

1300 lbs of explosives found in Ozona barn

Discovery of approximately 1,300 successful attempts to locate Maypounds of high explosives at a barn in Ozona May 14 led to the controlled detonation of the material Thrusday afternoon. The explosion was heard throughout Ozona.

After being notified of the find by local citizens Wednesday afternoon, Fire Marshal Steve Kenley examined the explosives.

Primer cord, dynamite and ammonium nitrate stored in a building owned by Bobby Mayfield, B & D Construction Company, were in a deteriorating condition with nitro beginning to settle out of the dynamite, said Kenley. After unfield, the fire marshal used his state given authority to "correct hazardous conditions"

Bomb Technician Ken Land of the San Angelo Fire Department engineered the removal and detonation of the explosives Thursday. Land had everyone out of the immediate area while preparing the material for removal, said Kenley.

The dynamite, primer cord and ammonium nitrate were transported through town in a sand-filled county dump truck with Land at the wheel as Sheriff's Department personnel

cleared the way.

"About an hour" was required to set up the explosives for detonation at the dump, said Kenley. The material was laid out in a triangular pattern of five piles 100 feet apart for the explosion.

"We owe a lot to the bomb tech," said Kenley, who also praised the Ozona Fire Department, Sheriff's Department and County Road Supervisor Eddie Moore for their "excellent cooperation"

The decision to remove the materials was acted upon after consultation with Judge A. O. Fields and County Attorney Tom Cameron.

after 30 years Dorris Haire to retire from Energas

After almost 32 years, Dorris Haire has decided to retire from Energas and pursue some leisure time activities. David Harris of Seminole has been selected to manage the Ozona office.

Haire's last day at the Energas office will be May 23, but his formal retirement will not begin until July 1. "I have a five week vacation, starting May 26," Haire explained.

When Haire first started working for Energas (formerly called Pioneer Gas Co.) on November 8, 1954, the fledgling company served 700 Crockett County customers. The company has doubled in size and presently serves 1,400 customers, down slightly from a peak of 1,500 during the oil boom.

"We have expanded by main extensions, increased our gas suppliers and spent a lot of money to keep up with the growing demand," said Haire recently.

Energas, which serves approximately 70,000 customers in Texas and Louisiana, has continued to grow slowly but steadily through the years. The company recently moved its headquarters from Amarillo to Dallas and presently employs about 865 persons. Energas encourages all employees to participate and be a part of the community, said the Lion's Club president and fire chief. Federal government restrictions on gas usage during the past few

years will continue, and persons will continue to need to practice conservation, Haire said. "We are allowed to take only so much during Church of Christ member. a 24 hour period. Any gas over-runs require special approval."

The Ozona native and his wife, Georgia, were both working here when their daughter, Marsha Haire Ingram, was born. "I was working for Phillips following graduation from high school. I didn't want to take my daughter out of the Ozona schools, so I went to work for Energas, and have managed the company for about 23 years.'

Ozona has changed since the 1950's. The change "has been considerable, due to the oil and gas situation. The overall environment of the town has diversified. People are no longer totally dependent on ranching." The company has grown to include consumer goods, such as gas grills, Haire said.

Donna Hightower, Larry Hensley and Haire have manned the three person office for many years. "I plan to continue my community involvement, at least for a while. I have served as fire chief off and on for 20 years, been Lion's Club president for

seven or eight years and also been active in various fund raisers and the Chamber of Commerce."

"I don't know what I will do after I retire. I like to fish, do yard work and have some leisure time," said the

The company, under Haire's 23 years of management, has matured, and breakdowns in the system now

Harris, who will assume management of the local office in mid-June, plans to continue "selling service to our customers. We work for the public, not individuals, said the 18-year veteran of the Seminole

Though Ozona has a smaller population, Harris says he is "looking forward to moving here. I want to be a benefit to the community and continue the trend of involvement set by Haire. Haire has already set me up as a Lion's Club member."

