
Governor Proclaims March 2nd To Be Texas Independence Day

Through the pen and the sword, Texans fought for independence from a government in Mexico that denied its citizens freedom and justice. While delegates gathered at Washington-on-the-Brazos on March 2, 1836, to sign the Texas Declaration of Independence, brave defenders continued fighting, many making the ultimate sacrifice and securing independence at the Battle of San Jacinto.

As those delegates declared 184 years ago, when a government ceases to protect the lives, liberty, and property of the people from whom its power is derived, that government becomes an instrument of oppression and must be abolished. In rebellion to the actions of Mexico, brave men and women gave rise to a free and sovereign republic.

In the fall of 1835 at Gonzales, Texans of all backgrounds banded together to fight for the cause of liberty. Throughout the revolution, many heroic Texans were lost, most notably at the Alamo and Presidio La Bahia in Goliad, but their sacrifices were not in vain and served as a rallying cry for the Texian forces under General Sam Houston. Texas forces defeated Santa Anna at the Battle of San Jacinto on April 21, 1836, declaring victory and securing freedom for the Republic of Texas.

The vision of freedom set down by our founders in the Texas Declaration of In-




dependence lives on in the Texas spirit today. As we continue building a 21st century Texas, we must always remember how the sacrifices of past generations build the future for the next. At this time, I encourage all Texans to learn more about, reflect on,








2020 Census News

Last week, we spoke about the 2020 Census and why it is important to Friona. Counting every person living in the United States is a massive undertaking, and efforts begin years in advance. Here's a look at some of the key dates in 2020:

frionaonline.com

2020

- March 12 20: Households will begin receiving official Census Bureau mail with detailed information on how to respond to the 2020 Census online, by phone, or by mail.
- March 30 April 1: The Census Bureau will count people who are experiencing <u>homelessness</u> these three days. As part of this process, the Census Bureau counts people in shelters, at soup kitchens and mobile food vans, on the streets, and at non-sheltered, door locations such as tent encampments.
- April 1: Census Day is observed nationwide. By this date, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the

2020 Census. Once the invitation arrives, you should respond for your home in one of three ways: online, by phone, or by mail. When you respond to the census, you'll tell the Census Bureau where you live as of April 1, 2020.

• April: Census takers will begin visiting college students who live on campus, people living in senior centers, and others who live among large groups of people. Census takers also begin conducting quality check interviews to

- May July: Census takers will begin visiting homes that haven't responded to the 2020 Census to help make sure everyone is counted.
- December: The Census Bureau will deliver apportionment counts to the President and Congress as required by law.







Commissioners approve new motor grader for Precinct 1

The Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, February 24th at 10:00 a.m. in the County Courtroom of the Parmer County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas. The meeting began with prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag and the Texas Flag.

There were no public comments. The Minutes from the February 7, 2020 meeting were read and approved. Commissioners approved the payment of the accounts payables as presented by County Treasurer Sharon May. The Treasurer's Report was also reviewed

and approved.

Approval was given for the purchase of a motor grader for use in Precinct 1. The new 6-wheel drive grader will be bought from Warren Cat of Lubbock. Parmer County is enrolled in a 5-year buy back program and the final cost will be \$138,900 after trade-in.

Sheriff Randy Geries reported that he is currently housing 29 inmates in the Law Enforcement Center. Thirteen of those are from Deaf Smith County. Commissioners approved the 207K Statue of moving jailers from a 40 hour work week to a 171 hour pay period. Also, a 2014 Tahoe owned by the county will be designated for use by the DA's Investigator instead of being used as a trade-in on a new patrol vehicle. Commissioners also approved a Memo of Understanding (MOU) with the Deaf Smith County Crisis Center.



Under Texas Law, individuals who appear before a court and make a good faith effort to resolve their outstanding Class C Warrants are afforded safe harbor and not subject to arrest. Additionally, if a judgment is rendered against an individual who is unable to pay the judgment, the individual may request a judge to assess their ability to pay and

offer alternative means to satisfy the judgment.

