For just \$20, each household will get a 50-word advertisement in the Big-E Classifieds, tips for holding a successful sale, price stickers, and two yard signs.


In addition, the ENTERPRISE will print a city map the week of the event indicating the location of each sale and will promote the citywide garage sale in area newspapers and with local radio ads.

A Plainview man was in the Donley County Jail Monday after he fled from state and local law enforcement last weekend.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said State Trooper Kellan Roberts had clocked a blue four-door Dodge pickup going at a high rate of speed on US 287 west of Clarendon shortly after midnight Saturday.

The vehicle fled north on SH 70 before turning onto County Road P and then turning back toward Clarendon on County Road 12. The vehicle end up in the bar ditch, and the driver, Raymond Morales, took off on foot. The sheriff's office and the Department of Public Safety searched for the suspect, and a DPS helicopter was called in from Amarillo to assist with the search.

After 2 a.m., the sheriff's office received a 911 call that a Hispanic man had run up to apartments on North Sully Street and was seen hiding under carport there. Morales was arrested and booked into the jail, the sheriff said.


Nurses have legacy of compassion

Life on the Frontier was many things: it was thrilling, daring, and adventurous. It was liberating and empowering. But one thing I think most of us can agree on-life on the Frontier was not easy.

When we hear tales told of the Old West, they often include scenes of bloody gunfights, rattlesnake bites, unbearable heat, and a long list of diseases-from smallpox to typhoidwhose symptoms would make anyone squeamish.

We're familiar with the frontiersmen who suffered any number of these maladies during their often short lifetimes - cowboys, rangers, sheriffs, ranch hands, and outlaws alike. But one person is often missing from these colorful stories, and she is the one who-day or night, for scoundrels or saints-attended to their injuries and illnesses: the nurse of the Frontier.


Before the development of formal



Dickinson and Andrea Castañon Villanueva who nursed the injured defenders and sat by their bedsides during agonizing nights.

With a long list and variety of diseases plaguing Texas towns on the Frontier, many of these "lay nurses" became extremely skilled and were called on to care for the sick and injured beyond their homes and towns. Some of the first groups of lay nurses to have a wide impact on nursing in Texas were Catholic congregations of women.

In 1866, Claude Marie Dubuis, second Catholic bishop of Texas, wrote to Mother M. Angelique of the Monastery of the Incarnate Word in Lyons, France, asking if she would send sisters to volunteer their time as nurses in Galveston. His request was answered when three sisters arrived from Lyons to Galveston and opened St. Mary's Infirmary in October 1866. For Bishop Dubuis, their arrival could not have come at a more urgent time. In the year following the sisters' arrival in Galves-

When school officials have sought an ally in the battle over school finance legislation, or in local efforts to stir up support for a multi-million dollar bond issue for capital improvements, this newspaper has always been there. When public school students have excelled in any number of sports and academic competitions over the last few decades, when school nurses have wanted to announce vaccination requirements, when school administrators have wanted to promote parent/ teacher open houses, when local merchants have wanted to congratulate students on their many successes,....The Record and other weekly newspapers like it in other towns like this one have always been there.


That is why it is even more puzzling that the Texas Association of School Boards would be on the leading edge of a movement among tax-supported entities to circumvent the state's public notice laws. Or maybe it's not so puzzling.

You see, there are things most school boards really want the public to know about their students and their schools. They are the stories and images that fill the pages of most community newspapers from Labor Day through Memorial Day each year, and which most publishers welcome as the vital news and information they know their readers count on finding inside the pages of each week's edition.

We could stack up a long line of witnessesincluding parents, students and most notably, our school trustees and administrators-who welcome the newspaper's ability to shine the light on their educational efforts and would willingly testify to how essential it is to the business of raising the next generation of leaders.

There are other things, though, that some school boards would prefer the local newspaper not report, like low TAKS scores or losing football records or errant teachers or contentious school board meetings or principle-less principals or-heaven forbid-school trustees who flout open meetings laws and violate the public's trust. But even most of them would admithowever grudgingly-that there's no better way to stir up a hornet's nest than to land on the wrong side of the local newspaper editor. That is because this country's community newspapers are the only media that report the important news of their hometowns-day in and day out, win; lose or draw, and even when hell occasionally freezes over. They are the burrs under the saddle that provoke discomfort when they call attention to the fact that the board room is only large enough to accommodate the school board and superintendent. They are also often the champions of small rural schools when Governor Rick Perry blames superintendents for causing a \$27 billion budget deficit that a sadder but wiser former State Comptroller once correctly warned would be the inevitable result of bad legislation backed by the very same Governor.

nursing education programs, many early Texas nurses were not nurses by trade but housewives, mothers and women who by the nature of their domestic responsibilities, also took on the duties of local 'nurse' and 'caretaker.' On the Frontier, it was largely considered part of a female's role to care for the sick, sanitize and suture wounds, and help women during childbirth. Physicians were few and far between, so it was often the closest female who was called on when

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

Public notice is too often viewed as the media's cause. It probably is, but only because we are the ones the public-by its default-has sent to do the job. They had better be damn glad someone is doing it.

In HB 400, carried by House Public Education Committee chair Rob Eissler, the Texas Association of School Boards and their member districts are trying to remove the mandate to post important public notices-of financial condition, performance, tax rate and budget adoption-in those very same community newspapers to which the public, and school trustees and administrators so often turn for information and

And while that is a piddling amount of money to school districts, it is often the life blood of community newspaper like ours, who are called upon to do so much more for which they can never be compensated.

We urge the public, the school district, the teachers and parents and students and administrators and school board members: do not let public notice be removed from the community newspaper on which you rely and on whose vigilance and well-measured support you can always depend. Please make a phone call or write a letter in support of public notice in your community newspapers, and in opposition to HB 400.

Alzheimer's Reduced by Vascular Dementia Prevention According to recent studies by Chinese researchers, the continued treatment of certain conditions in persons with mild mental (cognitive) impairment, and at risk for vascular dementia, may prevent new strokes and also delay the onset of Alzheimer's disease. The drugs used to treat these conditions, such as high blood pressure, diabetes, and heart disease, often includes those that increase blood flow to the brain (examples are pentoxifylline and ergoloid mesylates) and drugs used to control these conditions. This research involved more than 800 men and women ages 55 and older. They found that when these chronic conditions were properly treated, those that received treatment were almost 40% less likely to develop Alzheimer's disease.
