# Babcock trial moved to Hall County

The trial for accused child killer Robert Babcock will be held in Hall County instead of Donley County following a pre-trial court hearing in Clarendon last Tuesday, December 20.

Babcock is accused of beating his son, who died on January 5. According to previous reports, preliminary results of an autopsy conducted the next day revealed that the boy died from blunt force trauma to the head and that he also suffered internal injuries from

trauma to the torso.

District Judge Stuart Messer last week partially granted the defense's request for a change of venue. Defense attorney Dale Rabe argued for moving the trial to Vernon or Wichita Falls, but District Attorney Luke Inman said he did not agree with moving the trial out of the district.

Judge Messer said the court would first try to impanel an impartial jury in Hall County before it would consider moving the venue further.

Babcock's attorney also sought permission to prepare questionnaires for potential jurors, and Messer allowed that request but asked the defense to collaborate with the DA's office in the preparation of the questionnaire.

Messer also granted the defense's request to independently verify the results of tests the state had performed of damage to a wall at the crime scene.

The defense also sought to suppress three statements – interviews of the defendant conducted by the

Donley County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Rangers – totaling 6½ hours of recordings. During the hearing, Sheriff Butch Blackburn and Texas Ranger Jamie Downs testified about interviewing Babcock last January. Both men testified that Babcock had been properly read his rights, that he never asked for an attorney, and that he remained calm throughout the interviews.

Judge Messer himself will review all 6½ hours of recordings before making a ruling on whether to allow them to be admitted as evi-

dence. Messer will also be reviewing autopsy photos that the state intends to use in its prosecution of Babcock.

Also on Tuesday, the court invoked a rule prohibiting potential witnesses in the case from being in the courtroom while other witnesses testify and from discussing the case with anyone except the attorneys in the case.

Babcock remains in the Donley County Jail with bond set at \$1 million. His trial is set to begin January 17.

then everyone released balloons into the air, followed by a Chamber ribbon cutting which concluded the ceremony.

All clinic times subject to change or cancellation due to weather conditions or unforeseen scheduling conflicts.