Harris, his wife Lynn, and their two sons, Clay 15, and Trey 14, are active in the Seminole 4-H Club, particularly the horse events. "We have 10 horses, and spend all our time with the animals and our sons." Mrs. Harris has her own business, a monogram shop, in Seminole, and hopes to continue her work here.

DPS files suit for \$600,000

The \$600,000 confiscated in Crockett County May 11 from a 1986 Ford Taurus stopped on I-10 for a speeding violation has been deposited in an Austin bank.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Cliff Babbitt discovered the cash when two Mexican nationals allowed him to search the vehicle.

The money was turned over to the DPS Narcotics Division in Austin following its transfer from Crockett County. According to DPS information service officer Mike Cox, the money was counted May 12 and deposited in an Austin bank.

The DPS has filed suit with the U. S. District Court in Lubbock requesting that the cash be awarded to that law enforcement agency, Cox

Angelo spokesperson said the complaint has been filed. The San Angelo office is awaiting action by the U. S. District Court in Lubbock regarding disposition of the monies. "When the proper form is received from Lubbock, our office will arrest the property and advertise in the newspaper for someone to come forward and claim the cash," said the San Angelo spokesperson.

Cox said the disposition of the funds "lies in the Federal Court's ballpark now."

The U. S. District Court in San seized during three investigations by DPS officers since January 1986, said Cox. Webb County DPS officers seized \$400,000 and East Texas officers confiscated \$270,000 earlier this year.

The two men in the vehicle stopped here committed no crime in transporting the money, Cox said. "They were delivering the money to someone in El Paso, but didn't know to whom it belonged. The men Local officials are looking into the hadn't committed any crime, other than speeding.

> "There is an awful lot of cash in the underground economy. It benefits no one except those who shouldn't benefit," Cox said.

> The men were allowed to continue their trip from Miami to El Paso following conclusion of the initial investigation.

Study ordered on pipeline construction

A federal judge has ordered that an environmental impact study be made to determine the potential effects of the All American interstate pipeline across the environmentally sensitive Edwards Aquifer recharge zone. The study must be completed before construction on the 42-inch line from Los Angeles to Webster on the Texas Gulf Coast can resume.

A settlement was reached recently in Federal District Court in Austin in two lawsuits against the Federal Bureau of Land Management filed by the State of Texas and by Travis, Hays and Gillespie Counties. Terms of the settlement, signed by Judge James Nowlin, indicate that All American Pipeline Company has agreed to halt construction, commission and pay for a complete environmental impact study and research and suggest alternate pipeline routes. The settlement also allows the Bureau of Land Management the right to direct the route as indicated by the findings of the environmental impact study.

All American, a subsidiary of Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company, is constructing the \$900 million project which had reached Crockett and Sutton Counties before being halted. Environmental impact studies have been conducted in California, Arizona and New Mexico during the proposed pipeline route. If the pipeline is completed, the 1,768 mile route will be the longest in the United States and the only one running from California to the Gulf Coast.

Work had been progressing on schedule, but opponents of the pipeline cited environmental objections to the current route several months ago. The Edwards Aquifer provides drinking water for much of San Antonio and Central Texas. Hayes and Travis County officials successfully challenged the pipeline, viewing it as a potential threat to the aquifer.

The pipeline project, when completed, would pump an average of 300,000 barrels of crude oil, with a maximum of 450,000 barrels, per day from California to the Gulf Coast.

Crockett County residents viewed the pipeline as a boon to the sluggish local economy. One alternate route being considered by All American would by-pass Ozona and add approximately 22 miles to the route, going from McCamey to Bell County, north of Austin and then southeast to the coast. A second alternate route,



including Crockett County, would go south of McCamey to Zavala County, north of the Rio Grande and then east to the coast.

R. B. Potasnick of Cape Girardeau, MO had subcontracted to lay the pipeline from McCamey to south of Austin. At one time, more than 50 pipeline officials and workers were living in Crockett County working on the pipeline.

