

Texas gas pumps will soon sport new TDLR stickers

AUSTIN – Gas pumps across Texas will soon display new consumer information stickers to reflect the Fuel Metering and Quality Program's new home: the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation. Senate Bill 2119 in the 86th Legislature moved oversight of the Fuel Metering and Quality program to TDLR from the Texas Department of Agriculture as of Sept. 1, 2019.

The new design has a Texas shape and includes information about the amount of state and federal taxes charged for every gallon of fuel sold, as well as a telephone number and a QR code that consumers can use to file a complaint with TDLR regarding the quality or quantity of fuel that was sold. Consumers can also use the contact information to report possible credit card skimmer activity to TDLR. The design also includes a cue to look for possible tampering with a pump that could indicate that a credit card skimmer may have been placed on the device – as well as a reminder to "Drive Friendly – the Texas way."

"The new stickers reflect our agency's commitment to consumer protection and safety. We hope that this reminder that consumers, vendors and TDLR are partners in protecting fuel pumps will resonate with everyone," said TDLR Executive Director Brian Francis. "Motor fuels make the Texas economy prosper. We want to make the process as safe and secure as possible."

The new stickers are available for fueling stations and licensed service companies to order online from TDLR starting today (https://www.tdlr. texas.gov/fmq/fmq.htm).

County stock show starts Tuesday

The 83rd Annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show is set to begin on Tuesday, January 14th and will run through Thursday, January 16th. Board President Greg O'Brian said there are 430 entries ready to impress the judges. He invites everyone to come out to the Friona Event Center and support the local and county 4-H and FFA students. Greg said he would also like to thank all of the volunteers, sponsors, and buyers who make the show such a success and keep it growing.

Judges for the 2020 Show are: Garrett Holder (steers); Leo Sellers (goats and lambs); Emily Turpen (rabbits); and Shane Brinning (barrows). There will be a concession stand open during all of the events.

The Premium Sale will start at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, January 18th. Will sell 140 Head or 40% of each species. Exhibitors will walk through the ring without their animals. Two percent of the selling price of the animals will be retained by the Stock Show Board for repair and improvement of the stock show facilities. Premium on animals will be by the head. Sale order will be Steers, Goats, Barrows, Lambs, and Rabbits. Grand and Reserve Grand of each species will sell in the same order.

2019 Rainfall Data Released


Friona weather tracker John Gurley released his annual rainfall report this past week. The chart shows rain received by the month and year for the past decade. For the calendar year 2019, Friona received 21.34 inches of rain. This year was the 3rd wettest of the decade. The average annual rainfall for the past ten years is 18.80 inches per year.

This year also marked the first time since 2015 that we received some type of moisture in all twelve months. During the decade there were eight months in which we received no measurable precipitation. Also, if you look at the "average" column on the far right of the chart you will notice that Friona received approximately 80% of its rain each year from May through October. On average, August was the wettest month for the past decade.

For the past decade, 2011 was the driest year with only 7.21 inches of rain and 2015 was the wettest with 35.76 inches of rain. Also of note is that Friona received 66.28 inches of rain during the first half of the decade and 121.69 inches during the last half.

83rd Annual Parmer County Stock Show Regulations

GENERAL REGULATIONS

1. ELIGIBILITY: The Parmer County Junior Livestock Show is open to all 4-H & FFA members under the supervision of the county agent or vocational agriculture teachers of the county. Exhibitors must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four public schools in the county or they must be a resident of Parmer County attending a home/private school in grades 3 through 12. All exhibitors must be verified in the Quality Counts Program. The youngster's Quality Counts number must be on each entry card.

2. Entry cards and fees must be returned to the exhibitor's supervisor. All en-tries are due the third Friday of December. Late fees will be double and cash only. Entry fees have been set at a rate of \$15.00/steer; \$15.00/lamb; and \$15.00/ barrow and \$15.00/goat, and \$5.00/Rabbit, Heifer \$30.00.

3. Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show.

4. Weigh-in will be as follows: Sheep, and Goats will classified and weighed in from 2:00 until 5:00 p.m. Tuesday. Barrows will be classified as weighed from 2:00-6:30 p.m. Wednesday. Re-weighs : any animal that does not weigh within the required weight ranges at its first weigh-in will be allowed one re-weigh. The re-weigh must occur during the scheduled weigh-in time. Beef check in on Tuesday turn in Steer weights.