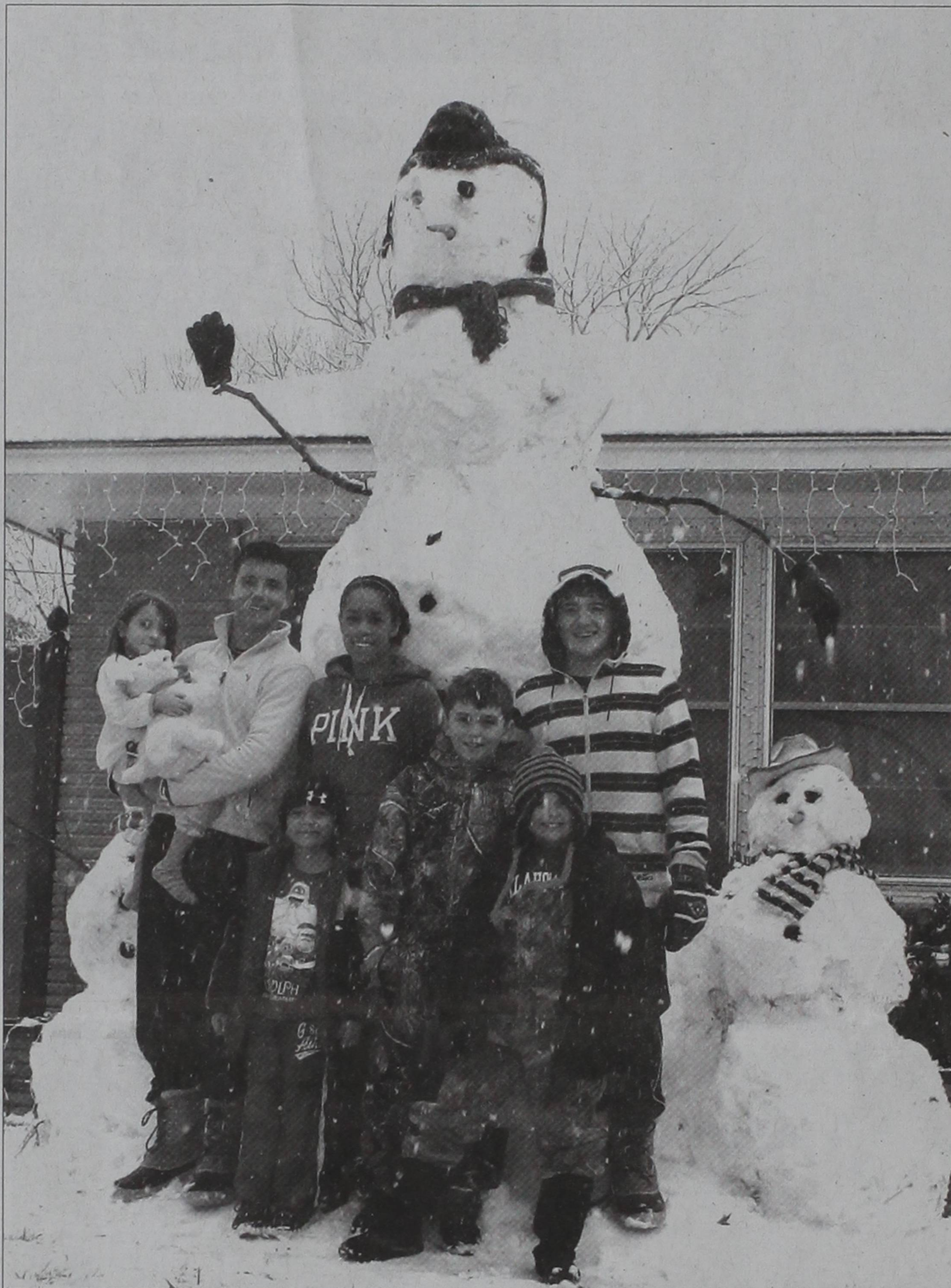

# 2011: Local man facing charges for murdering son

## January 5, 2011 Local man accused of murdering son

A Donley County man is facing a capital murder charge tonight in the death of his 4 1/2-year-old son.

Robert Monroe Babcock, age 38, will be arraigned tomorrow for the crime, which occurred yesterday morning.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said his office received a 911 call from Babcock Tuesday at 9:40 a.m. reporting that his son was unresponsive.

When emergency personnel and law enforcement arrived at the residence southeast of Clarendon, they found Chance Mark Jones on the floor in a bedroom, Blackburn said.

"It was obvious that he was unresponsive and evident that he had been assaulted," the sheriff said. "He had trauma to his head and torso."

The child was transported to Northwest Texas Hospital via Life-Star, and Babcock was taken in for an interview and held on a family violence charge.

Jones died at 6:42 a.m. this morning, and a capital murder warrant was obtained for Babcock. He was formally charged this evening.

## January 6, 2011 Babcock arraigned on murder charge

Thirty-eight-year-old Robert Babcock was arraigned Thursday morning at the Donley County Sheriff's Office by Justice of the Peace Connie Havens in connection with the death of his four-year-old son.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said bond was set at \$1 million on the charge of Capital Murder, a capital felony; and Havens also set a bond of \$100,000 on the charge of Domestic Violence/Injury to a Child, a first degree felony.

Authorities say Babcock beat his son, Chance Mark Jones, Tuesday morning, and the boy died as a result of his injuries Wednesday morning in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Blackburn said investigators believe the abuse began December 24 and "continued on and off until Tuesday morning."

Little, age 54, survived the crash and was extricated from his 1959 Cessna fixed wing single engine plane by the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department. He was transported by Associated Ambulance Authority to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he was in stable condition. The Texas Wing of the Civil Air Patrol reported that Little was being treated for an apparent broken leg.

## January 19, 2011 Thornberry scores high on AFP card

AUSTIN - Texas enjoys a strong position within Congress today, and there's no better way to gauge their potential leadership in 2011 than to look back over their legislative decisions in 2009-2010.

Who made the grade with America's taxpayers? Who didn't make the cut?

Americans for Prosperity released its scorecard for the 111th Congress today, and Texas' delegation continues to hold true to the state's reputation of fiscal responsibility.

Texas Senators Kay Bailey Hutchison and John Cornyn both earned "A" grades for their votes on 25 bills dealing with economic freedom issues that were key-voted by AFPP.

On the House side, 18 Texas congressmen earned either an "A+" or "A" grade on 19 key-voted bills. Among those earning an "A" was Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon), who scored 90 percent. Eight other members earned passing grades, and seven members earned a failing grade.

"Texans should know how their Congressional members voted on key policy issues," said AFP State Director Peggy Venable. "Three of the lower-scoring Texas members did not return for the 112th Congressional session and were replaced by fiscal conservatives."

## January 19, 2011 Unexpected company

Three strangers who literally dropped out of the air at one Donley County couple's home recently ended up staying two days and becoming good friends.

Bill and Betty Ann Sansing had been to a funeral Sunday afternoon, January 9, when they returned to their ranch home north of Clarendon. As they drove up to the house, they came upon a site they never would have expected—a helicopter had landed by their barn.

