ector County and 13 for Lynn County, on charges including two for possession of marijuana, and one each for burglary of a habitation, terroristic threat of family/household, and bond forfeiture for theft by check.
