Texas Cotton Crop Seen as Potential Record-Breaker

Things look good right now for the cotton farmer. Texas has better than a fair sized cotton crop coming up. Fact is, it may be a record year, since the acreage is up quite a bit over last year.

The cotton grower will get for his crop, and second, what it cost him to produce and harvest it. The government is working toward a stabilization of price through loans, but it's up to the farmers to look after the cost items. They know it takes big per acre yields to keep the costs down.

First Summer Heat Sometimes Causes Loss on Hogs

"The Good Old Summertime" often means a bad time for the hogs. June is the month hogs may become so overcome with the heat they die, even though the temperature climbs higher in July and August.

Apparently the hogs become adjusted to the heat during the latter part of the summer, says E. M. Regenbrecht, extension swine husbandman of Texas A&M College. Now is the time to watch your hogs to make sure they have plenty of cool shade, lots of drinking water and, if possible, a sanitary hog wallow.

It's better to handle the hogs on dry ground in the summertime, rather than allow them to lie in an old mud hole constantly. A concrete hog wallow, he says, is better than the mud hole. The wallow should be constructed out in the sun, but very near the shade. There's a reason for this. This way, a small wallow will take care of a large number of hogs.

On the other hand, if your hog wallow is in the shade, you'll find the hogs will stay in the pool all the time. As many hogs as possible will pile in, crowding out some that may become overheated.

It's not good for hogs to stay in the pool all the time, Regenbrecht concludes. So, the arrangement of the wallow in the sun near the shade will give all the hogs a chance to keep cool.

A dollar invested in control measures will protect the crop investment and return \$1.50, insect control is a paying-off proposition. Better yields will keep the profits higher, he concludes, but it all goes back to the business of insect control.

Disregard of Traffic Signs Draws Fire of Safety Engineer

Would you drive with your head tucked under the dashboard of your car?

It's as sensible to do that, State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer said today, as to ignore warning signs along the streets and highways. "Either one represents a case of flying blind," Greer said, "and cars aren't equipped for blind flying."

The Texas Highway Department is cooperating this month with the Texas Safety Association in an effort to impress the importance of traffic markers on motorists and pedestrians alike.

"Traffic signs and signals and pavement markings cover almost every situation that can be anticipated, yet the regularity with which they are ignored is appalling," Greer said. "A conscientious observance of traffic signs would help greatly to reduce traffic accidents."

Greer pointed out that traffic signs are easily recognized by their distinctive shapes, even at a distance that makes their lettering illegible. And he urged drivers to increase their own traffic protection by learning what these shapes are.

"Round markers are used to indicate approaches to railroad crossings," he said. "The familiar 'crossback' marks the crossing itself. Oblong signs indicate speed limits or other regulatory instructions. Diamond shaped signs warn of danger ahead. Eight-sided signs are used only for stop signs."

The Highway Engineer emphasized that every sign has a meaning and a purpose, and is installed for the protection and guidance of the people only after study by traffic engineers has established its availability.

National Safety Council Advises Drivers Of Risks

When you spin the needle of an automobile speedometer, you are gambling with much higher stakes than when you spin a roulette wheel—because you bet your life!

The chances of death in a speeding automobile are being emphasized by the National Safety Council in a nationwide program to reduce traffic deaths during the Fourth of July holiday and the entire month of July.

The adage that the faster you go the harder you hit is proved by figures of the Council which show that fatalities increase enormously as speed increases.

If you have an injury accident at 45 m.p.h., the chances of someone being killed are one in 16, according to the Council. At 55 m.p.h. the chances are one in 12. And at 65 m.p.h. the odds are one in six that someone will be killed.

To drive 400 miles, you can gain a little more than one hour by increasing your constant speed from 55 m.p.h. to 65 m.p.h., the Council said. But to gain that one hour, you double the chance of someone being killed if you have an injury accident.

A safe speed depends upon four things, according to safety authorities. The age, physical condition and ability of the driver. An older driver usually reacts more slowly to danger than a young person, for example. Similarly, a person with subnormal eyesight must drive slower than someone with good eyesight.

The mechanical condition of the car. Automobiles should be kept in good condition, but if brakes, headlights or tires are not in top condition, speed must be reduced.

Traffic congestion. Speed obviously cannot be as high on a crowded roadway as it can on a clear, open stretch of highway.

Condition of the roadway must be reduced when it is raining or when driving on uneven pavement, stone or gravel. At night, a safe speed is one which will permit you to stop in the distance illuminated by your headlights.

The highway death toll over the Fourth of July weekend and throughout the month of July will reveal how conscientiously the public heeds the warning that Speed Kills, the Council says.