"We didn't know what to think," Betty Ann Sansing recalled. "We just wondered, 'Is this for real?'"

Just minutes earlier, Robert Myers, along with his father, Jack, and his son, Haden, had been flying in the four-seat Robertson R44 helicopter,

going home to Skiatook, northwest of Tulsa, Okla., after visiting relatives in Clovis, New Mexico.

"We thought we could make it to Watonga (Okla.), but we ran into fog," Robert said.

## January 26, 2011 State budget proposal targets colleges

Clarendon College and other Texas community colleges were shocked last Wednesday when a budget proposal from the Texas House of Representatives cut \$767 million from their funding and eliminated state support entirely for four colleges, including Frank Phillips at Borger.

But new CC President Phil Shirley urged people not to panic in the light of the news and said a lot will change before the final budget is approved.

"There is a lot of saber rattling going on right now [in Austin]," Shirley told the CC Board of Regents at its regular meeting Thursday. "There will be terrible recommendations, but I don't think the state will close anyone."

## January 26, 2011 Thornberry votes to repeal new health care law

Washington, D.C. — The U.S. House of Representatives last week voted to repeal the new health care law, taking the initial step toward rolling back the massive overhaul.

Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon), who sponsored the repeal bill, voted in favor of the measure, which is a straight repeal of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) and all health care and tax provisions in the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010.

"This law is bad for our businesses, for our patients and doctors, and for the country. It's already negatively affected care and costs. People continue to want it repealed, and tonight, the House took the first major step toward meeting that expectation," said Thornberry.

## February 2, 2011 DWI, assault cases lead pleas

The 100th District Court heard six pleas resulting in convictions in cases ranging from Driving While Intoxicated to Assault on a Public Servant and Burglary when it met in Clarendon last Monday, January 24.

A total of \$12,500 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on January 24. In addition to the fines, the defendants were required to pay a total of \$3,012 in court costs and \$22,000 restitution.

## February 10, 2011 Broncos roll on in District

The Broncos continued their dominance of District 3-1A last week as they rolled to a 6-0 record in District play.

Last Wednesday the Broncos took down Wheeler 60-39 on the road. Seniors Johnny Gaines and Brayden Phillips teamed up and accounted for 44 of the Broncos' total points.

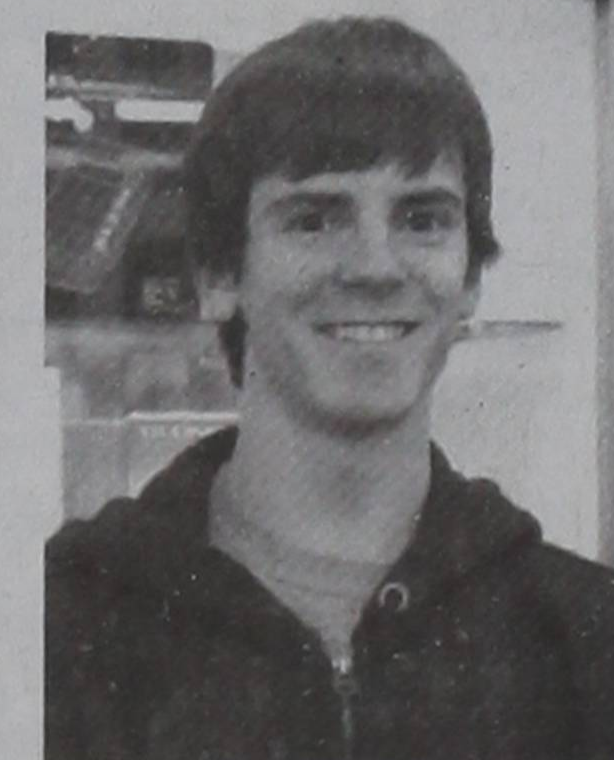

## February 10, 2011 Firemen have close call at accident

Four Clarendon firemen narrowly escaped injury or death while directing traffic at an accident west of town Saturday morning.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Chad Simpson said volunteer firemen Michael Newhouse, Jackie Bell, Chris Wilson, and Chuck Robertson were lucky to be alive after 82-year-old J.W. Noble of Claude sped past over half a mile of vehicles parked in the inside southbound lane of US 287 and narrowly missed the men.

Simpson said Newhouse had to run out of the outside lane to avoid being struck by Noble, who then ran through traffic cones set up to block the lane, and continued on a collision course with Bell, Wilson, and Robertson, who were standing behind a Clarendon fire truck. The three men also ran out of the way as Noble struck the fire truck, which was then knocked into a Nissan SUV driving by Michael Trevino of Weatherford, Texas.

