



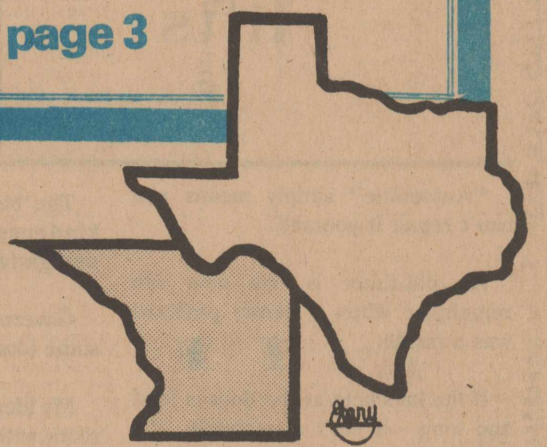

Commencement exercises honor 46 graduates

For 1986 Ozona High School seniors the bridge between childhood and adulthood would take slightly more than one hour the evening of May 30 at Lion Stadium. The commencement exercises on the windy, cool, slightly overcast evening marked more than just an ending to childhood; it marked the beginning of the unknown, the beginning of endless horizons and fulfilling careers and dreams.

Commencement started on a traditional note, with Ozona High School secretary Barbara Burger playing the familiar refrains of "Pomp and Circumstance. The orderly procession began with junior escorts Vickie Reagor and Rodney Beasley leading the way for the 46 soon to be graduates.

For some, the measured steps along the black asphalt track from the field house to midfield seemed like an eternity. For others, the path was easy and they were full of youth full confidence and exuberance. For all, the walkway marked the end of a special portion of their lives and the start of something new. Junior escorts Alma Gutierrez and Roger Flores concluded the processional. Each girl escort was dressed in lovely floor-length white gowns of cotton eyelet and satin, each escort boy in black fitted tuxedos.

Cum laude honor student Raedene Flores opened the commencement with an invocation. "Thank you for being here. We have shared joys, laughter, tears and pain. All our experiences helps us to appreciate our opportunities. We offer a special prayer for assistance given by our teachers, parents and family. "Keep and guide all of us."

The program continued with a brief welcome speech by salutatorian David Adams. "On behalf of the class of 1986, I welcome all our parents, friends and teachers to our commencement. We are proud to reach our goal, but it is time to move on." Referring to poet Robert Browning's advice that a person's reach must exceed his grasp, Adams said "now is the time to reach out . . . Maturity is marked by how well you achieve the goals . . . This is a time to begin again and have new goals and develop new perspectives in life."

Third ranking cum laude student Harvey Fierro continued the fast moving program with a brief look back in his speech "Memories." "I am honored to be addressing you. I now realize how much everyone has helped us. We need to remember." Fierro remembered the difficult road faced by the 1986 class, that included the death of two fellow classmates in

1985. "We lost two in death, but their souls will walk across this stage tonight . . . High school represents a special part of life. It is a place for preparation. The lessons learned in high school set the foundations for a successful life . . ."

Fierro called on fellow classmates to remember that "what lies within themselves is far more important than that which lies behind or ahead."

A musical duet by alto Raedene Flores and soprano Amy Scoggins changed the pace of the program. In the song, "Friends", both sang about "packing up the dreams God's planted . . . a lifetime is not too long to live as friends. Friends are friends forever."

Fourth ranked cum laude student Brad Thompson tugged a few heartstrings during his "striving for excellence" oration. "We are about to leave and go our separate ways. We must remember to live each day as if it were the last. We must remember to show love, and understanding. We must be supportive of ourselves and set goals for ourselves. We must go beyond goodness and strive for excellence." The transplanted Ohioian who moved to Ozona two years ago then said a special thank you to the school for the two best years of "my life. I

thank my family for everything. I thank my parents for everything. I have a special word of thanks to my mother. I love you Mom and thanks."

The valedictory address by top ranked magna cum laude student Bonnie Cameron continued the theme of excellence, of setting goals. In the poem opening her address, Cameron said, "There is no goal you can't achieve. Believe you are a person and make the world a better place to live." Recognizing that each graduate may have different goals, Cameron said "whatever we do, we must believe in ourselves. There are no certain outcomes in life. As we leave home, we will find that life holds more than a trophy or prize . . . We must believe in ourselves and strive for the best and highest dreams."

