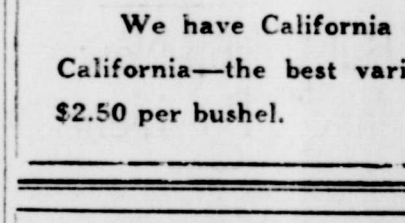

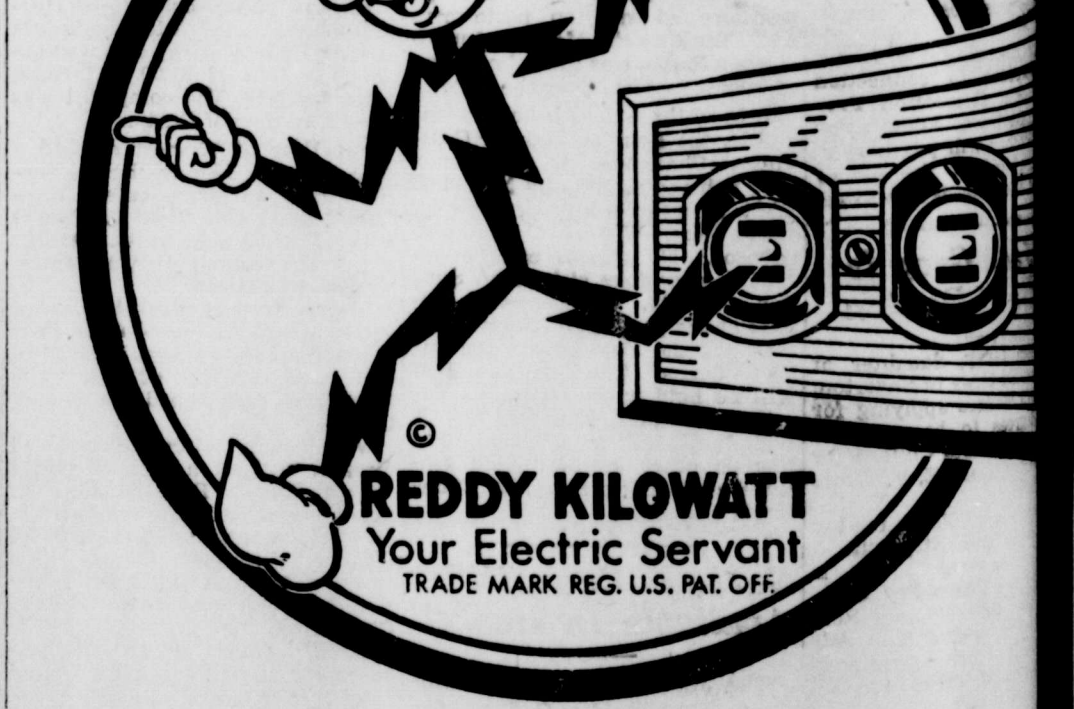

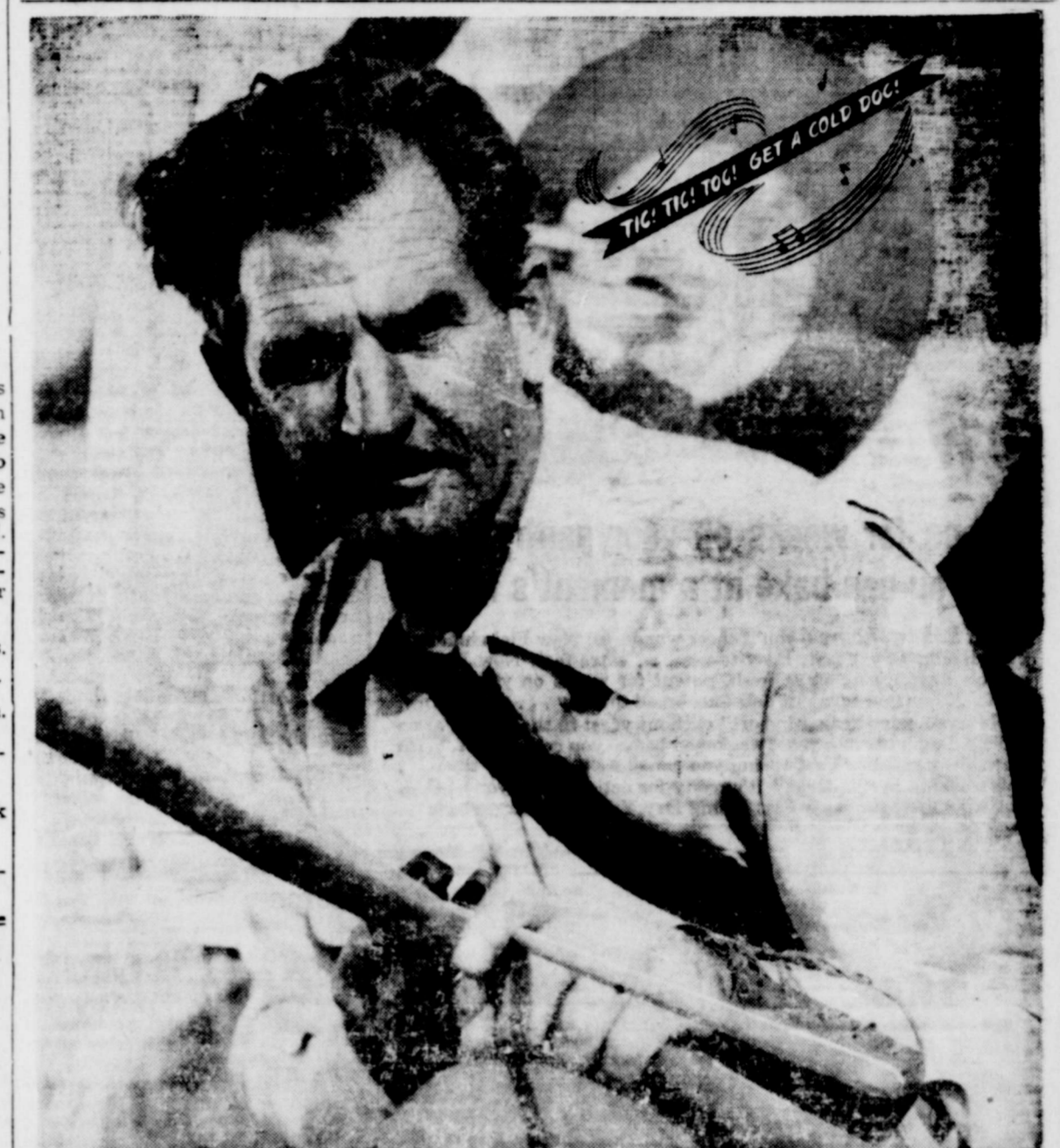

Kellogg Cereals Kept Fresh From Factory To Consumer

Freshness is a term which is ordinarily associated with products such as milk or eggs or vegetables. The Kellogg Company of Battle Creek, Mich., feels that freshness is a quality highly important to ready-to-eat cereals and every possible precaution is taken to protect the crisp freshness of their products from the time they leave the ovens until they reach your breakfast table.

The toasted cereals are first cooled and then measured with careful accuracy into the moisture proof waxite inner bag, which is exclusive with Kellogg. The tops of these bags are closed by both heat and pressure to insure an airtight seal.