"I'm so thankful that we didn't lose four of our firemen Saturday morning," Simpson said.

## February 10, 2011 Mulkey receives state recognition

The Mulkey Theatre was named to the list of Texas' Most Endangered Historic Places during an announcement at the State Capitol by Preservation Texas Wednesday morning.

The high profile designation had been sought by the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation and the Mulkey Advisory Committee as a way to raise awareness about the need to save the historic theatre.

Mulkey Advisory Committee Chair MaryRuth Bishop said the announcement draws attention to the importance of old theatres and to the work of saving the Mulkey.

"It shows the value put on the Mulkey not just by us in Clarendon but by others in Texas," Bishop said. "It really is priceless in a way, and it will help others see the importance of giving to save the Mulkey and make it a vital part of our community."

## February 10, 2011 Clifford wins Chamber's top award

Fred Clifford was honored with the 2010 Saints' Roost Award for his lifetime of service to the community during the annual Clarendon Chamber of Commerce Banquet Saturday night.

The Hedley Young Woman of the Year was Kaylee Shields, and the Hedley Young Man of the Year was Reid Copelin for excelling in all fields. Also recognized during the banquet were incoming chamber directors Britton Hall, Chrissy Woodrum, and Tex Buckhaults. Outgoing board members were Ashlee Estlack, Jerome Martinez, Henry Hermsmeyer, Susan Word, and Regina Wootten.

## February 16, 2011 City threatens to cut off Chamber funds

The City of Clarendon last week threatened to pull \$20,000 in funding from the Chamber of Commerce unless the organization changes the way it does business within 90 days.

The Board of Aldermen had expressed concerns to Chamber Executive Director Judy Burlin in the past about how the Chamber accounts for money it receives from the city's Motel Bed Tax, and those issues came to a head last Tuesday at the board's regular meeting.

"We have been trying to tell [Judy] for months that she has to improve the record keeping," Mayor Larry Hicks told the Enterprise. "Tax money has to be tracked penny for penny, and she has not kept track of it."

The city gives the Chamber \$5,000 per quarter from the Motel Bed Tax fund, and state laws dictate what types of expenditures the money can be used for.

## February 16, 2011 Broncos blow Cyclones away

The Clarendon Broncos are District Champions once again. They sealed the championship at home Friday night against Memphis with one game to play as of press time.

The 68-47 win was a just one

more example of how strong the Broncos are this year and their unchallenged dominance on the court. According to head coach Brandt Lockhart, the game was topped off by great offensive play.

"We had a season high of 19 rebounds," Lockhart said. "And we did a good job of forcing turnovers."

## February 23, 2011 Mulkey fundraising efforts get the spotlight

Fundraising to "Bring Back the Mulkey" is continuing and publicity for that effort got a boost over the weekend when Amarillo's ProNews 7 visited the historic theatre.

Reporter Matt Hamilton interviewed Clarendon Economic Development Board member Bill Stavenhagen, former Mulkey employee Renee Betts, and Donley County Historical Commission Chairman Jean Stavenhagen for the piece which aired Sunday evening and again Monday morning.

The report focused on local efforts to light up the marquee. The Bring Back the Mulkey Advisory Committee and the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation hope to have that done this summer, and have set a goal of raising \$20,000 toward that end.

As of this week, more than \$5,300 has been raised and another \$500 has been pledged for the marquee restoration.

## February 23, 2011 Few step forward to run for elections

Only three candidates have stepped forward to run for office one week into the sign-up period for local elections.

Former Clarendon alderman Tommy Hill has filed paperwork to run for that position again. The city will elect two aldermen and the mayor this year. Those positions are currently held by Mayor Larry Hicks and Aldermen Janice Knorpp and Ann Huey.

Donley County Hospital Board Director Melinda McAnear (Place 3) is seeking re-election. The hospital district has three positions coming up on its board this year.

The other positions are currently held by Bubba Newhouse (Place 2) and Wayne Tubbs (Place 1).

At Hedley ISD, Ted Wright has made it official that he will run for the remainder of the unexpired term he was appointed to last year. HISD also has three full positions up this year on the school board, and those seats are held now by James Lee Potts, Tonja Ruthardt, and Karen Watt.

Three other local governments have not had any candidates sign up as of Tuesday morning.

## March 2, 2011 College, school funding at risk

Clarendon College and local public schools are bracing themselves for what could be severe budget cuts as state legislators deal with a huge revenue shortfall this year.