5. Validation tags will be used for ear tags in each species. Tags of other shows will not be allowed.

6. Pens will be assigned by community.

7. Exhibitors may show four animals per species (4 goats, 4lambs, 4 steers, 4 barrows) however, exhibitors may only enter seven total.

8. All animals entered in show will have been owned by exhibitor and fed under the supervision of the county

agent or vocational agriculture teacher as follows: Rabbits no ownership deadline, Goats and lambs by November 1, 2019, barrows by December 1, 2019; and steers by July 1, 2019. Steers, Lambs, Goats, and Barrows must be validated under the Texas Validation system by the appropriate date. All animals must be continuously owned for the designated period immediately prior to the show. Animals must not have been sold through a premium sale during the ownership period.

9. Each exhibitor may only sell two animals in the premium auction. If an exhibitor places more than two animals high enough to qualify for the premium auction, the premium sale animals will be designated as follows: an exhibitor's highest placing animals will be sold. Should an exhibitor have more than two animals qualify for the sale and be the same placing, then the heavier weight animals will sell. (EX-AMPLE: 1st place steer, 3rd place barrow, and 3rd place lamb. The steer and the barrow would sell. The steer was the highest placing animal, and the barrow weighed more than the lamb of equal placing.)

10. If an animal that has placed high enough to qualify for the premium sale is dropped because an exhibitor has two other animals in the sale, the next lower placing animals in the class will move up into that sale position.

11. SHOWMANSHIP: Steer, Barrow, Lamb & Goat shows will have two age divisions, Junior 8-13 and Senior 14 and up. Each species judge will select showmanship winners within their division. Showmanship classes will be held upon the completion of judging each species and will be open to all exhibitors of that species, within each age division. Showman-ship selection will be based on the exhibitor efforts within the classes as well as during showmanship competition class. (All ages will be as of January 1, 2020)

12. All animals must remain on the show grounds from weigh-in until released by the

fund the money; if invalid, the money will be placed in the general fund. Their decision will be final.

15. The appeals committee shall consist of one member from the stock show committee from each community and 4-H (5 in all). A majority (3) shall represent a quorum.

16. Substitute showman: If the animal's owner has one of the following situations, a substitute showman is permitted; if a conflict with other school related activities, physical injury or illness, family emergency, more than one animal in the same class.

17. The state mandated "no pass, no play" rules will apply. If an exhibitor is not scholastically eligible by U.I.L. rules, then the exhibitor and his/her animals are not eligible to compete in this show.

Heifers

1. This show will be a jackpot show and these animals are not eligible for he premium sale. 2. Ownership and Registration: Animals must be owned by the exhibitor and registered in the records of the respective breed association (in the name of the exhibitor) on or before November 1st. Permanent Identification (i.e. brand or tattoo) must be present and must match the registration paper of the animal. 3. Partnerships. Original registration papers must be solely in the name of the exhibitor. Partnerships of any form will not be allowed. 4. Age: Heifers may not be over 24 months of age on the day of the Par-mer County Jr. Heifer Show. 5. Validation: All junior breeding beef heifers (including potential substitute heifers) Must be validated through the Texas 4-H and FFA Breeding Heifer Validation Program. Heifer validation will include online registration paper submittal and physical validation with DNA Hair sampling for all entered and potential substitute heifers. 6. ID Verification: The tattoo or brand will be checked on heifers during check-in and must match the permanent ID that appears on the original registration paper. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure the brand tattoo is legible prior to arrival of the show. Exhibitor's will be disqualified if their heifer does not have a matching tattoo or brand, or if the tattoo or brand is illegible. 7. Classification: Heifers will not be divided by breed. They will be divided into classes by date of birth. Classes will be determined after all heifers have been checked in. 8. Grooming: Heifer grooming guidelines will be the same as the Steer Show. 9. General show rules apply. Entry fee-

\$30.00/ head.

