### Clarendon residents try to conserve

The voluntary water restrictions suggested by the City of Clarendon due to drought and water shortage conditions are affecting the lifestyles of many citizens.

For Peter and Marilyn Odima, residents of Clarendon for 12 years, the water restriction hinders their lawn care routine.

"This is the first year they've cut us down like this," Marilyn said. "We spend money buying plants to make our yard look good, and I spend a lot of time working on it. Everyone tells me it looks nice, and I don't want it to die."

The Odimas said their exceptionally high water bill this month is due to the heat.

"We water on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and the water bill has never been this high." Marilyn said. "When there are 107°-114° temperatures, it's hard not to water your lawn if you want it to look good. I don't want to have to replace my plants that will die."

Joe's Lawn and Tree Care is one business that is slightly affected by the water shortage.

"I've lost some business by it, but I've also gained business," Joe Hall said. "More trees are dying and they need me to trim the branches. It's definitely affected me, not necessarily in a negative way though."

City Administrator Lambert Little said that citizens need to be aware of the severe conditions of the level three drought and the need for a 30 percent reduction in water usage.

# Mandatory restrictions in Hedley

Mandatory water restrictions are in place for citizens of the City of Hedley following a July 7 meeting of the Board of Aldermen there.

Mayor Dusty Wilkinson said his board put rules in place after receiving word from Greenbelt Water Authority about the low level of the lake and learning that the Red River Water Authority, which buys water from Greenbelt, had placed mandatory restrictions on its customers.

Greenbelt is currently in Stage Three of its drought contingency plan, which calls for its member cities - Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah, and Crowell - to voluntarily reduce water usage by 30 percent.

So far, Hedley is the only member city to enact mandatory restrictions, and Mayor Dusty Wilkinson says his city is doing the right thing.

"Water is the most precious resource we have," Wilkinson told the Enterprise. "If it's gone, we're gone."

Minutes from the July 7 meeting were not available at press time, but City Hall said the rules went into effect July 11. Mayor Wilkinson said he's only received one comment from the public about the measures and that person said it should have been done a long time ago.

Hedley's mandatory rules are as follows:

1) Outside watering utilizing sprinklers or irrigation systems will only be allowed on Monday and Thursday, However, no watering

# Local firemen battle several July wildfires

Five wildfires in and around Donley County have burned more than 800 acres since July 9, with the biggest fire consuming 475 acres south of Hedley.

Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department First Assistant Chief Jeremy Powell says eight city units responded to the big fire on the Finch Ranch and Quail Trail Ranch on July 13, and firemen were on the scene from 2:06 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. Hedley responded with three units, and assistance also came from Wellington, Memphis, and Samnorwood.

Donley County Precincts #1, #3, and #4 sent motor graders, and TxDOT responded with three motor graders and three dozers. The Texas and US forest services responded with Task Force 16 based out of Childress consisting of two dozers and two engines. Air Attack out of Amarillo responded and directed two SEATS (Single Engine Air Tankers) that were based out of the Childress Airport.

Clarendon EMS assisted with firefighter rehab, and the Donley County Sheriff's Office and Constable Doug Wright assisted with traffic and incoming mutual aid units.

Powell said the grass fire was started by a lightning storm that occurred on July 11 and 12. The Finch Ranch headquarters was threatened by

# America must continue the legacy of NASA

We watched with pride and admiration as the last shuttle flight launched last Friday. Pride and admiration that were bittersweet because of what this moment symbolized for the shuttle program, and because of the concerns we have about where we go from here to maintain American leadership in space exploration.

Over 40 years ago, our nation and the world paused to witness history as astronauts Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin saw firsthand the "magnificent desolation" of the moon. The final shuttle launch comes at a time when we need to be reminded that we can overcome challenges and achieve great things, when we

are committed and dedicated and prepared to step up to the plate.