The flaps of the outer package are securely glued together and the packages are then packed into sturdy cardboard cartons for shipping to the warehouses. The Kellogg salesman continually checks stocks to determine how recently the cereals have left the factory.

Further, Kellogg cereals are distributed to the grocers in the area in which they have come in to the warehouse, so that the shortest possible time elapses before they are on their way to the consumer.

Even in the grocery store, precautions are taken to make sure that no Kellogg cereal stays on the shelf overlong. 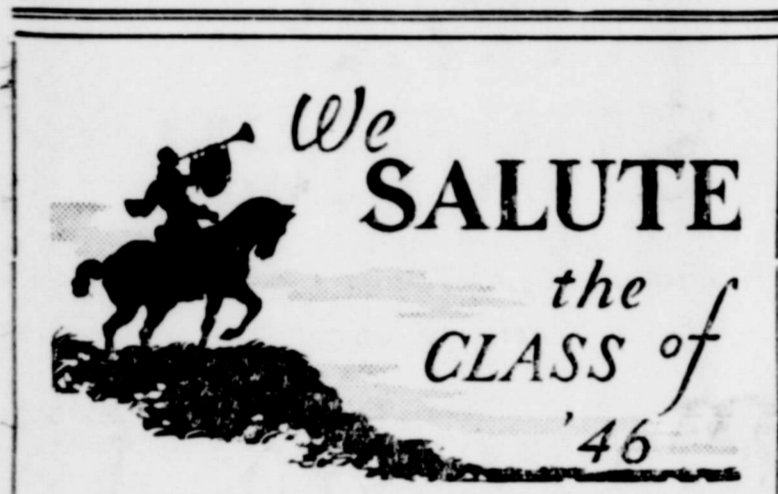

