

# Democrats just keep on spending

Despite pledges to cut spending by the new Republican House majority, it appears spending during the current fiscal year, which ends on Sept. 30, will actually be greater than in fiscal 2011. The House Republicans were filled with good intentions, but they got snookered by President Obama and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid. Fool me once, shame on you. Fool me twice, shame on me.

The Tea Party crowd and other Americans who believe in fiscal responsibility are unlikely to be tolerant of and re - elect Republicans who are so incompetent that they cannot reduce federal spending and continue to fund programs that most of their voters oppose. The Constitution is clear. Article I, Section 9 states, "No Money shall be drawn from the Treasury but in Consequence of Appropriations made by Law." That is, only Congress can authorize the spending of money. It is true that the Republicans only control one half of Congress, the House, and that many of the Senate Democrats want higher spending, so the House Republicans are not going to be able to get all of the spending reductions they wish. But it also is true that the House Republicans can insist on reductions in overall spending and, particularly, get rid of unpopular and nonessential programs as a price for passing any of the necessary appropriations bills. The Republicans allowed themselves to get snookered last year by not insisting on the "regular order," whereby both the House and Senate are required to pass a budget resolution that sets the framework for overall spending. The various appropriations committees then are supposed to make their spending decisions within the limits set by the budget resolution. The House dutifully complied with the Budget Act and passed a budget resolution. The Senate did not - in fact, it has been three years since the Democrat - controlled Senate passed a budget resolution. Without a binding budget resolution signed onto by both houses of Congress, the appropriators basically had free rein, which is exactly what the majority of Democrats wanted. The president and many of the Democrats demonstrate time and time again that they care little about the rules or the Constitution. Just last week, Mr. Obama made clearly unconstitutional "recess" appointments even though the Senate was not in recess. As former Attorney General Ed Meese and Todd Gaziano of the Heritage Foundation wrote: "If Congress does not resist, the injury is not just to its branch but ultimately to the people. James Madison made clear that the separation of powers was not to protect government officials' power for their sake, but as a vital check on behalf of individual liberty. To prevent future tyrannical usurpations of power, Congress must act to redress this serious threat to our liberty." Again, Congress still has control of the purse, and even the big - spending senators cannot force an appropriation if the House majority does not approve it. Therefore, the Republican leaders must make it clear to the president, Democrats in the Senate and the American people that they will not approve any spending for programs or people that operate against the best interest of America or operate outside what is constitutionally permissible. Republicans should prepare a specific list of spending non - starters and make it known to all. They need to be clear that if any of the items are contained in a future appropriations bill or continuing resolution, they will make sure it is defeated. The list should contain only those items that would cause the president to have a politically impossible public - relations problem if he threatened to veto the specific appropriation bill or continuing resolution and thereby shut down the government if the items were not included. Republicans could start by insisting that no expenditure for salaries could be made for people not properly appointed with the advice and consent of the Senate as called for in the Constitution - that is, phony, non - recess appointments would not be funded.

## The undependable wealthy taxpayer

The President recently took the stage in Osawatomie, Kansas and delivered what looks to be his administration's definitive statement on income inequality.

Obama called this a "make or break it" moment for the American middle class. And he made it explicitly clear his favored solution for inequality is higher taxes on the rich, calling the current tax rules on top earners "the height of unfairness."

This idea is picking up steam well beyond the Democratic caucus. Even Warren Buffet wants higher rates on the wealthy. In this push, however, tax activists are ignoring an inconvenient truth: a tax system heavily dependent on the wealthy is highly volatile and a breeding ground for bitter budget battles.

Consider three examples.

The first is California. The Golden State has been stumbling for years. We can blame its economic woes on a wide range of things, including environmental regulations, unstable electricity markets, and tax rates that have driven businesses to Colorado, Texas and elsewhere. But we can also see that its budget deficits are, in large part, due to movement in one category of taxpayers. From 2007 to 2008, California saw a sharp decline in taxes paid by those with incomes above \$200,000 a year. After crunching the numbers, UCLA professors Andrew G. Atkeson and William E. Simon Jr. concluded in January that this decline accounted for "fully 93 percent of the decline in total tax

revenues from 2007-08." A collapse in taxes paid by the wealthy put the state into the red.

The second example is New York. A full fifth of the Empire State's revenues come from taxes on financial companies. So the economic collapse of the past few years has led to plummeting revenues and a huge increase in public debt. In June 2007, the sixteen highest taxed banks paid \$173 million to the New York treasury. A year later, as the country was about to plunge into financial panic, those same firms paid just \$5 million in state taxes - a 97-percent decrease.

For all the trouble they have had, at least California and New York have confronted their budget problems in real time - however misguided their tax-rateraising approach.

Our third example – the federal government - shows us that putting off the day of reckoning doesn't make it

15 percent of GDP, down from 18% or more in recent years.

Back in the early 2000s, when public officials thought tax revenues from the wealthy would remain robust, it looked like the feds might actually pay off the national debt. Today, with spending far outstrips revenues total federal debt has climbed to \$15 trillion.

This is spike in national debt is precisely the danger of a tax system overly dependent the rich. And it's a very good reason to believe that hiking rates on the "one percent" won't solve our budget problems.