Once the arrest period begins, officers will aggressively seek out wanted individuals. arrest can take place at any location, including the defendant's home, school, or work-

Texas Weekly Fuel Update and Outlook

Texas gas prices have risen 6.9 cents in the past week to an average of \$2.16 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's daily survey of 13,114 stations. Gas prices in Texas are 3.5 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 2.4 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas is priced at \$1.87 while the most expensive is \$3.19 per gallon. The national average price of gasoline has risen 2.4 cents in the last week, averaging \$2.47 per gallon. The national average is down 6.4 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 7.3 cents per gallon higher than a year ago.

"With oil prices having pushed higher in recent weeks, we saw the national average price of gasoline increase for the second straight week. Yet with much unknown after a rocky weekend with the COVID-19 coronavirus spreading into new countries, we still could see the current uptick slow with more countries potentially locking down travel," said Patrick DeHaan, head of petroleum analysis for Gas-Buddy. "Over the last decade, the national average typically begins its seasonal rise on February 9, lasting until May 2, during which the average rise is 54 cents per gallon. This year could look much different based on myriad unknowns that continue to fog the situation. It's nearly guaranteed that prices will be higher by April and May, but beyond that, the timing remains completely unknown, as does how the coronavirus will threaten overall gasoline demand."

He Showed Us!

On Saturday morning two days later, Pop would join the great cloud of witnesses spoken of in Hebrews as he went to be with the Lord.

Pop was and still is a tremendous influence in our lives. He didn't give us deep philosophical explanations about things in this life. He showed us. Sometimes words, especially today, get watered down into meaningless noise. Pop did mean what he said and said what he meant, but most of the time the words were less, but the actions clear. He did things not because we were watching but because they were the right thing to do and we learned to do right things. He showed us many things over the years. He did not talk to us a lot about faith, but he faithfully planted each year trusting the Lord to do what only the Lord can do, and we learned to be faithful with much or little. He didn't talk to us much about love, but nearly everyday the last 3 years he made sure he was ready at 4pm to go see his girl for an hour at Prairie Acres and we learned that love wasn't a feeling, but a way to live. He taught us to work with our hands and create something new out of something old, and we learned that treasure can be found anywhere if you are looking at it with the eyes of possibility. He would take us to pick a watermelon in the morning and stick it in the water trough and by afternoon we had cold watermelon that tasted great, and we learned that patience is better learned slowly. Yes, I could go on with this, but I think you see my point. Pop did not tell us many things. He showed us and in so doing taught us more in his actions than his words.

I want to encourage you to do the same. In the book of James, he would write, don't be hearers of the Word only, but do what it says (James 1:22). In the book of James there is much about doing, not just saying and wouldn't you know it? Our Pop was known by many of you as James.

Communication is a Great Thing By Teena Hughs

This morning I was reading Joshua 22:10,11: "But while they were still in Canaan, before they crossed the Jordan River, Reuben, Gad, and the half-tribe of Manasseh built a very large altar near the Jordan River at a place called Geliloth. When the rest of Israel heard they had built the altar at Geliloth west of the Jordan River, in the land of Canaan, the whole assembly gathered at Shiloh and prepared to go to war against their brother tribes."

You may remember that the tribes of Reuben, Gad, and the half-tribe of Manasseh settled on the east side of the Jordan River; they chose not to live in the Promised Land. But, to be able to do this, they agreed to enter the Promised Land and fight with the other tribes of Israel to take over the Promised Land, to rid it of all evil and paganism. That had been accomplished, and Joshua was sending them home.

Now, because they built an altar, they were facing war. But wait, before attacking Reuben, Gad, and the half-tribe of Manasseh, "they sent a delegation led by Phinehas, son of Eleazar, the priest. They crossed the river TO TALK (my emphasis) with the tribes of Reuben, Gad, and the halftribe of Manasseh."

You see, the Israelites THOUGHT they knew why their brother tribes built the altar: 'The whole community of the LORD demands to know why you are betraying the God of Israel. How could you turn away from the LORD and build an altar in rebellion against Him?" They go on to further explain their reasons for being upset in verses 17 - 20.

In their defense, the tribes

of Reuben, Gad, and the halftribe of Manasseh told the high officials than in deed, the LORD alone is God; if they built the altar in rebellion to God, their lives should not be spared; but, they built the altar for their descendants. 'We have built this altar because we fear that in the future your descendants will say to ours, "What right do you have to worship the LORD, the God of Israel? The LORD has placed the Jordan River as a barrier between our people and your people. You have no claim to the LORD." And your descendants may make our descendants stop worshiping the LORD.' That is why the altar was built...to let future Israelites know that just because a river stood between them, ALL of them had "the right to worship the LORD at His sanctuary with our burnt offerings, sacrifices, and peace offerings." War was averted.