The Presidential Academic Fitness awards were presented to six students by High School Principal James Payne. Criteria for receiving the awards include: scoring at least 80 per cent on a national college entrance exam; maintaining a B+ average in 12 units of English, math, science, history, and foreign language. Those receiving the award

Hunting changes adopted

The general white-tailed deer hunting season will be Nov. 8, 1986 through Jan. 4, 1987. The archery-only deer season only will be Oct. 4 through Nov. 2.

Establishment of a uniform statewide white-tailed deer hunting season was among a number of hunting regulation changes adopted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission in a public meeting in Austin Thursday.

The commission set season dates and bag limits for most game animals and birds, except those for migratory species and quail bag limits which will be adopted later.

The statewide whitetail season represents the first time in modern history that all Texas counties will have the same season dates.

The Commission also added 59

counties to the either-sex system of deer bag limits. Special antlerless tags will be issued to landowners with no limit as to acreage required for taking antlerless white-tailed deer. The counties experience chronic overpopulations of does.

The commission also authorized an either-sex archery bag limit for whitetails in counties where antlerless deer were harvested during the past gun season.

In Pecos and Terrell Counties the bag limit will be changed from one turkey, gobbler or bearded hen, to two turkeys, either sex. In Ward and Crane Counties, the bag limit will be changed from two turkeys, gobblers or bearded hens, to two turkeys, either sex. This provides Texas with one standard fall turkey season and two bag limits.

Silver Haired election draws few voters

Crockett County residents age 60 and above did not turn out in droves Friday, May 30, to vote in the Silver Haired Legislature election. Only 49 voted Friday, and 11 voted earlier by

absentee ballot, said County Extension Agent Rachel Hall. The election to select two rural representatives to the Silver Haired Legislature was conducted locally through Hall's office.

Representatives elected for the rural district are Jack Conaway of Junction with 454 votes and Margaret Martin of Bronte with 447. Other candidates were: Bonnie Sandel of Big Lake, 279; Troy Williams of Ozona, 258; Tom Ratliff of Eldorado, 223; Chuck Hubbard of Rochelle, 219; and Billy Ray Dugan of Menard, 105.

Results in Crockett County were: Williams 45, Sandel 14, Hubbard 5, Ratliff 4, Martin 4, Conaway 2 and Dugan 0.

The two seats allotted for Tom Green County were won by Eugene W. Jones, 449, and Virginia Black, 320. The other two Tom Green candidates, C. D. Henry and Ina Ingram, garnered 293 and 289 votes respectively.

Approximately 3,000 senior citizens voted in the 13 Concho Valley Area Agency on Aging counties. The elected representatives will serve without pay when the legislature meets this for the first time this fall in Austin. The group was established to deal with legislative issues affecting senior citizens.

Drought ending rains continue to fall

Rains continued for the third week in Crockett County, bringing smiles to both backyard gardeners and drought stricken ranchers.

The rains Sunday and Monday were heavier to the south and west of Ozona. Henry Sellers reported the Ralph Watson ranch west of Ozona had received 10 inches since the rains started three weeks ago.

"It's rained so much, I've almost lost track," said Sellers. The welcome rains have helped the "land recover from the edge of disaster". The latest amount included one inch of rain Monday evening.

Down on the Pecos west of Ozona, B. B. Ingham reported the first substantial rain, with 2.5 inches in three days this week. The P. L. Childress ranch east of Ozona reported receiving three inches of precipitation since the drought ending rains started three weeks ago.

The R. A. Harrell ranch south of Ozona received .30 inch Monday night.

Armentrout service

Allie Armentrout died Sunday, June 1, 1986 in the Crockett County Care Center. He was 90 years of age.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church of Ozona, with the Rev. Jim Gray officiating. Burial was in Cedar Hill Cemetery, directed by Sizemore Funeral Home.

Mr. Armentrout was born August 12, 1895 in San Saba to John and Addie Vick Armentrout. He was married to Mae Gilbert on September 1, 1919 in Ozona.

