Kost came to Ozona in 1933, arriving on the bus. The Wellington, Kansas native worked for A. W. Jones at the Ozona Boot and Saddlery until he bought the business in 1940. He had learned shoe repair and boot making in Wichita, Kansas where he graduated from high school.

Kost made boots, saddles and all types of leather goods until he sold his business in 1976.

In February of 1955, he and four others started the cable television service. He managed the system until it sold in 1985.


Julian Ramirez, 74, of Ozona died, Jan. 30, 1987, in Angelo Community Hospital.



PUMPING DIETARY IRON

How much iron has your child pumped today? How much have you? No, not the kind with barbells and muscle shirts. This iron is strictly dietary, and the lack of this mineral in the American diet is affecting the well-being of millions.

Adult women and young children in the United States consume only about two-thirds of their recommended dietary iron allowance, according to the Department of Agriculture's 1985 Nationwide Food Consumption Survey. In fact, iron is one of the nutrients most often lacking in the American diet.

It's not the only mineral Americans are forgetting to pump either. The statistics for zinc are equally sad. Women from 19-50 years consume only an average 61 percent of the Recommended Daily Allowance of zinc. Children, 1-3, fall short of their zinc RDA by an average 23 percent.

Shortages of either nutrient can cause serious health problems. Diets lacking in iron can lead to anemia, irritability, apathy, and reduced work capacity. Digestion is hindered and resistance to infection lowered. Fingernails can become thin, spoon-

shaped and pale in color. Zinc shortages will lead to loss of appetite, poor growth, retarded sexual maturity and skin changes, such as scaly dermatitis. Zinc is also important for proper healing of wounds and resistance to infection.

How do you ensure an adequate supply of iron and zinc in the diet? One of the best ways is to include red meat. Red meat is an excellent source of iron and zinc.

There are two types of dietary iron: heme iron and nonheme iron. The body absorbs heme iron five to 10 times better than the nonheme version. Plant sources supply nonheme iron while animal sources supply both. About 40-60 percent of the iron in beef and other red meats is heme iron.

Zinc content of foods is highest in foods with a high protein content. It is also found in vegetable protein sources such as nuts and whole grain breads and cereals. However, just because you include foods high in zinc, doesn't mean that your body will get enough zinc. The availability of zinc differs from one food to another. Cereals and legumes contain significant amounts of zinc, but they also contain other substances which act to inhibit zinc availability. Red meat, on the other hand, has a high zinc content as well as high

Provisions for agricultural employers under the Immigration Reform and Control Act

The Immigration Control and Legalization Amendments Act of 1986 was signed into law in December 1986 and is now in effect. The legislative swiftness has not been matched by the system as many specific regulations and government forms have not yet been issued.

Following is a list of the provisions which will affect agricultural em-

-The law makes it illegal to knowingly hire, recruit, or refer for a fee, any person not authorized to work in this country. It establishes stiff penalties for violators. It applies to all employers regardless of size or

number of workers employed. -The law requires employers to inspect documents and attest to the legal right to work of every person hired. It establishes penalties for employers who do not comply with this paperwork requirement even if no illegal aliens are employed. Again, no exceptions are granted.

-The law provides a mechanism that will allow most agricultural workers to attain legal status. If the workers can show they have worked 90 or more man-days in the of documents meets the criteria as production and harvesting of perishable agricultural commodities during the year beginning May 1, 1985, they can obtain temporary resident status and, after two years, become permanent residents. For those workers who worked 90

man-days in the same capacity described above in each of the three years ending May 1, 1984, 1985, and 1986, they may become residents after one year. The number allowed permanent status under the threeyear consecutive years of work provision is limited to 350,000. Once either group has obtained permanent status, however, they have no obligation to continue to work in

-Anyone who can show continual residence since Jan. 1, 1982, can be months an may be granted per-

manent status after that period. -During a four-year period from 1989-1993, the law allows admission of a limited number of aliens to perform field work in fruits, vegetables and other perishable commodities if it is determined they are needed. Those admitted are obligated to do at least 90 man-days of such work for three consecutive years. They then can stay in the U.S. permanently but have no further obligation to work in agriculture.

