IRON LUNG WILL BE DISPLAYED DURING TWO DAY FUND RAISING CAMPAIGN

Friday and Saturday, April 16-17 have been announced as the dates on which the Mullikin Portable Iron Lung will be placed on display in a downtown show window, according to Chief Frank B. Reynolds of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, which is sponsoring the purchase of a Portable Respiator for Haskell and vicinity. At a meeting Monday evening, April 12, the committee handling the drive will be "briefed" on their duties for the 2-day drive, and it is planned that by Saturday evening, April 17, the necessary \$1200 will be raised.

School, at which time the students will be given an opportunity to see the "Lung" in action, first hand. The equipment will then be moved to a downtown store window, where demonstrations will be given by Ken Lichtenwalter, representative of the W. J. Mullikin Company, manufacturers. Arrangements are being made by the Fire Department whereby donations, large and small, will be accepted at the display. According to Chief Reynolds, a Portable Iron Lung will fill the need of the community for emergency resuscitation equipment. He also pointed out that though the Lung will be available for application in connection with polio cases, it can be used with equally good effect by our fire department in cases of drowning, suffocation, carbon monoxide poisoning, electric shock, etc. This is due to the fact that the Lung weighs but 87 pounds, and can therefore be transported readily to the scene of the emergency, providing "on the spot" care. Such use is further enhanced by the fact that the respirator will operate off a 6 volt storage battery as efficiently as from 110 volt house current. A hand lever will also operate the Lung in emergencies.

HHS Band Takes High Honors At Music Festival

Friday, April 2, was red letter day for members of the Haskell High School band, which received high honors in the annual Interscholastic League Region II Music Festival in Abilene. Although they were ineligible for the trophy award because of late entrance, the judges gave the Haskell band credit for the best performance of the day by a wide margin, being the only band in Class B to be placed in the First Division by a vote of all three judges. The judges were Major Ed Chenette, writer and composer of music and director of many bands; Anton Beck, college orchestral director in South Texas; and Frank Malone of S.M.U.

The band activities continued throughout the day and until 11 p.m. Friday night. All the bands marched and were inspected at Fair Park Stadium. Bands from some 30 towns took part in Class B, C and D events. James Hobbs, HHS Band director, praised the performance of the organization in their playing on the stage. "I never heard the band perform so overtly," he said. "I believe the overtures, 'Carnival of Roes' and 'Romantic,' were executed beautifully and musically, and I surely had a right to be proud of everyone in the band. Plenty of hard work and concentrated practice on these numbers certainly got results, and Friday, April 2, was the day from which all gained new experiences and new interests," Hobbs concluded.

Verdict Due Today For Murder In Negro's Trial

Jury verdict was expected late this afternoon in the murder trial of James Forman, negro farm laborer, on trial in 39th District Court on a Grand Jury indictment in which he is charged with the slaying last October 6 of Marion Young, another negro. Both were employed on a farm near Rochester. Forman was employed as a cotton picker. Young was fatally wounded by blasts from a 12 gauge shotgun, and died several hours later in a Knox hospital. Trial of the case was called Wednesday morning before District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman, with District Attorney J. H. Banks and County Attorney Curtis Pogue in charge of prosecution. Counsel for the defendant includes Wm. P. Ratliff of this city and the law firm of Guinn & Gunn of Rusk.

Heart Attack Is Fatal To O. E. Webb

Oran E. Webb, 50, prominent Haskell farmer and resident here for 30 years, died at the family home six miles east of Haskell, Sunday at 10:15 p.m., after being stricken with a heart attack. He had been slightly ill for several days but his condition was not believed serious and his death came as a distinct shock to relatives and friends. Deceased was born Aug. 16, 1897, at Lockney, in Floyd county, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. James D. Webb. He went to Leno county as a young man, and later came to Haskell county in 1918. He married Miss Stella Stewart, of Dilley, Texas, March 20, 1921, and they made their home in this section since that time. Mr. Webb had been a member of the Methodist Church since he was 14 years of age.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Stella Webb, a daughter, Mrs. Burnell Gilleland, both of Haskell; a son, James Robert Webb of Dallas, two brothers, E. D. Webb of Denver City, and Alton Webb of Brownfield, and three grandchildren. Funeral service was conducted at the First Methodist church in this city Tuesday at 3 p.m., by the Rev. James E. Harrell, pastor, officiating. Interment was in Willow cemetery under direction of Holden's Funeral Home. Active pallbearers were Menard Field, J. M. Glass, Robert Tidwell, O. E. Gilliland, Clyde Gordon, Ernest Johnston, Arthur Montgomery, Cohn Stark. Named as honorary pallbearers were members of Mr. Webb's Sunday School class of the First Methodist church.

Funeral was held at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday, at the Paint Creek Methodist church, 12 miles south-east of Haskell in the community in which the Overtons lived. The Rev. James Overton of Haskell, former pastor of the church, officiated, assisted by the Rev. James E. Harrell, present minister of the church. The body was taken Thursday morning to Burleson Cemetery, in Johnson county for burial Thursday afternoon. Holden Funeral Home of Haskell was in charge of arrangements.