As we reflect on successes of the Shuttle program, we must also honor the vision, courage and accomplishments of all of the men and women of the NASA family, whether astronauts, engineers, flight directors or assembly workers, and their families. We thank them for nearly two generations of excellence and leadership in science and technology that continue to touch and improve tens of millions of lives.

For more than 40 years, the world has been in awe of our dominance in space, from the moon landing to the International Space. But after decades of space superiority, our nation finds itself at a new crossroads of space exploration. As a nation we must decide: do we continue to reach for the stars, or do we let another country like Russia or China take that leadership? Our nation has embraced the challenge of space not because it was easy, but because global leadership in science and technology are the keys to future economic growth and ultimately to our national security.

In order to ensure that America wouldn't lose the momentum of a half-century of achievement and investment in NASA, Senator Bill Nelson of Florida and I negotiated a bipartisan NASA Reauthorization bill last year. Our legislation safeguards America's human space flight capabilities, balancing new commercial space investment with a robust mission for NASA. The new law prioritizes scientific research and protects our sizeable investment in the International Space Station.

Despite overwhelming Congressional support when this legislation was approved, the Obama Administration unfortunately is dragging its feet in implementing the new law. This foot-dragging is more than just failing to carry out the law, as the Constitution requires. The Administration's delays put current and future American jobs and industries at risk, and hand over to competing nations a golden opportunity to take the global lead in technology.

During the past 40 years, NASA scientists and engineers have pioneered more than 6,300 technologies that are now commonly used in our day-to-day lives. These technological breakthroughs have led to long-distance telecommunications, as well as satellites that aid in national security efforts, GPS systems, and television programming. Other scientific advances have not only improved our quality of life but have also resulted in medical breakthroughs that save lives every day, such as the technology used in CAT scanners, MRIs, and pacemakers, just to name a few. The contributions our space program has made to science, our national security, and our economy illustrate why we can't abdicate our leadership role in the world.

Ultimately, Space program-stimulated scientific advances create innovations and breakthroughs that create jobs, improve competitiveness, and boost quality of life. One way to advance those objectives is to extend and expand our commitment to fully utilize the US National Laboratory aboard the International Space Station, and ensure it is effectively maintained and used for broad scientific and engineering research. We also must continue to encourage important NASA programs in Space Science, Earth Science, fundamental aeronautics research, and education if we want to see job and industry growth.

We must fully understand the fact that we are entering a period of risk to the viability of the space station without the availability of the space shuttle. We must close the gap between the shuttle and its successor vehicles as quickly as possible. Without a viable space program leading and inspiring technology and innovation, we also jeopardize our economy and national security. We have a clear path toward replacing the shuttle's crew and cargo delivery capabilities, and a failure to follow that path could lead toward the virtual extinction of U.S. human spaceflight capability.

"We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win."

# The lasting legacy of Molly Goodnight

Known as the "Mother of the Panhandle," this month marks 141 years since the marriage of Mary Ann "Molly" Dyer to one of Texas' most famous ranchers, Charles Goodnight. Married on July 26, 1870, the couple spent a seven-year stint ranching in Pueblo, Colorado, before a number of unfavorable conditions resulted in their relocation to the Palo Duro Canyon. According to historical accounts, Molly, as she would be regarded by cowhands throughout the years, considered Texas to be much more civilized than Colorado and was particularly disturbed when two men were found hanged to death on a telegraph pole nearby. This lack of civility, coupled with the ensuing drought and the Panic of 1873, resulted in the Goodnights relocating to the Palo Duro Canyon in the Texas Panhandle.

Charles found a financial backer in John George Adair, a wealthy Irish landowner, and the two men and their wives started the JA Ranch in the Palo Duro Canyon. The Goodnights convinced the Adairs to select this location because of the plentiful grass for grazing, a steady water supply, and protection for the cattle during the winter by the canyon walls.