Steers 1. Breeds will be as follows: A. British Breeds, B. American

Breeds, C. Crossbreds 2. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion. 3. Steers must weigh 900 pound to show. 4. Any steer deemed wild or unruly will be barred from the show. 5. The first place steers in each breed will compete for Breed Champion. The second place steer to the Breed champion may compete for Reserve Breed Champion. The three Breed Champions will compete for Grand Champion. The Reserve Breed Champion behind the Grand Champion may compete for Reserve Grand Champion. 6. Grooming: A. No change of the major color pattern of the animals by painting or dying, will be allowed. B. Any grooming material that allows color to come off form any animals will not be allowed at show. No adhesive materials will be allowed. 7. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/head

Market Goats

1. Only wether or doe goats are eligible to show. 2. The show is open to any breed or crossbred. Ownership deadline will be November 1, 2019. 3. Horns must be tipped. 4. Goats may be shown with hair or may be slick shorn. 5. Goats must weigh between a minimum of 60lbs and a maximum of 115lbs. A three pound tolerance will be allowed. 6. Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the the show ring. 7. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendents discretion. 8. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/ head.

Lambs

1. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion. Classes will be as follows: A. Fine wool-this class will include only purebred or grade Rambouillet or Delaine or a cross between the two breeds. B. Fine Wool Crossbreed-this class will include lambs sired by a Suffolk, Hampshire, Corriedale or Columbia ram and out of fine wool ewe. Lambs that carry more than 50 percent pion and Reserve of each of the above classes. The Grand Champion and Reserve champion will be named. 3. All lambs must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show. 4. Lambs must weigh 80 pounds to show. 5. Lambs must have been shorn within 21 days of the show. Boots and foretops may be left on lambs. 6. Ewe lambs may be shown. 7. Ownership deadline is November 1, 2019. 8. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/head

Barrows

1. Classes are as follows: A. Yorkshire D. Berkshire G. Polands, B. Chester White E. Duroc H. Spot, C. Crossbreed F. Hampshire I. Landrace 2. Class sizes will be determined at the superintendent's discretion. Show order will be determined by the superintendent. 3. Barrows must weigh 170 pounds and not over 280 to show. A five pound tolerance will be allowed. 4. Only natural grooming (water) will be allowed prior to showing any bar-row. Barrows may be clipped. 5. First and second place barrows in each of the above classes will compete for the Champion and Reserve Champion of the breed. 6. Champion and Reserve Champion will compete for Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show. 7. Ownership deadline is December 1, 2019. 8. All barrows must be validated under the Texas Validation Program to be eligible for the show. 9. General show rules apply. Entry fee-\$15.00/head. 10. There will be prospect class for all barrows weighing less than the mini-mum required. All barrows of all breeds will compete together in the prospect class. Barrows exhibited in the prospect class will be eligible to qualify for the premium sale at the same percentage as all other classes. The winner of the prospect class will not compete for breed or re-serve breed. Champion, or grand champion. 11. Breed cards will be filled out for each breed and turned in at weigh in to classifier. Classifier decision will be





DPS Releases Mass Attacks, Domestic Terrorism Reports

AUSTIN - At the direction of Governor Greg Abbott, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) produced two state intelligence assessments on critical threats to Texas, both of which were released today. The two reports — Assessing the Mass Attacks Threat to Texas and Texas Domestic Terrorism Threat Assessment - were among many topics discussed at the Domestic Terrorism Task Force roundtable hosted by Governor Abbott today at the Texas State Capitol.

"Evaluating our state's public safety vulnerabilities in today's threat environment is critical to keeping Texas safe from the most unthinkable tragedies," said DPS Director Steven Mc-Craw. "Texas is fortunate that the Governor and our state leaders place such a high focus on not only responding seamlessly to public safety threats but also doing everything possible to prevent them. These reports will assist law enforcement and the public in doing just that by providing increased information and awareness of mass at-


tacks and domestic terrorism threats to our state."

The public can submit a report through the iWatch-Texas mobile app, which is free and available on iTunes and Google Play; online at www.iwatchtx.org; or by calling 1-844-643-2251. All reports are confidential; however, there is an option to provide contact information, so officials can follow up with any additional questions. Reports should take less than five minutes to complete.



Texas Government Insider **Texas population outpaces others in 2019**

Texas' population growth continues to surge as the state recorded the largest population increase in the United States between mid-2018 and mid-2019, according to U.S. Census Bureau estimates released December 30, 2019.

The state's population rose by 367,000 people during that period to take the number of people living in Texas to nearly 29 million second only to California's 40 million residents.