Deceased was born Feb. 19, 1879, in Missouri, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edwin Griffith. She married W. H. Overton July 4, 1897, in Johnson county, and they later made their home at Burleson before coming to Haskell county in 1918. Mrs. Overton was active in church, community and school work. She was a member of the Methodist church and the Eastern Star. Mr. and Mrs. Overton celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary July 4, 1947. They were married at Files Valley in 1897. After their marriage, Mr. Overton built and managed cotton gins at Cleburne, Itaca, Burleson and other Central Texas towns. They moved to Haskell county after Mr. Overton bought land here. He managed the Farmer Co-Op gin at Haskell 15 years, retiring in 1945. Survivors are the husband; three sons, Ray R., Roy A. and M. Eugene Overton, all of Haskell; three sisters, Mrs. Grace Childs and Mrs. Claudia Littlefield, both of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Bessie Hitt of Denton. Pallbearers were W. A. Montgomery, J. H. Montgomery, John R. Watson Jr., John Kunstler, Durwood Livingood, H. B. Montgomery, Wayne Perry and Allen Isbell.

Palo Pinto Men Held For Farm Home Theft

A 19-year-old Palo Pinto county youth was returned to Haskell Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Doss Fuller, and another youth is being held by Mineral Wells officers, for alleged complicity in the burglary of a farm residence between Rule and Rochester several months ago. Members of the sheriff's department said that a watch, gun and other valuables were taken in the theft.

Heaviest balloting in several years was recorded in the city election here Tuesday, when voters polled a total of 939 ballots in electing seven city officials for a two year term. W. Q. Casey, Haskell automobile dealer and former bank cashier, was elected Mayor receiving 514 votes to defeat Hallie Chapman, farm implement dealer and member of the present city council, who received 423 votes. For City Secretary, T. J. Arbuckle polled 494 votes in defeating J. Belton Duncan, seeking re-election, who received 427 votes. Joe E. Pace, unopposed for his first elective term as City Recorder, received 886 votes. Eal Treadwell was elected City Marshal, receiving 574 votes in defeating his opponent, George Yancey, who polled 321 votes. In the balloting for Aldermen, with three to be elected, Oscar Oates, Haskell businessman and former druggist, led the ticket with 645 votes; Payne Hattox, former grocer, received 513 votes, and A. M. Turner, bank official, polled 497 votes to complete the trio of Aldermen elected. Other candidates for Alderman, and respective vote totals were: F. L. Peavy 355, Bob Herren 305, R. W. Merchant 298. Newly-elected officials will take office at the regular meeting of the City Council, Tuesday, April 13. Retiring officials are Mayor John Couch and City Marshal W. C. Allen, neither of whom sought re-election; J. Belton Duncan, City Secretary; and Alderman George Neely, Police and Sewer Commissioner; J. M. Crawford, Finance Commissioner, and Hallie Chapman, Street Commissioner. Hold-over members of the Council are Water and Fire Commissioner J. B. Gipson, and Park Commissioner Wallace H. Cox.

County Agents Of Six Counties To Meet Here

County Agents from Knox, Throckmorton, Stonewall, Dickens, Kent and Haskell, will meet in this city on April 15 to discuss the 7-Step Cotton program for the coming year, according to F. W. Martin, county agent. Specialists from Texas A&M college, who will be present for the meeting will be Charley King, entomologist; Fred Elliott, cotton works specialist; E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, and J. A. Scofield, district extension agent. One of the main topics to be discussed will be the new insecticides that have been developed to control cotton insects.

Clean-up Week Being Widely Observed

"Finest cooperation of the citizenship in years," was the term used Thursday morning by city officials and civic leaders directing Haskell's annual Spring Clean-up campaign which is underway this week. Results of the first few days work on the part of homelovers and property owners in all parts of the city are noticeably apparent, campaign leaders said, and by the end of the week the goal of making Haskell one of the cleanest cities in West Texas will be attained, they believed. The biggest problem will be to clean up vacant lots of non-residents, city officials pointed out, and they urged adjoining property owners to cooperate in cleaning up such premises. The city will provide trucks or wagons to haul all trash or rubbish which cannot be burned, if it is placed in alleys or near the street where it can be conveniently loaded.