Local officials are not yet sure how badly their budgets will be impacted as lawmakers in Austin search for ways to bridge the gap of an estimated deficit of between \$15 billion and \$27 billion, but they say people need to act now and makes their voices heard in support of education.

CC President Phil Shirley testified before the State House Appropriations Higher Education Subcommittee in Austin two weeks ago, and he reports that the college is facing the possible loss of between \$800,000 and \$1.3 million over the next two years. In the worst case, Shirley said CC would have to shed between 10 and 15 employees and look at every aspect of college spending.

"Nothing will be sacrosanct," he said. "We'll look at programs, the course offerings, everything. We're just going to try to protect our students as much as we can."

## March 2, 2011 Broncos advance

The Clarendon Broncos are moving on in post-season play after being named Area Champions by defeating Canadian 51-42 in Amarillo on Friday night.

The win put them in the Regional Quarter Final game against Gruver, which will be played on Wednesday night, March 2, at Tascosa High at 7:00 p.m.

The Broncos were in a dogfight Friday night as they tried to put space between them and the Wildcats. It was not easy, but senior standout Johnny Gaines took control of the game and the scoreboard as he finished with 34 points in the game.

## March 2, 2011 Weekend fires burn 590 acres

High winds and dry conditions were primary factors when about 590 acres of Donley County land burned on

Sunday, February 27.

According to First Assistant Fire Chief Jeremy Powell of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department, two different fires blazed that day.

"That was one of the worst days I've seen," Powell said. "The winds on both fires were 30 to 40 sustained with gusts of 60 miles per hour. The relative humidity was around nine percent. The atmosphere was really dry."

## March 9, 2011 Next stop: Austin

The Clarendon Broncos battled and muscled their way through two good opponents to capture the Regional Championship in Levelland at the Texan Dome on the campus of South Plains College.

Now, it all comes down to two games. The two most important games of the season await the Bronco team in Austin beginning Thursday.

The Clarendon Broncos suffered through a 41-year dry spell from the state basketball tournament, but broke new ground with a dominating team and a great coaching staff.

The last appearance at state by Clarendon's basketball team happened in 1970 when the Bronchos played for the state title but were defeated by Kennard. Several present Clarendon residents were part of that team. The Bronchos also made the state tournament the previous year but were defeated in the semi-final game. The 1968 team qualified for the Regional tournament but was unable to move on.

## March 16, 2011 Three boards to have competitive elections this year

Three local governments will hold competitive elections this spring, while three other governments might cancel their elections due to a lack of candidates.

The City of Clarendon, the Clarendon ISD, and the City of Hedley have contested races and will hold elections.

Clarendon Mayor Larry Hicks has filed to run for his office again, and three candidates are running for the two open aldermen's positions - incumbent Janice Knorpp former aldermen Tommy Hill and Terry Noble.

Estlack worked for 38 years at The Donley County Leader in Clarendon, beginning shortly after she married George Wayne Estlack in 1936. They became the sole owners of the paper in 1958. During her career, she was very active with the PPA and attended many conventions. She and her late husband sold the paper in November 1974 to The Clarendon Press, but the Estlacks remained in the office supply and printing business into the mid-1990s.

# 2011: Wildfire burns 300+ acres

## April 20, 2011 Elementary students receive free lifejackets

Lifejackets are now in the hands of 287 Donley County students from HeadStart through 5th grade thanks to the combined efforts of the Associated Ambulance Authority and Greenbelt Water Authority.

Hedley elementary students received their jackets last Thursday, and Clarendon students got theirs on Monday. Both sets of students learned about water safety from EMS, volunteer firemen, and representatives from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department.

Ambulance director Anna Howard said the project began last year when the ambulance service received a \$1,190.90 grant from the Panhandle Regional Advisory Council for injury prevention.

"We originally were just planning to have some lifejackets on hand and pass them out when we felt it was appropriate, but I mentioned it to Greenbelt and they matched the grant - and probably went over - and got jackets for all the elementary kids in the county."

## April 27, 2011 Greenbelt nears Stage 3 drought level

Conserve where you can and pray for rain. That's the message this week from Greenbelt Municipal & Industrial Water Authority, which is giving notice that it is in Stage 2 of its drought contingency plan and is nearing Stage 3.

The plan in both stages seeks to reduce consumption of water, but Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd says the real concern is weather.

"The problem is not usage. It's pure lack of rainfall and this hot, dry wind," Kidd said.

Greenbelt says the reservoir looses a huge amount of water - almost equal to what is consumed - to simple evaporation, which is worse in hot, windy weather.

