USDA extends **CRP** grazing

Donley County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Bruce Ferguson this week announced that, in response to drought conditions, the National FSA Office has extended the deadline for emergency having use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres for all Texas counties that are approved for emergency having.

Emergency having of land enrolled in CRP has been extended through September 30, 2011.

"Eligible producers who are interested in emergency haying of CRP must request approval before having eligible acreage," said Ferguson. "Producers must also obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service that includes having requirements," he said.

There will be a 25 percent CRP payment reduction for CRP acres used for haying under these emergency provisions.

Upon approval of emergency haying, producers must leave at least 50 percent of each field or contiguous field unhayed for wildlife. If a county is eligible for emergency haying and grazing, the same CRP acreage cannot be both hayed and/or grazed at the same time.

The Donley County Clerk's office reports this week that it received the petition last Friday from citizens in Hedley seeking to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages in that city.

County Clerk Fay Vargas said the petition contained 91 signatures, and 82 of those were found to be valid by County Tax Assessor Linda Crump this week.

Petitioners had said last week they needed just 64 signatures to bring the issue to a vote.

County Judge Jack Hali said the commissioners' court will review the petition at its next regular session on September 12.

The British Are Coming

New CC golf team attracts students from England

There are almost 5,000 miles separating London, England, from Clarendon, Texas, but that's how far two recruits were willing to travel to be part of the Inaugural Golf Team at Clarendon College.

The Enterprise sat down with these two young men, Alex Palomeque of Bristol and Jake Bond of London, both 18, along with their parents, Julia and Gavin Palomeque and Carol and Steven Bond, and Golf Coach and Athletic Director John Green to discuss their journey to Clarendon and their plans while attending CC.

Both Alex and Jake have played golf since age 12 and give almost identical answers to questions despite growing up 100 miles apart and only meeting Thursday.

Q: How did you find out about CC and what's different about being here?

Jake - The sports agency suggested Coach Green. When I found out (about Clarendon) I looked forward to coming to Texas. I was excited. I had no idea what Texas would be like. Everyone is so friendly here is

so friendly. People in London are so grumpy. The weather here is so much warmer and drier. It is quite lovely here.

Alex's Dad - I expected everyone to be wearing cowboy hats but I've seen mostly baseball caps.

Alex – A friend's brother had played football (soccer) through the agency that told me about Clarendon.

Coach Green - There are agencies in Canada, Europe, South Africa, and Australia. You build a relationship with them, and they know what you're looking for. We look for the whole package - athletics and academics. I'm convinced that we're going to the national tournament and these young men are going to

us there. Sports agencies work to connect athletes with colleges in U.S. Jake and Alex both intend to transfer to a four-year school after CC and both want to pursue careers in sports management - either as athletic directors or in the corporate world.

Jake – If I can keep a 3-point (grade average), I can move up.

Are their organized sports in schools in England?*

Alex's Dad (who teaches primary school) - There are organized teams but not like the American system. We have clubs outside of the

schools. What differences are there in school?

Alex's Dad - Academics are different here, and I think both boys are apprehensive. Testing is a concern due to the language differences.

Jake's Dad - We asked for the bill at a local restaurant last night and the waitress looked right through me. It's a check ... to us a check is something you draw funds from a bank with.

What other cultural differences here?

Jake - Everything is bigger and better here. We came in from the golf course yesterday and coach showed us the cinema (the Sandell Drive In). I thought he was joking. I thought it was an advertising board but it's a

Mackey accepts plea deal

A Memphis man who led police on a high speed chase through parts of Donley County and was shot by a local peace officer accepted a plea agreement when the district court met in Memphis on August 19.

Terry James Mackey was convicted for the first degree felony offense of assault against a public servant and sentenced to 30 years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ. Mackey pleaded guilty for the offense that took place on November 24, 2010, that was scheduled for a jury trial in Hall County on August

Mackey, 33-year-old resident of Memphis, was indicted on three charges by a Hall County Grand Jury on February 8, 2011, but the state jail felony offense of evading arrest and the assault against a public servant were dismissed pursuant to the plea of guilty on the first degree felony offense.

Mackey pleaded guilty to the offense involving the assault against Hall County Sheriff Tim Wiginton.

"The Hall County Sheriff's Office, Memphis Police Department and the Donley County Sheriff's Office were all involved in a high speed chase with this defendant on one of the heaviest traffic days in the year," said District Attorney Luke Inman.

"All law enforcement involved took every precaution possible to make certain no one was seriously injured due to the defendant's actions."

Mackey struck Hall County Chief Deputy Tom Heck at the Hall County Courthouse before evading arrest in a motor vehicle and struck Wiginton during the pursuit.

According to reports, Mackey was being arrested at the Hall County Courthouse on a warrant to revoke his probation for burglary when the incident occurred.

Donley County Deputy Mike Spier tried to stop the subject at County Road 26 on US 287 by shooting the suspect's tires. Mackie was hit by one round in the low back, but he continued to flee into Hedley.

