An Iraan youth died Monday in Crockett County following a one vehicle rollover on River Road. Clinton Alan Harris, a 17-year-old student at Iraan High School, and his two companions were thrown from a 1966 Ford pickup driven by Harris 9.4 miles southeast of Iraan in a 10:45 a.m. accident. Harris apparently lost control of the vehicle on the hilly road and went into a broadside skid before overturning. The cab came loose from the frame of the vehicle, and none of the youths were wearing seatbelts according to the DPS report.

Casey Wayne Miller, 14, of Iraan, was treated in Iraan and taken to Medical Center Hospital in Odessa for treatment of internal injuries and a broken leg.

John Handley Kent, 15, also of Iraan, was treated at Iraan hospital and released.

Five other accidents were investigated in Crockett County during the

Jan. 13-Jan. 18 period. There were no injuries in these accidents. On Jan. 13, Sue Grauke of

Fredericksburg struck the guard rail 15 miles west of Ozona on I-10. A 1986 Chevrolet driven by Grauke left the roadway. When the driver corrected, she apparently lost

control of the vehicle. Marty Scott was the driver of a 1981 Mack truck involved in a one vehicle accident Jan. 14 at 5:15 p.m. The truck, owned by Deene Holden, was pulling a water tank trailer at the time of the accident.

The report of the investigating officer indicates that Scott had pulled on to Hwy. 163 from Bob White Drive and was proceeding south at the time of the accident.

The driver pulled the vehicle onto the sloping shoulder of the road, causing the load of water to shift and overturn the truck into the ditch. The accident was reported at 5:15

p.m

Two accidents were investigated on Jan. 16. A 1979 Honda driven by Daniel Price of Huntington Beach. CA overturned one time and came back to rest on its wheels 26 miles west of Ozona on I-10. Price was eastbound at the time of the accident. He reported that the wind blew his vehicle off the road. According to the accident report, the driver overcorrected and went into a broadside skid before overturning.

Dora Perez, driver of a 1985 Buick, was in collision with a 1985 Chevrolet pickup driven by Ethel Young. The accident occured when Perez was westbound on First Street and the Young vehicle was eastbound and attempting a left turn into a parking area on the west side of Ave. H.

Voth Prak of Mobile, Alabama was the driver of a 1979 Chevrolet which overturned on the overpass in Ozona Jan. 17. Prak's vehicle, which was pulling a trailer, overturned one time when the driver lost control after striking a patch of ice.


TS&GRA winter meeting, Jan. 29

The Lions outscored McCamey decisively in the first period, fastbreaking their way to an 11 point


lead. Ozona was good for 15 first quarter points on offense, while dusting off their once stagnant man-to-man defense to hold the Badgers to a measley four points.

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
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

The value of human life

The year was 1972; the place was Pennsylvania; and the occasion was a hearing to consider liberalization of the old abortion law. Gov. Shapp had been appointed a commission to take testimony from people of varying positions.

Testifying for abortion-on-demand were a Unitarian clergyman and his wife. He told of how excited he was when his wife informed him that a fourth child was on the way. But she convinced him that he was on a male ego trip while she, herself, wanted an abortion. Claiming to be democratic about the whole matter, she testified as to how they had gathered together their three grade school children, telling them that if this child were to be born, they would have to double up in their rooms. The camping trip they had plan-

ned for the summer would most likely have to be cancelled, and surely the bikes they wanted for Christmas would be impossible. Then they were told they could vote! The mother, father and two boys voted for an abortion, while the little girl pleaded for the life of her unborn brother or sister. But majority ruled, and so the abortion was carried out. One of the members of the Commission asked the mother how she could have denied the pleading of her daughter to spare the life of the unborn child, to which the mother shrugged her shoulders and said: 'Well, you can't give your children everything they want'! Translation: It's better to be a bicycle than a baby - and a camping trip is of more value than human life! Another member of the Commission observed that this was probably not the last death caucus to, our Lord Himself said: 'You, My be convened by the family, for the day would most likely come when the mother would need a place in the family - when their vacation plans would need to be revised if she were added to the family; when their budget would have to involve sacrifice in order to provide for her. But...they would have learned all too well the lesson they had been taught by the mother herself of how to deal with unwanted human beings Elimination! And as our logic would tell us, the next steps in the growing disregard for human life are showing themselves today in infanticide and euthanasia!

wounded him and left him half dead (Luke 10:30FF). There came that way a priest, a religious man, and when he saw him he thought, 'Well, I wouldn't rob a traveler myself but I support the right of others to choose'. So he passed by on the other side. Then there passed that way a Levite, a law-abiding citizen. and when he saw him he thought. Well, every man should be wanted and obviously this one wasn't'. So he passed by on the other side.

