#### Purchases To Date Amount To 10.06 of \$300,000 Quota

Still placed far to the rear in the amount of E Bonds purchased, Haskell County had attained only 10.06 per cent of the quota in the Victory Loan Campaign sales reported through Nov. 23.

Governor Stevenson in a special proclamation Wednes. day naming the week of Dec. 2 as Victory Loan E Bond week in Texas urged each citizen to purchase bonds in that period.

Receipt of the proclamation was announced Wednesday in Dallas by Nathan Adams, state chairman of the Victory Loan drive.

Texans are lagging far behind the rest of the nation in E bond purchases, Adams said. He revealed that through Nov. 27 Texans purchased 31.9 per cent or \$28,719,792.50 of their \$90,000,000 quota.

Most of the counties in this area have exceeded the record of Haskell County several times. The E Bond percentage of some of the counties shows Wichita with 66.5, Shackelford with 65.22, Throckmorton with 59.04, Archer with 48.49 and Jones with 43.05. Only three counties in the district having fifty-nine counties show a worse record than this county. Haskell County has never failed to meet a bond quota.

The campaign has little more than a week to run and will end Dec. 8. The quota here is \$300,000 for bonds of all types, and the E Bond amount is \$155,000.