Should this trend continue, Texas is predicted to gain several U.S. House seats after the 2020 census if the count is accurate and participation is high.

Population growth in Texas and most of the South contrasts a drop in the nation's natural increase (births minus deaths) to below 1 million for the first time in decades. Between 2018 and 2019, natural increase was 956,674, reflecting 3,791,712 births and 2,835,038 deaths. Forty-two states and the District of Columbia had fewer births in 2019 than 2018.

With fewer births in recent years and the number of deaths increasing, natural increase has declined steadily over the past decade. The nation's population was almost 328.24 million in 2019, growing by 0.5 percent between 2018 and 2019, or about 1.55 million people.

State sets historic unemployment record

Texas neared the end of last year on a six-month streak of record low unemployment, according to the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC).

The state's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held at 3.4 percent in November 2019 to mark the sixth consecutive month of record low unemployment in the state starting in June 2019. It is the lowest unemployment rate since series tracking began in 1976.

Leading job growth in November was the education and health services category with 10,200 jobs added, followed by the trade, transportation, and utilities industry adding 8,000 jobs, and manufacturing which added 6,300 jobs.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) recorded November's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.1 percent, followed by the Amarillo and Austin-Round Rock MSAs each with an adjusted rate of 2.5 percent. The College Station-Bryan and Lubbock MSAs each recorded the third lowest rate at 2.6 percent.

TWC produces employment estimates in cooperation with the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Abbott, Patrick react after shooting incident at church

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick released statements following a deadly shooting on Dec. 29 at West Freeway Church of Christ in White Settlement, a city of 16,000 people on the west side of Fort Worth.

Two church members were killed in the shooting, which occurred during Sunday services. A possible motive for the shooting is under investigation.

The shooter was shot and killed at the scene by a member of the congregation who is a member of the church's volunteer security detail and is a firearms instructor.

"Places of worship are meant to be sacred and I am grateful for the church members who acted quickly to take down the shooter and help prevent further loss of life," Abbott said.

Patrick said the Texas Department of Public Safety is leading the investigation in cooperation with the White Settlement Police Department, the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Tarrant County Sheriff's Office.

Revenue total is higher

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Jan. 3 reported that state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.01 billion in the month of December, 4.8% more than the amount reported for December 2018.

"Growth in state sales tax revenue was led by receipts from the construction, information services and restaurant sectors," Hegar said in a news release. "While revenue growth was slightly buoyed by collections from remote sellers and online marketplace providers, collections from retail trade were depressed due to significantly fewer Christmas shopping days in November this year compared to the previous year."

The majority of December sales tax revenue is based on sales made in November and remitted to the agency in December. Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in December 2019 was up 6.0% compared to the same period a year ago.

Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57% of all tax collections, according to the comptroller's office.

Toll hike takes effect

The Texas Department of Transportation's annual toll rate increase took effect Jan. 1.

According to TxDOT, the biggest increase will be felt by drivers who still pay by mail, as the surcharge for those transactions will increase to 50% of the base rate paid by all toll users. Motorists with a TxTag account will experience an even larger comparative discount on tolls - a discount of 33% compared to Pay By Mail rates, the agency said in a late-December news release.

The 50 percent surcharge for Pay By Mail transactions helps defray the rising administrative costs associated with these mailed payments, such as viewing license plate images, generating and mailing invoices and processing payments. Raising the surcharge to 50% also brings TxDOT Pay By Mail rates in line with other toll authorities in Austin and Dallas and across the country, and further incentivizes having a TxTag account.

Flu season hits hard

In its weekly update on Jan. 2, the Texas Department of State Health Services encouraged "everyone to get vaccinated now."

The most recent flu surveillance report shows widespread flu activity in Texas and high levels of influenza-like illness. There have been eight pediatric flu-related deaths reported in the 2019-2020 flu season.

Influenza is a contagious respiratory illness caused by one of a number of related viruses. The flu vaccine is made up of strains similar to ones likely to be circulating in North America, and vaccination is especially important for people with chronic health conditions and weaker immune systems and their caregivers, the DSHS said.

Oats come in a variety of cuts. The chart below is a quick summary of all your oats choices.