Isn't it amazing what a little communication prevented? Rather than letting what the 9 1/2 tribes thought was happening and going to war over it, they sent a delegation to the 2 1/2 tribes to discuss it. As it turned out, they had made wrong assumptions.

We do the same thing, and oftentimes, we don't go talk to the people about what has us upset. We just choose to sit, stew, and make the problems worse than they are. Assumptions can be a bad thing sometimes. Taking the time and effort to go talk to someone takes courage, but in the end, it is amazing at all the good it does. Joshua 22 is good reading; I hope you will take the time to read it all and learn

Contend for the Faith against Adversaries

Jude, the half-brother of Jesus compelled the church in the first century and us today "to contend for the faith that was once for all delivered to the saints," (1:3 ESV). The true believer can be a faithful contender because of the assurance we have in Christ Jesus for salvation, but a true contender for the faith must also be aware of adversaries to the faith.

In Jude, one can learn a great deal regarding how to spot someone who is an adversary to the faith. What is interesting about Jude is that he does not spend much time describing the false

teaching of those who were dividing the churches, but he focused mostly on their character and life. It is not that what they were teaching was his focus, but the fruit in their lives it produced. Verses 4, 8, 10 and 16 paint the picture of these people as sensual, blasphemers of what they don't understand, grumblers, malcontents, boasters and those who follow their own sinful desires. In other words, their lives did not depict a life transformed by the gospel, because their teaching was void of the power of the gospel truth to change lives through the Holy Spirit.

The point is that when one measures what a person, preacher, televangelist, Bible study teacher or any other person who seeks to influence others spiritually, know that a huge part of their fidelity to the faith is not simply in what they say, but also in how they live. In Jude's day, just as today, there were those who seeped into the churches, seemed spiritual, but the fruit of their life denied the gospel. Beware of such persons who trade in the truth and standards of God for the shifting winds of the world as you "contend for the faith once for all delivered to the saints," (v3).

Governor establishes clemency application for certain survivors

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Feb. 20 established a clemency application specifically for survivors of human trafficking or domestic violence.

The application, crafted in coordination with the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles, includes a section that affords the applicant an opportunity to provide a statement to the board regarding their human trafficking or domestic violence victimization.

Human trafficking and domestic violence, according to the governor's office, often lead victims down a path of offenses that entraps them in a vicious cycle of abuse and associated crime. Abbott's announcement coincides with the launch of a new public awareness campaign informing survivors that they can submit an application for Board of Pardons and Paroles to review and consider recommending that the governor grant a full pardon for crimes committed while under the grips of a trafficker or an abusive partner.

"Texas is committed to empowering the survivors of domestic abuse and human trafficking, and one of the surest signals of that goal is laying out a true path to redemption and restoration," Abbott said.

"The gubernatorial pardon plays an important role in this redemption process, because it offers a second chance to survivors with criminal convictions resulting from their abuse or exploitation. I am grateful for our ongoing partnership with the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles as we work together to develop a stronger justice system that promotes redemption, restoration and transformation," Abbott added.

In his recent announcement proclaiming January as Human Trafficking Prevention Month, Abbott applauded state lawmakers for passing legislation to provide survivors with "streamlined access to a clean criminal record and a fresh start."

AG leads in support of act

Some 42 state attorneys general joined Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton in a Feb. 20 letter expressing support of the Bankruptcy Venue Reform Act of 2019.

If passed by Congress and signed into law by the president, the federal legislation would prevent forum shopping during bankruptcy litigation. Paxton said such a law would provide protection to consumers, workers, retirees, shareholders and small business vendors "who are currently harmed by the one-sided right for corporate debtors to choose whichever court they pre-

Currently, Paxton said, individuals can only file bankruptcy in their district of residence. Corporations, on the other hand, have a wide choice of possible venues, which can be manipulated to their own advantage, he added.

Update: Coronavirus

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Feb. 21 announced the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention had confirmed three cases of novel coronavirus 2019 in people under federal quarantine at Joint Base San Antonio-Lackland.

