Burglar caught Sunday morning

An Oklahoma City man was arrested Sunday after he burglarized a rural Donley County home.

Mike Robert Spence, age 57, reportedly broke into the home of Dan Hall on FM 1260 before noon when a family member returned. Sheriff Butch Blackburn said Hall's daughter saw a white man run out of the house, carrying a backpack. She dialed 911 and reported that the man ran east through some trees.

Blackburn, who lives nearby, said he went through what was formerly County Road 16 and caught the subject as he arrived at a white 4-door Ford pickup. The sheriff arrested Spence and recovered all the stolen property, which included cameras, cookies, and cash.

The pickup also was reported stolen out of Amarillo.

Spence was awaiting arraignment Monday morning on charges of Burglary of a Habitation and Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle.

Blackburn said Spence is wanted in Oklahoma and California and has a lengthy criminal history consisting of mostly theft and burglary charges.

Certification deadline near

Donley County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Bruce Ferguson, reminds producers that the annual crop certification deadline for spring-seeded crops is July 15, 2011.

Producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

"I encourage all producers to visit the Donley County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the July 15 deadline in order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements," said Ferguson

Considering the current drought situation in Texas, producers are also reminded to report crop losses insured through Federal Crop Insurance and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) within 15 days of the disaster or after the loss is apparent.

Voice support for Hedley's **Post Office**

Donley County residents need to pull together to help the community of Hedley save an important resource to the town - its post office.

The Hedley Post Office has been without a fulltime postmaster since last August, and now its customers have been notified that the US Postal Service would like to close up shop there in favor of a rural carrier system. Retail postal

services would be available only in Clarendon or Memphis, and the folks in Hedley are not happy about the idea.

Postal customers will get their chance to voice their concerns in a public meeting with postal representatives next Wednesday, July 20, 2011, at 4:30 p.m. at the Hedley Baptist by roger estlack Fellowship Hall, located at 310

N Main, and every interested party needs to be there. The Hedley school and local businesses depend on the post office for many day-to-day functions, and other local government functions and senior citizens

would also be harmed by the shuttering of the post office. With no local post office, life will become a little more inconvenient for the folks in Hedley. Imagine a half-hour round trip just to mail a package. There are also delivery considerations that need to be looked at. For example, when will folks in Hedley get their Clarendon Enterprise each week? There are huge forces at play here. According to

a USPS press release: "The Postal Service lost \$8.5 billion in fiscal year 2010 (Oct. 1, 2010 to Sept. 30, 2010) — that equates to losing more than \$23 million every single day of the year. Mail volume has declined by 43.1 billion pieces in the past five years — from an all-time high of 213 billion in 2006 to 170 billion in 2010." USPS says it is doing "everything possible to reduce costs and save money — this will

involve consolidating operations wherever possible."

By its own admission, the United States Postal Service is in trouble, and rural America is going to take a hit in any attempt to retool the system for the 21st century. Other area post offices have less business than Hedley and may face closure. Right now it is Hedley's post office on the chopping block. One has to wonder if trends continue how long it will be before Clarendon or Claude or Memphis is faced with something similar. We may not lose retail postal services completely here, but it is foreseeable that the day may come when the post office contracts with a private business for these services.

There is a real fear that the postal service in America is headed for obsolescence. More and more people prefer to use e-mail and web-based communications for everything from personal correspondence to paying their bills. Every postage increase drives more business away from the post office, and shuttering rural post offices, in addition to making rural life harder, will likewise force people to look at alternatives. In 10 years, the Post Office as we know it today may be extinct, killed by a combination of apathy, technology, and poor management.

But that certainly does not mean that rural America should just sit by and watch it happen. In fact, now more than ever, it is time to stand up and be counted and let USPS officials know exactly how integral post offices are to rural life.

Max Heath, Postal Chairman for the National Newspaper Association and a friend of your humble editor, has some advice for saving rural post offices that we all need to pay attention to:

1. Provide written comments within the proper time frame, keeping them factual rather than emotional. Remind decision makers that the proposed rules require USPS to "provide a maximum degree of effective and regular postal services to rural areas, communities, and small towns where post offi ces are not self-sustaining."

2. Be sure local businesses are involved and make their voice heard. Attend the public hearing.

3. Contact your representative and senators and ask their help in applying their clout to the objections of others.

4. If you lose, you have the right of appeal to the PRC within 30 days of the posting of the final determination.

Everyone who has a stake in the Hedley Post Office needs to be at the public meeting next Wednesday, July 20, 2011, at 4:30 p.m. at the Hedley Baptist Fellowship Hall. And everyone also needs to send written comments to: Consumer Affairs Manager, USPS Fort Worth District, 4600 Mark IV Parkway, Fort Worth, TX 76161-9631, before the July 25, 2011 deadline. And remember to keep your comments factual and polite.