Because of opposition to the project, another pipeline, the Pacific Texas Project, may postpone construction on its \$1.6 billion 42-inch line from Los Angeles to Midland.

One Junction geologist, Pete Rose, in testifying before the U.S. Senate subcommittee on environmental affairs in March said that a one minute leak downline from a pumping station, at a flow of 350,000 barrels per day, would create a spill of more than 100,000 gallons of oil. All American officials have repeatedly stated that the odds are 40-1 against a leak occuring during the lifeline of the pipeline, explaining that special monitoring devices would shut down pumping mecha-



The Christian and Christ's Church

"Me and Jesus, we got a good thing goin':

They're turned off by what they call "organized religion". They resent

We don't need anybody to tell us what it's all about!"

Do you remember that song? It was popular on the Country & Western radio stations about 10 years ago. Leaving the terrible grammar aside, what do you think of its message? It expresses a popular attitude, doesn't it? Folks want a personal relationship with Jesus that leaves everybody else out of it.

They're turned off by what they call "organized religion". They resent any kind of authority (other than their own private opinion) which would tell them what to believe or how to live. They think they're individualists, which is like saying there's an individual finger that's not attached to a hand. Actually, they are nothing more than rebellious children, lacking in spiritual discernment or maturity. They profess to love Jesus, while they despise His Church.

How many of you husbands would appreciate the loyalty of a "friend" who, while claiming sincere love for you, openly despised and reviled

your wife? Would you tolerate that kind of "friendship"? I wouldn't. My wife is one flesh with me. An attack on her would be an attack on me. Do you think that Christ is any less loyal to His bride, the Church? (Rev. 19:7-8). The Holy Christian Church is His most cherished treasure. It is Christ's pearl of great price for which He gave His own life. So intimately does He commune with her that He regards persecution of her as persecution of Himself (Acts 9:1-5). Christ is the Head of the Church which is His body (Ephesians 1:22-23). Christ refuses to be found outside of His Church. To His Church He has given all authority in heaven and on earth (Matt. 28:16: 19). The very means of salvation, God's saving Gospel and Sacraments, belong to Christ's Church. Outside of the Church there is no salvation. Jesus Christ will tolerate no attempt to divorce Him from His bride. Those who will not listen to Christ's Church will not listen to Christ (Luke 10:16).

Ah, but who speaks for the Church? Does the Pope at Rome? After all, he claims to be the Vicar of Christ. Or how about the World Council of Churches? Or perhaps one of the television religious personalities? With the millions of Christians all over the world, there is no consensus (or so it seems) on who is the voice of Christ in His Church today. With the various competing and contradictory claims - each claiming to be the true voice of the Church - it is understandable that some people give up on finding an authoritative word of Christ and say: "We don't need anybody to tell us what it's all about!"

But Jesus Christ does speak and act through His Church on earth even today. And there is a real - not an imaginary - Church of Jesus Christ which is called together by the Holy Spirit in one faith, mind, and understanding (Ephesians 4:3-5). This Church can be found. It can be identified. It can be listened to. It can be recognized ast the very bride of Christ. How?

Stated simply, "The Church is the assembly of saints in which the Gospel is taught purely and the sacraments are administered rightly" (Augsburg Confession). The pure Gospel and rightly administered sacraments identify Christ's Church. That assembly or congregation of Christians which has the pure Gospel does indeed speak for and represent Christ Himself. When this Church speaks, God's children should listen. When this Church acts, God's people should recognize it as Christ Himself acting. Christ absolves the penitent sinner (Mark 1:15, John 20:21-22). Christ baptizes people into His Church (Matt. 28:19-20, Acts 2:38). Christ gives us to eat and drink of His body and blood (Matt. 26:26-28, Mark 14:22-24, Luke 22:19-20, 1 Cor. 11:23-25). Christ preaches through the pure doctrine proclaimed from the pulpit (Mark 16:15-16, Romans



Prices on lunches have remained fairly stable. In 1964, elementary age students paid 35 cents; students paid 60 cents; and adult tickets cost \$1.00. Present lunchroom fees are: 85 cents for elementary age students; \$1.00 for junior high and high school sutdents and \$1.40 for adults.



