





If you have done a good conitioning job on the hair, you von't have to clip the animal over. Clipping tends to make the hair coarse. A few days beshowing the animal, clip he long hair around the head, ears, above the switch, inside the egs and around the udder.

Just a day before the show wash, braid and wrap the switch. Rinsing it in bluing water will righten the color of the hair, Just before going into the w ring, unbraid the switch and comb it out. This will give animal a clean, fluffy switch that adds points to its ap-

Feeding roughage puts high medals on dairy animals, says Davis. Feed them good quality hay frequently. The barrel capacity of an animal will show up the best if the animal takes a good drink of water fifteen or twenty minutes before going in-

After these many weeks of fitting the animal for the ring, you want to keep her looking her best when you get her there. Never allow her to droop or go to sleep at any time. When stopping the animal, always try to stop her with her forefeet on slightly higher ground than the hind feet, says Davis. And one of the most important things of all to remember when you're in the show ring is to keep one eye on the judge and the other on the animal being shown at all





If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately so that the scar will be completely healed before school opens.

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly desirable, Dr. Cox believes. This disease, which causes serious illness and deaths among young children can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of the toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

In addition, before you send your child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for thorough examination, Dr. Cox You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defect there will be time to build up his beneral nealth and correct dental defects before school opens. Don't let your child start his school life with any avoidable handicap







Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Cut steak into pieces for serving. Sprinkle mixture of 1½ teasp. salt and few grains pepper on both sides of meat. Dip, one piece at a time, in milk. Save remaining milk for gravy. Roll in corn flake crumbs. Brown on both sides in hot shortening in heavy skillet. Cover; bake about 1 hour, or until tender. Remove to In hour, or until tender. Remove to platter; keep hot. Blend flour and few grains pepper into liquid in skillet. Stir in liquid off peas. Boil slowly and stir 2 min. Measure milk left from dipping meat; add enough to make 2/3 cup. Stir into hot flour mixture; add peas. Heat thoroughly but do not boil. Serve at once with the meat.