The group moved a herd of 100 Durham bulls and four wagons stocked with provisions to the site in May of 1877 and built a two-room cabin. Soon the ranch to Charles and Molly, signing a five-year contract that guaranteed Charles one-third of the ranch's interest and a \$2,500 annual salary.

Charles began what would become an 11-year career with the JA Ranch, growing the herd and expanding the ranch, which at its peak spanned 1,325,000 acres. Faithfully by his side was Molly, who not only carried out the duties of homemaker but also served as his helpmate on the ranch: Charles designed a two-horned saddle to make it easier for Molly to navigate the ranch on horseback. She quickly learned the ins and outs of ranch life, including the often long and lonely periods when few visitors would cross their path and the nearest neighbors lived 75 miles away. It's said that when a cowboy gave the Goodnights three chickens as a token of appreciation – intended for a Sunday supper - Molly made the chickens her personal pets to help pass the time.

Over the years, Molly earned the respect and admiration of the cattlemen for the compassion she showed them and the natural remedies she developed for wounds and fevers. She often gave parties for the cowboys, mended their

dle" or the "Darling of the Plains."

Molly also extended her compassion to orphaned buffalo calves who were left to die after commercial hunters killed their mothers on the range. By rescuing the orphaned buffalo and bottle-feeding them, Molly established an impressive buffalo herd, soon known around the world as the Goodnight Herd. Many credit her efforts with helping to prevent the extinction of the southern buffalo.

As the Panhandle became more populated, Molly donated her time to various philanthropic efforts. In 1898, she and Charles helped establish Goodnight College through the donation of 340 acres. Molly passed away in April 1926. A fitting tribute to her life, her gravestone was inscribed: "Mary Ann Dyer Goodnight One who spent her whole life in the service of others."

Today, visitors can catch a glimpse of Molly Goodnight's life in various exhibits at the Armstrong County Museum in Claude, Texas. The museum is also working to restore the Goodnight home, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, and develop the Charles Goodnight Historical Center. 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
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

# Solutions for America's 'tax gap'

In 2010, there was a "tax gap" - i.e., the difference between federal taxes owed and those actually paid - of \$410-\$500 billion.

Some of the gap stems from the complexity of the tax code. Much of it, though, is deliberate – self-employed individuals working for cash, table-servers under-reporting tips, taxpayers claiming unauthorized credits and deductions. And don't forget the highly paid White House, congressional, and federal agency staff (including some at the Internal Revenue Service) who, according to reports last year, collectively underpaid their taxes by tens of millions of dollars.

Unpaid taxes are unfair to the millions of taxpayers who pay their full tax obligation. What can be done?

Some suggest beefing up the IRS's budget and manpower. Many oppose this out of concern that an enlarged IRS would be like the Transportation Security Administration, making life miserable for millions of law-abiding citizens

President Obama estimates that increased enforcement would capture 10 percent of the tax gap. That sounds accurate. Completely eliminating the tax gap is no more possible than completely eliminating waste and fraud from Medicare. When systems become as gigantic and convoluted as our tax code and the Medicare system, all the king's horses and all the king's men can't extirpate fraud, waste, and loss.

Since the tax gap is so intractable, we should investigate alternatives to the reflex political "solution" of hiring more government workers. I do not condone breaking the law, but if millions of otherwise law-abiding Americans are defying a law, then maybe something is wrong with the law itself.

Millions of Americans despise our tax laws. They believe that taxes are excessive and that the tax regime is arbitrary, discriminatory, and oppressive. One potential reform is to adopt a low, flat tax rate, such as those that Russia

and other erstwhile communist countries now have. Low, flat taxes reduce the incentive to cheat. Fewer people risk criminal prosecution for 12 or 15 percent of their income than when 28 percent or more is at stake. In addition to greatly simplifying the tax code (which would also reduce the portion of the tax gap resulting from miscalculations), a flat tax lessens the rebellion fueled by discriminatory progressive taxes.