The truth is that the wealthy are unreliable taxpayers because their income is volatile. So a deadlocked super committee might have saved us from a Washington deal that would have left us more dependent an unstable tax source - the rich - and thereby has provided us with an opportunity to debate a reliable solution to our debt problems: economic growth. Instead of seeking to tax the rich, we would do better to curb excessive spending and concentrate on enacting policies, such as tax simplification, aimed at sparking economic growth. With growth all things are possible. We can lower unemployment, raise living standards, and pay down our national debts. What's more, in a booming economy we'll also likely find that the wealthy are once again paying a bumper crop in taxes. Brendan Miniter is Senior Editorial Director at the George W. 

According to data from the IRS, between 2007 and 2009, the number of tax filers with reported incomes of \$1 million or more decreased from 390,000 to 237,000. As a result, the taxes paid by this group dropped 42 percent – from \$309 billion to \$178 billion. The dropoff in tax payments gets steeper the higher up the income ladder you go.

In the same period, the number of Americans with incomes of \$10 million or more fell by 55 percent - from 18,394 to 8,274 – causing tax revenue from this category to drop by 51 percent. Falling tax revenue from the rich is a huge reason federal revenues are now just


The GOP and others have rightly complained about regulatory excess, but they need to put someteeth in these complaints by refusing to allow funding for regulations that have not been justified by a truly independent cost - benefit analysis, so the Environmental Protection Agency could not get away with unnecessarily attempting to shut down many needed power plants. ## Texas leads in science, innovation

Our state's world-class research institutions, combined with our state's pro-growth tax and regulatory policies, have made Texas an oasis for scientists, researchers, and inventors. As incubators for groundbreaking new technologies and research, our university-based innovation hubs are also magnets for savvy entrepreneurs, new businesses and industries - and for the new jobs that they create.

This past year, our state's leadership in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) was underscored by the international recognition garnered by two of Texas' brightest stars, one a distinguished scientist with decades of experience and the other a high school student beginning her career. Dr. Bruce Beutler of The University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center won the 2011 Nobel Prize in physiology / medicine. His research enables scientists and doctors to understand humans' abilities to respond to infectious diseases and cancer, and is helping to develop new treatments for a broad spectrum of diseases. As a member of The Academy of Medicine, Engineering, and Science of Texas (TAMEST), and now as the state's 10th living Nobel Prize laureate, Dr. Beutler proudly carries on the Texas tradition of achievement in the STEM

ing crossdisciplinary science in our state we have improved the quality and impact of the research that Texas produces. Second, TAMEST has been a terrific tool for attracting the best scientific talent to our state. Third, since TAMEST's creation in 2004, Texas' share of federal research and development dollars to universities has increased to more than \$1.8 billion annually - from 6th to 3rd in the nation. On January 11th, TAMEST will kick off its 9th Annual Conference in Houston - welcoming 17 new members - all of whom have achieved membership in the national academies, as is required for every scientist, engineer, and doctor invited to join TAMEST. As successful farmers know, you can't eat your seed corn. Likewise, America must continue investing in research to foster the innovation that fuels our economy. A year ago last month, the America COMPETES Act, legislation to reauthorize the key science agencies responsible for supporting basic research, was approved by strong, bipartisan majorities of Congress. As the ranking Republican on the U.S. Senate Commerce Committee, which brought forward this legislation, I'm also proud

that Congress acted in a fiscally responsible way, by eliminating several duplicative federal programs in order to focus on high-value research.

One of the goals of the America COMPETES Act is to encourage our young people to take science and engineering courses in college, so they can keep our economy strong in the future through research and innovation.

This past year, one Texas high school student stood out: Shree Bose of Fort Worth. Following in the footsteps of giants like Dr. Beutler, Shree won the 2011 Google Science Fair's \$50,000 Grand Prize Award for her research on ovarian cancer, which she conducted with her mentor at the University of North Texas.


### **USDA** drops rate for home loans

The US Department of Agriculture Rural Development has announced a decrease in home mortgage interest rates for its Direct Homeownership Loan program. Effective December 1, 2011, the interest rate was reduced to 3.25 percent for home mortgages. The interest rate stayed the same for January 2012. This is the lowest interest rate ever offered by the Agency.

Homeownership opportunities are available under this program with no down payment, and provide for long-term, fixed interest rate financing. Applicants must have acceptable credit history and repayment ability. Homes must be located in eligible rural areas and be modest in size and cost. Rural areas are communities with a population of 20,000 or less.



purchase a home through the USDA Rural Development Direct Homeownership Loan program. Depending on household income, mortgage payments may be further subsidized to as low as 1 percent interest rate. The program is available to households with incomes at 80 percent or less of the county median income.

Funding is for the purchase of an existing home or for new construction in rural areas. For example in the rural communities of Armstrong, Carson, Potter and Randall Counties, a family of 4 with an adjusted gross household income of less than \$46,500 could qualify for this program. ### Flu Shot OK for Children with Egg Allergy

According to the results of a two year, multi-center study presented at a recent meeting of the American College of Allergy, Asthma, and Immunology, it is now considered safe for children who have a severe egg allergy to receive the annual flu shot. The vaccine is manufactured using eggs that contain protein to which some individuals are allergic. Previously, the American Academy of Pediatrics Red Book considered a severe allergy to eggs as a health risk. This risk was actually listed as a contraindication, meaning you should not receive this vaccine. That contraindication no longer exists.


Health experts now recognize that the finding of this and other studies are important in protecting the health of young children, even children with a history of egg allergy and those with asthma. Two different health organizations suggest that if the child can eat cooked eggs, the health care provider caring for that child may give the flu vaccine. It is further recommended that children with a history of anaphylaxis (severe allergy) receive their vaccine from health providers that are experienced in managing reactions to vaccines.
