



Q. What is Anaplasmosis?

A. Anaplasmosis is a disease of attle caused by a protozoan parasite which gains entry into the blood stream of cattle and destroys the red blood cells. The protozoa are spread by files, ticks, and uncleanliness with dehorners or vaccination peedles. This disease is becoming needles. This disease is becoming more common in certain sections of the country and emphasizes the need for proper sanitation measures.

Q. Last year I had trouble with my turkey poults and lost nearly half of them. They were about three days old when I fed them. Do you think they should have been fed earlier?

A. Poults should be placed in the brooder and fed and watered immebrooder and fed and watered immediately after they are received from the hatchery. According to research conducted by the Ralston Purina Company's Research Department, for every hour that feeding was delayed, mortality increased one-half of one per cent, and weight was one-fourth of one per cent less at six weeks of age. Three groups of poults were fed and watered at 24, 48, and 72 hours after hatching, respectively, and the livability at six weeks of age was as follows:

Q. Will hogs fed fish meal or fish eil in their ration produce pork with a fishy flavor?

A. Studies made at the Indiana Agricultural Experiment Station indicate that hog rations containing 2.5% and 10% of fish meal produced pork without a fishy flavor. However, 10% of fish meal plus 0.5% or 1.5% of fish cil in the ration resulted in fish flavored pork. The fishy flavor was more pronounced in the fresh roasts and cured bacon than in the fresh chops. Fish flavor was also more pronounced in the fat than in the lean tissue of the meat.