Groats	Whole oat without the hull, toasted and cleaned, not cut or rolled
Steel Cut Oats	Groats that have been cut into two or four pieces with a sharp, steel blade. Have a nutty flavor and chewier texture. Well suited for overnight crockpot oats but not for baked goods.
Scottish	Groats that are ground into a meal-like texture.
Old Fashioned Rolled Oats	Made by steaming and then rolling the whole groats. They cook faster than steel cut oats and have a thick, creamy texture. Good for cooked cereal and baked goods.
Quick Cooking Oats	Similar to old fashioned oats but steamed longer and rolled thinner. These are good for cooked cereals and baked goods.
Instant Oats	Usually come in individual packets. These are steamed longer and rolled thinner than the quick cooking oats and then dehydrated. These are the most processed form and usually contain added sugars, salt, and other additives.

2¹/₂ cups old-fashioned oats (1.5 cups ground, 3/4 cup milk (or non-dairy milk) 1 cup whole) 2 Tbsp old-fashioned oats for muffin tops 2-3 large overripe bananas (1 cup mashed or 1 cup applesauce) 2 large eggs, (lightly beaten, may use flax eggs) 1/3 cup honey

Instructions

Preheat oven to 325°F to toast oats. Place oats on a baking sheet and toast until lightly browned, stirring once (about 4 to 6 minutes). Let cool to room temperature. (If you are in a hurry you can skip the toasting step, however the toasting adds flavor!) Divide oats into portions of 1.5 cups, 1 cup and 2 Tbsp. Turn oven heat up to 350°F degrees to bake the muffins. Place 1.5 cups of oats in a food processor and blend/pulse until they reach a rough, flour like consistency. Mash bananas well, they should have no lumps. I use my mixer to mash them before adding the other wet ingredients. Add eggs, honey, milk and vanilla. Mix to combine. Add dry ingredients (including the ground oats and 1 cup whole oats) to wet ingredients and mix until just incorporated. Allow these to sit for 10 minutes to soak the oats. Optional: Fold in 1/2 cup fruit, raisins, or nuts. Scoop into muffin tin, well-greased or lined with parchment muffin wrappers (makes 14 muffins). Sprinkle muffin tops with the 2 Tbsp of reserved oats, press lightly to make sure they stick. Bake at 350°F for 20 -23 minutes. (Tops should spring back when lightly pressed and/or a toothpick inserted in the center of a muffin should come out clean.)

Texas HHS Receives Grant to Improve Nutrition for Older Texans State's Congregate Meal Program to Help More Seniors

AUSTIN - Texas Health and Human Services will use a three-year, \$750,000 grant to increase participation in the congregate meal program, which provides nutritious meals in a community setting to people age 60 and older.

"Having a place to go to share a meal and good company reduces hunger and food insecurity, and is important to maintaining good health," said Wayne Salter, deputy executive commissioner for HHS Access and Eligibility Services. "Serving meals in a group setting is more than just nourishment for the body, it nourishes the soul for those who participate."

While Texas' aging population continues to grow, participation in the congregate meal program is declining. Established through the Older Americans Act of 1965, the program provides a wholesome meal in a community setting where people can socialize and participate in activities offered at the site, such as board games. The program includes nutrition education classes, chronic disease prevention classes, and other activities.

The grant will fund modernization of Texas' congregate meal program through the creation of the Texas Congregate Meal Initiative. As part of the initiative, HHS will partner with Texas A&M University to conduct research to identify causes for the decline in program participation.

The Texas Congregate Meal Initiative will also provide training and project development practices, inspire innovation, increase participation in local congregate meal programs, and improve satisfaction, health, and wellbeing among the senior population in Texas. "This is great news for our senior citizens," said Rep. James White. "We stand on the broad shoulders of these great Texans and I am elated that HHSC will provide our local communities with more resources to serve our seniors."

According to the US Census Bureau, between 2005 and 2017 the population of individuals age 60 and older has increased by 65 percent in Texas while the number of meals served through this program has decreased by nearly 25 percent. Participation in congregate meal programs has declined nationwide as well.

"We especially are pleased to be partnering with the Mays Business School, Texas Health and Human Services, and the Area Agencies on Aging on a project with the potential for improving the quality of life for aging populations throughout Texas," said Nandita Chaudhuri, research scientist at the Public Policy Research Institute at Texas A&M University. "This type of project fits perfectly within the mission of the Public Policy Research Institute. The

results have the potential to reduce social isolation among aging populations by connecting seniors to other members of their community through congregate meals."