Mackey's car was rammed and knocked off the roadway by Memphis Police. The subject then took off on foot across some CRP land where he was apprehended by officers from the Hall and Donley County sheriff departments.

Jay Foster with the Texas Rangers Division, along with DPS Aircraft Section Clay Shelton, provided aerial footage of the route the defendant took on that busy Wednesday before Thanksgiving, Inman said.

"Evidence collection throughout this investigation was key to this plea of guilty without the necessity of a jury trial this week," said Inman.

"It truly makes a difference in our preparation and presentation of cases when experienced, well-qualified law enforcement agents work the case and that is what we have in Hall County and the entire 100th Judicial District."

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Mackey is required to pay \$376 in court costs.

Spending the cause of US financial woes

We have failed to heed the lessons of economic history, with terrible consequences for our economy and country. And the most crucial of those lessons, particularly since the start of LBJ's Great Society, is this: deficits have been caused not by a lack of income-tax increases but by recession and, most of all, by excessive government spending.

The failure to learn that lesson is again on painful display, as President Obama travels the country pointing the finger at "the rich" for not forking over enough income. By this narrative, the 36 percent income-tax rate paid by the wealthiest Americans is somehow robbing the poorest Americans, whose income-tax rate is zero percent; something one would never know from Democrats' class rhetoric.

Because I comment on this topic so frequently, especially in the context of Reaganomics, I constantly deal with these issues from a historical perspective. Here, I would like to make it easy for everyone to see the numbers themselves and understand the root of the problem.

The answers are as easy as googling the words "historical tables deficit." Two sources pop up: CBO historical tables and OMB historical tables. "CBO" is Congressional Budget Office; "OMB" is Office of Management and Budget. These are the official go-to sources for data on deficits, revenues, and government expenditures.

Either source will work. To keep it simple, I'll focus on the OMB numbers. At the OMB link is Table 1.1, titled, "Summary of Receipts, Outlays, and Surpluses or Deficits: 1789-2016." That is an official scorecard of spending by the federal government since the founding of the republic.

Looking closely at the chart is an eye-opening experience. As the first two columns show, receipts (i.e., revenues) and outlays (i.e., expenditures) moved up and down throughout our history. In 1965, however, something historically unusual, something literally deviant, began: Spending increased every single year, non-stop, consistently, without exception, into the Obama presidency, from 1965-2009.

There are few constants in the universe: gravity, the sunrise, the oceans, the moon. Add another: spending by the federal government; it rises every year.

Significantly, revenues don't increase every year. The most dependable reason for declines in revenues is not a lack of tax increases, or high enough incometax rates, but recessions. Since 1965, as the data shows, annual revenues declined seven separate times.

At the start of the Great Society, in 1965, revenues and expenditures were nearly equal, with expenditures only slightly higher, leaving a manageable deficit of \$1.4 billion. By 2009, however, annual expenditures (\$3.5 trillion) had far outpaced annual revenues (\$2.1 trillion), leaving a record deficit of \$1.4 trillion.

Significantly, the biggest one-year drop in revenues was from 2008-9, when they declined from \$2.5 trillion to \$2.1 trillion. Worse, President Obama and the Democratic Congress responded with an \$800-billion "stimulus" package that didn't stimulate. In other words, they responded in the worst way: with another \$800 billion in government spending. That further mushroomed the record deficits/debt we face. The math is very simple.

Government spending, which has hampered growth rather than spark growth, caused this fiscal

It is crucial to realize that this spending addiction is a new thing in American history. Previous generations of politicians showed much more restraint. Prior to 1965, expenditures were not following an everupward trajectory; expenditures decreased year-to-year frequently, nearly two-dozen times between 1901 and 1965, even during the administrations of big-government liberal presidents, like Woodrow Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt.

This changed in the mid-1960s, when the federal government began a serious spending problem.

How do we communicate the crisis to the wider

public, beyond charts and data?

I suggest comparing the situation to a household: Your family's annual revenue has probably not enjoyed a 40-year-plus consecutive increase. For some years, you were paid less. Perhaps you lost a job, took a pay cut, or switched jobs. Maybe your spouse was laid off, or left work to have a child. You bought a house one year, another 20 years later, spent a ton of money on your children's college education, lost on a

I doubt your family's yearly revenue has been a steady upward climb since 1965. Life obviously doesn't work that way.

And yet, imagine if each successive year, without fail, you spent considerably more money than the previous, including money that isn't yours. You added debt each year, creating massive debts for your family and children. You paid taxes with a credit card.

How long would this go on before you ended up with a credit downgrade or in jail? Get the picture?

If President Obama and the Democrats don't, they should. Warren Buffet certainly should. Our fiscal crisis is due not to insufficient income taxes but uncontrolled, undisciplined spending.

To paraphrase Bill Clinton's 1992 campaign slogan, "It's the spending, stupid."

Alcohol sales will not help Hedley

Someone reading the two front page articles reporting on the petition for sale of alcohol in Hedley the last two weeks could be left with the impression that everyone in Hedley approves of the measure since no opposing views were cited in either article. That is far from the facts matter, consider Howardwick and case. Many citizens in Hedley strongly oppose this shift in public policy for several reasons.

