Use of Benzene **Hexachloride** Said **Harmless** to Flocks

Haskell county poultrymen wh se benzene hexachloride to protect their chickens from lice will find the chemical highly effective, says James A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. Colege.

He says the Bureau of Animal Industry of the USDA has conducted tests that show the "musflavor that sometimes results in fruit and vegetables from the use of the chemical are not taken p by either the eggs laid immeliately after delousing nor the neat of the birds that are protected by a BHC treatment.

Three groups of heavily infested chickenswere freed from all trouble with lice by the simple, easy and inexpensive painting of ther rosts with a suspension consomer of BHC. The treatment says Deer, was liberal but not wasteful. Foul galons was ample to treat the roosts of more than 1,000 birds. The immediate effect was as a fumigant.