After serving in World War I, Armentrout worked as a mechanic before going into business for himself as a concrete contractor. After his retirement, he and his wife built ornamental concrete items such as bird baths, planters and door stops.

Armentrout was a member of First Baptist Church.

He is survived by his wife, Mae Armentrout of Ozona; two daughters, Allie Mae Parker of Ozona and Helen Lucille Patterson of Luling; two sons, George B. Armentrout of Bedford and James Gilbert Armentrout of Midland; nine grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Northwest of Ozona Mrs. Frank McMullan reported the Live Oak Ranch had just received showers this week. Monday night, the ranch rain gauge measured $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch. Buddy Moore south of Ozona has received three and $\frac{1}{2}$ inches since the storms began.

The continuing downpours have sent the Crockett County Road Department into a constant flurry of activity to stem the pavement washouts prevalent throughout the county.

Several pavement washouts have been reported. Extensive damage on Pike's Peak Road has caused some washout, Pat Aiguier of the Crockett County Road Department reported Tuesday.

Other areas of washouts and pavement damage include Clayton's Big Mill road and the Vic Montgomery Road.

The Johnson Draw Road by Earl Acton's and the Pierce ranches have sustained heavy road damage. Live Oak Draw crossings have washed out. Pavement has been washed away completely on Miller Lane.

Portions of the Howard Draw Road have washed out, and low water crossings are running water.

Damage on Taylor Box Road east of Ozona has been minimal, with no pavement loss, but some water is running across the road in low areas.

West of Ozona, the B. B. Ingham road has some crossings washed out.

On the Holmsley road, many portions are standing with water, and several crossings have washed out.

The heaviest damage to ranch roads occurred south of Ozona, Mrs. Aiguier said. "Many roads are impassable because of high water."

Runoff election

Absentee voting for the June 7 run-off election ended at 5:00 p.m. Tuesday. As of 4:45, 204 persons had voted according to Barbie Meyers of the County Clerk's Office. The turnout for absentee was very good said Mrs. Meyers.

The offices of Justice of the Peace, Commissioner, Precinct 2 and County Chairman are on the ballots for local races.

Raymond Davee and Jerry Lay are on the ballot for the J.P. race. Candidates for Precinct 2 commissioner are incumbent B. W. Stuart and Jerry Hill.

Robert Longoria and Steve Kenley are in the run-off for County Chairman.

The polls will be open Saturday from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Polling places are: Precinct 1, courthouse; Precinct 2, junior high; Precinct 3, Civic Center; Precinct 4, primary school.

County seeks return

of \$600,000 By Cynthia Harrell Hodges

Crockett County officials continued their efforts this week to retrieve \$600,000 confiscated by Department of Public Safety Trooper Cliff Babbitt during a routine speeding violation stop May 11.

According to County Attorney Tom Cameron, Crockett County has filed papers to intervene in a federal lawsuit regarding the monies. The county maintains the confiscated funds were "abandoned, lost or unclaimed in Crockett County. There is insufficient evidence of a drug connection."

The U. S. attorney in the Federal Court in San Angelo has already seized the monies, and "we question their right to do this," Cameron explained.

Crockett County has based its action on a previous case in the early 1980's in Waco, which was decided in favor of the county involved, Cameron said.

Trooper Babbitt discovered the \$600,000 during a followup voluntary investigation of the 1986 Ford Taurus after it had been stopped in response to a speeding violation. The monies were discovered in the trunk of the vehicle. Both Mexican Nationals in the car denied ownership of the funds.

The \$600,000 was turned over to

the DPS Narcotics Division in Austin, and later deposited in an Austin bank. The DPS filed suit with the U. S. District Court in Lubbock May 15 requesting that the cash be awarded to that law enforcement agency.

Charges filed in kidnapping

Two Ohio men were arrested on charges of aggravated kidnapping and aggravated sexual abuse May 31 after being accused of keeping an Indiana woman against her will.

The victim, who said she was taken from Junction, reported that she was thrown from their 18-wheel truck in Crockett County. She was brought to local officers by passing motorists.

The suspects were apprehended in Pecos County. They have been released on \$8,000 bond.

The case remains under investigation by the Crockett County Sheriff's Department.

