## Rites Held Sunday For R. B. Guess

Rebus B. Guess, prominent far-mer and landowner and former County Commissioner of Precinct died in the Haskell County Hospital at 6:30 p. m. Friday following an illness of several weeks. Mr. Guess, born in Bell County Oct. 6, 1886, spent his early life in that section, and married Mrs. Belle Weaver July 28, 1905. He brought his family to this section in 1907 when the area was first being developed for farming. He settled his family in the Roberts community northeast of Haskell and was instrumental in the establishment of churches and schools in that section. He was a member of the Baptist Church. He served two terms as County Commissioner, during which time he instituted a program of better roads and other public improvements in the precinct. 
Long Wait for Girls The average girl in Vienna, Austria, has a fair chance of finding

Dr. Cox explained that a disease condition known as trichinosis is caused by a microscopic organism called the trichina or muscle worm. The young worms, or larvae, are found in the muscles of infected pigs. When this meat is eaten raw or is undercooked, the unharmed larvae grow in the human intestines into adult worms which are carried by the lymphatic tissue and blood stream to the muscles where they become encysted. This period of invasion gives rise to the symptoms of the disease. The severity of the illness is dependent upon the number of trichinae originally con-"While the adult parasites are in

the human intestines they may cause acute diarrhea," Dr. Cox said, "which at first can be mistaken for typhoid fever or dysen-This may start anywhere from the first to the fourth day after eating the infested pork and may last one to several days. As union claims against industry for back pay for walking to the job or preparing for work on company property mounted to over half a billion, tax experts opined that Uncle Sam may have to bear the burden of the settlements if the firms are permitted to obtain tax credits for such disbursements.

Although John L. Lewis first pointed up the question of so-called 'portal to portal' pay for miners traveling to the coal faces underground, the principle was given industry-wide implications with the Supreme court's decision upholding such compensation retroactive to 1938 for employees of the Mount Clemens, Mich., Pottery company.


The Supreme court verdict was followed by a rush of the major CIO unions for such retroactive back pay, with the United Farm Equipment and Metal Workers suing International Harvester for 100 million dollars. Imports are almost three times ex-

Helping Hand

Since Uncle Sam has dealt generously with Italy, it is looking confidently for more assistance from the U.S. Thus far, the U.S. has agreed to compensate Italy for supporting American invasion troops and furnishing war supplies, and has extended credits for purchase of overseas surplus. In addition, Italy has profited from U. S. contributions to UNRRA and the international bank.

Despite the difficulties presented by shortages of both foodstuffs and industrial materials, both the left and right wings have made political capital of unrest. Latest example was the food riots engineered by Communists in southern Italy. As a result of the political bickering, there has been a resurgence of Fascist sentiment, with Mussolini's former followers growing increasingly

Leftists also have backed the attacks on pope and church, with the intention of weakening respect for the Catholic doctrine of authority, family and property. However, the rightist dominated government has been quick to fight abusive criti-cism of the clergy. distressed areas. Having become used to the shock and terror of wartime B-29 raids, the Japanese accepted the catastrophe with resignation, calmly counting their dead and injured in the usands and their property damage in the millions. No less than 24 of the 47 prefectures felt the tremors, with the coastal regions of southern Honshu, Shikoku and Awaji islands swept by seven foot walls of water rushing in from the sea.

All of the horror and distress was portrayed by the Tokyo newspaper Asahi in an eyewitness report from Shikoku: First, startled people felt the ground shaking beneath them, then they could hear a great roaring sound. Stumbling from their quaking houses, they rushed for high ground, but many were overtaken by a surging wall of water and their screams rent the air. Some people saw a little girl with a doll crying. "Save me, gentle Buddha," but when they returned to search for relatives the tearful child was missing and all they could find was the doll, wedged between planks on the

DISPLAY HISTORIC DOCUMENTS WASHINGTON .- Attorney General Tom Clark is hatching a unique plan for selling civil liberties to the American people. He will send a special train through the 48 states carrying some of the priceless treasures of American freedom.