Counties throughout Texas have remained dry for good reason. Others had the wisdom and strength of character to put safeguards in place to protect people and society as a whole from their own vices, recognizing the immorality of using others' weakness for personal gain. Alcoholism is a tragic and widespread scourge on our society.

The proponents of alcohol sales say, "Well, people are going to drink - so we might as well cash in on their habit. Better we gain the revenues than someone else." The response of a moral society is, "Yes people will drink, therefore we are under no obligation to make it easier for them. We need not sell it on their doorstep."

The supposed reason for the clamor to go wet is, "We need the money, revenues are down in Hedley." But increased revenues only benefit a local government if all other expenses remain the same and property values are maintained. If Estelline. Howardwick's increased revenues from alcohol sales were offset by increased law enforcement costs, including additional deputies and additional expenses for jail use and maintenance.

According to Texas Monthly, Estelline voted to go wet in May of 1983. In August, the high school closed. Four years later in 1987, the school district dissolved. The population has continued to dwindle from 297 in 1983 to 158 at the latest census. What happened to the grand promise of saving the town and increased revenue benefits? One or two businesses enriched themselves, leaving the community and the county to bear the negative side effects and damage control.

Selling alcohol is not a good answer for solving our problems. Sadly, choosing the legal sale of alcohol under the

guise of increasing revenues is a shortcut in the short run and will end up sabotaging real changes and innovations necessary for long term gain.

With the downturn in our economy and the added burden of devastating weather conditions, anyone trying to survive running a business large or small deserves understanding and community support. The town of Hedley and its businesses have survived without alcohol in the past, and they must adopt a plan greater than "sell alcohol" if the community hopes to be successful in the future.

It's time for responsible citizens of Hedley to say no to enriching a few at the expense of many, and have the courage to face the lessons of Estelline and Howardwick - alcohol sales won't provide measureable benefit, and will bring problems to our community.

budget impasse, the on-time pay of our military personnel was in jeopardy. It was unconscionable to think that our troops, particularly those in harm's way, would have to worry about whether or not they would receive their pay. So, I introduced legislation that would guarantee our military would be paid first in the event of a government shutdown. The bill gathered 80 cosponsors and generated a lot of attention on the situation facing our uniformed service members. Fortunately, my bill was not needed, as the 2011 budget was passed at the 11th

But just four months later, on the eve of our debt crisis, our service members' pay was once again in jeopardy. Again, I took to the Senate floor to promote my military pay legislation, and I will continue to work to ensure that our men and women in uniform are not faced with this uncertainty again.

In the coming months and years, Congress must take a hard look at where spending should be cut so we can get

our nation's fiscal house in order. But we should not be reducing the benefits of those who have sacrificed so much in the service of their country. Our military and our veterans, as they should, are merely asking that promises made will be promises kept.

As next month marks the tenth anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, we all should remember that the American people and our nation's soil has been valiantly protected in this last decade. Far from our nation's borders for 10 years of continuous combat, two and one half million men and women have been deployed to support combat operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. What is most remarkable is that nearly all of them joined the military after that tragic day in September 2001, and they all volun2 teered for service. They did not join for college money or to get tax-free groceries at the base commissary. They joined to fight for America, for our defense, for our values, and for our freedom, They joined to fight against a ruthless enemy, knowing that it might be the last job they ever have.

Generations of veterans have fought tirelessly to protect the freedoms we enjoy each day. It is essential that the American people never lose sight or take for granted the enormous sacrifices that have been made and will continue to be made by our military men and women who are ensuring that America remains a "shining city on a hill" - a beacon of hope to the world.

The Hedley Owls lost the lead and momentum late in the first half and never could get it back in a 59-42 loss to Lefors last Thursday night.

Hedley jumped out to a 24-14 lead with just over three minutes left in the first half, but turnovers and missed opportunities turned a promising lead into a 29-24 halftime deficit. Lefors extended the lead to 37-24 after an opening drive Hedley turnover, and from there the Owls were never able to get any closer than 7 points.


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DVT Therapy Following Joint Replacement

In July of this year, the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved an oral drug called Xarelto (rivaroxaban) for the prevention of a condition called DVT (deep vein thrombosis) in persons who have recently had either hip or knee replacement surgery. The safety and effectiveness of Xarelto was evaluated in persons undergoing these types of surgeries. The occurrence of DVT was significantly less in those who received Xarelto compared to those who received another prescription drug that is used for the same purpose. The most common side effect noted in clinical trials was bleeding. Health statistics indicated that about 80,000 individuals in the US undergo hip and knee surgery each year. Most are greater than 50 years of age and many suffer from arthritis.

DVT is a blood clot that forms in a large vein, usually in the legs or arms. The clot either partially or completely blocks the flow of blood in that area of the body. The greatest threat is the risk of the clot becoming dislodged and moving to the lungs where is can cause a pulmonary embolus, a potentially serious medical situation.


