Greenbelt Water declares Stage 4

The hot, dry summer has now officially pushed Greenbelt Lake into Stage Four of its drought contingency plan, but for this week Clarendon and Hedley residents are still being told to follow Stage Three restrictions.

Greenbelt Water Authority is publishing notice in this week's ENTERPRISE that it met the criteria for the Emergency Water Shortage Condition when the reservoir reached an elevation of 2628.00 last Tuesday, August 2. That's a lake depth of 48 feet.

Greenbelt reported a depth of 47.74 feet this Tuesday.

The water authority says it appreciates the efforts of everyone in its service area to conserve water, noting that it has seen good reductions in water use from all its member cities. The authority continues to ask people for help in the effort to reduce water use by 30 percent.

The need for greater restrictions will be considered by the Greenbelt Board of Directors next Thursday, August 18. The location of that meeting had not been set at press time.

City officials in Clarendon and Hedley said Tuesday their citizens should continue to abide by Stage 3 mandatory restrictions until notified otherwise.



Clarendon's Stage 3 Rules

1. Limit outside watering to twice-a-week, and then before 10:00 a.m. and after 7:00 p.m. Residential customers with odd-numbered street addresses water on Wednesdays and Saturdays. Residential customers with even-numbered street addresses water on Thursdays and Sundays. Commercial customers water on Tuesdays and Fridays. 2. Limit washing of motor vehicles, motorbikes, boats, and other vehicles at home to before 10:00 am or after 7:00 pm on your designated watering day, and then use a bucket and/or a hand-held hose equipped with a shut-off nozzle. Commercial car washes are excepted.

3. Avoid filling swimming pools except during the above watering hours.

4. Avoid operating ornamental fountains unless necessary to support aquatic life or if equipped with a recirculation system.

Do not water-wash driveways, sidewalks, and other hard-surfaced areas. Do not wash down buildings or structures except for immediate fire protection.

6. Repair all leaks as soon as possible, and

report any leaks or unauthorized usage to City Hall. Night and weekend emergency leaks should be reported to the Donley County Sheriff's Office at 806.874.3533. Persons found guilty of violating Clarendon's Stage 3 rules can face a maximum fine of

Hedley's Stage 3 Rules

1. Outside watering utilizing sprinklers or irrigation systems will only be allowed on Monday and Thursday, However, no watering will be allowed between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Hand watering only will be allowed on Sundays.

2. No washing of vehicles, boats, RV's or driveways is allowed. 3. Customers with livestock tubs must main-

tain the float systems in good repair to alleviate any overflow. 4. Swimming pools must be maintained to

reduce evaporation and water loss due to flushing. 5. All commercial and other known high

water users are asked to reduce usage and prevent waste. 6. Watch for leaks and notify personnel at

Hedley City Hall immediately if one is found. 7. Violators will be given one verbal warning. After the warning has been given a fine of \$50 will be charged to your water bill every time you are caught violating the rules.

It's 2 a.m. when the peaceful silence in a local home is broken by the sound of an emergency pager going off. A man pulls himself from his slumber and quickly heads off to help someone he may not even know, while his wife remains behind to wonder what danger might await

This is the life of a volunteer fireman and his family - answering calls for help at all hours and facing unknown peril in the process. But they do it week in and week out as a way to serve their community and lend a hand to their fellow man.

They ask for nothing in return, but this month the community has an opportunity to express its appreciation to the members of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department at a fundraising dinner on August 27. The event, being organized by the Clarendon Firebelles, follows a February incident in which four firemen were very nearly injured while working an accident and one fire truck was totaled by a careless motorist.

Felicia Powell said she and other Firebelles are organizing the benefit dinner to recognize the firemen's contributions to the community and to help raise funds for much needed equipment. For Felicia, supporting the fire department is nothing new. Her husband. Jeremy, has been a Clarendon fireman for 16 years.

"I'm very proud of him, and it's something he loves," Powell said. "I want people to realize that it is so important what our volunteer firemen do. They put their lives on the line every day for Clarendon and Donley County, and they are really just a bunch of great guys."