It was Clark, working quietly behind the scenes, who had more than anyone else to do with organizing the president's special committee on civil liberties, which will study southern lynchings and race prob-

Accordingly he has evolved the idea of sending a special train across the United States containing the most sacred documents of American history which guarantee our freedom.

At first Clark proposed equipping two special cars with showcases which would display the Bill of Rights, the Declaration of Independence, the Emancipation Proclamation, the Constitution and so on. However, he found that the Proc-

lamation of Emancipation by which Lincoln freed the slaves was in the hands of Abraham Rosenbach of Philadelphia, famous collector of old manuscripts. Clark, therefore, called Rosenbach to tell him about his plan and ask for the loan of the proclamation.

Rosenbach agreed to cooperate, and suggested an entire train instead of two cars. He offered to help raise the extra money and, as a result, it now is planned to equip an entire special train with showcases in which will be displayed the most cherished documents of American history. Soldiers will guard the train, just as guards stand watch continually over these documents in the Library of Congress. In addition, as the train arrives at each state border, an extra car will be ments and civil rights mementoes of

Because of Robberies. LONDON. - Britain's nobility, alarmed at the wave of raids on its

stately homes and castles by daring jewel thieves, was reported to be returning to wartime precautions used for guarding estates when invasion threatened.

Listening posts and pillboxes were being manned again and farmhands, gardeners and butlers were renewing knowledge of hand-to-hand fighting gained in the home guard dur-

ing the war. Many manorial British homes contain millions of pounds worth of jewelry, art treasures and heirlooms. Private detective agencies reported they were working overtime to protect clients from the wave of jewel burglaries, and insurance brokers said they were insuring huge amounts in precious gems. Some insurance brokers were imposing strict conditions, such as specifying the proportion of jewelry which must be kept in safety deposit vaults and providing that

homes must be equipped with safes. Among thieves picked up by Scotland Yard in its drive to end the jewel robberies was a "smash and grab" bandit who practiced breaking plate glass windows in his back yard before tackling jewelry shop fronts.

Find Man First Arrived in

Florida 10,000 Years Ago WASHINGTON. - "Florida can now make a legitimate claim to some very old inhabitants" - perhaps 10,000 years old, according to

Smithsonian institution. Dr. T. Dale Stewart, Smithsonian curator of physical anthropology. dug into the institution's skull collection, tore apart a reconstructed skull and put it together again in another shape.

The skull was discovered 20 years ago near Melbourne, Fla.

At that time Dr. James W. Gid ley, Smithsonian paleontologist, said fossils unearthed where the skull was discovered indicated it was the remainder of a human who lived when giant mastodons roamed North America near the end of the Ice

However, original reconstruction of the skull was identified as a Florida Indian, refuting Gidley's theory. But Stewart was dissatisfied. He put the bones together again in the shape of a long-headed skull "similar to the earliest skeletal remains found on this continent," the Smith-

sonian said. Since the original discovery of the skull, anthropologists have agreed that man actually arrived in North America as many as 10,000 years







Norway has little government managed industry, as such. The only the government are the post office power, and railroads. There seems to be no agitation for extension of government ownership and manage ment. In fact, some leaders feel the trend is in the other direction and that the government has shown no ability to provide efficient serv-

However, cooperatives are numer ous in Norway. Entirely different nevertheless control the buying and selling of almost everything and are monopolistic in nature. The effective organizations of the co-ops, while individually owned, have been used in some instances for extension of government control. Subst dies have been offered to farmers' cooperatives in an effort to please everybody: the producers with higher prices and the purchasers with low prices.

Wait 'Til You're Old

The completeness of the cooperative monopoly may be seen in the association of drug store operators, to which all operators belong. To open a new drug store a man would first have to become a member of the association and get its approval, after which he would appeal to the government for a license. 