## May 4, 2011 Shirley optimistic about future of Clarendon College

Clarendon College President Phil Shirley is upbeat after travelling to Austin last week as the State Legislature continues to wrangle with budget woes and the fate of funding for community colleges.

CC has balanced its budget for 2011-2012 under the assumption that its state funding would be cut by 13 percent, but Shirley said he was given words of encouragement by Rep. Warren Chisum.

"Everything is still in a holding pattern waiting for Susan Combs' final projection," Shirley said. "In two weeks we should know a great deal more."

## May 4, 2011 Green to lead CC athletics

Clarendon College has a new face overseeing Bulldog and Lady Bulldog sports this week as John Green takes the reins as the college's athletic director.

Green comes to Clarendon from Frank Phillips College in Borger where he spent 25 years as the AD and golf coach, and he was named the NJCAA Athletic Director of the Year in 2009, but he says sports will not be his sole focus.

"I'm a strong advocate of academics," Green said. "We want to set kids

up for success in life. Our games will be good entertainment, and I expect our kids to be role models."

## May 4, 2011 CEDC to open bids on Mulkey marquee

The Clarendon Economic Development Corporation will meet next Thursday to open bids for the restoration of the Mulkey Theatre's marquee.

The CEDC Board of Directors met Monday and authorized advertising for bids for the marquee work as well as for new electrical circuits for the sign and for repairs to wood framing and plasterwork on part of the theatre's overhang.

As of this week, fundraising for the theatre has reached nearly \$16,000 either donated or pledged for the marquee restoration.

## May 12, 2011 Plainview man runs, can't hide

A Plainview man was in the Donley County Jail Monday after he fled from state and local law enforcement last weekend.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said State Trooper Kellan Roberts had clocked a blue four-door Dodge pickup going at a high rate of speed on US 287 west of Clarendon shortly after midnight Saturday.

The vehicle fled north on SH 70 before turning onto County Road P and then turning back toward Clarendon on County Road 12. The vehicle end up in the bar ditch, and the driver, Raymond Morales, took off on foot. The sheriff's office and the Department of Public Safety searched for the suspect, and a DPS helicopter was called in from Amarillo to assist with the search.

After 2 a.m., the sheriff's office received a 911 call that a Hispanic man had run up to apartments on North Sully Street and was seen hiding under a carport there. Morales was arrested and booked into the jail, the sheriff said.

With the reservoir falling below a depth of 51 feet, officials with the Greenbelt Municipal & Industrial Water Authority have begun lowering

the levels in municipal storage tanks as a method of conserving water.

Dropping the water tower levels reduces pressure on municipal water systems thereby cutting back on the amount of water going through the system and even reducing leaks in the system.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd says the biggest conservation is coming from the City of Childress, which uses more than 50 percent of the water consumed from the lake.

"We dropped the level in their storage tank by three feet, and that is producing a significant savings," Kidd said.

## Local farmer has big goal for tomatoes

The Donley County farmer has 2,300 tomato plants set out on his land northeast of Clarendon where, despite the drought and high winds, the plants are coming along quite nicely.

Howard's tomatoes are irrigated beneath black plastic, and the plants themselves are in wire cages wrapped in clear plastic, which helps them produce more tomatoes.

"The wind causes vibration on the plastic, and that makes them pollinate and set tomatoes better," Howard said. "It also protects them from the wind and the sand."

## Mandatory restrictions in Hedley

Greenbelt is currently in Stage Three of its drought contingency plan, which calls for its member cities - Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah, and Crowell - to voluntarily reduce water usage by 30 percent.

"Water is the most precious resource we have," Wilkinson told the Enterprise. "If it's gone, we're gone."

## Greenbelt nearing Stage 4

Greenbelt Water Authority General Manager Bobbie Kidd told citizens at Hedley that conservation measures are helping, but Greenbelt Lake is still nearing the next trigger in its drought contingency plan.

"These restrictions are starting to make a difference," Kidd said at a called meeting of the Hedley Board of Aldermen last Friday. "We're seeing reductions in the systems we serve. We'll be down to one raw water pump tonight. That's about three million gallons, and that's unheard of this time of year."

However, the lake is just within inches of reaching Stage 4 of the drought plan. On Monday morning the Greenbelt was at a depth of 48.39 feet. The trigger for Stage 4 is 48.0 feet, and Kidd said he believes that will be hit between the first and middle of August.

Cities served by Greenbelt have been asked to implement their drought plans and achieve a 30 percent reduction in consumption. Hedley and at least two other cities have implemented mandatory restrictions.