The first was a traveler who returned on a U.S. State Department-chartered flight from Wuhan City, China. The others returned on a State Department flight for passengers from the Diamond Princess cruise ship quarantined in Yokohama, Japan. The individuals are currently isolated and receiving appropriate care at medical facilities.

There were no other reported cases in Texas and officials said the risk of contracting the virus for all Texans remains low. The Department of State Health Services offers information on "COVID-19" for the public, health care professionals, health departments and labs at dshs.texas.gov/coronavirus.

In other news, the DSHS on Feb. 21 reported there have been 15 pediatric flu-related deaths reported this season in Texas.

The agency urged Texans who have not taken this season's influenza vaccine to get vaccinated without further delay. More information can be found online at www.texasflu.org.

AG sues over explosion

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality on Feb. 21 announced that Texas Attorney General Paxton had filed a lawsuit against TPC Group Inc. and TPC Group LLC for violations of the Texas Clean Air Act and the Texas Water Code pertaining to the Nov. 27, 2019 explosion at its Port Neches plant.

The lawsuit requests that the court grant injunctive relief, civil penalties, reasonable attorney fees, court costs and investigative costs to the state.

The lawsuit also includes claims that TPC Group caused numerous violations of TCEQ's air quality program from January 2018 through September 2019.

TCEQ Executive Director Toby Baker and House State Affairs Committee Chairman Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont, applauded Paxton for taking legal action. "Through this suit, the state can learn what caused the incident, how to prevent such occurrences in the future and adequately penalize all violations," Phelan

Sweet Potatoes

Over the years an ongoing debate has ensued in our house about sweet potatoes and yams. Jarrett likes to call them yams, but Hadley refutes this claim explaining how yams are only grown in Africa and that sweet potatoes and yams are not the same thing. Then Jarrett continues to call them yams, just to irritate his older brother.

Hadley is correct, of course. Yams and sweet potatoes are not the same thing. Yams are a totally different plant related to the lily. They are grown in Africa and other more tropical climates such as the Caribbean Islands. They are brown with a rough peel and flesh that is white or purple. The vam is starchier and lacks sweetness. Another notable difference is the rounded ends on a yam.

Sweet potatoes are from the morning glory family and can range in color from orange to purple to white. In contrast to the yam, a sweet potato has an elongated and tapering point on both ends. Sweet potatoes, one of the oldest known vegetables, originating in Central America. There is some dispute about how they made their way to Europe. The traditional thought was that Christopher Columbus took them back after his travels to the new world. However, more recent DNA tests have shown that the sweet potato was in Polynesia some 400 years before the Europeans made it to South America. It is believed that the Polynesians traveled across the ocean to South America before the Spaniards. After making it to Europe, the sweet potato made its way through China and then Asia, Africa, and Latin America. It was later introduced to the Southeast-

by Native Americans. Slaves in the Southern states survived on sweet potatoes as did many in the South after the Civil War.

Sweet potatoes are highly nutritious and can be prepared baked, fried, roasted, sautéed, or mashed. They can be used in both sweet and savory dishes. They have around 20 grams off carbs, but almost no fat and 3 grams of fiber. They are high in both Vitamin A and betacarotene.



Inspector General Announces National "Slam the Scam" Day

The Inspector General for the Social Security Administration, Gail S. Ennis, is designating Thursday, March 5, 2020 as National "Slam the Scam" Day, to raise public awareness of government imposter telephone scams across the United States.

These pervasive scams—in which callers pretend to be government employees to mislead victims into providing personal information or making payments—have become a scourge on the

American public. The Federal Trade Commission recently reported victims lost nearly \$153 million to government imposter scams in just fiscal year 2019. Social Security-related scams in particular have skyrocketed over the past year to become the #1 type of consumer fraud reported to the Federal Trade Commission and the Social Security Administration.

To combat these scams, the Social Security Administration and its OIG have undertaken a public outreach campaign to educate the public so they will know how to identify these scam calls. We want the public to know SSA will never:

- Tell you that your Social Security number has been suspended, or offer to increase your benefits or resolve an identity theft issue for a fee.
- Call to threaten you with arrest or legal action if you do not immediately pay a debt, fine, or fee.
- Request immediate payment via gift cards, cash, wire transfers, or internet currency like Bitcoin.
- Demand secrecy from you in handling a Social Security-related problem, or tell you to make up a story to tell your friends, family, or store/ bank employees.