Let's make sure every decision maker knows that Hedley needs its post office.

Meanwhile...

Kudos to Chamber of Commerce President Charlie Smith for his work on Clarendon's July Fourth activities. All in all, everyone seemed to have a great time; and while there may have been a couple of hiccups, everything went very smoothly. This is especially true when you consider Smith didn't have much in the way of help and he had never been in charge of the parades and other activities before. Improvements can be made with experience, but for now, the community should thank him for his effort.

Keep energy use down as heat rises

With temperatures frequently escalating to more than 100 degrees during the Texas summer, high utility costs may seem inevitable. Older Texans on limited or fixed incomes are often hit hardest. Although your bills may become more expensive during this blistering season, raising the thermostat to uncomfortable levels to save money does not have to be your only option.

Fortunately, there are many ways that you can easily reduce home energy expenses.

To start off, keep your curtains, blinds or shades closed to prevent warm air from entering through poorly-sealed windows and the Texas sun from warming up your home. Do you have a fireplace? Be sure that the damper is closed.

Also, turn off lights in unoccupied rooms. Don't forget kitchen and bathroom ventilating fans. If left on, these fans can quickly blow all of the cooled air out of a house.

To save water, take showers instead of baths. Run clothes and dishwashers only when you have a full load. Use

the cold water setting on your washing machine, when possible, to save energy. Also in the laundry room, clean your dryer's lint filter after every load, and periodically clean the vent. Lint buildup can waste energy or even cause a fire.

Moreover, unplug block-type chargers, such as those for phones, computers and small appliances, from the wall when not in use. If these chargers are plugged in, they're still consuming energy, even if you aren't charging any devices.

Finally, to keep your air conditioning running at its best, clean your vents and make sure they aren't blocked by curtains, furniture or carpet. Use heatgenerating appliances, such as dryers and ovens, during the coolest time of day to keep your air conditioner from working so hard. Turn your ceiling fans to low, and be sure they're set to rotate in the direction that forces cool air near the ceiling down.

Tried all these things but still struggling to afford your bills? There may be help available.

You could also be eligible the feder-

ally-funded Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program based on income and other eligibility requirements. Call 1-866-674-6327 to find out more.

By dialing 211, you can reach more than 60,000 additional state and local programs, including several that help with energy assistance and weatherizing your home.

Don't qualify for these programs? Ask your energy provider about flexible payment plans. Deferred payment plans allow customers to pay outstanding bills in installments over a longer period of time. You may need to make an initial payment of 50 percent of the total amount due. Another option is average payment plans, which let customers pay approximately the same amount for electricity each month.

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














We must be sure to pay our military

With the United States only weeks away from hitting our \$14.3 trillion debt ceiling and leaders in Washington divided over deficit reduction, the American people are very concerned and rightfully so. This looming deadline over the debt ceiling certainly underscores a very troubling fiscal reality for our nation. Our soaring national debt is stifling economic growth and job creation. But this budget crisis is also an opportunity for leaders in Washington to make the tough choices that are neces-. sary to put our country back on a path to sustainable prosperity.

Despite some resistance to the true causes and the seriousness of our nation's budget deficit and debt problems, I am undeterred, and remain hopeful that Congress and the White House will come together in the next few weeks on a plan to balance the federal budget and ensure that we will not need to raise the debt ceiling again. But as Congress and the White House hammer out tough decisions on spending, there should be no disagreement nor any question over whether America will pay our troops on time and in full for their services. If there is one thing that all of us in Congress can agree on, it is our tremendous pride and support for our brave men and women in uniform.

As current law stands, if the Congress and the White House were unable to agree on a budget and debt limit plan, and a government shutdown were to occur, our active duty military would not receive a paycheck to support themselves and their families. They would continue to do their patriotic duties and, in many cases, put their lives on the line for our country. But they would not be paid, until Congress and the President could agree on the debt ceiling plan.

