Created by the Texas Legislature in 1987, the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science (TAMS) is a two-year, residential, early college entrance program serving approximately 380 Texans at the University of North Texas. The TAMS Advisory Board consists of nine members who offer advice on curriculum, student life and admissions. Seliger's term will expire August 31, 2015.

If Mitt Romney gets the GOP nomination, prepare for a season of class warfare in America unlike any before. Not only has President Obama been pushing class warfare unceasingly for three years now, but his chief strategist, David Axelrod, has been employing precisely this tactic against Romney, and well before Newt Gingrich and Rick Perry started harshly criticizing Romney's Bain Capital work.



For a century, Girl Scouts has fostered courage, confidence, and character. Today, the possibilities are limitless for young women. And I am honored to be a part of an organization that empowers young women to pursue their goals - no matter how high. 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Which Republican stands in the way? The leading candidate is Mitt Romney, who happens to be the candidate Axelrod and Obama want to run against. "Ax" is slicing up Mitt for an Occupy Wall Street feast. He sees Mitt as a hunk of red meat for the Occupy movement, the poster-boy for Wall Street greed.

"Obama officials intend to frame Romney as the very picture of greed in the great recession-a sort of political Gordon Gekko," reported an August 2011 Politico piece, titled, "Obama plan: Destroy Romney." The article quoted Axelrod: "He [Romney] was very, very good at making a profit for himself and his partners but not nearly as good [at] saving jobs for communities. He is very much the profile of what we've seen in the last decade on Wall Street."

This, mind you, was still before Occupy Wall Street exploded in September and October.

The Politico quoted a "prominent Democratic strategist" close to the White House: "Unless things change and Obama can run on accomplishments, he will have to kill Romney."

Well, indeed, Obama and Axelrod will run on Romney-tire-tracks and all.

Axelrod has steadily maintained this caricature of Romney. "He says he represents business," Axelrod told MSNBC in October, "but he really represents the Wall Street side of business."

Last Sunday, Axelrod told ABC's George Stephanopoulos that Romney is "rooting" for economic decline. He described Romney as a nefarious outsourcer of "tens of thousands of jobs," who "closed down more than 1,000 plants, stores, and offices" and "took 12 companies to bankruptcy." As this rapacious profiteer cheerfully destroyed companies and businesses and shops and shop-owners and the poor and the meek and the downtrodden and the crippled and the lame, "he and his partners made hundreds of millions of dollars."






to crack down the dog problem and strictly enforce the local requirement for a dog tag and the state law that dogs be vaccinated for rabies.

Pit bulls are a particular problem for the city, accounting for more than 50 percent of the reported dog calls, Christopher said. Over the weekend a local woman reported a neighbor's pit bull killed her cat, and Christopher said there was another case of a pit bull killing two cats.

"We're going to have to see about restricting pit bulls in the city," he said.

City Administrator Lambert Little said the Board of Aldermen will consider that issue at a called meeting next week.

Producers are encouraged to apply for CSP throughout the year to be considered for current and future application ranking periods. Those who apply by January 27, 2012, may be eligible for current available funding. Eligible lands include cropland, pastureland, rangeland and nonindustrial forestland.

A CSP self-screening checklist is available to help producers determine if CSP is suitable for their operation. The checklist highlights basic information about CSP eligibility requirements, contracts obligations and potential payments. It is available from local NRCS offices and at http://www.nrcs.usda.gov/ wps/portal/nrcs/main/national/programs/financial/csp.



Drugs in the News

ADHD Medicines Shortage Reported

A problem that is getting more attention in the media relates to a shortage of many prescription drugs. One report indicates that this shortage has existed for the last four to five years. It is reported that in 2011 the shortage affected a record 267 different medications. In comparison, in 2004 the number of prescription drugs that were in short supply numbered less than 60. A recent article in the New York Times focused on the shortage related to drugs for attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD). That article indicated that there were hundreds of patients complaining to the FDA about shortages of drugs like Adderall and Adderall XR. The Boston Globe reported that the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry had told its members that shortages were widespread nationally.

News stories about the ADHD medicine shortages point out that part of the problem appears to be based on the limited amount of active ingredient released by the Drug Enforcement Administration to drug manufacturers of drugs that are highly controlled such as Adderall and other stimulant-type controlled substances.