The Social Security Office of the Inspector General (OIG) is engaging other Federal agencies and the private sector to promote a National "Slam the Scam Day" as a National Consumer Protection Week initiative. On March

5, we plan to participate in a USA.gov-hosted Twitter chat, and a Facebook Live event at Social Security. We want to warn all Americans to hang up on all government imposters, and ask them to spread the word to family and friends.

"Awareness is our best hope to thwart the scammers," said Inspector General Ennis. "Tell your friends and family about these scams and report them to us when you receive them, but most importantly, just hang up and ignore the calls."

We encourage the public to report Social Security scams online at https://oig.ssa.gov. IRS imposter scams can be reported to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration, and other government imposter scams to the Federal Trade Commission.

TxDOT Project Making Improvements to US 60

Drives should anticipate various extended lane closures, delays

PARMER COUNTY - Motorists traveling US 60 next week should anticipate driving lane closures as the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) begins a project to completely rebuild more than seven miles of US 60 in Parmer County, from the New Mexico State Line to five miles west of Bovina. The \$25.5 million project will also make drainage, culverts and guardrail improvements, said Steve Perez, P.E., TxDOT's Littlefield Area engineer.

"The project will be making needed improvements and repairs to the pavement and is expected to enhance the overall safety of the roadway," Perez, said. "Contractor

Johnson Bros. Corporation, of Roanoke, TX, is scheduled to begin setting up the work zone next week. Work will begin on Monday, March 2, on the New Mexico end of the project limits."

Motorists should anticipate various extended mainlane closures and a change in the speed limit—reduced by 10 mph—through the active work zones, Perez noted. Drivers are advised to pay attention and slow down as they enter the work area for their safety and the safety of the workers.

Work will take place weather permitting. Construction is anticipated to wrap-up late

USS Texas returns home from deployment

PEARL HARBOR - The Virginia-class fast-attack submarine USS Texas (SSN 775) returned home to Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Feb. 24.

During their seven-month deployment, Texas completed a full spectrum of operations, including theater anti-submarine and anti-surface warfare, in support of the high-priority tasking in the Indo-Pacific and U.S. Central Command areas of operation.

"The crew worked and trained tirelessly, preparing to execute any mission in defense of our nation, and performed remarkably throughout our seven month Middle East deployment," said Cmdr. Mike Dolbec, commanding officer of Texas. "In my opinion, every Texas Sailor is a hero, whose patriotism is evident daily. These Sailors are the heart and soul of this mighty warship; they are responsible for Texas' many successes. I can say with a great deal of pride that these are the finest men and women that I have ever served with,

and it is a great honor and privilege to be their commanding officer."

On deployment, Texas visited Perth, Australia, where they engaged with dignitaries including the U.S. Ambassador to Australia, as well as other government officials and members of academia. Additionally, members of the crew volunteered at a community food bank and participated in receptions with Australian submarine counterparts to enhance understanding through shared maritime experience and interest.

"We visited HMAS Stirling, Australia, and while there, Texas Sailors conducted community outreach at the Rockingham food bank, assisting with sorting, inventorying and storing food supplies for those in need," said Master Chief Machinist's Mate (Auxiliary) Charles Cardell, from Pensacola, Florida.

During the deployment, 40 crew members earned their submarine warfare qualifica-

tions and 24 Sailors advanced to the next rank.

"My most memorable moment was seeing six of six eligible member in my division being advanced to the next higher pay grade. We have embodied a culture that expects us all to push ourselves, and one another, to perform at a higher level of work and responsibility. Like any finely tuned machine, our individual success is directly attributed to our teamwork and efficiency, and the results are evident," said Fire Control Technician 1st Class Quincy Miller, from Savannah, Georgia.

Commissioned Sept. 9, 2006, Texas is the forth ship of the U.S. Navy to bear that name. Texas is a flexible, multi-mission platform designed to carry out the seven core competencies of the submarine force; anti-submarine warfare; anti-surface warfare; delivery of special operations forces; strike warfare; irregular warfare; intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance; and mine warfare.