Clarendon **TAKS** scores 'acceptable'

Clarendon Independent School District received a rating of Academically Acceptable from the state's accountability system this year due to increased standards.

The ratings are partly based on Texas Assessment of Knowledge & Skills (TAKS) scores. This year, in order to meet a Recognized rating, 15 - 24 percent of students must have commended performance scores, and 25 percent and up to be Exemplary. The state also removed the use of the Texas Projection Measure (TPM) this year, which did not count students who would fail but were projected to pass in the future.

Clarendon Elementary received a Recognized rating, down from an Exemplary rating the previous two years. Clarendon Junior High went up from Academically Acceptable last year to Recognized this year. Clarendon High received a rating of Academically Acceptable, same as last year.

"We made gains all in all," Superintendent Monty Hysinger said. "Especially considering more kids were brought into the accountability system this year."

On the TAKS across the district, Clarendon had 94 percent of students pass the reading/English language arts portion of the test, down from 95 percent last year; 94 percent in writing, down from 96 percent; 99 percent in social studies, up from 95 percent; 84 percent in math, up from 82 percent; and 93 percent in science, up from 92 percent.

"We appreciate the hard work of the teachers and students," Hysinger said. "Now we will start studying and preparing for the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) test, which will replace the TAKS test this year."

Clarendon TAKS results for Clarendon Elementary are as follows - reading 96 percent, down from 98 percent last year; writing 97 percent, down from 100 percent; mathematics 93 percent, up from 92 percent; and science 90 percent, down from 100 percent.

"Overall, we had a good year," Elementary principal Mike Word said. "Our commended performance went up and it's nice to see that. I hope to see that continue in the Elementary building. We have really great teachers and a good curriculum."

Clarendon Jr. High resultsreading/English language arts 88 percent, same as last year; writing 92 percent, up from 91 percent; social studies 99 percent, up from 92 percent; mathematics 79 percent, up from 71 percent; and science 91 percent, up from 82 percent.

"Given the increased standards, the TPM being taken away and the added commended requirement, receiving a Recognized ranking shows how hard our teachers worked, how well our students performed, and that we're the best Jr. High in the state," Jr. High principal John Taylor said.



Obama order would stifle free speech

The Obama administration has drafted a new, little-noticed executive order that would plainly stiffe free speech. The "Disclosure of Political Spending by Government Contractors" order is still a draft, but if the administration has its way, the order will be in full force soon.

Premised on the idea that sunlight disinfects, President Obama's executive order would require all bidders for federal contracts to disclose all financial contributions to candidates standing for election. The order includes all corporate contributions and all personal giving in excess of \$5,000 by officers and directors of corporations concerned, and it also requires the disclosure of contributions made to third-party groups like the National Rifle Association or the Center for American Progress. The order takes direct aim at the \$530 billion in federal contracts that will be issued in 2012, and it represents the latest move in a series of tactics designed to drag the Supreme Court's defense of the First Amendment in the Citizens United decision through the mud.

The Court's decision, announced in 2009, struck down parts of the McCain-Feingold Act that prohibited corporations and unions from broadcasting on behalf of candidates close to a primary. The move sparked a public feud between President Obama and the Court, as Obama (in an infamous moment) chose his State of the Union Address in 2010 to openly criticize the ruling. Reacting instinctively, Associate Justice Samuel Alito responded to Obama's factually incorrect criticism by mouthing the words "not true" in a very public way.

The Court, of course, was acting to defend free speech from the muzzle of government regulation, even if that regulation was proscribed in the name of openness and transparency. Affirming the First Amendment, the Court sided with the Founding Fathers, who hotly rejected the idea of disclosure on all political communication. Indeed, the pseudonym "Publius" was employed by Hamilton, Madison, and John Jay as a way to protect themselves as they defended the passage of the new Constitution in The Federalist Papers, and similar nom de plume moves came with such high-profile public debates as Thomas Paine's Common Sense, signed "Written by an Englishman," and a cabinet debate between Hamilton and Madison under the names "Pacificus" and "Helvidius."

