The original stockholders in the system included Evart White, Kost, Sherman Taylor, W. E. Friend Jr. and Bill Cooper, who dropped out of the agreement many years ago.

A plane crash 16 miles south of Ozona ended in death for the pilot, Jay Stein Cox of Fredericksburg, October 24. Cox was a building contractor for a Crockett County ranch home and frequently flew in the area.

Cox was alone in a single engine Grummon Tiger when it crashed in a brushy area on the Nat Read Ranch about noon.

Reports indicate that Cox was flying west from Fredericksburg when his plane descended from low cloud cover and was unable to pull back up to avoid the crash.





Cubs dominate Crane

The Ozona Cubs traveled to Crane Thursday night to try to extend their winning streaks to one more game. The Seventh Grade Cubs faced a

challenging Crane team. However, the Cubs bested Crane 14-12 in what proved to be a low scoring ball game.

On the Cubs' first possession, Ruben Borrego turned on his speed and shot 45 yards on a punt return and produced the first touchdown of the game. The attempt at a two-point conversion failed, and Ozona led 6-0.

Crane held the Cubs for the rest of the half. But they could not turn any of their possessions into points. In the early part of the third quarter, Crane finally found an open spot and tied the score at 6-all.

Gilbert Rico intercepted a Crane pass to set up the Cubs' last touchdown of the game.

Mingo Perez, who had 107 yards for the night, hurdled himself into the end zone from two yards out to give the Cubs a 12-6 edge. Martin Urbino added what would become the winning two points, after bulling in from three yards out.

Crane responded with an eight yard touchdown that put everyone on the side lines anticipating the two-point conversion attempt. The Cubs' defense held Crane and proved to be the victors, winning 14-12.

The Cubs had 231 yards rushing, aided by M. Urbino with 33 yards and R. Borrego with 91 yards. Brad Bollier went 25 percent on his passes for 18 yards.

Defensively, Pete Ramirez had four tackles. He was followed by Rodriguez with three, then Ybarra, Martinez, Mark Fierro and Gus Garza followed with two apiece. Crane outmaneuvers new Ozona offense

Despite a new shotgun offense that featured a strong passing attack, Crane took advantage of early Lion interceptions and a fumble and easily defeated Ozona 56-6 Friday night in Crane.

Ozona plans to use this aerial attack, which features no huddles "as long as it is effective", said Head Lion Coach Jim Green. "Going to a huddle tires the receivers more quickly by making them jog further distances between plays to the huddle. Having no huddles also does not give a defense time to make adjustments."

Ozona will play Coahoma Friday in the last home game of the season. Coahoma, who lost 34-0 to Sonora last week, has an excellent 190 pound senior quarterback, Brian Calaway. The Bulldogs are predominantly a running team and feature three potent runners: fullback Dale Hodnett, junior running back Craig Wallace and senior Garry Vaughn.

Coahoma has a strong defensive unit anchored by left linebacker Anthony Hernandez and defensive lineman Barry Stafford. "They are a well coached team, both offensively and defensively.

Girls scrimmage Nov. 5 A much depleted team will face Coahoma, as the Lions suffered many key injuries during the Crane game. Starting quarterback Steve Sanchez received a knee injury as did all purpose back Harvey Fierro. Sanchez and Fierro may not play in the Coahoma game. Bret Thompson received a shoulder injury and is a questionable starter. Brock Jones and Brian Morrow are out with ankle injuries and also may not see action in the Coahoma game. Out for the season with injuries are Valdo Galindo, Marty Moran and Kenneth Sessom.

"We may have to bring up additional junior varsity players, and possibly change some positions to help fill in the holes," Coach Green explained.

'We knew we couldn't beat 'em (Crane) by running, so we only ran against them 11 times," he said, citing the overwhelming Crane weight advantage. They all did a good job. I sure hope that the kids can get a second victory against Coahoma. Victories have not come in direct proportion to the effort put forth this season."

During the Crane game, the team gained confidence as the game progressed. The first three Crane scores came either on or inside the Lion 20 yard line as a result of two interceptions and one fumble.

A fourth score resulted from a controversial bouncing pass from quarterback Abel Sena to Gerald Mitchell, who darted down the field for 71 yards. The field judge who made the final call said the ball was pitched backward.

O'Bryant is justifiably proud of the two advance life support vehicles and the growing number of skilled Emergency Care Attendants (ECA), Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's) and EMT-Special Skills (EMT-SS). These professionals deal with emergency care and provide a vital link to the definitive care provided by the hospital.

In 1977, when O'Bryant started this volunteer work, state law required two trained ambulance attendants on each run. With Jerry Cain, James Mahaffey. Jack Balou and Brian Henry they started the training process that would take them to classes nights in Mertzon. "We covered each other while others went to school.'

The first level of training, ECA, requires 50 class hours; EMT requires 120 class hours, and EMT-Special Skills requires 160 class hours and is a two or three month program. The most advanced level of training, Paramedic, requires 400 class hours. Ozona has no trained paramedics.

O'Bryant, former co-ordinator of the Crockett County Hospital Ambulance Service (hospital related) and former president of the **Crockett County Emergency** Medical System (non-hospital

"I hope those directing the system in the future continue to put the patient first in everything. As long as they remember that, there should be no problems," said the 17 year deacon at First Baptist Church. "Ozona has more trained per-

sonnel than many towns of this size. There are no paramedics because that requires a six-month full time training course. In real emergencies, transfers to San Angelo can be made in one hour." Approximately the same amount of time would be involved for air evacuation of patients since a unit would have to be dispatched from San Angelo.

The system handles between 20-30 calls per month, depending on the time of the year.

Starting in 1986, CPR, which assists with heart attack victims, will be taught in the public school system as a regular part of the curriculum.

"We hold many CPR classes from time to time," O'Bryant, an instructor trainer for the American Heart Association CPR classes, said. He also has taught many EMT classes through Midland College. "I am teaching presently in Iraan.





Mrs. Philip K. Smith is flower show chairman with all members assisting her.


In addition to design and horticulture sections, there will be an educational exhibit on wildflower and native plant literature, and one on flower arranging, demonstrating styles.



Extension service to reduce staff

Faced with a \$4.5 million budget shortfall for the next two years, the **Texas Agricultural Extension Service** is reducing its statewide staff while continuing to pursue top quality programming.

The shortfall resulted from a \$3.2 million reduction in general revenue appropriations coupled with unfunded salary increases and estimated increases in such operating expenses as utilities and postage.

"With a budget shortfall of this magnitude, we basically had two choices," said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the state educational agency that is responsible for agriculture, home economics, community development and 4-H programs

"We could maintain our present level of staffing and drastically reduce programming, or we could reduce our staff and direct funds from these positions into high quality educational programs for clientele.

"We chose the latter because we felt the citizens of Texas should not be deprived of quality educational programs," Carpenter emphasized. 'Our goal, as always, will continue to be to address the needs of the state's citizenry within the resources allocated."

Cuts were made straight across districts in the state. The only places cut in the district which includes Crockett County were in Big Spring and Fort Stockton. The position eliminated in Big Spring was that of an assistant in Home Economics. In Fort Stockton, the assistant to the agriculture agent position was eliminated.