Charges were filed May 30 against a 60-year-old Ozona man on indecency with a child. This case was

investigated by Sheriff's Office personnel and the Child Welfare investigator. The suspect was released into the custody of his family after posting a \$5,000 bond.

On May 29, a 31 year old Ozona man was arrested by sheriff's deputies for public intoxication and unlawfully carrying a weapon. Subject was released after paying a \$200 fine and posting a \$500 cash bond.

A 29 year old Iranan man entered jail May 30 to begin serving a 10 day sentence for driving while intoxicated.

A 33 year old Ozona man was arrested by THP and sheriff's deputies May 30 for driving while intoxicated. He was released the next day after posting a \$500 bond.

Alien apprehension up 45%

Statistics for the month of May for the Border Patrol in Ozona show 229 deportable aliens apprehended. This is an 80% increase over apprehensions for May of 1985. Currently the Border Patrol in Ozona is running 45% over last year in total persons apprehended.

A total of 12 aliens were apprehended while being smuggled into the United States. On May 7, a United States citizen and an illegal alien were arrested transporting three other illegal aliens to Denver City.

On May 21 Sheriff's Department officers in Big Lake intercepted three illegal aliens transporting nine other illegal aliens to Ft. Worth agents.

On May 26 Border Patrol agents apprehended an illegal alien who had attempted to make a false claim to United States citizenship using documents that belonged to another. The alien, apprehended on a ranch in Crockett County where he was employed, was taken before the U.S. Magistrate in Del Rio where criminal charges were filed.

Several local retired Border Patrol Agents spent three days recently in Nashville, Texas where they attended a convention of the Fraternal Order of Retired Border Patrol Officers.

During the convention, members were given a speech by Border Patrol Commissioner Roger Brandemuehl of Washington, D. C. In his speech, Chief Brandemuehl released the following facts.

In 1965, the United States Border

Patrol apprehended a total of 65,000 illegal aliens.

In 1975, 700,000 illegal aliens were apprehended.

In 1985, the Border Patrol apprehended 1.2 million illegal aliens.

For 1986, it is estimated the Border Patrol will apprehend 1.8 million illegal aliens.

In 1985, the United States Border Patrol made 885 seizures with a total value of \$110 million.

For the first six months of fiscal year 1986, The Border Patrol has already made 764 seizures with an undetermined value.

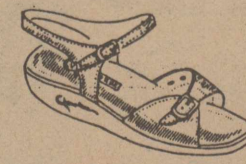

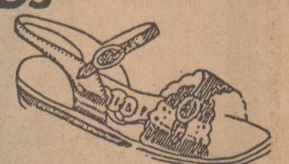

Household goods were spilled from the trailer in the accident. Investigating officer was Richard Barton.