An even more effective way to eliminate the tax gap would be the appropriately labeled "fair tax," which would replace all federal taxes on income with a national tax on consumption. The fair tax would restore taxpayer privacy, save the colossal amount of time spent calculating (or miscalculating) one's tax liability, and would bring the vast underground economy above ground into the taxpaying realm.

Either a flat tax or a fair tax would be better than the existing tax code, but the problem underlying the tax gap goes beyond our crazy, convoluted tax code. The fundamental problem is the widespread perception that our political system itself is immoral, dishonest, and corrupt.

Is it any wonder that taxpayers are cynical and demoralized when politicians routinely break promises; the government's own accounting watchdogs refuse to vouch for the accuracy of government's official budget figures; rich people and busi-

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nesses with expensive tax attorneys and accountants can legally avoid taxes; and wellfunded, politicallyconnected special interests get billions in handouts and bailouts from government?


Citizens perceive that our democratic process has degenerated into what H.L. Mencken dubbed an "advance auction of stolen goods." Trillions of dollars per year are redistributed according to who has power, connections, and lobbyists. American politics has become a never-ending donnybrook in which nearly everyone wants the government to make somebody else pay for the benefits they receive.

In the moral lawlessness that characterizes a redistributionist state, respect for property rights atrophies. When politicians, intellectuals, clergymen, the media, etc. demagogically denounce "the rich" and have the effrontery to call income that they grudgingly let a taxpayer keep "a tax expenditure," it is not a good situation for property rights. In this "every man for himself," "grab what you can get" culture, many individuals will defy the law.

The root cause of our elaborate, confusing, costly, maddening, and unfair tax system - and of the tax gap - is our delusional belief that we are entitled to a free lunch and our morally bankrupt insistence that government subsidize our lifestyles with wealth from others. Until we correct those errors and quit worshiping at the altar of Big Government, the tax gap will not go away.

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
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



Howardwick and Hedley, however, both saw their monthly revenues drop in July, but Howardwick is still ahead for the year-to-date.

Hedley received \$362.67 for the month, a drop of 57.58 percent. That brings the total for the year so far to \$3,805.72, which is down 12.79 per-

Howardwick's allocation was just barely less than last July's, dropping 0.22 percent to \$1,121.34, and bringing that city's total for the year to \$7,393.58, an increase of 5.61 per-

Combs said that state sales tax revenue in June was \$1.72 billion, up 7.2 percent compared to June 2010.

"The state's sales tax revenue has now increased for 15 months in a row," said Combs. "Strong business spending boosted sales tax revenue in sectors such as the oil and gas industry and manufacturing, and the retail sector continued to show growth."

Statewide, Texas cities received \$315.5 million, up 6.2 percent compared to July 2010. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up 6.3 percent compared to the same time period last year.

July sales tax allocations represent sales that occurred in May.

Rapid RA Relief with Added Therapy

According to new data presented recently at the Annual Meeting of the European League Against Rheumatism, an FDA approved drug called Cimzia (certolizumab pegol), an inhibitor of tissue necrosis factor (TNF), provided an important and rapid relief of rheumatoid arthritis (RA) symptoms, when added to standard RA medicines. Improvement for those who took Cimzia was recorded as being statistically significant at week 12 of a study involving 2,367 individuals with RA. There were clinically important reductions reported in pain, fatigue and sleep problems related to the RA in those who had or had not previously received a TNF-type medication for their RA. Medical experts indicate that this study is valuable in that it demonstrates that this drug can have a significant impact on the quality of life of persons who are diagnosed with this condition.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a chronic, inflammatory autoimmune (immune cells attack the body's own healthy tissues) condition. Primary symptoms include joint pain and morning stiffness in joints. Just over 2 million people in the U.S. are affected.







"Today, your options as far as selling and marketing your cattle and calves abound.


"Which option suits your operation best? What are the pros and cons of different marketing techniques? These are questions that will be answered at the workshop."