New Cotton Plan Is Step Nearer Enactment

A new plan for federal control of cotton planting and marketing—intended to curtail threatened postwar surpluses—has been approved by a senate agricultural subcommittee in Congress.

Chairman Anderson, Democrat of New Mexico, who is a former secretary of agriculture, told a reporter he expects both senate and house approval at this session.

"Under present laws we could not have effective controls," Anderson said. "We could have an acreage allotment of as high as 27,500,000 acres and that would mean too much cotton."

Key points of the new program worked out as a compromise between agriculture department officials, cotton interests and major farm organizations, as outlined by Anderson include:

- 1. A minimum allotment of 10,000,000 bales or slightly less in the next two years. This compares with a crop of 14,626,000 bales last year, and estimates of an even larger cotton crop this year.
- 2. An acreage base of 22,500,000 acres from which allotments would be made with special adjustments for small farms of five acres or less. New cotton areas. And other special conditions such as cotton acreage planted to wartime crops. Actual acreage allotment probably would be considerably less than the 22,500,000 acres for the next few years.
- 3. Provisions allowing state and county farmer committees to decide upon allotments within their areas rather than allowing federal agriculture officials here to do this.



Area Rancher Uses Unique System Of Pasture Management With Success

"You can't raise beef without grass." This thought prompted J. L. Hill, Jr., of Stamford, to start a unique system of pasture management on his Four Hills Angus Farm two miles west of Lueders. To produce beef most economically, Hill seeded good native grass which mature could grow without any cost of land preparation, planting, and cultivation.

There is a 91 acre native grass pasture on the farm which is grazed in rotation with supplemental field pastures. The pasture is rested during the summer when field grazing on sudan or Madrid clover is available. When the fields are being grazed the cows do not go back and forth into the pasture for water, but are kept completely out of the pasture and watered in the field. This gives the grass a chance to attain maximum growth and produce seed. The pasture with its native grass hay is then used in the winter to maintain mother cows. Hill says that since last September he has had 16 grown cows on the pasture. The cows were given two pounds of cottonseed cake daily and the only time they were given additional hay was during January when everything was covered with ice and snow.

The pasture grasses have shown rapid improvement. This exceptional condition has been brought about by only one summer of deferment. The summer 1948 was the first time the pasture had been completely rested. Hill stated that the pasture was grazed very heavy in 1947.

Hill has followed this same rotation system on a ranch in Stone-wall County for the last two years. The old timers there say that he has the best turf they have seen on the pasture in 25 years. All of the summer native grasses including little bluestem, sideoats grama, and buffalo grass were allowed to seed last year.

J. L. Hill knows the value of following a definite system of rotation grazing on his native grass. He doesn't take all the grass he can at once, but practices conservative grazing. Some of the grass is left on the ground which forms mulch to catch more of the rainfall and thus produce more and better grass the next year. This is paying off in dollars and cents as well as saving his soil and moisture.

Hill is a district cooperator with the California Creek Soil Conservation District. Soil Conservation Service technicians have assisted him in determining proper management practices to get the most use out of his pasture.

Quality of Milk Is Important to Both Producer and User

In view of the fact that June has been proclaimed National Dairy Month, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges that with the more extensive use of milk, both producer and consumer be concerned as to its quality. The use of clean safe milk is a health measure.

Local interest in improved methods of producing wholesome milk has increased greatly in the past two decades and the striking advance in milk control has been responsible for the enormous saving in infant life.

Milk is perishable and especially during hot weather. To insure milk of good quality requires cleanliness, sterile utensils, protection against flies, careful bottling and maintenance at low temperature. The presence in fresh milk of large numbers of bacteria, due to insanitary methods of production is a health hazard.

Dr. Cox added, "Among the diseases which may be transmitted through milk are tuberculosis, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, septic sore throat, undulant fever, diarrhea and enteritis. Numerous milk-borne outbreaks of disease occur every year in this country from the use of milk that might have been safe with proper care."

"We should firmly insist that the milk we drink be carefully produced, so that we will have the maximum practicable protection along the line from the cow to the consumer."





Drivers Urged To Recognize Traffic Signs

Can you read sign language? If you can't, then it's a matter of life and death that you learn it quickly, the National Safety Council says.

You don't have to be an Indian, though, to learn this sign language. It is the kind that appears on signs along the highway to warn you of danger.

Almost 60 per cent of the drivers involved in fatal accidents were violating a traffic regulation at the time, according to the Council. And three out of every four pedestrians killed were vio-

lating some regulation. Such disregard of the "signs of life" is the reason for a nationwide campaign this June to impress upon the public the standard shapes of signs so that their meaning will be easily recognized. Better understanding of the meaning of sign shapes, signals and pavement markings will promote better observance and increased safety, the Council believes.