The depth of Greenbelt Lake was recorded as 47.97 feet Tuesday morning, August 2, which is 0.03 feet below the trigger for the next drought level. Stage Four will not begin until the water authority gives public notice in newspapers of its member cities, and Greenbelt General Manger Bobbie Kidd said that might happen in a week or two.

Restrictions implemented by Greenbelt member cities are having an effect, Kidd said.

## Clarendon TAKS scores 'acceptable'

Clarendon Independent School District received a rating of Academically Acceptable from the state's accountability system this year due to increased standards.

The ratings are partly based on Texas Assessment of Knowledge & Skills (TAKS) scores. This year, in order to meet a Recognized rating, 15 - 24 percent of students must have commended performance scores, and 25 percent and up to be Exemplary. The state also removed the use of the Texas Projection Measure (TPM) this

year, which did not count students who would fail but were projected to pass in the future.

Clarendon Elementary received a Recognized rating, down from an Exemplary rating the previous two years. Clarendon Junior High went up from Academically Acceptable last year to Recognized this year.

Clarendon High received a rating of Academically Acceptable, same as last year.

Hedley Independent School District received a rating of Recognized again this year.

If the petition and later election are successful, Ruthardt said she wants to sell beer and possibly wine in her store to keep more business in Hedley.

## Clarendon declares Stage Four drought

The water level at Greenbelt Lake continues to decline this week, prompting the City of Clarendon to move into Stage Four of its drought contingency plan. The City of Hedley remains at Stage Three.

Greenbelt Water Authority reported a lake depth of 47.20 feet Tuesday, which is down from 47.48 feet last week.

Members of the Greenbelt Board of Directors discussed the falling lake level during their regular meeting last Thursday, August 18, but took no action pending the results of a long term engineering analysis of the reservoir. That report, which is expected in October, will look at the future of the lake and is also supposed to identify alternative sources of water to meet long-term needs.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd told the board that the authority's member cities - Clarendon, Childress, Crowell, Quanah, and Hedley - had all showing cutbacks in water usage, and he recommended not enacting further restrictions or implementing a system of water allotments at this time.

"I think we need to give our engineers a chance to report," Kidd told the board, "and I think people will do more to conserve if they can make their own choices how to do it."

## Court does not reduce Babcock's bond

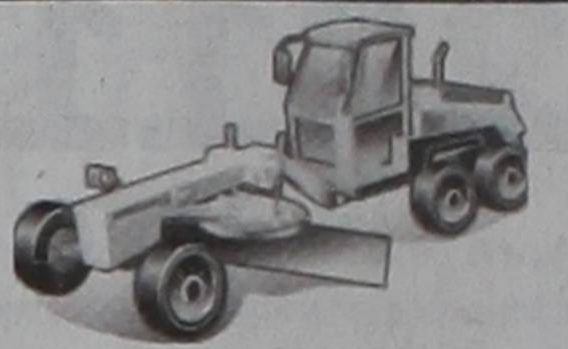
A \$1 million bond remains in place for accused child murderer Robert Babcock following a district court hearing in Clarendon last Thursday, August 18.

## September 1, 2011 Firemen battle blazes for three days

Welcome thunderstorms last week brought unwelcome wildfires with them and caused 16 volunteer firemen to log a combined 576 hours over three days.

First Assistant Chief Jeremy Powell with the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department said storms that moved into Donley County about 9:15 p.m. last Wednesday, August 24, contained heavy cloud-to-ground lightning, and firemen began receiving multiple calls at 10:30 that evening.

The first fire was on the Milton Mann property on south SH 70 and burned less than five acres before being brought under control.

Other fire calls that evening ended up being in Armstrong County, Powell said. The Clarendon Fire Department noticed several "glows" to the southwest of Clarendon and investigated only to find muddy roads with more than an inch of rain between them and the fires. The fires seemed to be put out later by rain.

But by 1:10 a.m. on Thursday, the fire department began receiving calls about multiple fires on the JA Ranch that were beginning to grow.

The department responded with three units and a tanker to extreme southwest Donley County on CR CC to a grass fire reported to be 20 acres and growing.

## September 8, 2011 Trustees approve \$5.4M budget

Clarendon ISD Trustees approve a \$5.4 million budget last Tuesday, August 30, reflecting a loss of more than \$400,000 in state funds.

Superintendent Monty Hysinger said the new budget is about eight percent less than the current budget, and he said falling enrollment is hurting the school district in addition to general education cuts by the state.

CISD also lost more than \$100,000 in federal stimulus money which expired.