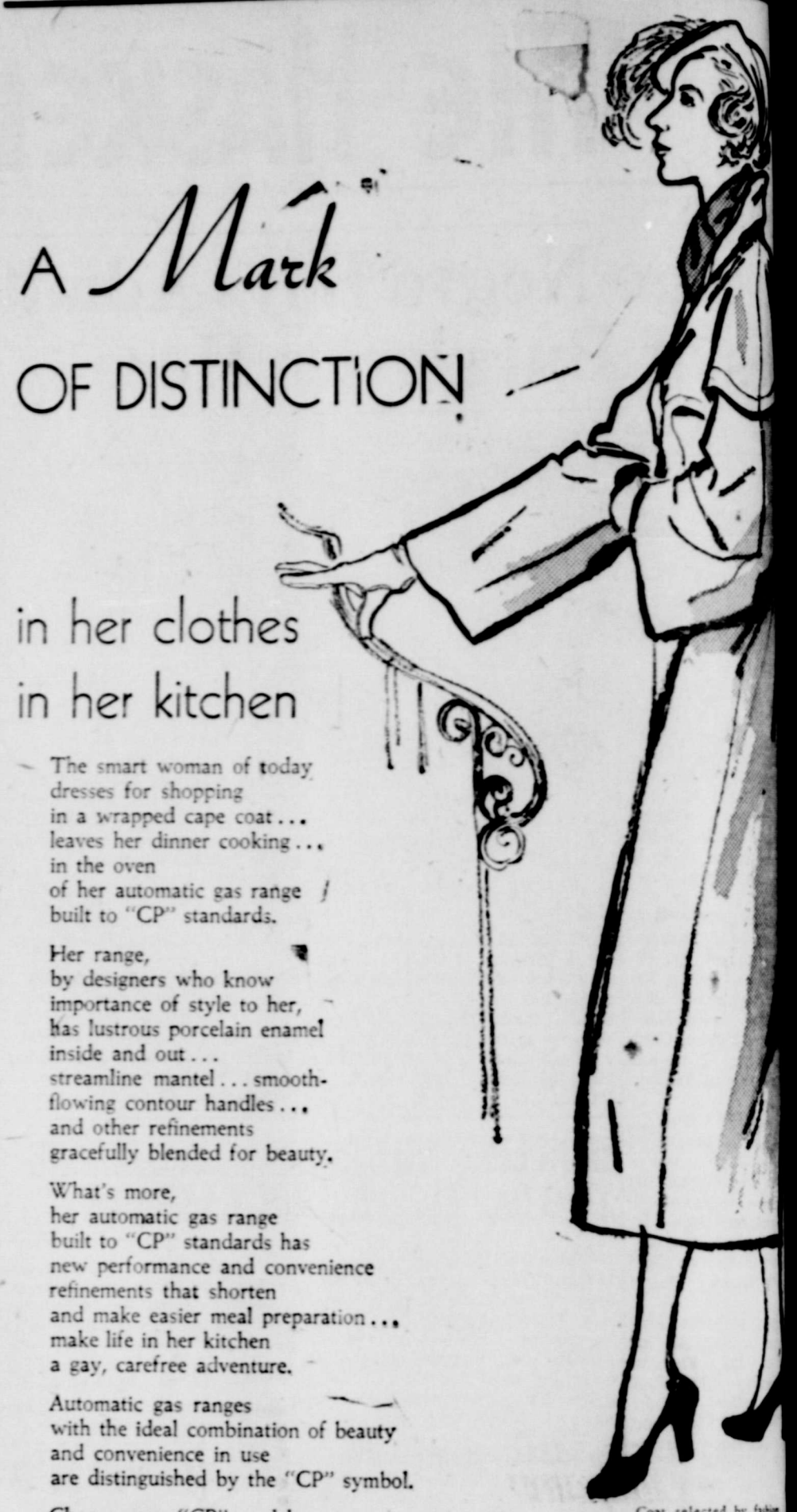

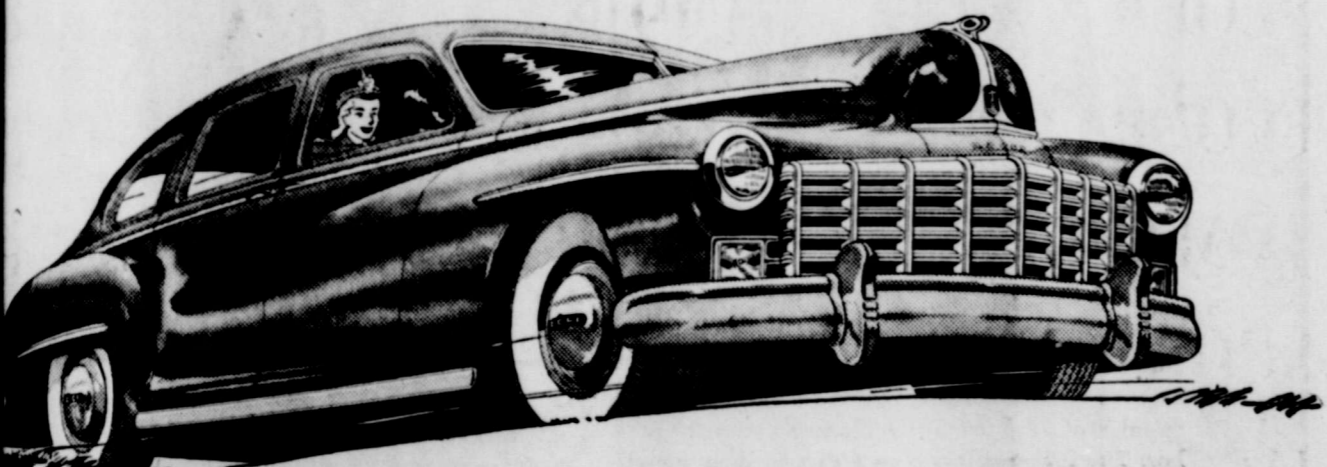
