

director. Green comes Clarendon from Frank Phillips College Borger where he spent



years as the AD and golf coach, and he was named the NJCAA Athletic Director of the Year in 2009, but he says sports will not be his sole focus.

"I'm a strong advocate of academics," Green said. "We want to set kids up for success in life. Our games will be good entertainment, and I expect our kids to be role models."

Green says he's excited about the opportunities at CC, and says he looks forward to partnering with the community and local businesses. He anticipates having college students involved in the community and wants to hold tailgate parties before college games.

"We're going to have fun," he said. "I am so thrilled and excited about people I've met, and I have no doubt we're going to have success."

Green will establish a golf team at Clarendon College and say's he's already guaranteed President Phil Shirley the team will be nationally ranked and in the national tournament.

"We will have a largely international team with at least three from England," he said, noting that he would recruit locally also. "I had ten British players at Frank Phillips, and we were ranked in the top 20 nationally every year."

Shirley says Green is coming to Clarendon with unique credentials and the ability to start new programs and calls the new athletic director a "recruiter par excellence."

Green said he hopes to use athletics as a way to promote academic and workforce programs at Clarendon because people can't go visit a classroom but they can attend a ballgame.

"There are many great programs here, and we will work to expand them," Green said. "We will support our nursing, ag, and other programs."

Osama bin Laden is dead. May he burn in hell. After years of searching and fighting, America's military and intelligence forces located and killed the man responsible for the attacks on this nation on September 11, 2001.

Reports are that a team of 40 Navy SEALs

stormed a compound in Abbottabad, Pakistan, on Sunday afternoon. The raid lasted about 40 minutes and resulted in bin Laden being shot in the head, ending any hope he might have had of having an American civilian trial or even editor's hearing his Miranda rights.

death rippled across the airwaves and the Internet Sunday night ahead of what can safely be described as the most anticipated speech of Barack Obama's presidency. Whether you liked the speech is a personal preference, but Obama deserves credit for authorizing the mission.

The questions have long been debated in this War on Terror – What are we fighting for? Where is bin Laden? Are the extraordinary measures the United States has made necessary?

The fight, of course, is one for our freedom and our very way of life. Our men and women in uniform have earned the utmost praise for making Sunday's news a reality. Every day, they put their lives on the line to root out evil and protect us from harm. They deserve our respect and our prayers for their protection.

This is America's hour of choosing

"In Bin Laden Announcement, Echoes of 2007 Obama Speech," declared the headline in The New York Times. It's difficult to find a newspaper that has demonstrated a worst pro-Obama and anti-Bush bias than The New York Times, especially when dealing with the War on Terror. And so, I expected a headline like this in the Times. When I searched Google this morning, looking for a text of President Obama's statement on the death of Osama Bin Laden, the Times headline was the first thing that popped up.

That's too bad. A better banner would have been, "In Bin Laden Announcement, Echoes of 2001 Bush Speech." That's what I immediately thought when I heard the stunning statement by President Obama announcing the killing of Osama Bin Laden. To wit, President Obama stated:

Tonight, I can report to the American people and to the world that the United States has conducted an operation that killed Osama Bin Laden....

The American people did not choose this fight. It came to our shores, and started with the senseless slaughter of our citizens.... Yet as a country, we will never tolerate our security being threatened, nor stand idly by when our people have been killed. We will be relentless in defense of our citizens and our friends and allies. We will be true to the values that make us who we are. And on nights like this one, we can say to those families who have lost loved ones to Al-Qaeda's terror: Justice has been done....

Let us remember that we can do these things not just because of wealth or power, but because of who we are: one nation, under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all.

Thank you. May God bless you. And may God bless the United States of America.

For President Obama, it was a refreshing and surprising expression of American exceptionalism.

More than that, President Obama's words read like a punctuation, an exclamation point, on what President George W. Bush had said on September 14, 2001, during an unforgettable 9/11 memorial service at the majestic National Cathedral. Bush himself had organized the service. He picked the music, selected speakers, and carefully chose the words he delivered that after-

Bush had declared the day a National Day of Prayer and Remembrance. In preparing for his speech, he literally prayed that he could rise to the occasion and deliver his talk meaningfully in keeping with the somberness of the occasion. "I prayed a lot before the speech," he later told reporter Bill Sammon, "because I felt like it was a moment where I needed, well, frankly, for the good Lord to shine through."

Everyone in elite Washington was there: Former presidents Jimmy Carter and Gerald Ford sat in the third pew, as did Al Gore. The Clinton family sat in the front pew. An ailing Billy Graham, in a poignant display, struggled to address those gathered. President Bush approached the platform at 1:00 PM. He stated:

We are here in the middle hour of our grief. So many have suffered so great a loss, and today we express our nation's

who love them.

attacked with deliberate and massive cruelty. We have seen the images of fire and ashes and bent steel. Now come the names, the list of casualties we are only beginning to read....

Just three days removed from these events, Americans do not yet have the distance of history. But our responsibility to history is already clear: To answer these attacks and rid the world of evil.