## September 15, 2011 Hedley alcohol election delayed

A petition to hold a local option election in Hedley is valid, but voting to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages in that city won't happen until May.

Donley County Commissioners reviewed the petition containing 82 signatures during their regular session Monday afternoon and found it to be legal and in the proper format, but county officials say petition backers did not get it filed soon enough with the county clerk's office to be placed on the November ballot.

"A petition like this has to be in my office for 30 days, and then [the commissioners] have to vote on it prior to the 71st day before an elec-

tion," County Clerk Fay Vargas told the Enterprise.

But that doesn't mean there was anything wrong with the petition itself, Vargas said. And with a new law in place as of September 1, petition backers can now take their quest directly to the City of Hedley, where the Board of Aldermen will order the issue be placed on the May ballot.

## September 16, 2011 CC reports its third best fall enrollment

Clarendon College today reported its third highest fall enrollment in school history.

Clarendon College's fall headcount is 1,347, a decrease of 236 from the fall 2010 record enrollment of 1,583. The second highest enrollment was 1,422 in fall 2009.

This fall's enrollment reflects the loss of the prison education system which cut almost 200 students from the college's enrollment this fall.

These students were taught through the prison education system at the Roach and Jordan units of TDCJ, and were not funded by the state for this biennium.

## September 22, 2011 City cans trash rate increase

A proposal to raise sanitation rates in Clarendon has been shelved after receiving a cold reception from members of the Board of Aldermen last Tuesday.

City Administrator Lambert Little says the \$1.83 million budget he will

present for the board's approval next Tuesday night, September 27, will not include any increases in taxes, utility rates, or service charges.

Dropping the proposed sanitation rate increase means the city will likely not make about \$30,000 in planned equipment purchases next year, Little said.

The administrator had initially put forth a 30 percent increase in commercial and residential garbage rates.

"I know downtown merchants will holler because they are already paying about \$75 a month (on their city bill)," Little said at September 13 meeting, but he felt the city could defend itself because it wasn't going up on taxes.

Alderman Tommy Hill was the first to raise concerns about the rate increase, saying the city's rate was higher than some area towns, while Little said an increase would be in line with other towns.

"Our citizens are struggling just like the city is," Hill said.

## Study looks at Greenbelt's reliability

Greenbelt Lake is not likely to run dry, but steps need to be taken now to insure the lake's customers have an adequate water supply in the future.

That's the result of a study presented to the Greenbelt Water Authority Board last week by engineers from the Ft. Worth firm of Freese & Nichols, who spent much of the summer investigating the reliability of the Greenbelt reservoir.

"They started in June, and they assessed the reservoir and looked at other water sources," Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd told the Enterprise.

A Draft Assessment of Potential Water Supplies presented to the Greenbelt board found that "the reservoir will not go dry at current demand levels if the historic hydrology (inflow) is representative of future hydrology."

Kidd said springs which feed Greenbelt Lake were found to be producing about 3,850 acre-feet of water per year, but he also says evaporation has to be taken into account. And it is uncertain what effect the current drought will have on the local streams.

The engineers found that depletion of the reservoir has slowed in the last several weeks, which may indicate that the spring flow is returning. However, if the springs were to stop running and the drought was to continue, the report says Greenbelt Lake "has one to two years' supply remaining."

"The long term solution is groundwater," Kidd said.

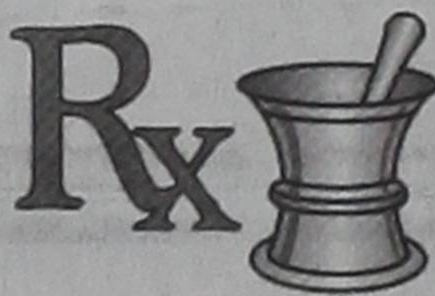

## Drugs in the News

### Treatment for Difficult-to-Control Epilepsy

According to study results published in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Academy of Neurology, a specific combination of medicines appears to be the best for resistant or hard-to-control epilepsy. According to the study, over 30 different prescription drug combinations were evaluated. Only one of the combinations produced a significant reduction in the number of seizures for those with this difficult-to-control type. That combination consisted of lamotrigine (Lamictal) and valproate (Depacon). Researches associated with the study indicate that this combination reduced seizure frequency by about half when compared with the other combinations used in the study.

According to one report, more than 3 million Americans have epilepsy and of that number, about one million have the form that is called difficult-to-control. The Epilepsy Foundation defines the goal of epilepsy treatment is to have no (zero) seizures with little or no drug side effects. Health experts add that good seizure control is a seizure-free period of at least 12 consecutive months.