Documentation of Work Status

Based on the law, it seems prudent for every employer to ask for documentation of legal status prior to employment. Any of the following listing of documents or combination proof of resident status as set forth in

- 1. A U. S. passport.
- 2. Certificate of U. S. citizenship. 3. Certificate of naturalization.
- 4. Resident alien card or other

5. A current foreign passport with a current endorsement allowing the applicant to work in the U.S.

6. Social Security card and a driver's license or other identification card with photo, issued by the

If employers knowingly hire unauthorized aliens, they can be fined between \$250 and \$2,000 for each such employee for a first offense. The second violation carries a fine of \$2,000 to \$5,000 per employee found in violation. After more than two previous citations, the fines range from \$3,000 to \$10,000 per offense. general, an employer is engaging in a pattern or practice of violations, he may face criminal charges which

carry fines and/or jail sentences. There is a period through March 1987 during which no citations will be issued. During the subsequent year through March 1988, a first offender will be cited, but no penalty will be assessed. Second and subsequent violations found during this year, however, will be penalized as outlined in the bill. After March 1987, all violations are subject to the full measure of the bill.

For seasonal agricultural employees (90 man-days in production and harvesting of perishable commodities), no penalty will be imposed for violation until the application period for the seasonal agricultural worker program has ended in October 1988.

The law also addresses workers employed through a labor contractor. If the farmer knows the employees are not authorized to work in the U. s., the farmer is considered to be the one doing the hiring. Any sanctions imposed will be against the farmer.

Employers who do not adhere to the documentation requirements may also be fined. The law mandates employers maintain a record keeping system that verifies they have examined documents presented. Employers may photocopy the documentation. Those employers found in violation shall be fined between \$100 and \$1,000 for each individual for whom the violation occurred.

modern rifles shooting modern ammuniton need surprisingly little attention here. I recommend a bore-guide whenever running a cleaning rod through the bore of a rifle. This'll keep oil from dribbling down into the delicate trigger mechanism and keep the rod in proper alignment with the bore, preventing damage to the rifling. And by the way, whenever possible, clean a rifle from the breech, not from the muzzle. A metal cleaning rod scraping against the rifling at the muzzle, or crown, can create accuracy problems quicker than you think. In some rifles, like lever actions and semi-autos, this can be next to impossible; but with bolt actions there's no excuse not to work through the breech. A patch soaked with one of the commercial solvents, swipes with a good brass-bristled brush to remove old powder or copper fouling accumulated in the rifling. Follow this with a clean, dry patch, and keep using dry patches till the last one comes out clean. The last step in bore care, and one of the most important, is to run through a tight-fitting patch that's been dipped in a light machine oil - a commercial gun oil or common household oil. This will coat the inside of the barrel and prevent rusting from now to next hunting season. Avoid using a solvent type oil, such as WD,40, in them. Moisture can condense in this last step, as this type of oil was not meant to be left on metal indefinitely.

Turning our attention to the external metal surfaces, I recommend taking the rifle out of the stock and giving it a good wiping all over.

by Rod Chalmers Some don't like to do this, as it will invariably affect bullet point of impact when the stock screws are reseated. But that doesn't bother me, 'cause I'm going to sight-in again before next season, anyway. Besides, that rain shower I hunted in before Christmas probably let a little moisture get in between the stock and action (or barrel), and there's nothing like rain water to rust a good gun. After we've wiped all metal surfaces with an oil rag and put

everything back together, we're

ready to wipe off the outside of the

barrel, scope, bolt, trigger guard,

floorplate, and anything else carry-

ing dust, rust and fingerprints. There's something about body chemistry that makes some folks harder on gun metal than others. For instance, I can handle your gun and put it away, and a year from now pick it up and you'll find nothing but prints where I touched it...no rust. But I know a guy that can touch the same gun in the same place, and within a week there'll be rust where he touched it. But regardless of which category you fall into, it's a good idea to wipe that gun with an oil rag every time you handle it and put it away, just to be safe.

Try not to get oil on the wooden stock. Oil darkens the wood and makes it soft in saturated areas. If you want to shine up the stock, use lemon oil or furniture polish, and do that sparingly.

It's not a good practice to leave cartridges in the magazine for a prolonged period of time. Most magazines operate on a spring principle, and leaving that spring depressed for years on end can result in weakening, and might give you feeding problems later on down the road. Anyhow, adhering to principles of gun safety in the home, one shouldn't keep the ammo stored with the gun, unless this is the same one you use for home defense (and unless you live in a concrete house. I like Hoppe's No. 9, can get things bet your neighbors would rather loosened up, then follow with a few you'd use something besides a deer rifle for home defense!).