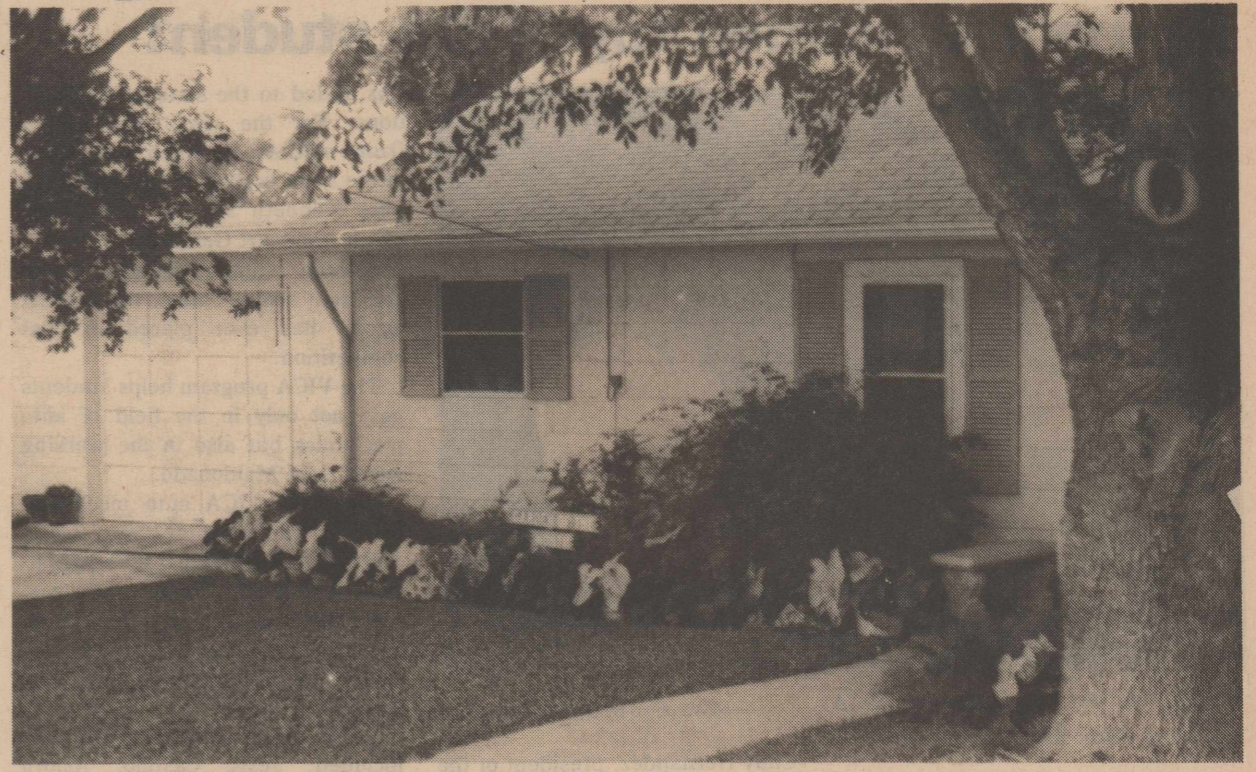

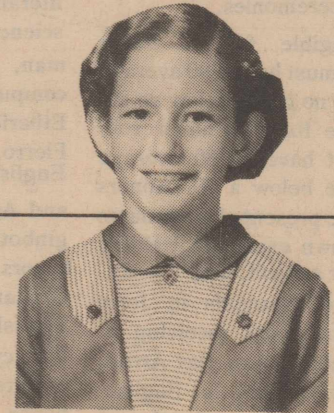

Third place went to Danny Sanchez in the 3200 meter run May 16.