Anonymity is an important cornerstone to American politics because it insulates the speaker from reprisal by the government or another disgruntled group in the face of political criticism. Additionally, providing the speaker with anonymity allows the argument to stand on its own merits, removing the caustic ad hominem barbs often attached to political discourse. The provision of anonymity has a rich heritage as, in the words of the Court, "a shield from the tyranny of the majority."

This shield remains just as important in the digital era. In the wake of the Proposition 8 debates in California, major financial supporters of Prop 8 were routinely peppered with death threats, vandalism, and other intimidation tactics. Property was defaced, certain supporters were fired from their jobs, and some religious organizations even received envelopes containing white powder. The intimidation tactics were employed after the disclosure of the names, address, and employers of Prop 8 donors, providing would-be assailants with the data to construct a literal roadmap for violence.

President Obama rejects the condition of anonymity on political speech as a means of advancing controversial views, except (apparently) when it benefits his own party. In objecting to Citizens United, the president decried the donations of anonymous corporate-backed super-PACs to candidates, but he hasn't objected to the contributions of Majority PAC or American Bridge 21st Century—both of whom have substantial anonymous donor bases—to his reelection efforts in the West. Tellingly, his new order also does not require unions to disclose their political contributions.

Now President Obama appears to want to institutionalize the spoils system by making political affiliation part of the bidding process on federal contracts. Rather than awarding the contracts to the companies that provide the best combination of prices and services, the contracts may flow to political allies. These new disclosure requirements could turn discussions about cost and efficiency into purely political calculations by allowing bureaucrats to award contracts exclusively to their followers. Moreover, the public dissemination of this information on data.gov, as proposed by the order, would allow for violent backlashes by political opponents.

Anonymous speech has been protected by the First Amendment and affirmed by the Supreme Court. By allowing the White House to adjudicate federal contracts based on political donations, President Obama is jeopardizing a long history of valuable political anonymity in this country. Ironically, Obama warned that the Citizens United decision "strikes at democracy itself." The First Amendment is a vital part of that democracy.

Democrats putting youth out front

Some things in politics are subtle, largely unnoticed by the media. One is the House Democrats' obvious decision to go younger in the people they put on TV as party spokesmen.

The three top House Democratic leaders - Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi (D-Calif.), Minority Whip Steny Hoyer (D-Md.) and Assistant to the Minority Leader Jim Clyburn (D-S.C.) - are all over 70. Though still firmly in charge of the party leadership, they are pushing two younger congressmen - Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.), 52, and Steve Israel (D-N.Y.), 53, front and center as the TV spokesmen for the party. A third younger House member, Rep. Debbie Wasserman- Schultz (D-Fla.), 44, has also emerged as a national spokeswoman in her role as chairwoman of the Democratic National Committee.

All three of these younger Democrats have handled themselves well in the spotlight. Van Hollen is a cheery but firm presence on TV. Israel stays on message, hitting the party's talking points as chairman of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee. Wasserman-Schultz is a very tough partisan in going after Republicans.

It hasn't come a moment too soon.

Republicans went younger at the beginning of this Congress — with Eric Cantor (R-Va.), 48, as majority leader and Kevin McCarthy (R-Calif.), 46, as majority whip. Speaker John Boehner (R-Ohio), 61, is ten years younger than former Speaker Pelosi, 71.

Both parties know that the key electorate in the 2012 is voters between the ages of 35 and 60. Younger voters are likely to stay with President Barack Obama, but older voters are a battleground to be fought over on traditional issues like Social Security and Medicare.

It is these voters between 35 and 60, increasingly identifying as independents, who are expected to be the true battleground in both Obama's re-election and the Democrats' effort to re-take control of the House.

Decisions about who appears on television as party spokesmen don't happen by accident. Pelosi and Hoyer could have hogged the limelight because of their leadership positions. But they have chosen to let Van Hollen and Israel do much of the talking.

It helps that Van Hollen is the ranking Democrat on the House Budget Committee, and has been at the center of much of the budget deliberations for House Democrats. Israel, as the new

DCCC chairman, has taken a higher profile role than some past chairmen — as part of the campaign to rally the troops in recruiting and fundraising.