AA FARM NEWS

By Joe S. Harper

WINTER COVER CROPS

Practically all farmers who planted winter cover crops of Austrian Winter Peas or Hairy Vetch in the fall of 1945 have reported their performance by the closing date, which was May 15, 1946. Results vary in the different sections of the county but as a whole it is believed that the crops obtained a good stand and growth, and the value to the land will be seen later when the roots rot and go back into the soil. All producers who have not yet reported this information to the county AAA office are requested to do so immediately.

Plans are not yet complete for the cover crop program for 1947, but every effort will be made to obtain plenty of seed again this year.

PRIOR APPROVALS FOR 1946 PRACTICES

To date there have been 1,100 requests for prior approval for practices to be carried out in the 1946 program year and practically all the original county allocation of funds has been exhausted. A small second allocation has been made to the county but this, too, has been taken up in prior approvals. It is not known at this time whether or not there will be any additional funds, but every effort is being made to see that there is enough money to cover all requests for practices that will be carried out before the closing dates of each practice. Although more money may be available later, there is no provision whereby payment can be made unless prior approval for such practice is first obtained be-

FOOD FAMINE PROGRAM

The serious food situation which has become worldwide shows no signs of getting any better. The government suggested the following for individuals who desire to aid in some way:

1. Conserve food in every possible way.
2. Eat potatoes instead of bread, rice and other cereals.
3. Eat cereals sparingly, especially wheat products.
4. Use less fats and oils.
5. Eat fish, eggs and poultry, which are relatively prevalent.
6. Eat locally abundant vegetables.
7. Produce food if you can.
8. Share—don't hoard.
9. Cooperate with all local food agencies so that individual contributions can be grouped and the most good done.

FEDERAL-STATE AIR JURISDICTION

Major jurisdictional differences between the Civil Aeronautics Administration and state aeronautical bodies were ironed out at a recent conference of the National Association of State Aviation Officials and the CAA.

AIR ENGINES AS FROST PREVENTORS

Purdue University is conducting experiments to test whether or not surplus aircraft and propellers can be used in preventing frost damage to crops.

Lapsed GI Insurance Can Be Reinstated

The contact service of the Veterans Administration today was seeking every veteran who has let his G. I. Insurance lapse to offer reinstatement without a medical examination.

Robert W. Sisson, Lubbock Veterans Administration Regional Manager, said success of the campaign would result in invaluable service to thousands of veterans. Ex-GIs can now reinstate policies without a medical examination, regardless of how long they have been out of the service, provided their health has grown no worse during the lapsed period, Sisson said.

"This liberalization is only effective until January 1, 1947," he pointed out. "Time is running out for many of these veterans and we must use every means to inform them of this priceless opportunity." "Its importance cannot be over-emphasized. It will not only be simpler to reinstate policies, but many veterans are now able to reinstate who would not be able to pass a rigid physical examination."

"The uninsurable veterans may never again have the opportunity to provide adequate life insurance protection for their present and future dependents."

Term insurance carried on service people during the war can be reinstated by payment of only two monthly premiums. Veterans can reinstate all or a part of the government policy. Sisson urged veterans to see their local VA representatives immediately. Local veterans service organizations, the county service officer or the Red Cross can also supply information about insurance reinstatement.

Advices Protection of Trees Against Worms

Fruit crops in the South Plains area should be protected against worms this year, according to Dr. W. W. Yocum, professor of horticulture at Texas Technological College.

A spray of lead arsenate, composed of about one to two tablespoons of the compound to one gallon of water, should be used, Yocum says.

Apple trees particularly should be sprayed at once in order that a dose of poison may get into the blossom end of the apple before it closes. The worms try to enter there, and unless spraying is done before the blossom end closes, the poison will be ineffective.