They had all the facts, they saw all there was to see and they made a choice. Their value of man way rooted in the affections of another And then there came that way a

Samaritan, one of different values and different beliefs, and when he saw him, Scripture says he had compassion on him and history has forever called him 'good'. But not until he had invested his time. his treasure, his talents. Not until he had set aside his plans, his schedule for his was not compassion by proxy. God's love is always expressed through the giving of self, through sacrifice for others.

Today, many Christians are too embarrassed to publicly contradict anything, and instead of living as God's 'Chosen' people to give leadership in overcoming the devaluation of human life and in the preservation of human life, have become God's 'frozen' people afflicted with moral laryngitis. How many of us say: 'Yes, Lord, I will follow You...but about my cross...I don't want one like Yours. Make mine lightweight, collapsible, transferable, and with a money-back guarantee. That's for when it becomes inconvenient, unpopular and controversial'! But that's not what the cross is all about!

Christians cannot be neutral, for followers, are the salt of the earth' (Matthew 5:13). He said salt cannot be neutral, and if it is - it is good for nothing! We cannot say: 'Well, I wouldn't have an abortion myself, but I support the right of others to

choose'. That may sound so American, so democratic, so Christian until we apply that same philosophy to other areas of human rights. Would we think it very American if some were to say: 'I wouldn't enslave a black myself, but I support the right of others to choose', and there were some Americans who said that! Would we think it very democratic if some were to say: 'I wouldn't gas a Jew myself, but I support the right of others to choose', and there were some Germans who lived that! Would we defend someone as Christian who said: 'I wouldn't rape a woman myself, but I support the right of others to choose'. So we can see how morally and ethically bankrupt this is. Christians must come to see that we are responsible not only for what we do ourselves but also for what we allow to be done. That is American, democratic and Christian!

Concerning the 5th Commandment, "Do Not Murder", Martin Luther explains in his large catechism: "In the second place this commandment is violated not only when the person actually does evil, but also when he fails to do good to his neighbor, or, though he has the opportunity, fails to prevent, protect and save him from suffering bodily harm or injury. If you send a person away naked when you could clothe him, you have let him freeze to death. If you see anyone suffer hunger and do not feed him, you have let him starve. Likewise, if you see anyone condemned to death (innocently) or in similar peril and do not save him although you know ways and means to do so, you have killed him. It will do you no good to plead that you did not contribute to his death by word or deed, for you have withheld your love from him and robbed him of the service by which his life might have been saved'

Likewise, God's Holy Word speaks to the same issue in Proverbs 24:11-12, where it is written: "Deliver those who are being taken to

Cholesterol - getting to the heart of the problem

Are you afraid of things that don't go thump. thump in the night? Like your heart. for example. Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United states, but it's probably the most misunderstood disease around.

The biggest misconception surrounding this disease centers around the role of cholesterol. Many Americans have banished red meat from their diets because of cholesterol. If this is what you've done, take another look. The facts may pleasantly surprise you.

Coronary heart disease is caused by coronary atherosclerosis, an irregular thickening of the walls of the arteries that supply blood to the heart muscle. The primary cause or causes of atherosclerosis are not sis.

known

Statistics have shown that persons with elevated serum cholesterol levels are more likely to develop atherosclerosis than those with normal levels. Because of this link, some scientists believe that dietary control may reduce the risk of developing heart disease. Scientific experiments, however, have yet to prove this hypothesis.

Even when no cholesterol is consumed, the body manufactures between 800 to 1,500 milligrams daily anyway. Cholesterol is an essential part of body chemistry and the body will fight to keep it around. Many scientists believe that high blood cholesterol is probably a sign, rather than a cause, of atherosclero-

Even though scientists disagree on all the causes, individuals can take certain steps to minimize risk factors generally associated with atherosclerosis. Cigarette smoking, lack of exercise, obesity, stress and high blood pressure contribute to heart disease and most scientists agree that they should be controlled.

As for cutting down on dietary cholesterol, the debate rages, but most experts agree that it can't hurt. The American Heart Association recommends 100 grams of cholesterol per day. At 65 milligrams of cholesterol per three-ounce serving, broiled top loin fits well within AHA's recommendation. So enjoy. At that low level, your heart can safely go thump, thump in the night without your tummy going grrr, grrr.