War has been waged against us by stealth and deceit and murder. This nation is peaceful, but fierce when stirred to anger. This conflict was begun on the timing and terms of others. It will end in a way, and at an hour, of our choosing.

Note that last word, "choosing." Indeed, here is where both President Bush and President Obama—not to mention America and history-found common ground: This war, and that awful attack on September 11, 2001, crafted by the diabolical Osama Bin Laden, had not been our choice. Both Bush and Obama pledged that justice against Osama would come at a time of our choosing.

That time arrived, at long last, on May 1, 2011. Justice, indeed, has been done, and on America's terms, not Osama Bin Laden's.

Reform needed before raising debt ceiling

America is only weeks away from hitting our debt ceiling, and we are faced with striking reminders that we have a finite amount of time to deal with our looming fiscal crisis.

Just recently, Standard & Poor's, one of the three main agencies that rate the ability of nations to repay their debts, lowered its outlook for America's longterm AAA credit rating from "stable" to "negative." This will make our cost of borrowing money even more expensive.

Additionally, the Chinese government, America's largest foreign holder of our debt, has even begun to shift away from purchasing U.S. debt and instead is looking elsewhere as the U.S. economy appears to be a risky investment. This move by foreign investors comes as the dollar is steadily declining in value. With no end in sight for soaring budget. deficits that will swell to unprecedented territory at more than \$1 trillion a year, the alarm bells are tolling, and they should be spurring leaders in Washington to tackle our unsustainable deficit immediately and with decisive action.


Unfortunately, the Obama Administration and Democratic leaders in Congress are not heeding these warning signals and remain convinced that we must blindly continue raising the debt ceiling. They disregard the demands by many in Congress, including myself, that meaningful spending reform measures must be passed before we consider raising the debt ceiling.

Some who oppose combining spending cuts or fiscal reform measures

with the debt ceiling vote have been using scare tactics about doomsday scenarios.

way, we will be damaging our current economic recovery and failing future generations of Americans.

If Congress votes, yet again, to raise the debt limit but takes no serious steps to rein in spending, America will continue down a fiscally unsustainable path. Failing to demonstrate a commitment to live within our means, when voting to borrow beyond \$14 trillion dollars, could very well send terrible tremors throughout our fragile economy.

Accepting that Washington has a spending problem, not a revenue problem is the first step to real fiscal reform. Congress can do this by cutting current spending, putting safeguards in place that will restrict future spending, such as the balanced budget amendment, and establishing a more effective and transparent federal budget process. These would be significant steps towards a path of fiscal responsibility and would ward off a looming debt crisis.

We then must focus our attention on passing a responsible budget for the upcoming fiscal year and work together to reform our broken entitlement pro-

grams that are the single largest contributor to our long-term debt.

In a recent speech, the president outlined his long-term deficit reduction plan but failed to recognize the real cause of our fiscal mess. We cannot tax our way out of debt, and raising taxes, as the president proposed, will not curtail deficit spending. Historically, Washington has proven that the government will spend every dollar of taxpayer money it takes in.

It is unconscionable to punish American families and small businesses through higher taxes when reckless government spending is driving our unsustainable deficits. Chasing higher spending with ever-higher tax rates would severely disadvantage the U.S. economy and is ultimately a recipe for decline, not job creation and economic growth.

In a matter of weeks, when America once again hits the debt ceiling, the political courage of Washington to take action against unsustainable government spending will be put to the test. We need to see a clear commitment that assures spending cuts before the debt ceiling is raised. We also must prepare reforms in Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid for long-term fiscal responsibility.

The longer the president and many in Congress wait to face reality, the window of opportunity to ensure a future marked by economic stability and prosperity will get smaller. We have an obligation and opportunity right now to put our country back on a prosperous course.




Elam noted that Watson had two hits, scored two, and drove in two. Phillips reached base all four times at bat and scored three runs and Gaines hit a double and drove in two.

Drugs in the News

Treatment for a Type of Juvenile Arthritis Approved The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) recently approved a medication for the treatment of a rare childhood disorder called SJIA (Systemic Juvenile Idiopathic Arthritis) in children who are two years of age or older. This is a prescription drug called tocilizumab (Actemra). According to news reports, Actemra is the first drug approved by the FDA for SJIA treatment. The approval of this new drug was based on positive results in a clinical study called TENDER. Data from the study showed that 85% of children with SJIA who received Actemra experienced an improvement in approximately 30% of SJIA symptoms (eg. fever, swelling, pain). Common side effects observed from the use of Actemra included headache, increased blood pressure, and upper respiratory tract infections (colds and sinus infections).

SJIA is also known as Still's disease. It is rare and potentially lifethreatening condition in which severe inflammation occurs throughout the body of a child. There are spikes in fever, rash, and swelling of internal organs. It reportedly affects one or two out of every 1,000 children.

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

Saturday evening the attention will turn to mixed doubles. Adults and children are both welcome to compete (and adults and children may be paired on the same mixed doubles team.)