AUXILIARY JET POWER

One of the domestic airlines has ordered 100 planes that will have jet exhaust propulsion as auxiliary power. The planes, twin engine type, capable of flying 40 passengers will be used for speedy, economical flights of 1,000 miles or less.

AIR TRAVEL CARDS EXTENDED

The U. S. flag airlines have notified holders of air travel cards, many issued in 1941 and 1942, that their present cards will be valid during 1946.

Urges Wider Use of Frozen Fish

With plentiful supplies of fresh and frozen fish assured in markets Edith Lawrence, specialist in food generally for the next few months, preparation for the A. and M. College Extension Service, urges Texas housewives to include fish often in their meal planning. "Use of the more abundant foods will save other foods for shipment to famine areas," she says.

The heavy fishing season, which began about the first of April, promises to be unusually heavy this year according to U.S.D.A. reports. In fact, the catch may set a new record because of favorable prices, plenty of good boats, more workers for on-shore plants, and abundant fish in banks along the coast. Frozen fish supplies in storage are already very large. On March 1, almost 100 million pounds of frozen fish were in cold storage—about twice as much as the year before.

Sidelights From Washington

By GEORGE MAHON

This is being airmailed from Washington Saturday afternoon, May 18th. An 8c stamp is required for this purpose today, but the odds are very heavy in favor of a 5c airmail rate within a few weeks. The House passed unanimously this week a bill establishing a 5c airmail rate—a program which some of us have favored since V-J Day. The 5c spread between the regular mail and airmail rate has retarded airmail. There is little doubt but that the Government will make more revenue out of the 5c rate than the higher rate, on account of increased volume. The chances are that airmail will be expanded to the point where practically all first class mail except that which is local in character will go airmail. The more our aviation industry is supported and the greater the backlog of experienced pilots in this country.

At present we have a large number of airmen who have been discharged from the service and who would like each month to have a way to get in a little flying time in order not to lose their ability to pilot an airplane.

The Army has a lot of surplus planes and there are many available air fields. General Carl Spaatz, who took General Hap Arnold's place as head of the U. S. Army Air Forces, will be before our Military Appropriations Committee Monday to ask us to put through an appropriation of one billion two hundred million dollars for the Air Forces for the coming fiscal year. I am going to ask him to expedite the Army program for reserve pilots so that these discharged veterans under a well-supervised plan may have an opportunity to continue to fly. I would like to see a National Guard unit in aviation established in West Texas.

The Military Guard will have a bigger and better program in the future than it has ever had in the past. The Guard was a great factor in the victory which we won in the war and it will represent a large reserve force for national defense in the future.

The Reserve Officer Training Corps in the schools is due for expansion. Texas Tech is slated for a bigger ROTC program than ever before, which will include, if desired, when appropriate plans are completed an ROTC unit in aviation.

The Military Appropriation Bill is scheduled to pass the House in June. Indications are now that the bill, for the first time in years, will include no money for the purchase of horses and mules. The General Staff of the Army has decided to abandon the Horse Cavalry.

The Army is asking for forage for the 2000 horses and 1347 mules which it still has on hand in the Continental U. S. The prize horses of the Army now are the horses that were captured in Germany and brought to the United States last October. These 152 animals are valued at more than one million dollars, and the Army is besieged with offers of purchase.

Used Fat Scarcity Points to Emergency

The total supply of fats and oils is still not sufficient to meet present requirements, Charles L. Howell, acting district director, said this week in urging housewives to continue collecting and turning in used kitchen fats.

While the world quantity of fats and oils available this year will be one billion pounds more than last, this remains 2.5 billion pounds short of the pre-war average, he said. Supplies will not improve rapidly until production in the Far East is restored and shipments are resumed in volume. So far, only limited quantities of copra have been received from the oil-rich Philippines.

Used kitchen fats, no longer

suitable for cooking purposes, are needed now to speed up soap production and to keep soap shortages from getting worse, he said. Meat dealers still pay four cents for each pound.

Any complaints or breakdown in local movement of used fats should be reported to his office at once, Howell said, by addressing such complaints to P. O. Box 2129, Amarillo, Texas, or by calling telephone number, 2-4577.