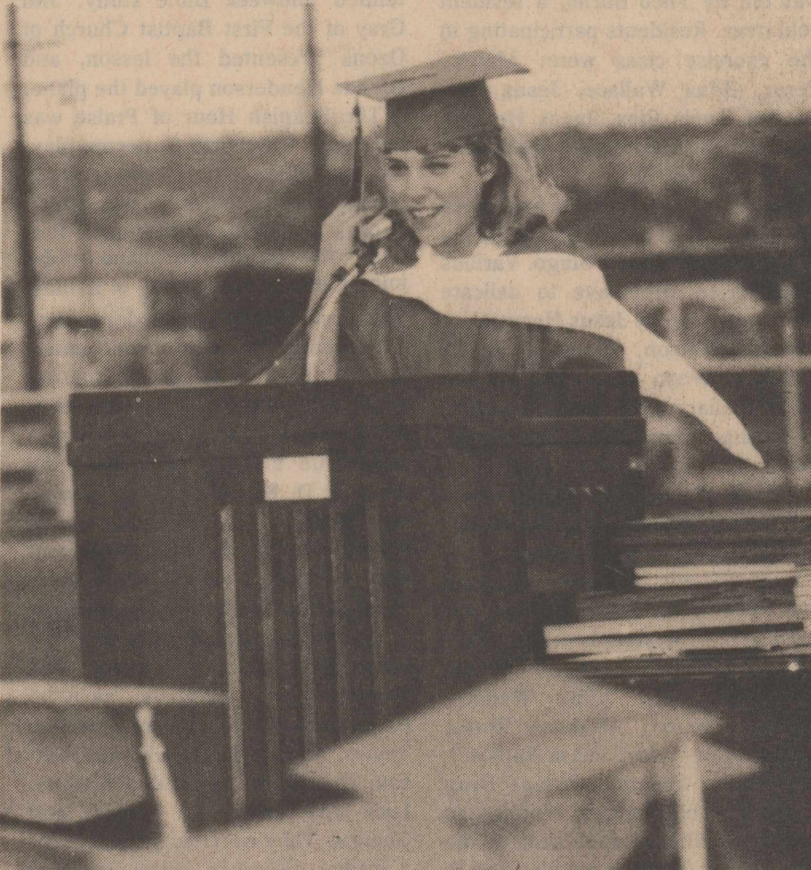

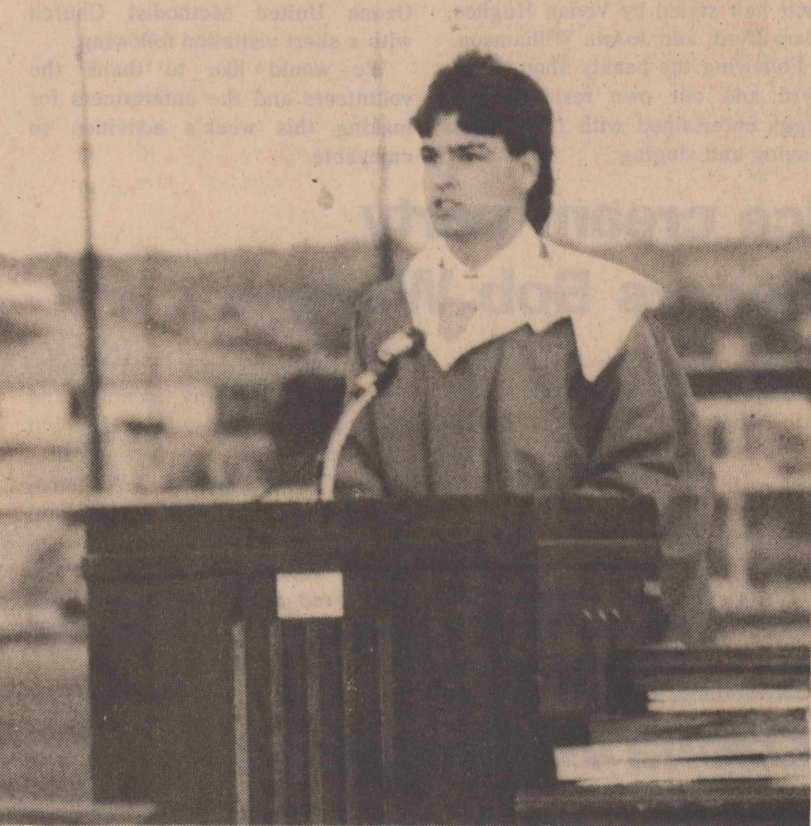

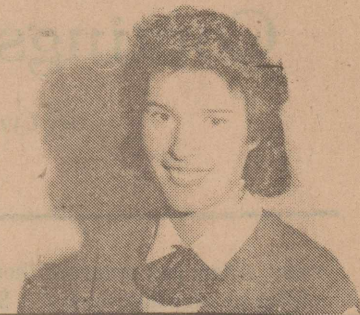

Rachel's reviews

Vitamins and minerals are undergoing a promotional craze. Health food stores, door-to-door sales, and newspaper and magazine articles promise that the consumption of vitamin or mineral supplements will increase good health. Americans are concerned about their health, but many have misconceptions about what vitamin and mineral supplements can do to improve health.

According to a recent USDA study, about 40 percent of the U. S. population uses vitamin and mineral supplements. Only seven percent of these people take the supplements under the guidance of a physician. Vitamin and mineral "over-dosing" has become a major threat, causing problems from intestinal disorders to liver damage. Every 24 hours, 11 people in the U. S. are treated by a doctor for vitamin or mineral toxicity, while many more cases are never seen by a doctor.

The Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council/National Academy of Sciences publishes guidelines known as Recommended Dietary Allowances. These are defined as "the levels of intake of essential nutrients considered adequate to meet the known nutritional needs of practically all healthy persons". The RDAs are not "minimums" or "requirements" and the level for each nutrient is deliberately set higher than most people need.

Very small amounts of vitamins and minerals are needed by the body. Just one ounce (28.3 grams) of vitamin B12 is enough of this vitamin to supply the daily needs of 4,724,921 people. The RDA for an adult is six micrograms per day.