As a part of this initiative, HHS will utilize Texas' 28 Area Agencies on Aging and their congregate meal providers to gather comprehensive statewide data. Area Agencies on Aging provide supportive services to people age 60 and older, their family members, and caregivers across the state's 254 counties. These services give individuals the resources to maintain healthy and independent lives in their communities.

2 cups water

¹/₂ cup Steel Cut Oats

Combine ingredients in pressure cooker pot select high pressure and set 10 minutes cook time. (It took the pressure cooker 10 minutes to come up to pressure and 20 minutes for a natural pressure release after the cook time, for a total prep time of 40 minutes. A quick release is not recommended with grains.) Top with milk fresh or dried fruit, chopped nuts or granola, and your favorite sweetener - brown sugar, white sugar, maple syrup, or agave syrup. I like to add apples to my oats, but I quick cook them in the microwave before adding them to the oats. I peel and chop my apples, place them in a microwave safe bowl with butter and cinnamon. Then I cover and cook them for about 2 minutes or until apples are tender. I don't add them to the oats in the pressure cooker until after the oats are cooked and the pressure releases. If you cook the apples with the oatmeal, you will just have apple sauce in your oatmeal.

- 2/3 3/4 cup almond milk or your favorite milk (for a non-vegan version - you can add half milk and half Greek yogurt for creaminess as well)

- 1. Add mashed banana and cinnamon to a mason jar
- 2. Shake jar or mix and combine with a spoon. Seal and chill in the fridge for at least 4 hours or overnight. Enjoy cold or heat up in the microwave or stove top.
- 3. Serve with more milk as desired and top with fresh banana slices and walnuts before serving, if desired.

Blueberry Vanilla Almond Butter Overnight Oats:

- 1/4 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1 Tablespoon almond butter
- 1-2 teaspoons maple syrup, honey or low carb liquid sweetener
- 1/4 cup fresh blueberries plus more for toppings Blueberry Vanilla Almond Butter Overnight Oats:
- 1. Add vanilla, and blueberries (and sweetener if desired) to mason jar.
- 2. Shake jar or mix and combine with a spoon. Seal and chill in the fridge for at least 4 hours or overnight. Enjoy cold or heat up in the microwave or stove top.
- 3. Serve with more milk as desired and top with fresh blueberries and almond butter before serving.



Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices are unchanged in the past week, averaging \$2.27 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 6.8 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and 35.4 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.99 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The cheapest price in the entire country today stands at \$1.89 while the most expensive is \$4.99 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has fallen 2.2 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.57 per gallon. The national average is down 2.4 cents from a month ago and stands 34.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"To start the first week of a new decade, the national average has seen little change, but with the U.S. targeting and Iranian General in an attack last week, there is a distinct possibility that escalations in tensions may have an affect on gas prices moving forward," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for GasBuddy. "For now, there's been no physical disruption or retribution from Iran, but it has been promised. Oil markets have risen on the rising risk of Iran retaliating, but until it happens, don't expect gas prices to see much of a jump. For now, I could see a small 5-10 cent per gallon increase over the next couple of weeks, but the real potential for fireworks at the pump will be contingent on retaliation, and whether that retaliation targets oil infrastructure like Iran struck last year. For now we're in limbo, but typically gas prices decline slightly in January and February thanks to seasonally weak gasoline demand."

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$3 Billion in December

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.01 billion in December, 4.8 percent more than in December 2018. "Growth in state sales tax revenue was led by receipts from the construction, information services and restaurant sectors," Hegar said. "While revenue growth was slightly buoyed by collections from remote sellers and online marketplace providers, collections from retail trade were depressed due to significantly fewer Christmas shopping days in November this year compared to the previous year."

The majority of December sales tax revenue is based on sales made in November and remitted to the agency in December. Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in December 2019 was up 6.0 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax collections.

In December 2019, Texas collected the following revenue from other major taxes: (1) motor vehicle sales and rental taxes - \$427.3 million, up 7.9 percent from December 2018; (2) motor fuel taxes — \$310.7 million, down 1.1 percent from December 2018; (3) natural gas production taxes - \$114.0 million, down 33.8 percent from December 2018; and (4) oil production taxes — \$362.5 million, up 18.3 percent from December 2018.