In our area, rust is not a big problem. But if you have problems with rust in your storage area, there are a number of good products on the market today to minimize this threat. Heating elements, silica bags and other products can keep the moisture away from firearms in storage, and the cost can be easily justified when you consider the value of good firearms at today's prices.

Gun cases, the fleece-lined type, are for carrying guns, not storing zipped-up cases and rust metal as fast as anything. If you must leave the gun in such a case, leave it open

and in a cool, dry place. A little preventative maintenance before storage will pay off, and your rifle will be ready to go next time the leaves start to fall.

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

The bad news:

Felony Crimes

Crockett County Public Library has had money stolen twice from the cash box. The first time, I think, was a spur-of-the-moment, grab-thecash-and-run thing. But, Tuesday night, Jan. 27, the library was broken into, the cash drawer broken

into, and this makes the crime a felony offense. For the record, there will be NO MONEY left in the library at night from now on. All cash will be removed at night, and Sheriff Mills and his deputies will be keeping an eye on the library.

Interface Surgery

CCPL was the meeting place for the Ozona Women's League Tuesday afternoon, Jan. 27. Speakers for the meeting were Dr. Fry from San Angelo and Dr. Tubb from Midland. The doctors presented a program on cosmetic and reconstructive surgery. Dr. Fry began with his specialty, the face and neck, and Dr. Tubb finished up with what he can do with the rest of the body. I was particularly impressed with his presentation of interface surgery.

Dr. Tubb began with a little history, defining reconstructive surgery as attempts to restore the individual to normal, and aesthetic (cosmetic) surgery as attempts to surpass the normal. Recently the term interface surgery has been coined as the interface between cosmetic and reconstructive surgery.

With the recent modification of silicones, new products are now available, in particular, tissue expanders. These silicone "Balloons" were first used in the 1979's to expand normal skin so as to allow removal of birthmarks, tattoos, and ultimately covering the raw tissue with normal thick and healthy skin. Shortly thereafter silicone tissue expanders were used for soft tissue reconstruction to include expansion of remaining skin following mastectomy for breast cancer.

Dr. Tubb showed slides depicting the classical treatment for skin and hair loss following a burn to the scalp, namely a skin graft, of a young girl. There was no hair. He then showed slides demonstrating tissue

expanders, used under the skin of the scalp remaining. The slides illustrated correction of the cosmetic defect, after skin graft removal and sliding the stretched hair bearing skin to the mid scalp to replace the removed graft. This treatment is so important, because now children don't have to go through life bearing the disfigurement of abuse or accident. There is help.

These and similar techniques are now used for repair and reconstruction of a constellation of defects including breast restoration after cancer surgery, removal of birth defects, large scars, tattoos, birthmarks, and the reconstruction of noses or ears after loss from cancer or accident trauma.

Plastic and reconstructive surgery arose as a result of ravages of war by the determined effort of a small group of surgeons in Europe and America who refused to accept that horribly mutilated soldiers could not be restored to near normal appearance. Over one half of a century later, we are much nearer to accomplishing that ideal in the arena of Interface Surgery by the use of tissue expanders.

If you have a child or know of one who needs Interface Surgery, call Dr. Tubb or come by the library for more information. The problem of money can be worked out. There are several agencies set up just for this sort of medical aid. Terry D. Tubb, MD, is a plastic and reconstructive surgeon, practicing in Midland.

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

A dance followed the dinner. Antonio Vasquez is employed by Ladd Petroleum. He has served as lecturer for Knights of Columbus Lions Club.



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A look at 4-H membership

There are 305,000 Texas youth between the ages of nine and 19 that are members of the action-oriented. "learning by doing" program called 4-H.

4-H is the youth share of the educational efforts of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, established in 1915 to diffuse among the people practical information relating to agriculture and home economics.

However, 4-H goes back father than that. 4-H actually had its beginning in 1908 in Jack County when a boys' corn club was organized to help grow better corn. Shortly thereafter, girls got involved as organized groups such as tomato clubs, canning clubs and poultry clubs.

4-H in Texas has grown from an organization for farm boys and girls to one that is quite diverse in its makeup. Girls and boys are about equal in number in the program. Current figures show 152,499 girls to 152,533 boys.

About 66 percent of today's 4-H'ers -- 203,447 -- come from towns and cities larger than 50,000 people. More than 33,000 still live on

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
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
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