The average person can get an adequate amount of all essential nutrients by following the Basic Food

Groups - four servings of fruits and vegetables, four servings of breads and cereals, two servings of meats, and two to four milk servings. Adhering to this recommended minimum, with reasonable portion sizes, provides about 1200 calories and adequate amounts of all essential vitamins and minerals that the body needs.

There are relatively few segments of the population who are at risk for deficiencies including: pregnant and lactating women, casual vegetarians, single eaters, persons that restrict a whole food group due to allergies, and those on extreme reducing diets.

Three issues should be involved in deciding whether to take vitamin supplements: need, safety and cost. Most people take supplements of "insurance" to be sure they get enough. Once the decision is made to take a supplement, the following will be useful in choosing safe amounts.

- Choose a balanced multivitamin, rather than specific nutrients (unless medically prescribed). Excessive levels can disrupt the body's balance.

- Choose a preparation that provides 100 percent of RDA, since extra doses create toxic effects.

- Avoid preparations containing unrecognized nutrients, since they only increase cost.

- Ignore "natural" versus "synthetic" claims since most synthetic preparations are more effective.

- Expiration dates are necessary since preparations lose potency with time.

However, the best way to get vitamins is from foods in a balanced diet. Rather than taking vitamins for "insurance", evaluate your diet to determine whether you are eating a variety of foods. The best course of action to save money, health, and safety is to improve eating habits.