Third grade classes experience star gazing

Though the rhyme "twinkle, twinkle little star", brings back memories of childhood, amateur star gazers led by Peter and Paul Shacklette learned that planets, not stars do most of the twinkling in the dark, clear skies.

Two third grade classes and several adults traveled seven miles north of Ozona May 16 to hear how the Greek gods discovered and charted their way by Polaris, the Orion bull and Venus (the evening

Most junior and adult astronomers easily envisioned the Big Dipper shining brightly in the star-filled night sky. Craters on the half moon were glimpsed through two fought over pairs of binoculars. The bright half moon which lighted the way also restricted the number of star for-

Within 20 minutes of the initial sightings, southeastern clouds rushed across the sky and obscured

Time to control casebearer

Insecticide application for control of the pecan nut casebearer in Ozona should be made on May 25 plus or minus three days.

Control measures should be applied to control the small casebearer larvae just after the larvae hatch and before they begin to tunnel into the nutlets (two days

There will be some difference in the time that casebearer hatch between pecan varieties. To determine the exact time to control casebearer, the nutlet may be inspected daily for eggs and the first casebearer damaged nutlet. When the first damaged nutlet is observed, control measures should be applied.

Homeowners can use Zolone,

control. Commercial producers may use Guthion R, Carbaryl, Malathion, Phosalone (Zolone R). Follow the directions on the label for mixing and applying the spray treatment.

Zinc should be applied to the foliage of pecan trees when applying an insecticide for casebearer control. Regular zinc applications are needed for good development of pecans and terminal growth.

The May 25 date was predicted by the pecan nut casebearer model. Temperature data was accumulated for the county starting in late March and ending in mid May. From that point, historical weather data for May was used to predict the date when larvae begin entering nutlets. This level of accuracy is, in general, close enough to time insecticide Malathion, or Carboryl (Sevin R) for application for effective control.

Ranchers Roundup new look

Roundup has put on a new face. According to Drs. Dwight Guynn and Tom Troxel of Uvalde, coordinators of this year's meeting, many changes have been made in this annual educational event.

The IRR has been shortened by one day and will be held later in the summer, August 18-21, than past IRR meetings. The Y-O Hilton in Kerrville will be the official IRR headquarters, but some activities will be held at the Inn of the Hills.

'We are designing this year's IRR to be the best ever," said Guynn. "We are striving for the best information that is practical and applicable for ranchers. This year's IRR in Kerrville will have the luxury of the Y-O Hilton and the Inn of the Hills as a backdrop for a meeting that ranchers will never forget."

The meeting is sponsored annually by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service to provide ranchers an opportunity to learn the latest management styles, techniques and technology. In addition, a special selection of ranchers have been scheduled on the program to tell what they have found most important in making their ranches successful. "IRR coordinators make a special effort to insure that ranchers with proven, successful methods are a major part of the program," Guynn said.

The theme for this year's meeting will be "Resource Management for Ranching Success." Guynn said, "We realize that agriculture in general and ranching in particular, is suffering some hard times. The IRR

The 1986 International Rancher's is aimed at addressing that exact issue by showing ranchers what is being done by innovators in ranching to maintain profitability."

> Past meetings have included speakers from New Zealand, South Africa, Hawaii and Mexico, as well as many parts of the state. This year's IRR speakers will include, among others, James Innes, a rancher from Haldon Station, Central South Island, New Zealand. Innes will discuss new Genepool cattle breeding programs, Merino sheep operations "down under", and the New Zealand red deer farming operations.

Others who have been asked to speak include two of the owners of Tom Brothers Ranch, Campbellton; Claudia Ball, owner-operator of Hudspeth River Ranches in West Texas; Robin Giles, a Kendall County rancher; and Geoff Nielson, the New Zealand-born manager of Twin Creeks Ranch near Devine.

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
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
