Indians and Victorias Turnpike Road.

SCRIPTIONS will be received at the Mayor's office from the citizens of Indians and elsewhere, for the purpose of repairing the bad and almost impassable portions of the above road, until the arroyos are filled up by the company to put the same into a thorough state of repair, terminating at the city of Victoria.

The expensiveness of repairing the road forthwith must appear obvious to the merchants and property holders of Indians, and particularly to the planters and merchants of Western Texas generally, whereby the trade and a free interior communication may be kept open and diverted to a point, where it naturally and legitimately belongs. It is to be hoped therefore, that the subscriptions to carry out this important measure will be liberal and prompt.

NOTICE.

SEALED proposals will be received at the Mayor's office until the 15th inst., to repair all bad and impassable places of the Indians and Victoria Turnpike road and construct the necessary bridges theron. The road is to be widened by a width of twelve feet, to be made by a committee of the directors of said road, the whole of the ridge to be completed by the 20th of October, A. D. 1853. The work to be paid for in cast installments, as follows: first installment, one-third cash, when one-third of the road is finished; second installment, when the next third of the road is completed, save the balance of the money when all the sections are thoroughly repaired, to the satisfaction of said committee, and payment made. Bond and security will be required, and twenty per cent, of the amount retained for the faithful performance of the same.

The plan and specifications for the work may be seen at the Mayor's office from and after the 10th August. The object is to immediately improve the bad places, as to accommodate the fallage, so that it will not be practicable to construct the turnpike itself in time for that purpose. The regular contracts for the entire Turnpike will be in a short time.