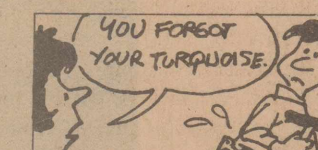

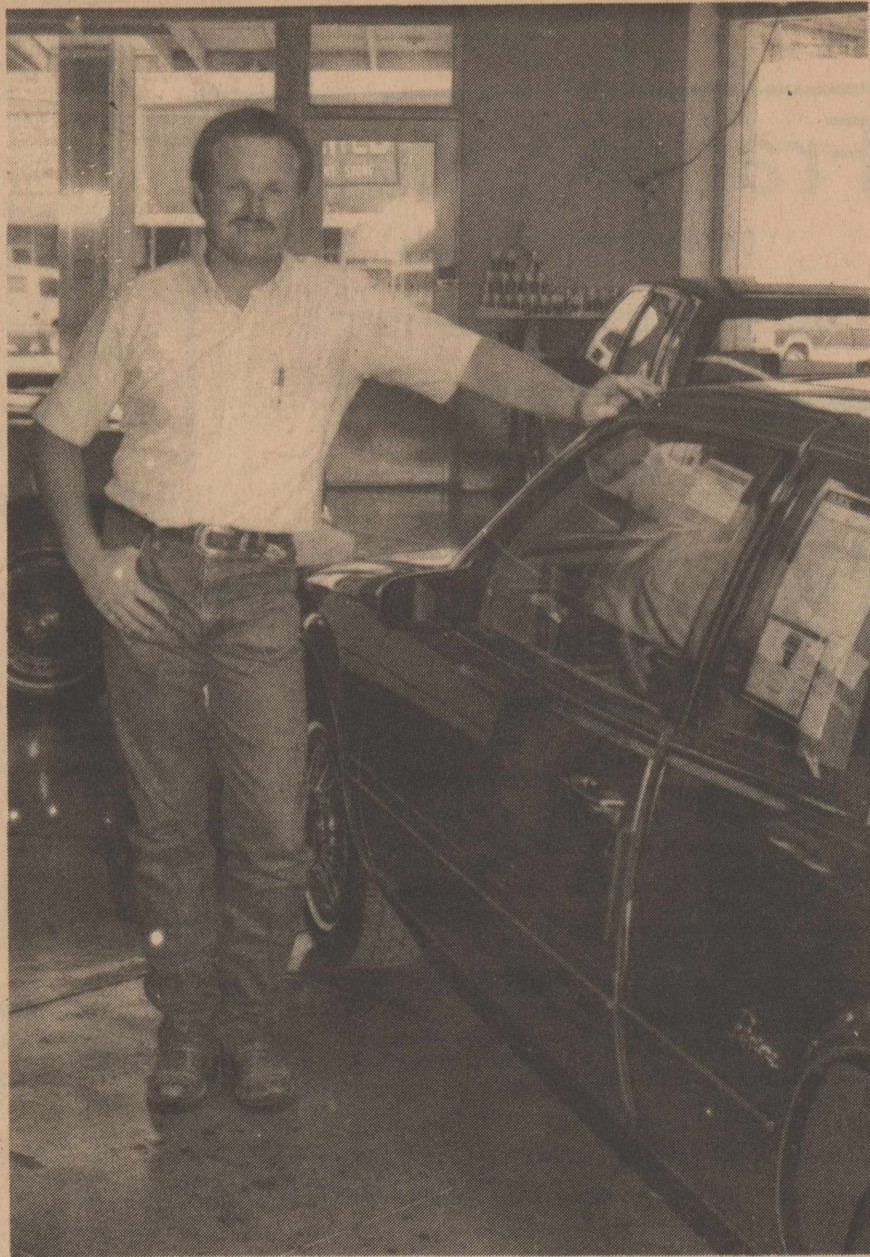

Tale of Indian captivity

The Texas Sesquicentennial is being observed in a special way by one Texas Family.

The Boy Captives, a book written by Clinton L. Smith and first published in 1927, has been republished and copies are now available.

The book accounts the true story of brothers Clinton L. and Jeff D. Smith and how they were captured by the Comanche Indians.

Allen Smith Jr. of Ozona is the grandson of Clinton L. Smith.

Clinton was nine and Jeff six at the time of their capture in 1869. They were herding sheep on their father's ranch on Cibolo Creek near Dripping Springs.

The two boys were the sons of Henry M. and Fannie Short Smith. Henry came to Texas from Pennsylvania and settled near Austin prior to the Texas Revolution. He and Fannie were married in Austin in 1841.

Because of constant Indian raids, the couple moved to San Antonio where Henry later became San Antonio City Sheriff. He also owned

a blacksmith and gun shop in San Antonio.

The Smiths moved to Dripping Springs after the Civil War. Clinton and Jeff were two of their nine children.

After the two boys were captured, a search party led by Charles Schreiner of Kerrville was formed to track down the boys. The party followed for over 240 miles before losing the boys and their captors near Fort Concho.

The brothers remained in captivity for five years.

In his book, Clinton recounts his family life prior to the capture and how he eluded the Indians five times before they finally seized him and his brother.

The first person account as related by Smith also tells how he was adopted by a Comanche chief named Tosacowadu. Jeff was later sold to Apache Chief Geronimo. Jeff's life with the famous Indian chief is also told.

Clinton L. Smith lived in Edwards County from 1910 until his death in 1932. He is buried in the Rock-springs Cemetery.

His son, Milton Smith of Rock-springs, owns the copyright to his father's book, and after much demand for the writing, he and other family members decided to republish their father's story.

The 219 page paper cover book is available in Ozona from Allen Smith at 1105 Avenue G, or can be purchased at Thornton's Super-market, Shot's, Village Barber and Beauty Shop, Circle Bar Gift Shop and T & T Grocery.

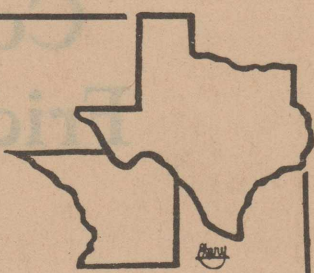

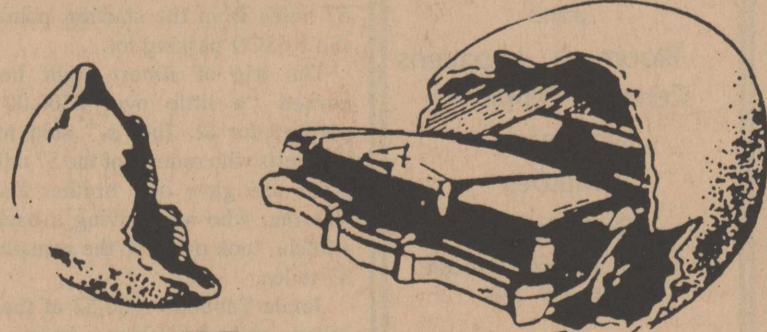