The key word in the "signs of life" educational program is RO-DE-CE. This coined word is a reminder of the meaning of highway sign shapes.

Round for warning of the approach to a railroad crossing. It is an "alert" signal.

Octagon for most regulatory signs. Such signs are backed by law as well as common sense.

Diamond-shaped signs warn of dangerous, or potentially dangerous, conditions just ahead.

Eight-shaped, octagonal signs mean STOP. It is not just a warning to slow down.

Vote On School Board, Constitutional Amendments Is Set For November 8th

The Legislature has made it possible to hold all of Texas' special elections on Nov. 8.

Thus, the state will not be forced into double expense of holding elections twice.

The House and Senate made possible the consolidation of election dates by adopting a joint resolution. The resolution reset dates for votes on ten proposed changes in the Constitution. These elections will be held Nov. 8 in-

stead of Sept. 24, as originally set. This action was followed by a statement from Rep. Deno A. Tuftares of Wichita Falls that he would amend his bill on electing a new state board of education so as to provide that it, too, would be voted on Nov. 8.

And sponsors of three more proposed amendments to the Constitution agreed to write in election dates for Nov. 8 if the Legislature agrees to submit them to the voters.

Tuftares' bill seeks to amend the Gilmer - Aiken administrative school bill to clarify the procedure in the election of the twenty-one members of the newly created State Board of Education. He would insert a provision in his bill, he said, to make it for Nov. 8.

The Gilmer - Aiken bill does not become effective until ninety days after adjournment, or Oct. 5. It has conflicting provisions as to when the State Board of Education shall be elected. Common acceptance is that the election would come thirty days after the bill becomes a law, or on Nov. 3, just three days before the Nov. 8 date now in prospect.

Representatives S. J. Isaacks of El Paso and John Crosthwait of Dallas sponsored the House joint resolution resetting the ten amendments election date for Nov. 8. Their joint resolution set aside the election date clauses in each of the proposals and changed them to the new date.

This caused the Secretary of State to send telegrams to some 245 newspapers over the state to stop publication of the ten amendments for the Sept. 24 election date. The telegram also advised that a new date (Nov. 8) would be supplied later and in ample time to start publication anew.

Under the Constitution all amendments proposals must be published four times and starting at least ninety days before the election.

Two publications have already been made of the ten amendments and now all will have a new series of four publications. This is added expense but not nearly so much as if separate elections were held.

Robot Pickers Save Farmers \$2 On Cotton

The Agriculture Department at Washington reports that mechanical cotton pickers are saving farmers in the Mississippi delta up to \$2.08 for every hundred pounds of cotton harvested.

The department said that the cost of harvesting cotton by mechanical pickers averaged \$2.42 per hundred pounds in 1947, compared to \$2.50 to \$4.50 for hand picking.

However, mechanical pickers harvested only a small part of the delta crop and farmers use less than half the capacity of the area's 600-650 machines, the department added.

Salt Deficiency Should Be Avoided In Hot Weather

A deficiency of salt in the human system can cause serious consequences, and for this reason, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, advises every person whose work is such that it causes excessive perspiration to add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water taken during the day.

Farmers, mechanics, carpenters, construction men and all others whose work cause them to sweat profusely are in danger of having their body salt content seriously depleted, and as a result may suffer from heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat, and when the thermometer hits the high register, the human body may lose as much as 40 to 50 grams of salt during a single day.

In many industrial plants, workmen are furnished with and urged to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Many find this a pleasant way of taking extra salt, but others prefer to add the needed amount of extra salt to their food and drink.

"Take your extra salt in any manner that is agreeable to you," says Dr. Cox, "but take it. Heat cramps are very painful and exhausting. They are characterized by cramps in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases there may be nausea and vomiting. Body salt losses occur



Patrol Cars To Be About More Often Now

Your chances of seeing a black and white state patrol car, when you want to or do not want to, are much better now.

The patrol is at its full strength for the first time in its nineteen years of existence, Homer Garrison, director of the Department of Public Safety, said.

The last legislature increased the number of patrolmen from 240 to 450. The patrol was increased gradually because the department insists on putting its candidates through a rigorous training course of several months' duration in small groups.

Funds were appropriated on a gradually increasing scale during the last two years. Garrison kept his training program on schedule and finally brought the patrol to full strength.

At times in the past, the department has not had enough funds to put as many patrolmen on the highways as were available.

The highway patrol was organized in 1930. The Legislature provided for fifty patrolmen and five lieutenants. Since that time, the total amount of state highways has increased from 18,523 miles to 31,075. Too, there are now nearly a million more motor vehicles registered in Texas than there were in 1930.