Last April, when we were facing the threat of another government shutdown, I introduced the Ensuring Pay for Our Mili-

pay on time and in full. Immediately after introducing this bill last spring, I was contacted by a military spouse. Her husband was on his tenth deployment in support of operations in the Middle East. The spouse was at home raising their 1-year-old son. She was very concerned about whether she would be able to pay her bills if the government in fact shut down. And her heartbreaking story is the story of thousands of other military families across our country. We can only imagine the stress of families who have loved ones in

Even the threat of an interruption of pay is very stressful for military families. This is unacceptable. The last thing our military families should worry about is not receiving their paycheck on time because Congress and the President have


harm's way.

not been able to make the tough choices on the nation's finances. At a time when our nation has

100,000 troops in Afghanistan and more than 45,000 in Iraq, it is unconscionable to me that we ask our troops to serve on the front lines while worrying about whether the mortgage can be paid on time. From the state of Texas alone, there are more than 28,000 soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines currently deployed, which is second only to California in the highest number of deployed troops from one state.

These brave Texans are working long hours in extreme conditions, facing a dangerous enemy, and the most remarkable thing is they all raised their right hands and volunteered. The very least we can do is make sure they get paid in the event of a government shutdown. It would be tremendously damaging for morale to tell our troops to go on long deployments, away from their families, and then not pay them.

My bill currently has 80 cosponsors in the Senate and should sail through both houses of Congress with bipartisan support. Now is the time for Congress to vote to ensure that our troops will not miss a paycheck due to gridlock in Washington. Now. Not at midnight on August 2nd.

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Advanced Prostate Cancer Drug Approved

A few weeks ago, the FDA approved a new drug for the treatment of prostate cancer that does not respond to other treatments. The drug is called Jevtana (cabazitaxel). It was approved to be given along with prednisone for the treatment of metastatic prostate cancer that does not respond to standard prostate cancer treatment called testosteronedeprivation. Results from this trial indicate that while Jevtana did not cause complete remission from the cancer, it prolonged life in men with advanced prostate cancer by an average of 10 weeks over standard treatment. Treatment with Jevtana is administered every three weeks as a one hour intravenous infusion in combination with prednisone taken orally every day throughout the treatment period. Monitoring for drug side effects is recommended.

Prostate cancer is the second most common cancer among men residing in the United States. The American Cancer Society indicates that an estimated 192,280 new cases of this type of cancer were reported in the United States in 2009. According to the society, over 27,000 deaths occurred that same year in men with this type of cancer.



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

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

Sign up for drop disaster benefit before July 29

Donley County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Bruce Ferguson, announced that the deadline to apply for assistance for 2009 crop losses under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program is July 29, 2011.

"The SURE program compensates producers for production and/ or quality losses during times of disaster," said Ferguson. "All producers who have experienced crop production and/or crop quality losses must apply for SURE program benefits by the July 29 deadline," he said.

To meet program eligibility requirements, the farming operation must be physically located in a county that was declared a primary or contiguous disaster county by the Secretary of Agriculture under a 2009 Secretarial Disaster Designation.

Producers located in designated disaster counties must have suffered at least a 10 percent loss on a crop of economic significance and purchased crop insurance through the Federal Crop Insurance Act or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP).

However, an operation located in a county that did not receive a primary or contiguous disaster designation, can still qualify for SURE benefits if the actual farm production was less than 50 percent of the normal production on the farm due

to a qualifying disaster event. Producers and legal entities collectively cannot, directly or indirectly, receive more than \$100,000 in SURE and other FSA disaster assistance payments. FSA disaster programs include SURE, Livestock Forage Program (LFP), Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP), and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-raised Fish (ELAP).


Producers or legal entities, whose nonfarm income is more than \$500,000, are not eligible for SURE

NOTICE

The City of Clarendon is nearing Stage 4 Drought conditions and citizens' cooperation is needed to achieve a 30 percent reduction in water usage. Please observe the following guidelines:

1. Limit outside watering to twice-a-week and then only before 10 a.m. and after 7 p.m. Residential customers with odd-numbered street addresses should water on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Even-numbered addresses should water on Thursdays and Sundays, and commercial customers should water on Tuesdays and Fridays.

2. Limit washing motor vehicles, motorbikes, boats, and other vehicles at home to before 10 a.m. or after 7 p.m. on your designated watering day, and then use a bucket and/or hand-held hose with a shut-off nozzle. Commercial car washes are excepted.

3. Avoid filling swimming pools except during the above hours.

4. Avoid operating ornamental fountains unless necessary to support aquatic life or if equipped with a recirculation system.

5. Do not water-wash driveways, sidewalks, or other hard-surfaced areas. Do not wash down buildings or structures except for immediate fire protection.

6. Repair all leaks as soon as possible, and report any leaks or unauthorized usage to City Hall. Night and weekend emergency leaks should be reported to the Donley County Sheriff's Office at 806-874-3533.





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

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


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