The contrast with Cantor and McCarthy has been helpful to Democrats and is a break from the past when the elected leaders did most of the talking.

A similar decision has been made in the Senate where Sen. Chuck Schumer (D-N.Y.), 60, of New York has been visible as a spokesman to assist Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-Nev.), 71.

The question now is how do Democrats proceed in the months ahead?

Pelosi, for one, could institutionalize Van Hollen's role by naming him to the 12-member super committee that will address further budget reductions between now and Thanksgiving. It would certainly by a popular choice though she has various factions inside the Democratic Caucus to deal with in making her three selections.

Politics can often be a subtle business. We are seeing a classic example of that right now.







Debt agreement is a positive step

The debt ceiling agreement recently passed by Congress and signed into law by the President, while not perfect, is a step in the right direction. Sensible spending cuts, not tax increases, are the right path to a balanced budget. Here's the quick outline of the plan:

The agreement will cut nearly \$1 trillion in federal spending during the next ten years. It also sets up a joint Congressional committee to recommend between \$1 and 2 trillion in additional cuts. The Committee's recommendations must be finalized by November 23rd and must be approved or disapproved by Congress before December 23rd, or \$1.2 trillion in across-the-board cuts would be triggered, starting in 2013. The only alternative to across-the-board spending cuts is Congressional approval of the Balanced Budget Amendment, which would require Congress and the White House to balance the federal budget.

I am a cosponsor of the Cut, Cap, and Balance legislation, which includes the Balanced Budget Amendment. It would reduce federal spending by as much as \$6 trillion dollars over 10 years. Unfortunately, it did not pass the Senate. I believe this capitol

security interests. The final debt limit agreement, although more limited in scope, is a step in the right direction. The agreement rejects the tax-and-spend policies advocated by the White House and Democrat-controlled Senate, and takes constructive steps in the direction of fiscal responsibility.

After months of political posturing and maneuvering aimed at increasing spending and taxes, the White House and its Congressional allies finally succumbed to fiscal responsibility on August 2nd, with approval of an historic new agreement. The new legislation marks the end of automatic debt limit increases. It has no tax increases.

Instead, a new precedent has been created that will require the president and Congress to offset increased federal borrowing with spending cuts that are at least dollar-for-dollar match. When President Obama was sworn

into office, the national debt stood at \$10.6 trillion – a stratospheric level. During only two and a half years of the Obama presidency, the national debt has risen to more than \$14.3 trillion. This almost inconceivable level of national debt is a heavy anchor on the American economy. It has stalled the job creation engine of our country and brought us to the brink of a double-dip recession.

On August 2nd, the debt ceiling agreement signaled an end to the status quo in Washington, D.C. Calls for fiscal responsibility from across Texas and across America are being translated into action. The thinking in Congress and in the White House has begun to change from "how much can we spend, and how much can we raise taxes," to "how much do we need to spend, and what should be cut."

Flu Vaccines Approved for 2011-12

Recently the FDA announced that it had approved influenza vaccines provided by six pharmaceutical companies for the upcoming 2011/ 2012 flu season. The six vaccines and their manufacturers are Fluzone (Sanofi), Fluvirin (Novartis Vaccines and Diagnostics), FluMist (MedImmune), Flulaval (ID Biomedical), Fluarix (GlaxoSmithKline Biological), and Fluria (CSL Limited). These vaccines are designed to protect against 3 strains of influenza; 2 strains called A-Strains (H1N1 and H3N2) and one B strain (Brisbane). These strains are identical to the strains included in the flu vaccines manufactured in the previous' year (2010/2011). A spokesperson for the FDA Center for Biologicals Evaluation and Research has indicated that "it is important to get vaccinated every year, even if the strains in the vaccine do not change, because the protection received the previous year will diminish over time and may be too low to provide protection in the next year". The CDC indicates that approximately 200,000 people are hospitalized each year due to complications associated with the flu and 3,000 or
